



The boiling point of chromine solution is about the same as water. Water boils at 212 degrees Fahrenheit so that the use of chromine solu-tion in an automoble will not cause the motor to heat up. When alcohol is put in a radiator it boils at a very much lower temperature than water, with the result that it evaporates very rapidly and the solution of the radiator begins to boil, overheating the water.

Chromine is also a preservative of rubber-the rubber hose connections of the raditing system of an automobile will be unattacked. The standard withstand a temperature as low as 15 degrees below zero and prevent freezing at any predetermined temperature. When replacing water, which has evaporated, it is not necessary to add more chromine, as it does not evaporate and one charge will remain in the radiator all season unless the radiator or pumps leaks. For this reason it is more evonomical than alcohol or any other non-freeze sub-
