BELIEVES DEAD MAN TO BE HER HUSBAND WHO DESERTED HER ABOUT 4 YEARS AGO

Mrs. Howard arrived from Ft. Worth Saturday night to if possible ascertain if the man killed here a week prior to that date was her husband. She is a friend and acquaintance of Mr. and Mrs. M. K. Taylor of this city and was met at the station by them. She at once proceeded to the Undertaking parlors of the J. I. Payne Undertaking and Furniture Co., where the body was embalmed and was held until this afternoon.

After carefully looking at the corpse she was still undecided as to whether it was her husband whom she said deserted her three years ago last June. Mr. Payne asked her if there were any scars upon the body of her husband, she replied that there was a scar on one of his legs, she did not remember which limb. She stated that he had told her that the scar was made by a gun shot.

A reporter for the Daily Reporter called at Mr. Taylor's home this afternoon and interviewed Mrs. Howard with reference to her mission. When asked the direct question if she believed the dead man to be her husband, she said the scar referred to above and another similar mark made her feel pretty sure that it was her husband. She said the features and general appearance did not resemble him, but she supposed that nearly four years of time together with the kind

of life that he had lived would naturally bring about great changes. She stated that she had not heard from her husband in over two years, he only wrote her a few times after leaving her and his ten months old babe. The latest letter from his stated that he would never return and that she would never hear from him again, he had a divorce, etc. She had known him eighteen months before their marriage, did not know about his people, had heard him speak about his father and received letters from him occasionally. She saw him drunk only twice during the time they lived together, but he was a man who could drink quite a lot without getting drunk. She showed the writer a photograph of herself and him taken together soon after their marriage. The reporter was unable to draw any definite conclusion from the comparison. She said she and her husband resided on the farm near Alma until he left her.

Mrs. Howard is a woman about 25 years of age, of good appearance, but shows that she has had her share of trouble for a person of that age. Like anyone else would be under similar circumstances, she is anxious to know definitely whether the dead man is her husband. She believes he is, but there is still a doubt which it may take time and further information to completely remove.

On Saturday of last week two petitions of county wide importance came before the Commissioners' court, and both issues are entitled to the unbiased judgment of thoughtful business men.

One was a petition asking for an election to determine whether or not the county shall issue \$150,000 in court house bonds, the proceeds to be used in the erection of a new and adequate court house. The other petition called for an election to determine whether or not an additional tax of 15 cents on the \$100 valuation shall be levied for road and bridge purposes. The purpose of the latter tax would be to provide interest and sinking fund to take care of whatever warrant issue the Commissioner's court saw fit to use in building and maintaining a system of Highways for Nolan County; which system is estimated to contain about 140 miles of the main

further needed connections with the proposed pike system.

It seems to be the plan of the Court to put the Highway system of the county under the superintendency of a competent highway engineer, and in view of past experiences, believe that they can show some splendid values in business road building, in case the proposed issue should carry. The court house issue is, of course, an old one to most of our people, and has been agitated more or less for the past seven or eight years. However, the present petitions calling for an election, were probably not circulated until within the last two or three weeks; but every one knows that we need a court house; that we will have to build it sooner or later—then why put it off? The present one is a bad advertisement for the county, and the small extra tax it will mean to the average tax payer does not seem to justify the postponement of the issue, now that the matter is up before us for settlement.

The people who were pushing the road program, and who began their work several months ago, did not realize that the court house petition was coming up quite so soon, and with the rush of work in the country their petition has been delayed somewhat, so that inadvertently, both petitions came before the court the same week, and are set for a vote of the people on the same day. This, of course, is an unfortunate coincidence and may prove disastrous to one or both issues unless the people can be induced to see the imperative need, just at this time, of the broadest kind of prudent business judgment, unbiased by local prejudices or pride.

Let's build for all of Nolan County. Let each issue stand on its own merits as a business proposition and measure them by that standard. It is sincerely to be hoped that no ill feeling will be permitted to creep into either issue, to pit one against the other. Both are needed improvements, both have the endorsement of conservative business people in both town and country, and both have a justification in economic business necessity. Then

The Passing of the Medicine Bottle

WE ARE CERTAINLY MAKING LONG STRIDES forward when we read such words as these, and they concern us all because they concern our health. And it must be well borne in mind that the writer, Sir William Osler, M. D., is unquestionably the foremost living American physician and the highest authority on drugs in the medical world. He says what follows in the "Encyclopedia Americana":

The new school does not feel itself under obligation to give any medicine whatever, while a generation ago not only could few physicians have held their practice unless they did, but few would have thought it safe or scientific. Of course there are still many cases where the patient or the patient's friends must be humored by administering medicine, or alleged medicine, where it is not really needed, and indeed often where the buoyancy of mind, which is the real curative agent, can be created only by making him wait hopefully for the expected action of medicine; and some physicians still cannot unlearn their old training.

But the change is great. The modern treatment of disease relies very greatly on the so-called natural methods, diet and exercise, bathing and massage; in other words, giving the natural forces the fullest scope by easy and thorough nutrition, increased flow of blood, and removal of obstructions to the excretory systems or to circulation in the tissues.

One notable example is typhoid fever. At the outset of the nineteenth century it was treated with 'remedies' of the extreme violence—bleeding and blistering, vomiting and purging, antimony and calomel, and other heroic remedies. Now the patient is bathed and nursed and carefully tended, but rarely given medicine. This is the result of the remarkable experiments of the Paris and Vienna schools in the action of drugs, which have shaken the stoutest faiths; and partly of the constant and successful lessons of homeopathy. No regular physician would admit that the homeopathic 'infinitesimals' could do any good as direct curative agents, and yet it was perfectly certain that homeopaths lost more of their patients than others. There was but one conclusion to draw, the most drugs had no effect whatever on the diseases for which they were administered.

POPCORN VENDER BECOMES VERY RICH MAN

Dalhart, Tex., Nov. 22.—Twelve years ago A. B. Wall, now of this city, accepted five acres of land near Cushing, Okla., from a half-breed Indian, in payment of a note for \$125, because he could not collect the note any other way. The land lay idle all these years while Wall made a modest living as an itinerant popcorn vender. Last week Wall, now an old man, received a telegram from a friend in Cushing that oil had been found within thirty feet of his land, and for him not to accept any offers for the land until he visited Cushing. The friend, a banker, had kept the taxes paid for Wall, who had ceased to pay attention to the land. Wall has gone to Cushing to take charge of his property after refusing

offers ranging from \$5,000 to \$100,000 for a lease. He is regarded as a wealthy man now.

Wall came to Dalhart with a road show several years ago, but his wife was seized with a fatal illness here, and after her death he set up a small popcorn, peanut and chile booth. This he has passed on to a friend since his recent good fortune.

Dallas, Nov. 22.—Civic improvement votaries of Dallas today will welcome Miss Maude Van Buren, of Washington, a representative of the American Civic Association, who will conduct a three days campaign for civic improvement under the auspices of the Woman's Forum.

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
