

#### MODERN EDUCATION

By THOMAS ARKLE CLARK Dean of Men. University of

T IINGS are done better in the schools now, so those who ought to know assert at least, than they ever Psychologists, and pedagogues and architects, and trained nurses have worked hard to look after the child, to tell how to house him in school, what and how to teach him, and how to make him play systematically whether he wants to or not.

We teach him something about almost everything in these days. He can drawn cartoons of his teachers, and design and make his own pajamas. and play the saxophone, and bake biscuits, besides knowing something of journalism, and stenography, and basket ball. The extent of the knowl edge with which the high school graduate has at least had mental or physical contact is amazing.

As I look back upon the conditions under which I was taught as a boy and consider the educational training of those who acted as my teachers. and compare these things with the conditions of today, I marvel that I ever learned anything. Until I entered college I had but two teachers wh had been farther than the eighth one teacher who had had a year or two of high school and another who had graduated from a second-rate college. We learned only a few things in those illiterate days, but what we learned we learned very well. We could spell and we enjoyed doing it. and learning to spell as we did stand ing upon our feet, we learned to proa small per cent of the young people who come to college today can spel! "accommodate" or "sophomore" "transferred" or "athletics" or "re ceived" or a score of other words which we use almost daily. Not 10 per cent of the young people in college whom I know can pronounce "dis charge" or "penalize" even if they were members of the A. E. F or played upon the village football team, or lustrate" or "data."

We learned to manage figures pretty easily even "in our heads," to reason and to work out difficult problems. asked a college freshman a few days ago to give me the square root of 169 and after spending ten minutes with pencil and paper, he gave it up as too much for him. I could have done it at ten in my head and so could any other normal boy in my class.

We learned to parse words and t diagram and to analyze sentences, and to determine the various relationships between them. These are almost unknown accomplishments today, and words and phrases and clauses in pres ent-day compositions go wandering of by themselves, as does the moder young person, without any regard for their parents or other linguistic rein



### SATTERWHITE NOT IN RACE

AUSTIN, Texas, Sept. 16 .- Speaker Lee Satterwhite of the House of the Thirty-ninth Legislature, in Austin Tuesday, authorized the statement that he would not be a candidate for either Governor or Lieutenant Governor in the 1926 primaries, ut that he would be content to b returned to the thirtieth session of the Legislature as representative from his home county of Potter.

This was the first definite statement, Mr. Satterwhite said, he had made that he would not be in the race for the gubernatorial nomination. He has ever since adjournment of the thirty-ninth Legislature been prominently spoken as a probable candidate for Governor, and some of his friends had insisted that in the event he declined to make the race for Governor he would seek the office of Lietenant Governor.

'I have reached the conclusion that the next campaign for Governor will be one of personalities and probably the bitterest ever waged in Texas," Mr. Satterwhite said: "I do not care to become involved in such a contest and I have definitely decided, notwithstanding insistence of numerous friends from all over the State that I become a candidate, to not enter the campaign and instead seek reelection to the office of representative from Potter County."

Mr. Satterwhite sees no reason for calling a special session of the Legislature to make investigations, but it is his opinion that an extraordinary session would be warranted to take care of three emergency matters, which he named as being the reinstallation of the summer school of the University of Texas, appropriation for which was vetoed by Governor Ferguson; financing of tick eradication work, and adoption of measures to stamp out the foot-and-mouth

# One Flag For Americans

## One Scientific Standard for Those Who Minister to the Sick

The State of Texas believes that persons who make a business of ministering to the sick should know something about sickness. Your State has set up one scientific standard for those who hold themselves out as able to benefit the sick.

This standard is very reasonable. It requires every person who makes a business of ministering to the sick to have a knowledge of the following fundamental sciences—Anatomy, Physiology, Histology, Bacteriology, Pathology, Diagnosis, Obstretrics, Gynecology, Surgery, Hygiene and medical jurisprudence. It is fairly easy for anyone to obtain enough knowledge of these sciences to qualify for a license to practice, yet there are persons in Texas who defy the law and refuse to come up to this safe and reasonable standard.

Anyone who contends for a lower standard than this one, thereby shows his ignorance of what is absoultely necessary for any advisor to the sick to know, before he can be competent. To lower the standard in any particular would lower it beneath the point of safety.

The State not only requires persons who minister to the sick by any system or method whatso-ever to meet this standard, but the State also requires every person to show that he is fitted. He is given an opportunity to go before a Board and stand examination upon his fitness. The axamina-tion is given in writing upon the sciences mentioned above. Any Chiropractor, Masseur, Faith Healer, or What-not who wants to treat sick people or do anything for them for the purpose of making it possible for them to get well can educate himself in these fundamental sciences if he really wants to

When he has passed the examination he is issued a license. That the people in the county may know that a person who offers to minister to the sick for pay is competent, he is required by law to register his license in the District Clerk's office. The Higher Courts of Texas and the Supreme Court of the United States have held this law constitutional.

A chiropractor by the name of Johnson was convicted by a jury for practicing without a license. He appealed his case but the Higher Court sustained the action of the jury in convicting him. (Johnson vs State 267 Southwest Reporter page 1057.) The Higher Court's decision included the following

"The conditions prescribed as necessary prerequisites in the matter of education and training for entry into the medical profession by Articles 5739 and 5741 of the Revised Statutes which are a part of the medical practice act, represent that which the legislature in its wisdom deemed necessary in the interest of the public health and the public welfare as the state's guaranty of fitness for this high calling. These conditions apply to all persons alike; they do not prescribe any method to be employed in healing disease, or any system of practice to be adopted by the practitioner. If he possesses the qualifications prescribed by the statutes and is awarded a certificate to practice medicine, he is just as free to adopt the system of a Chiropractor as he is to adopt a system of the regular physician."

"The fact that it requires a broader education than is given by the chiropractic college to meet these conditions cannot be urged as a discrimination against such school of medicine. It is easily within the power of a chiropractor to conform to the prescribed conditions. This record shows that all the subjects prescribed by this act for examination are taught by the chiropractic schools, except those of surgery and medical jurisprudence; so it may be said that these schools give substantial recognition to the executial qualifications prescribed by these statutes." cognition to the essential qualifications prescribed by these statutes."

#### Work Started On 1st Street Underpass

A huge pile-driver, manned by Texas and Pacific workman, has been busy for several days in the East Yards driving piles in preparation to the building of the underpass to connect North East First and South East First Streets.

The piles were driven to support the tracks of the road while construction work goes forward on the underpass. The pass will be of concrete and steel construction and plenty large to handle the traffic from the south side of town. It is not known exactly when actual construction will begin on the underpass, but it will very likely be immediately, officials state.

The pass is being built to divert a large amount of traffic under the railroad instead of across the track as in the past, thereby lessening the number of accidents caused by automobile drivers crashing into trains.




