Speaking before the Kiwanis Club of Sedalia, Jesse W. Barrett, attorney general of Missouri, said that when taxing authorities "soaked" the public utilities with heavy taxes, they were merely "soaking" the pubhic which used the utilities; that higher taxes inevitably meant higher rates for service rendered by the utility companies, and that the general public in the end paid all taxes thru the rates they pay for service.
