"MY TURN"

IF YOU ARE among the group of folks who used to wear penny loafers, poodle skirts and pony tails, then perhaps you can remember the three-cent postage stamp and the penny post card.

The last letter you ever mailed for three cents would have been on July 31, 1958. In that same month, Alaska had just become a state and President Eisenhower signed a bill creating the National Aeronautics and Space Administration (NASA).

Earlier that year, Joanne Woodward won the Oscar for "Three Faces Of E..." and Alec Guinness won for "Bridge On The River Kwai." This "My Turn" column-writer had just received an engagement ring from a fellow journalism student at Texas Tech (you know the guy who writes "Star Lites" in this space every other week).

Drive-in movies were all the rage. Elvis Presley and rock and roll had taken over the music industry. Music has been getting louder and postage has been getting higher ever since that time.

On Monday of next week, April 3, 1988, you will pay a quarter to mail a letter first class in the good old USA. This is an increase of 1150 per cent since first class postage was established at two cents per ounce 103 years ago in 1885.

The three cent stamp was in effect for 28 years. There have been 11 postage rate increases in the 30 years since we said goodbye to that three cent stamp. However, the postal service prefers to put it in a different context. A recent release by the USPS points out that, with adjustments for inflation, the three cent stamp in 1932 would have been worth 25.5 cents.

Perhaps we are simply going backward in time. Before postage stamps and a standard postage rate were established, it cost 25 cents to send a letter of one sheet of paper going 450 miles or more. A letter going 40 miles or less was around six cents. This was in the early 1800s and these rates were considered quite high even then.

I don't know how they delivered mail in those days. The Pony Express method was not begun until 1860. No envelopes were used and there were no stamps. Letters were simply folded over so as to show how many sheets of paper were being mailed. The postmaster wrote the amount of postage due on the outside of the letter, and I suppose anyone along the way would be free to read your epistle if he desired to do so. This would tend to make writing love letters rather public and embarrassing.

Since the start of the current one ounce standard system, the rates have been:

- July 6, 1932: 3 cents
- Aug. 1, 1958: 4 cents
- Jan. 7, 1963: 5 cents
- Jan. 7, 1968: 6 cents
- May 16, 1971: 8 cents
- March 2, 1974: 10 cents
- Dec. 31, 1975: 13 cents
- May 29, 1978: 15 cents
- March 22, 1981: 18 cents
- Nov. 1, 1981: 20 cents
- Feb. 17, 1985: 22 cents
- April 3, 1988: 25 cents

In the engineering division, Deena Willard won the Army Achievement Award.

In microbiology, Lisa Weatherly won the Outstanding Achievement Award from the Society of Microbiology.

Kelley Cash placed second in headline writing with Jana Renner third. Julia Warren gained a spot with a third place in number sense.

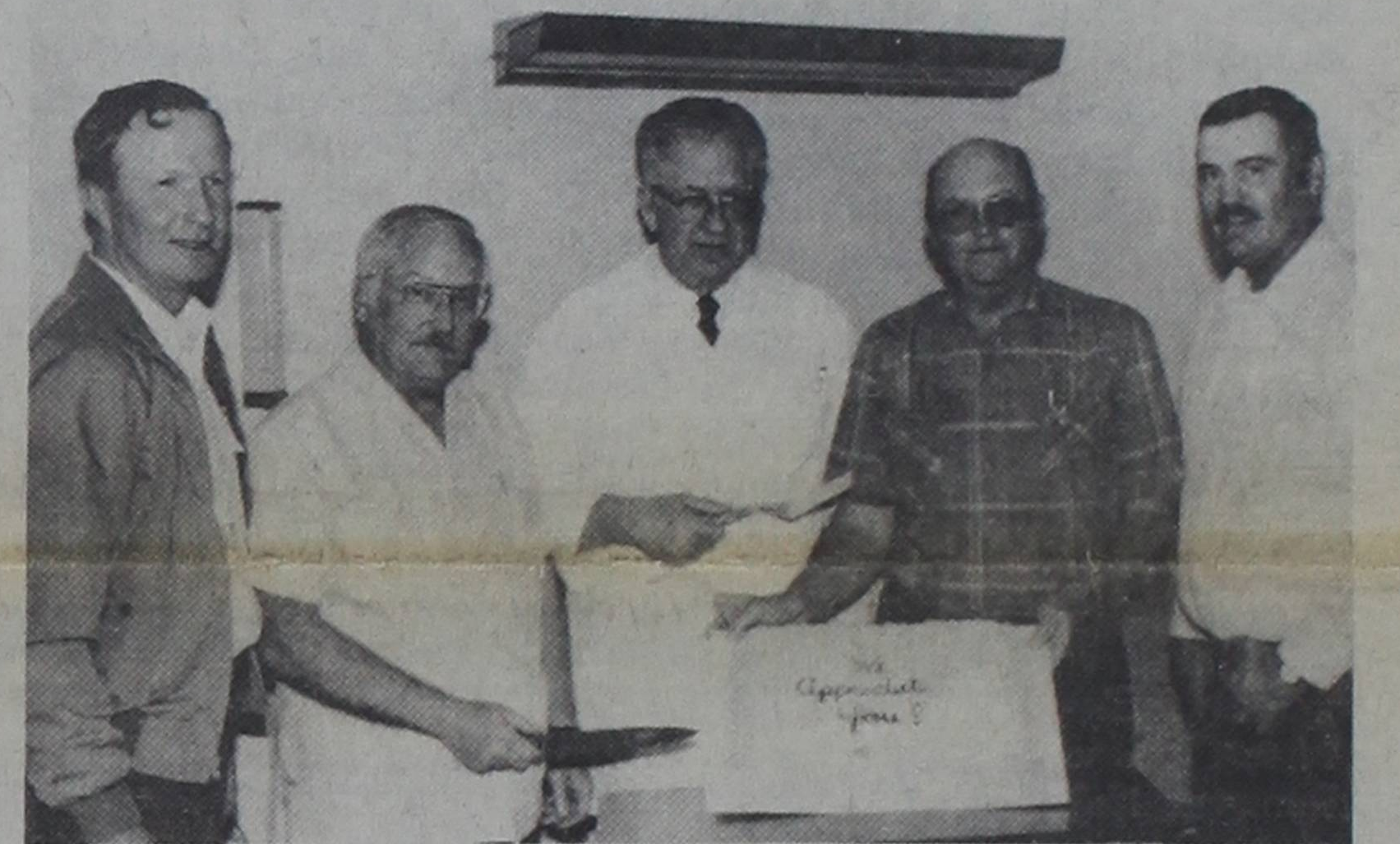

Silent Auction Set For "Eata Fajita"

Several interesting items have been donated for the silent auction which will be held during the evening of April 15 at the "Eata Fajita" benefit dinner, as a fundraiser for the restoration of the Old Santa Fe Depot.

The gala event is being sponsored by the Community Heritage Society and is scheduled for Friday evening, April 15 at 7 p.m. in the Junior High Cafeteria. Tickets, at \$6.95 each are available around

town from Heritage members and will also be available at the door on the evening of the dinner.

Among the items which have already been donated for the auction are a crocheted afghan, a silk flower arrangement, a set of cookbooks, hand-made quilt, a collector's Madame Alexander doll, a painted sweatshirt, and various other small handicraft and antique items.

Any business, group or individual who would like to donate an article to the benefit auction should contact either Beth Thompson, Dottie Osborn or Carol Ellis by April 10.

The Community Heritage Society is a non-profit organization and so the monetary value of any donated item can be considered as a charitable contribution for IRS purposes.

The silent auction will work thusly: the donated articles will be displayed around the room at the "Eata Fajita" dinner. A pencil and paper will be provided with each item.

The dinner guests will be given plenty of time to look over the items and write down their name along with an amount of money which they wish to bid on any of the items. Then if someone wishes to "up" a bid which has already been made on a certain article, they simply write down their name with a higher bid.

An end to the bidding will be called for at some point during the evening, whereupon the persons placing the highest bid on each item will become the owners of those items.

Two exciting guest artists will be on hand to add to the festivities of the benefit. Amarillo artist Ben Konis will be signing prints of his sketch of the old depot as it appeared "down on the tracks" about 20 years ago.

The signed depot prints will be available for \$7.50. They are suitable for framing at 11 x 14 inches in size. A sample of the sketch is currently on display in the window of the Ethridge-Spring Agency on Main Street.

One young man who grew up in Friona, Gary Mingus, is now a well-known professional musician in Amarillo. He will be providing dinner music for the evening on his electronic Yamaha Clavinova.

Area Gets Needed Moisture--April Fool!

The Friona area received its first appreciable moisture of the calendar year 1988 this week, when a spring snowstorm finally broke a several-months drought by dumping much-needed moisture on the area.

The storm started in the form of rain on Thursday night, with a light rain falling up until about midnight. Sometime later, the rain changed to snow, and residents awoke Friday morning to find that their "April Fool's joke" was in the form of about three inches of snow on the ground.

The snow was extremely wet, and posed threats to trees and power lines by the added weight.

Up until midnight, the area had received approximately .35 inch of moisture in the form of rain, and the additional snow should place the total moisture at near the .7 inch mark as of 8 a.m. Friday, when it was still snowing.

(One irony of the snowy day Friday was the fact that this was a makeup day for Friona school children, who had to attend classes on Good Friday due to a missed day of school earlier--due to snow.)

Farmers hailed the moisture as a boon to the area's agriculture. Clyde Woodard, who farms in the Hub area, said that the dryland wheat was badly in need of moisture, and that this would be a tremendous help. Woodard said the moisture in his area might approach an inch. "We'll

need more. I haven't started my irrigation wells. But this will help, that's for sure," Woodard said.

After having good moisture to start with, the wheat crop has had precious little moisture in the area since the first of the year.

Rural residents also woke up Friday morning to another surprise, as many were without electricity to start their day, due to heavy snow causing power outages. As far as could be determined, no power was lost in the city of Friona. The early-morning snowfall was accompanied by lightning.

Friona's official moisture measurement was two inches of snow, with .47 inch of moisture for the rain and snow as of 8 a.m. Friday.

Riding Club Will Host Egg Hunt

The Friona Riding Club will sponsor their annual Easter Egg Hunt Sunday at 2 p.m. (weather permitting).

The hunt is conducted each year as a free treat for the children of the Friona area.

There will be four age groups--ages one and two; three to five; six to nine and 10 to 12.

Prizes will be awarded for the hunter in each group finding the most eggs, and there will also be a prize egg, officials said.

V58W 115-117 Days

In the area where 115-117 day hybrids are grown, none is better than V58W. From the Texas high plains, the Ohio Valley and into the central and southern Corn Belt, this corn is the standard by which other hybrids are compared.

Plants are medium tall with mid-placed ears. Grain quality and ear retention is better than most competitive hybrids. The dry-down rate is faster than most hybrids in this group. Population will vary with the area grown and whether or not it is irrigated.

FC 550 112 Days

FC 550 is unique in that it is one of the best producing hybrids available and its milling qualities are excellent. Plants are full-sized; leaves are fairly upright, wide and are a medium green. FC 550 stalk quality is outstanding. This hybrid flowers like a full-season hybrid but dries very fast once maturity is achieved.

Population should be maintained at a fairly high level. It makes sense to grow this yellow even if you don't have a contract for sale. Good quality grain is always in demand.

V68AW 117 Days

This is a superior new white single cross for south central and southern white corn production. In testing, V68AW has shown high yields, good stalk quality as well as good heat and drought resistance. Plants are tall, ears are medium placed and leaves are wide and dark green. Grain quality is superior-large pearl like white grain.

V68AW is adapted from the southeast and through the mid and deep south areas to south Texas and California. Good shuck coverage and disease resistance help make it an excellent hybrid in full-season areas.

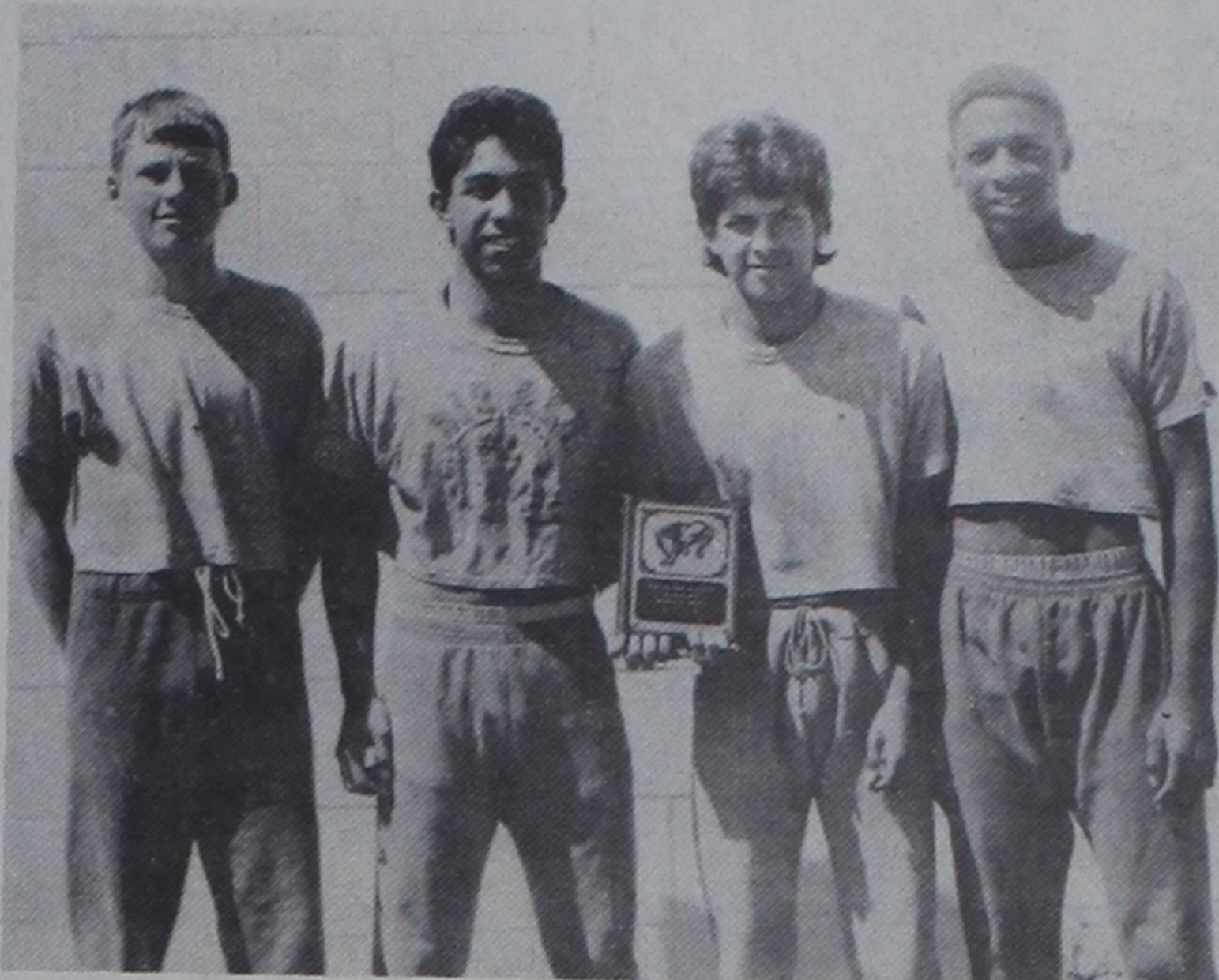

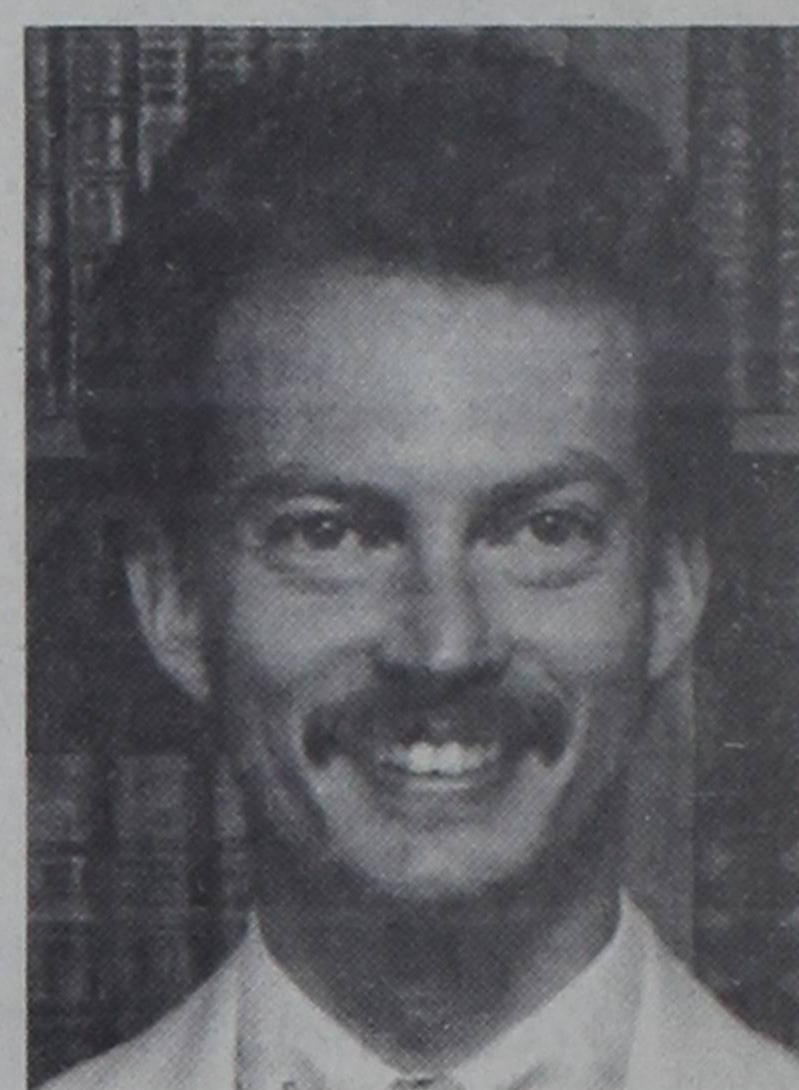
Cody Burney placed sixth in the high jump with a jump of six feet.


