STATE COMPTROLLER Bob Bullock has released a report which should make all Texans' feel considerably better.

According to Bullock, more than 73,000 Texans have found new jobs during the past year. This marks the first time in more than unemployment level has risen.

Bullock's report says that Texas Community Center. residents' spendable income is growing faster than the national average and that Texas retail sales are averaging \$9 billion per month.

The state's petrochemical sale. industry, the comptroller says, is operating at full capacity for the first time in five years, and new plant development is being discussed seriously.

Bullock, who appeared in Amarillo this past week to underscore these figures, said that business failures this year are about 14 per cent below the rate of 1987. Bullock estimates that the state's revenue from major funds will total \$29.9 billion for the 1990-91 biennium. That is a \$1.4 billion increase over the current biennium.

Bullock credits a number of things for the state's economic turnaround. Among them are the stability of world oil and natural gas prices, the falling value of the U.S. dollar, aggressive new development economic and diversification efforts and the natural cycle of a free market economy.

His plan would call for an additional \$600 million in revenues to "equalize school financing."

The state comptroller's school plan is endorsed by poor school districts, by most Democrats and by the Equity Center, an Austinbased research firm created to study school finance problems.

Bullock says the concern over his plan comes from local school districts who are concerned with retaining local control over their schools.

Bullock pointed out that the Texas Department of Corrections spends about \$11,500 per year to keep a person in prison. In Texas, we're spending \$2,900 per year to

keep a kid in school." "You're either going to catch them now and put them in jail or catch them now and keep them in

school," the state official said. All of the argument may become academic, if a constitutional amendment supported by state representative John Culberson of Houston, is pushed through. Culberson's amendment would say that the state's school funding system is acceptable as it now stands.

According to DPS trooper Frank Ellis, Mrs. Gunn was driving a 1981 Chevrolet four-door car that was struck broadside when she crossed the Texas 214 intersection.

Driver of the Mack tractor/ trailer rig hauling grain was Conrad Martinez, 36, of Friona. Martinez was treated and released at Parmer County Community Hospital.

The Gunns were pronounced dead at the scene by Parmer County Justice of the Peace Francis Euler.

Nice, Soaking Rainfall Received In Parmer County

Friona received a total of 2.81 inches of rainfall during the Saturday, Sunday and Monday rainy spell, to run the city's total rainfall for the month of June to 4.59 inches.

June virtually equalled the total rainfall received for May in Friona, which was 4.74 inches. That makes a total of 9.33 inches for the last two months, and runs the total moisture for the calendar year 1988 to 11.78 inches.

harvested acre led the cotton- per acre. That yield is about 18 producing counties, with 712 pounds short of the area's best, pounds per acre. Parmer edged out 513.2 pounds per acre in 1965, and Hale County, whose average was is the fourth highest ever, behind 705 pounds per acre. These were the only two counties to top the 700-pound mark in production.

Parmer Overall, County harvested 40,600 acres, and produced 60,200 bales of cotton on an average weight of 480 pounds.

Using an estimated 55.5 cents per pound average price, Plains Cotton Growers puts lint value at \$710,901,720. Seed, at \$75 per ton for 1,134,134 tons, was worth another \$85,060,050. Another \$210,740,573 in target price deficiency payments brings the total value to \$1,006,302,343.

This marks the first time in history that area cotton has achieved a billion dollar crop status, and tops the previous record of \$900 million set by the

TASS reports planted acreage harvested acres at 2,599,000, and Parmer County's yield per an average yield of 494.7 pounds 1965, 1973 (498) and 1968 (496).

Total 1987 production also ranks fourth in records kept by PCG back to 1928, trailing the all-time record 3.522 million bale crop of 1981, 3.22 million in 1977 and 2.89 million produced in 1973.



Nazareth To Hold 16th 'Fest'


Area residents are asked to make plans now to attend the 16th annual German Fest in Nazareth on Saturday, July 9.







Fireworks Can Pose Threat

Don't let a Fourth of July fireworks accident rob you or your children of the glorious sights of summer. Last year, the U.S. Product Consumer Safety Commission estimated that more than 9,000 people were treated in hospital emergency rooms for fireworks-related injuries. "We are particularly concerned with the increasing percentage of eye injuries," says William M. Carpenter, Texas Society to Prevent Blindness President.

Too many fireworks-related injuries strike children, often resulting in a permanent vision disability. An American Academy Ophthalmology (AAO) study found that 40 per cent of the cases reported caused permanent eye damage and almost 25 per cent of the injured--mostly children-either had an eye destroyed or lost some vision.

There are many misconceptions about fireworks. One is that fireworks-related injuries occur only in non-regulated states. In fact, enough fireworks find their way into regulated areas to account for 45 per cent of the eye injuries. Another fallacy is that your children are safe if they don't use fireworks. Actually, 25 per cent of the eye injuries were to bystanders.

Finally, don't be fooled into thinking that there are "safe" fireworks. Even the widely available sparklers burn at 1800 degrees, a temperature almost hot enough to melt gold. Particularly dangerous are bottle rockets, which accounted for well over a third of the eye injuries noted in the study.

Carpenter warns against the use of fireworks. Unfortunately, the range of state laws and illicit market make fireworks readily available. If you are going to use fireworks, the following safety guidelines are recommended:

-- Before using any type of fireworks, check state or local laws.

--Children should never be allowed to discharge fireworks. Even "safe" fireworks (i.e., sparklers) are a danger to children. --Read and follow all

instructions and warning labels. Wear eye protection. -- Fireworks should only be used

outdoors in a clear area away from homes, buildings and combustible materials.

-- Be sure others are out of range before lighting fireworks.

--Keep water nearby for and emergencies dousing malfunctioning fireworks. Never handle or attempt to relight a firework that does not go 'off. Soak it thoroughly before discarding.

-- Never ignite fireworks in a container; glass and metal containers can easily shatter.



Record Number Of Cattle Fed In Area

SPS annually prepares a Fed Cattle Survey covering feedlots in its service area. The electric utility serves a 52,000-square-mile area comprising the Texas and Oklahoma panhandles, the Texas South Plains, eastern and southeastern New Mexico, and southwestern Kansas.

Feedlots in the SPS service area fed 5,406,975 head of cattle last

> is prospering in this part of the country," said Seth Thomason, manager of agricultural and industrial power. "The growth of this business shows how important cattle feeding is to our area's economy."

> Total one-time capacity of the feedlots surveyed in 1987 was 2,728,255 head, up from the total capacity of 2,594,975 head in 1986.

Additionally, the survey found that 4,758,886 cattle were slaughtered last year at packing plants in the SPS service territory, down 312,991 from 1986. Fourteen service area, Thomason said, noting the facilities have an annual slaughter capacity of 5,107,153 head.

"We get requests for Southwestern's Fed Cattle Survey from all across the nation," Thomason said. "By providing this information, we hope to help stimulate further development in the agricultural sector. The area's feedlots and packing plants were extremely cooperative and helpful during this survey. We commend them for their assistance."

The survey lists each feedlot in the SPS area, and the lot capacities and number of cattle fed, by counties. Thirty-one counties in the SPS service area have feedlots.

The report includes charts of the number of feedlots surveyed, number of feedlots with 1,000head capacity or above, growth of the feedlot industry and one-time feedlot capacity.

Copies of the report and survey are available at SPS offices across the Company's service area or from Thomason, SPS main office, Tyler at Sixth Street, Amarillo, Texas, 79170.

A special 24-by-28 wall map showing feedlot and packing plant locations also is available upon request.
