"MY TURN"

THERE ARE TWO types of summer vacation trips. There's the "R & R" type and the "Tourista" type.

On the R & R vacation, you sit on the lake with a fishing line dangling in the water. You visit with friends or relatives and play 42 a lot. You come home rested and relaxed.

On the Tourista vacation, you go to tour a different part of the world, see the sights, learn about new people, new cultures and new places which you have never seen before. You come home sunburned, tired and broke.

Every four or five years, the Ellis family feels compelled to go on a Tourista vacation. We just got back from New Orleans...sunburned, tired and broke.

It really seemed as though we were heading into a different part of the world during the last 100 or so miles of the trip when I-10 turned into a causeway over swamps and bayous with cypress trees and snowy egrets standing around in the brackish water. I wonder just how much that stretch of four-lane interstate highway must have cost to build up on concrete pillars for that long distance.

Nearly every large city in the U.S. has an "old town" or a pioneer section which is set aside to preserve the history of the area. In New Orleans, the "French Quarter" is most uniquely colorful and historical. Some of the buildings and artifacts date back to the late 1700s.

New Orleans was such an important port of commerce in those days (and still is), being located at the junction of the Gulf of Mexico and the mouth of the Mississippi River. France, Spain and America fought over the privilege of calling Louisiana their own.

The cobblestones which paved the French Quarter came from ballast taken from ships which had been sunk off the harbor. Because the area was marshy, cotton bales were sunk into the ground before buildings were put up...sort of an early-day landfill. So the foundations of the buildings in the French Quarter are resting on cotton bales which are nearly 200 years old.

We tried to learn the difference between the Creole and Cajun people. The French and Spanish who intermarried with natives of the Caribbean Islands were among the first settlers and considered themselves the established gentry. Descendants of these early pioneers became known as Creoles.

They did not look kindly upon the French Accadians from Nova Scotia who came down into Louisiana a few years later. "Cajun" became the localized name for the Accadians who were shunned, much as the poor immigrant Irish were shunned when they arrived in New York City around the turn of the century.

So the Cajuns chose not to settle in the city, but took to the swamps where they made their livelihood catching fish, hunting alligators and trapping muskrats. Because they were rather isolated, many of these folks still speak French and retain some of their early traditions.

By the way, the true Cajun food is spicy in flavor, but not hot. The blackened fish which has become known as "Cajun" in Texas restaurants, is a very recent invention. About the only difference in Cajun and "soul food" is the addition of the spices. We tried some alligator meat which tasted a bit like barbecued chicken.

Many of the lovely sugar plantation homes along the river from Baton Rouge to New Orleans were spared the ravages of the Civil War. Several of these have been restored and are open to the public.

Demo Delegates Back From Austin

The readings have hit the 90 mark steadily every day during the past week, making it uncomfortable for most activities.

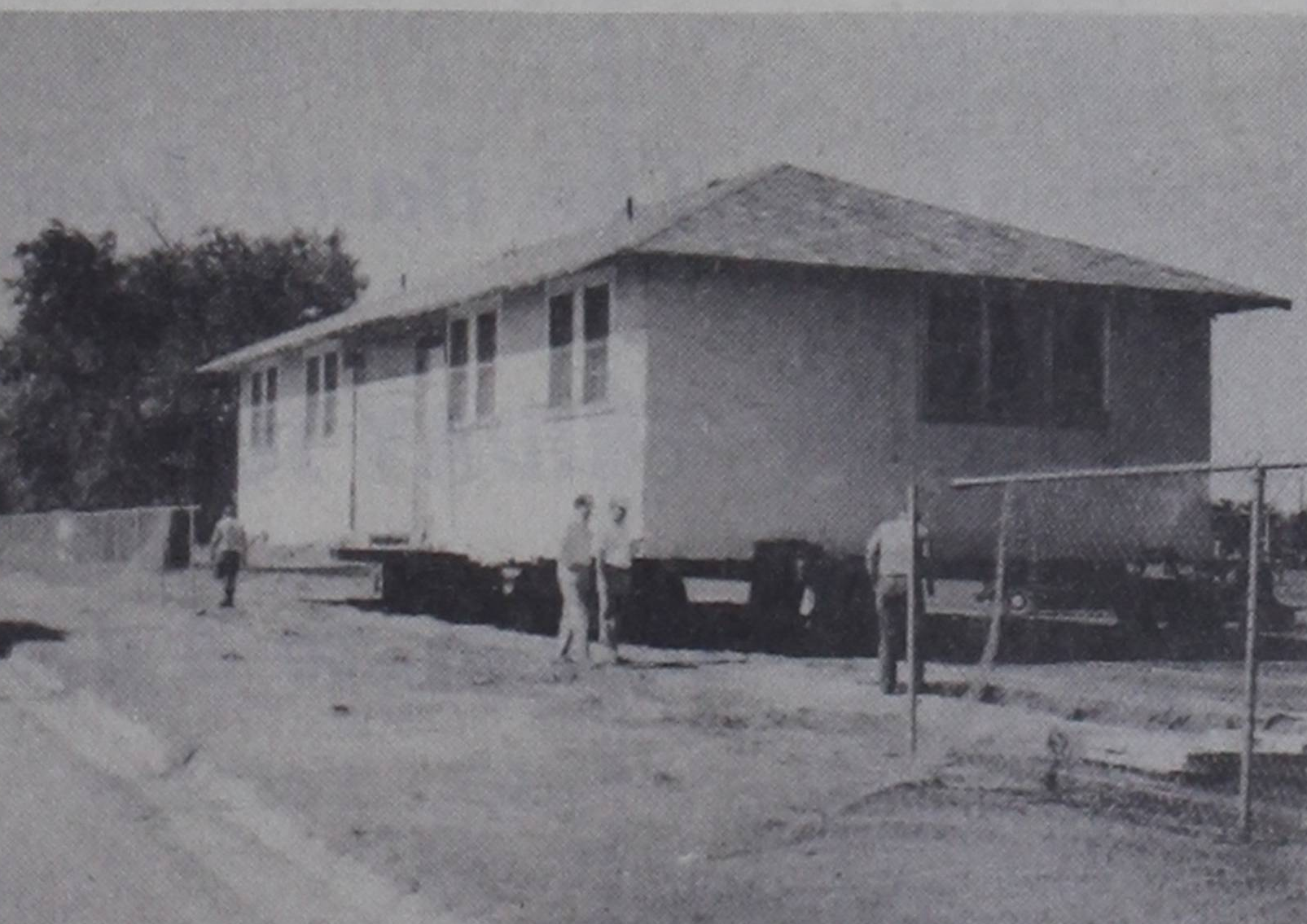
No precipitation was received during the past week.

Sugar Industry Fighting Lower Support Proposal

Alvin Hansen, a sugarbeet farmer from Baker, Minnesota, recently told a Senate Committee that U.S. sugar farmers should not be burdened with a disproportionate share of the cost of this nation's foreign aid.

Hansen appeared in Washington before the International Trade Subcommittee of the Senate Finance Committee in opposition to a proposal authored by Senator Bill Bradley (D-NJ) to dramatically lower U.S. sugar supports and significantly increase sugar imports from Central American countries.

"This proposal is specifically designed as a foreign aid package," the Minnesota farmer declared. However, the bill for the foreign assistance would accrue solely to the U.S. sugar industry, according to Hansen.

The beet farmer took note of Washington's seeming pre-occupation with problems faced by large eastern financial institutions and the concomitant disregard of the financial problems of small town U.S. banks. "The U.S. sugar industry is just as important to our state economies as the industry is to economies of these foreign

exporters," Hansen said.

Sugar ranks first in Wyoming and Hawaii, second in Florida and third in Idaho, Hansen stated and "in my home region of Minnesota, and North Dakota, the sugar industry generates almost \$1 billion of economic activity per year.

"Besides thousands of jobs directly associated with the sugar industry, \$27 million in taxes are paid to finance schools, hospitals, roads and other beneficial projects.

"The bill--S2252--proposes to destroy that," Hansen stated. "It says that foreign producers are more important to this country than taxpaying American producers," he declared.

The hearings included testimony from witnesses representing banking interests as well as U.S. and foreign sugar producers.

Dennis L. Printz, Agricultural Manager at the local Holly Sugar factory, agreed with Hansen's assessment. "The Senatorial sponsors of this proposal live in a dream world," Printz opined.

"Heavily subsidized foreign sugar is dumped on a so-called world market and sold at fire sale prices."

"Senator Bradley has implied that U.S. consumers can actually purchase sugar at those prices and save billions," Printz said. In reality, if the U.S. accepted the world's subsidized surplus, it would drive American producers out of business. The overproduction would turn to shortage and American consumers--without a U.S. producing capability--would be left holding the sack, Printz declared.

Stability for American consumers is our best policy the local sugar executive declared.

The economic impact of the local Holly factory on Hereford, according to Printz, is

tremendous. The actual payroll for the Hereford factory is in excess of \$5,400,000. Checks sent to sugarbeet growers for the last crop year totaled almost \$20,500,000; supplies, materials and energy costs were in excess of \$3,700,000, and Holly Sugar paid approximately \$200,000 in local property taxes.

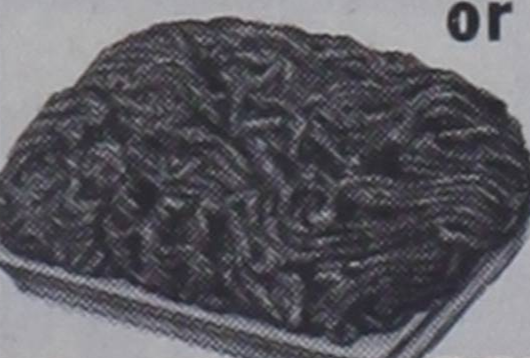

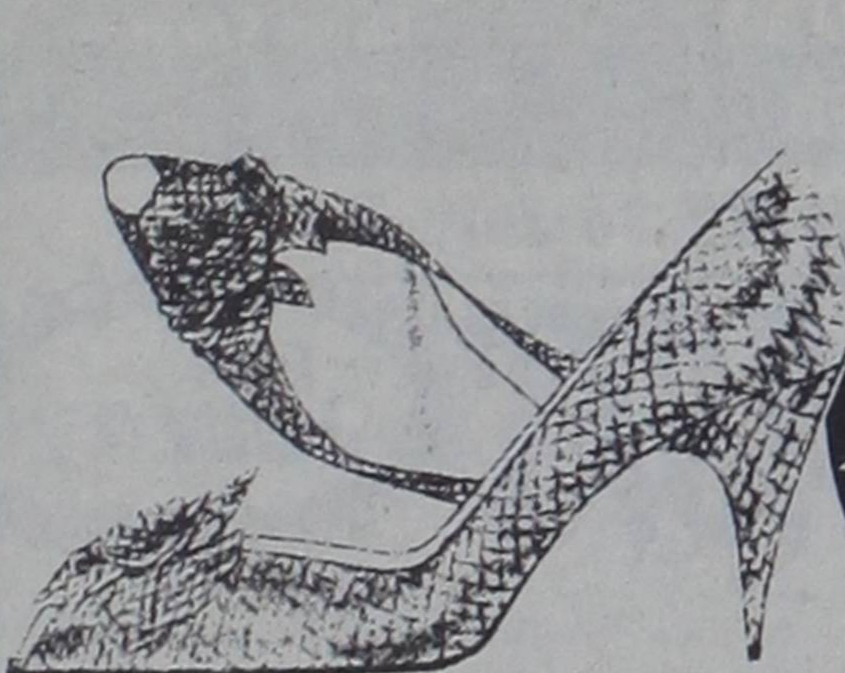

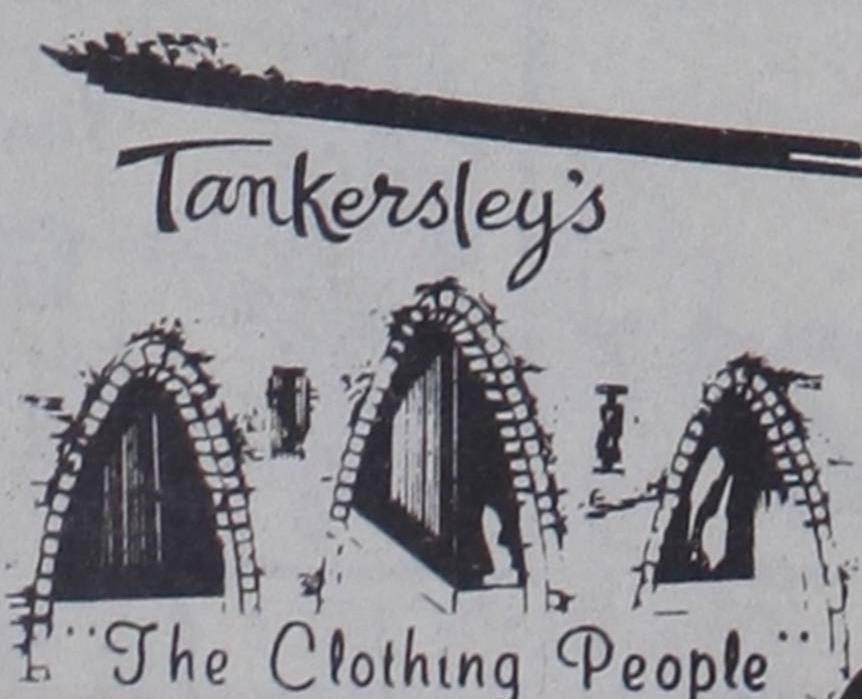

He spent eleven days in the Methodist Hospital in Lubbock where he had therapy for the burns and skin graft surgery for the burn on his arm.

The skin graft took one hundred

per cent and Bryan is enjoying being home again even though he is restricted as far as being outside too much or going anywhere due to the new skin and the possibility of infection.

Bryan is the grandson of Herbert and Cecelia Schueler of the Rhea community.

A "Love Fund" has been established at Friona State Bank for Bryan.

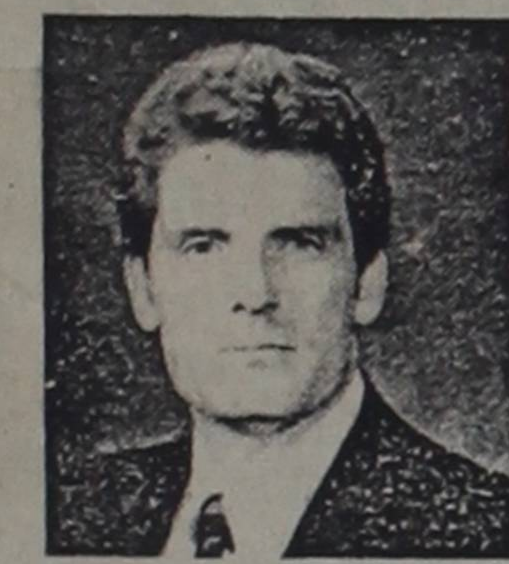

REMEMBER THESE SAFETY TIPS

- Watch for power lines when climbing in trees.
- Do not climb electrical poles, towers or structures.
- Do not trim trees near power lines.
- Do not set ladders or scaffolds near power lines.
- Do not shoot at insulators on poles, towers or structures.
- Never climb on or go inside a substation fence. Call SPS to help you retrieve anything thrown into the substation or caught in its fence.
- Avoid using electrical tools like lawn mowers or hedge clippers when grass and leaves are wet.
- Be careful when digging. Call SPS to find out if there are any buried electrical lines in the area.
- Electrical cords should not be spliced or taped. Repair by shortening them or replace them entirely.
- Beware of exposed wires.
- Don't touch portable appliances (coffee makers, radios, hair dryers, etc.) with wet hands or while standing or sitting in water.
- Don't post signs on utility poles. A lineman hitting a nail with his cleat could slip and fall. Also, nails can snag protective gloves and destroy their insulation value.

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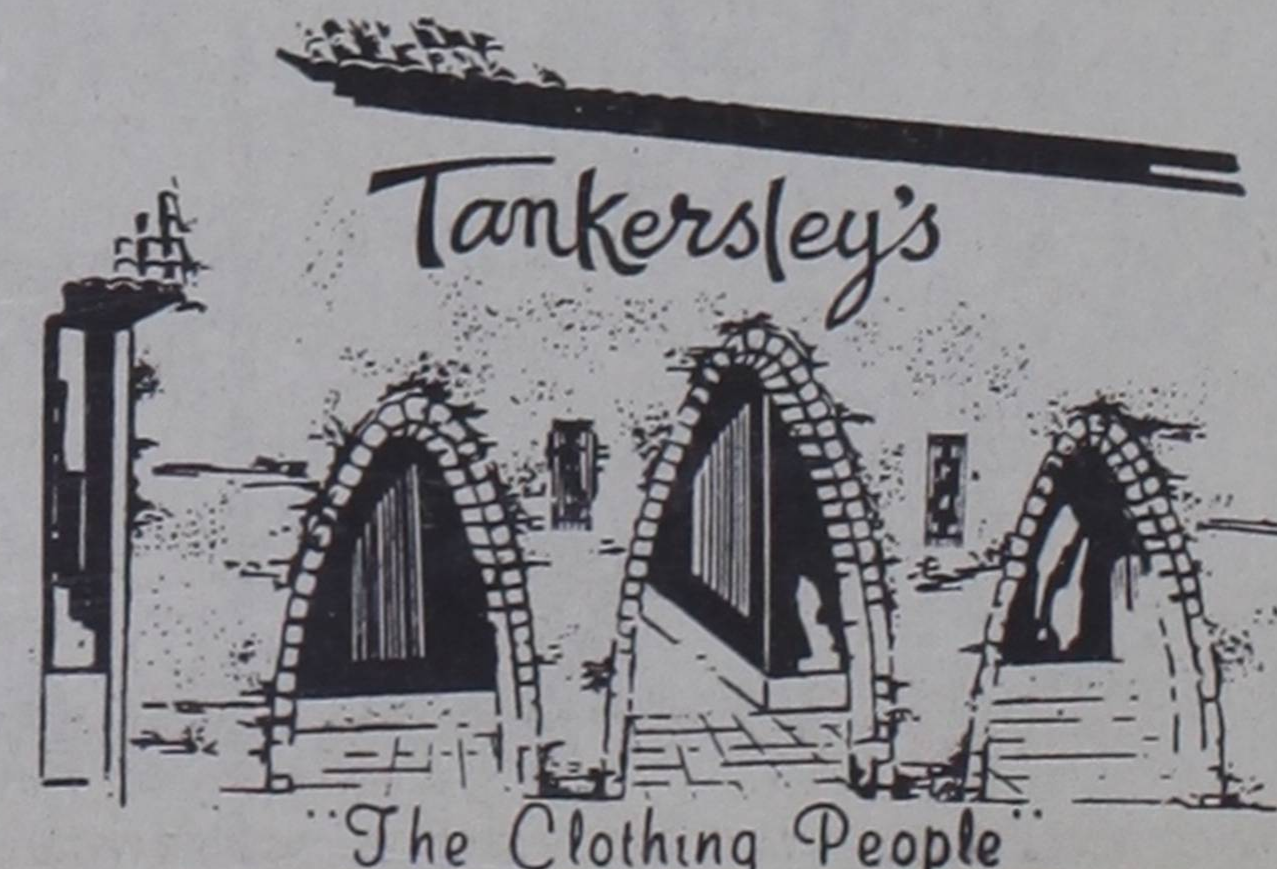
