## School, City Election Is May 7

The city and school election will be held on Saturday, May 7 at the Friona Fire Station, between the hours of 7 a.m. and 7 p.m.

Four names will be on the City Ballot, seeking two of the city council seats. In addition to incumbents June Rhodes and Bobby Jordan, names of Ralph Shirley and Joe Mejia will be on the ballot. Clarence Monroe is unopposed in his bid for reelection as mayor.

In the school race, just the three incumbents are running. They are Jerry Cass, Becky Riethmayer and Butch Preston.

## Padilla Qualifies For State Meet

Daniel Padilla was Friona High School's lone qualifier to the state meet as a result of the Region I track and field meet last Friday and Saturday in Odessa.

Padilla uncorked a school record throw of 167 feet, one and three-fourth inches in the discus

event, which had a talented field, to place second and earn the trip to Austin.

The Chieftain star was the first contestant in the class AAA discus event, and his stellar throw came on his first toss of the day. However, Coach Steve Williams

pointed out that Padilla had three other throws of over 158 feet. All four of these throws were his career bests in competition.

"I did it when I had to," said the happy FHS senior, who will compete in the state meet next Friday, May 13, at 11 a.m. on the University of Texas campus.

Padilla wiped out the old record of 160-2, in the discus event held by Donny Carthel. It was one of the oldest school records.

It looked for a time on Friday like high jumper Cody Burney might join Padilla on his trip to Austin, as he cleared every height in the high jump through six feet four inches without a miss.

But with the bar at 6-6, Burney, who cleared this height earlier in the season, was unable to do so, and two of the other contestants made the height. Burney had to settle for a tie for fifth place. As a junior, he will have another shot next year at the state meet.

After the great start with Padilla in the discus event, Friona High School's luck took a downturn in the rest of the events.

Stephen Thornton, who came in with the second-best qualifying time in the intermediate hurdles race, seemed to be thrown off by the wind at the start of his preliminary race, and just never could get his steps down.

"Hurdles are a very unpredictable race. When you get off at the start like that, it's hard to recover. Stephen had had a great season, and I was disappointed for him," Williams said. Thornton ran most of the season with his arm in a cast, due to a broken wrist.

The mile relay team also had visions of a state meet trip, but this, also, did not pan out, in spite of the team managing to qualify during a "monsoon" Friday afternoon.

When Friona ran its heat of the relay race, the wind was blowing very hard, and it was raining so hard that the runners had trouble telling which lane they were in. They still managed a good time, and placed second behind Dalhart to qualify for the finals.

In the finals, Friona drew lane one. Cody Bracken ran an outstanding race for 200 meters, clocked by Williams in 23.0. But that took too much out of him, and he fell to the back of the pack before the first handoff.

"We just weren't able to run our race. We still should have had third place, but fell back to fifth," Williams said. "I really felt bad about the relay team, because I thought they would break the school record and qualify for Austin," the Chieftain track coach (Continued on Page 5)

## Beef Referendum Slated May 10

The nationwide "Beef Referendum" vote will be held May 10 according to Gary Patterson, Parmer County Extension Agent. The vote will be conducted in the County Extension office (second floor of the county courthouse) from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m. on May 10. Voters may also request an absentee ballot from the State Coordinators office. Here are a few important facts about the "Beef Referendum":

Voter eligibility--Voting is open to any producer who owned or acquired ownership of any cattle during the period of October 1,

1986 through March 31, 1988, or any importer of cattle, beef, or beef products who imported during that same time period. There is no age requirement for voter eligibility. Producers must vote in the county in which they reside.

Any questions concerning the "Beef Referendum" may be directed to Gary Patterson at the Parmer County Extension Office.

All programs and information of the Texas Agricultural Extension Service are available to everyone without regard to race, color, religion, sex, age, handicap, or socio-economic level.

## Kindergarten Registration Is Slated

Friona Elementary School is asking for assistance in efforts to contact all parents of children who qualify for the pre-kindergarten program for the 1988-89 school year.

A pre-kindergarten enrollment has been scheduled for Friday, May 13 at 1:30 p.m. in the Grade School Cafeteria.

To be eligible for pre-kindergarten, a child must be four years of age, on or before September 1, 1988 and unable to comprehend the English language or is at or below subsistence level. Parents are asked to bring their child's birth certificate and immunization record.

## 50 YEARS AGO--MAY 13, 1938

Friona people who are lovers of aeronautics will be given an opportunity to gratify their desire for this form of sports out at the L.F. Beckner farm northeast of town Sunday, when Floyd Daniels, pilot, and Johnney Holden, parachute jumper, arrive here with their airplane for a full day of pleasure flights and a parachute jump.

## 45 YEARS AGO--MAY 14, 1943

Only twelve seniors will be in the graduating class this year and this is the smallest number the class has had for several years. The class consists of three boys and nine girls, whose names are as follows: June Maurer, valedictorian; Elsie Messenger, Fern Cunningham, Vera Leach, Velma Schueler, Eva Dean Hyde, Margie Mars, Mary Lou Barker, Benthall Southall, Howard Loveless, Walter Johnson and Billy Baxter.

## 40 YEARS AGO--MAY 14, 1948

Another little thing that we do not wish to omit is the fact that Friona has, what seems to be the most popular square dance club in the Panhandle. Yes, we mean just that. Members of this social club include the most popular and most highly respected people of the Friona community. They have not only received an abundance of pure recreation for themselves, but are frequently invited to visit other towns and communities to help the people of these places to execute the square dance in the form of the reel, the cotillon and the folk dance, and include a polka and schottische occasionally. All these dances produce or create courtly or stately bearing or posture and graceful movements.

## 35 YEARS AGO--MAY 14, 1953

## 25 YEARS AGO--MAY 9, 1963

According to the 1962 estimate for Parmer County, the population stands at 10,508. This is the first time in the county's history that the population has climbed over the 10,000 mark, a significant plateau in the county's growth.

## Ex-Resident FHS Netters Excels For Results At Okla. School Regional

A former Friona resident, Jennifer Carson, has had a good track season while competing for Howe High School in Oklahoma.

She qualified for the regional meet in four events. In the long jump, she had a 16-6 jump at district. She qualified in the 200-meter dash with a 26.6; the 800 relay and the 1600 relay.

At her regional meet, Jennifer also qualified for the state meet in the 1600-meter relay.

Jennifer helped her team accumulate an average of 125 points in their regular meets. Howe is a class 2A school.

Jennifer is the daughter of Carolyn and David H. Carson. Her Friona grandparents are Mr. and Mrs. David Carson and Mr. and Mrs. D.C. Herring.

Competing in the Region I tennis meet, freshman David Barnett won his first round match in straight sets before losing to the tournament's second-seeded player.

Barnett downed Mike VanZandt of Waco LaVega, 6-0, 6-0 in his first-round pairing.

He then played Austin Ryan of Marble Falls in the quarter-finals, and lost, 6-4, 6-0. "It was a much closer match than the score indicates. Every game in the second set went to deuce," said Chieftain tennis coach Greg Stockstill.

The Friona High School girls' doubles team of Trudy Reeve and Sherry Dickson had the misfortune of drawing the region's number one seeded team, and lost out.

## THERE IS NO SUCH THING AS A FREE PRESS

**ONCE UPON A TIME IN TEXAS**, there lived a newspaper that reported all kinds of things, from weddings to recipes to obituaries to local needs and deeds, to club and church news, to water and power rates, to local elections. And while the town worked hard to solve unemployment, crime, bad streets and all the other aches of the day, the newspaper kept at it to try to bring the town a promise of the best to come -- and to believe in itself.

**A FEW YEARS EARLIER**, the newspaper didn't have as many readers. But its merchants advertised a lot, and there were more available dollars to hire writers and advertising sales people.

**THE TOWN PROSPERED** and its population grew to attract new, bigger businesses that came in to compete for customers from throughout the entire region. But some of those bigger businesses tried different ways of advertising, or reduced their own dollars for advertising when they took command of the market. Some small firms left.

**TIMES GOT TOUGHER** for the newspaper in spite of helping it's town grow. In just 18 months, the price of newsprint increased 30 percent, and it cost 20 percent more just to mail the same newspaper. The newspaper faced the same higher taxes, increased minimum wages and all of the other new challenges to business as did everyone else. Just the cost of keeping its doors open increased to \$526 per day for every 2,500 circulation. \*

The newspaper was forced to reduce its staff a bit, along with some of its local coverage because the dollars just don't have the same reach as prior years.

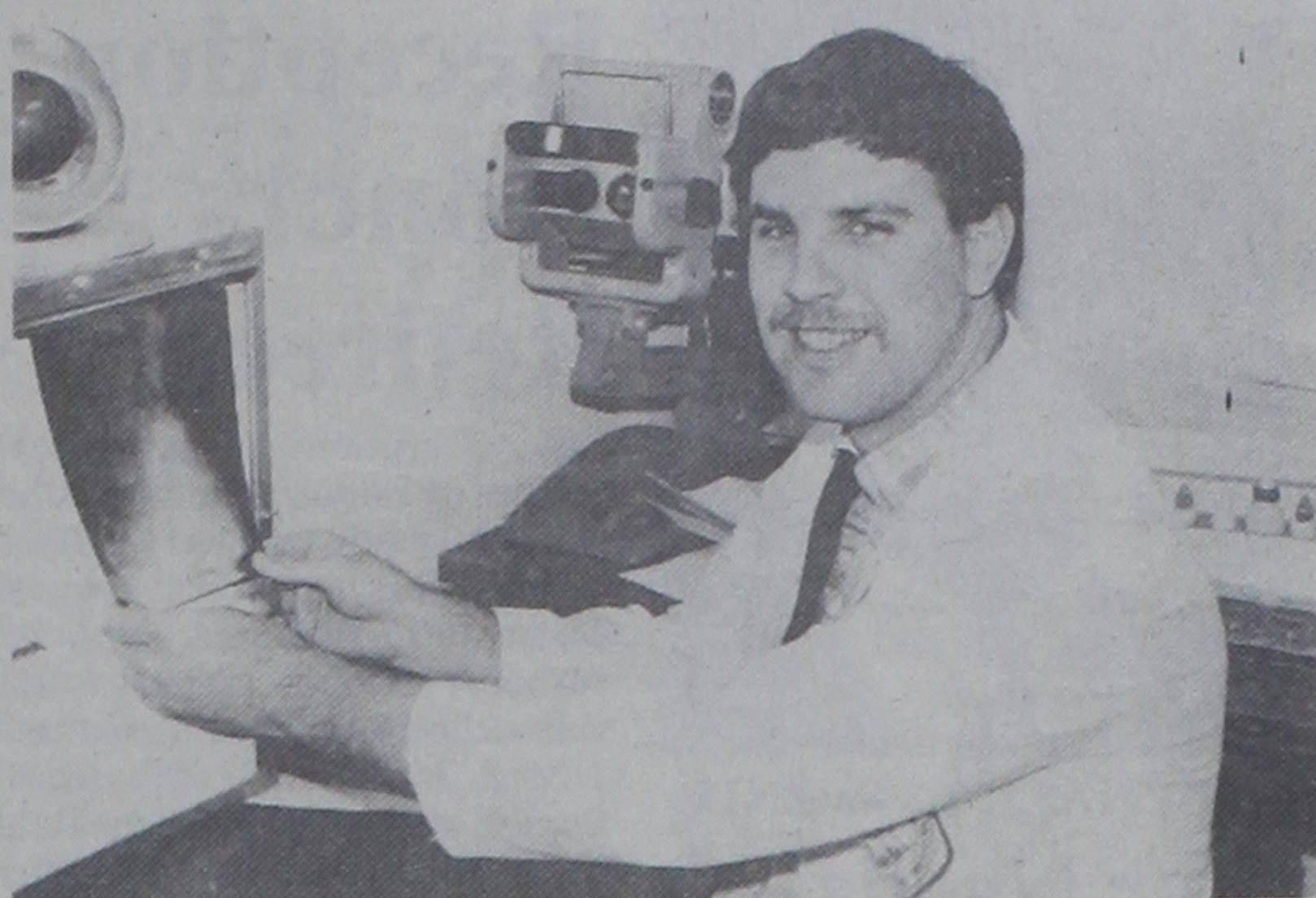
Rev. Tilden Armstrong, pastor of the First Christian Church of Paducah, officiated. Mynatt Funeral Home was in charge of arrangements.

and Brian are cousins.

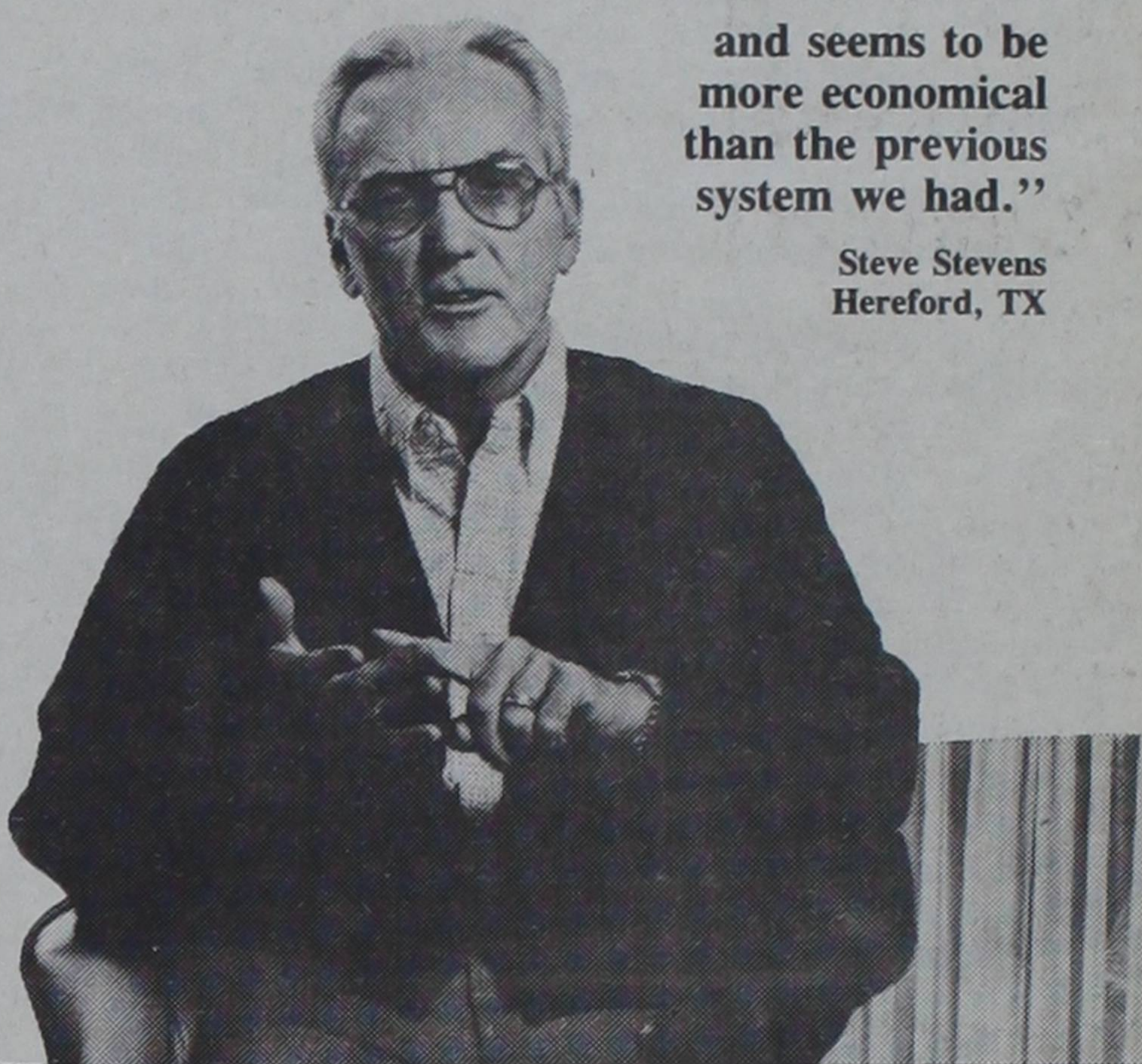
Brian's next assignment will be to a naval base in Iceland, where he expects to be stationed six months.

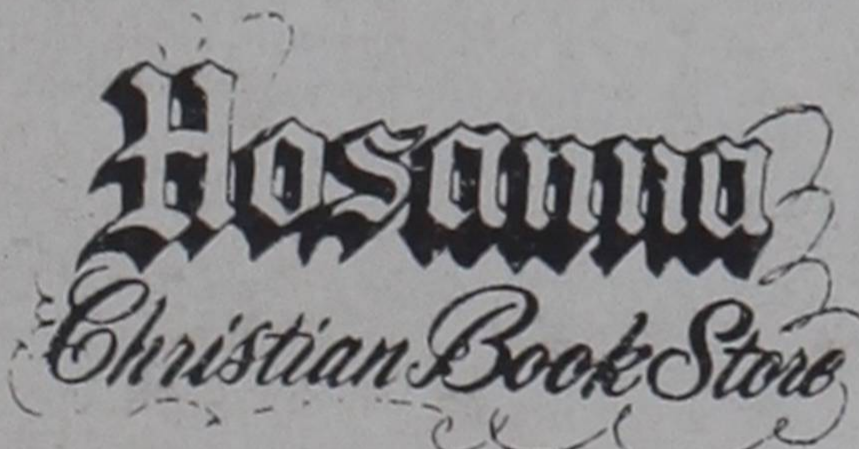

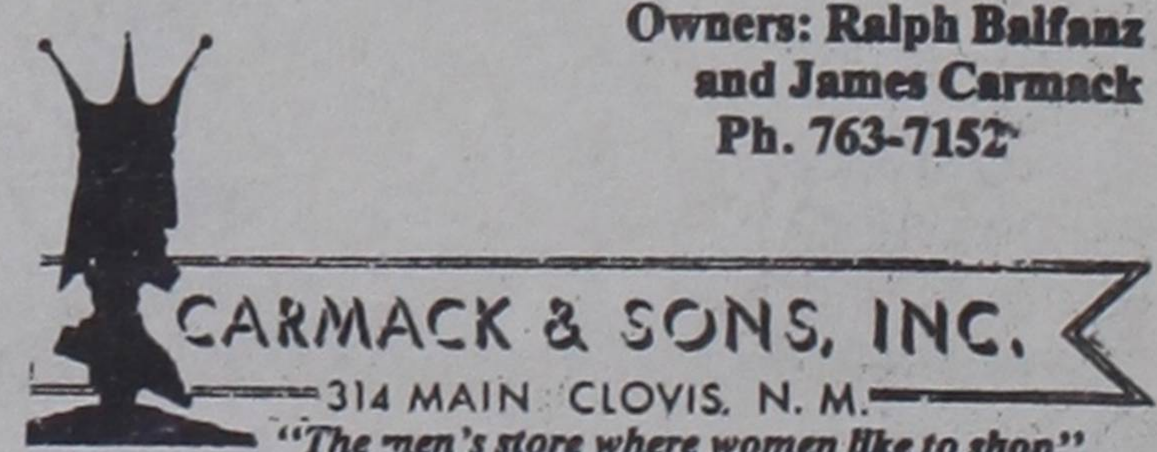

On May 10, the residents will go to Amarillo to the Good Samaritan Center for a picnic with other persons from nursing homes. We are looking to have a great time.

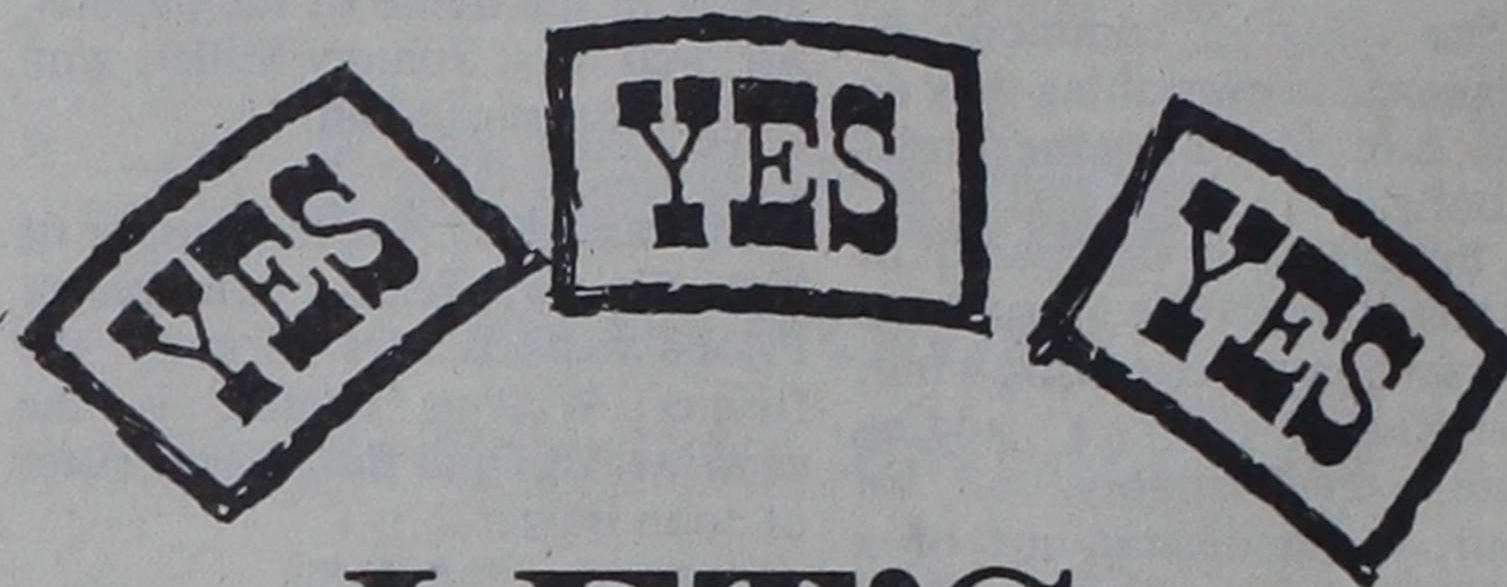
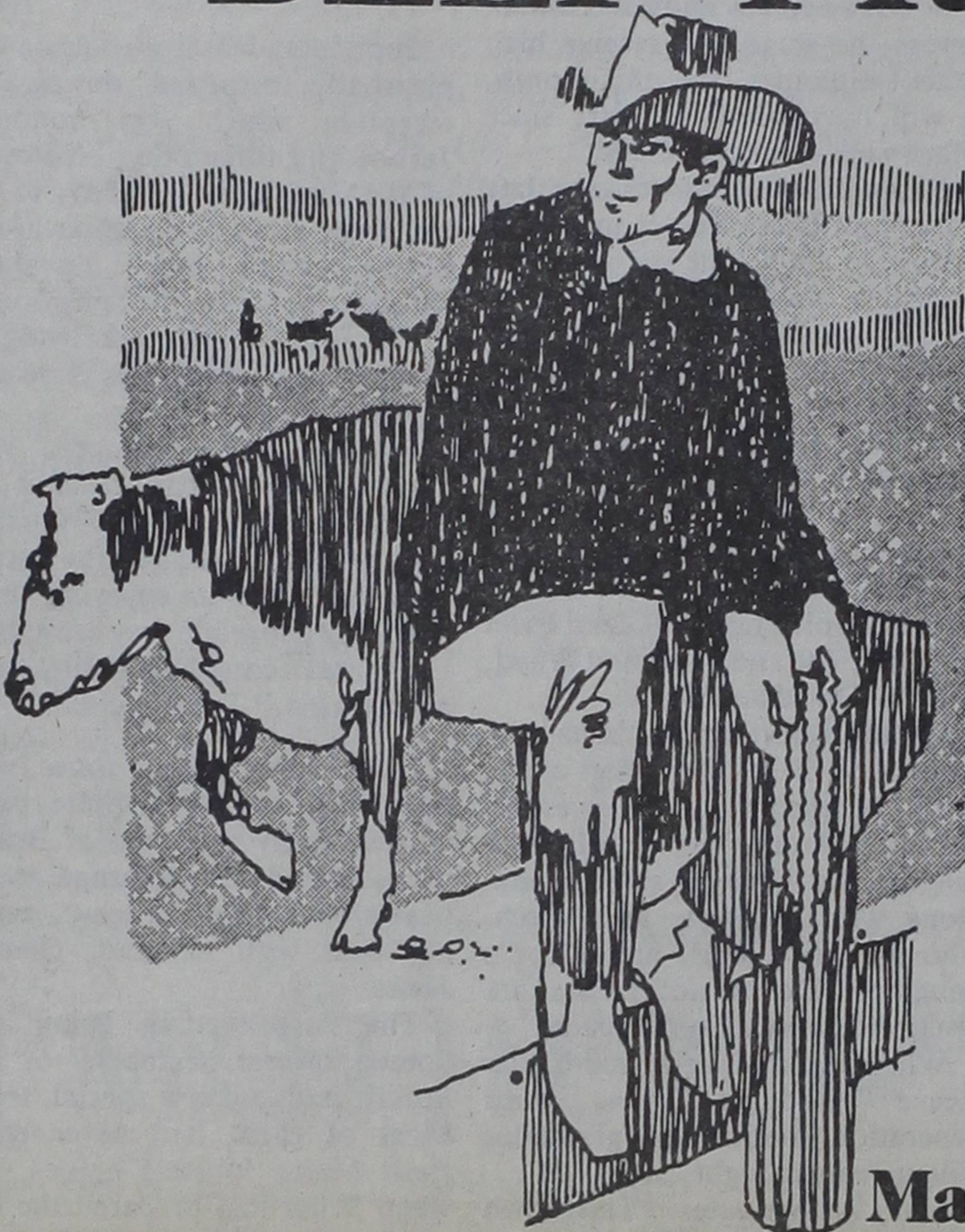

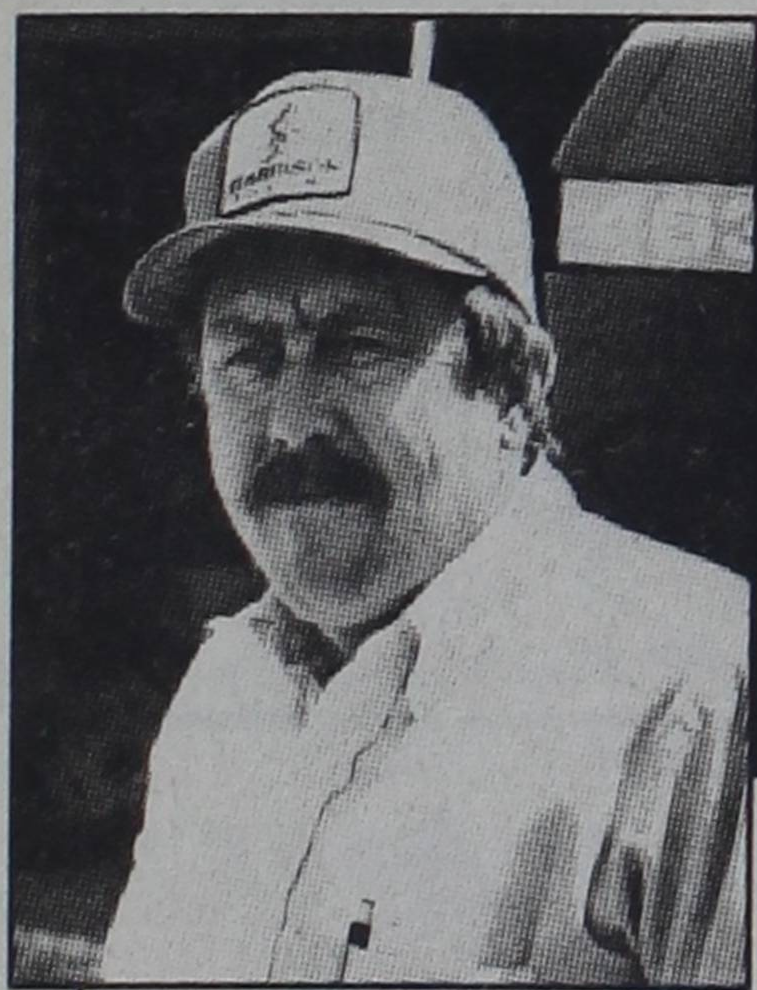
