First Baptist Sets Revival Meeting

ALTHOUGH OTHER sections of the country are having their problems this summer, with the worst drought in 50 years plaguing the Midwest, our immediate area is having a much better than average year in several respects.

This has caused the local economy to begin to show signs of improvement, after a few years of being in the "sluggish" category.

One area merchant told this writer this week that his business was showing a considerable improvement this year, with each month of 1988 having showed substantial gains over the corresponding month of 1987.

Due to the CRP program, many farmers have had some extra money, and this always helps the economy.

It isn't necessarily fun to profit at another area's expense, but if the local area is able to continue with its better than average farm year, and produce an above-average yield, then that should put a lot of money into the farmers' pockets.

The expected good yields should be helped by much-improved commodity prices, boosted by the forecasts of crop failure in parts of the Midwest, or at least a much smaller harvest in the drought-plagued region.

If we can continue to be lucky enough to get a little rain held during the growing season, then the extra benefits to the area farmers will accrue in savings from their energy bills from irrigation costs.

This could enable our area's farmers to make some money for a change. Most observers agree that if we could somehow have four or five consecutive years like this for the farmers, then they could rid themselves of the debt that has been saddling the farming sector.

And as we stated, this type of scenario would be especially beneficial to the local economy, and from all appearances, the improvement has already started, and this is good news.

Coach Thomas returned to Morton High School to start his coaching career. At Morton, he served as an assistant coach in both the boys and girls basketball program. In 1987, Morton won the state championship in both girls and boys divisions.

Thomas is 33 years old and is married. He will report to Friona around the first of August.

Owner Change Given For Cable Company

Representatives of Friona Cablevision and Mission Cable Company, a Delaware limited partnership, met with the Friona City Council at the council's meeting Monday to ask for re-assignment of its franchise with the City of Friona.

Merlyn Neel of Muleshoe, representing Friona Cablevision, and Al Williams of the Mission Cable Company, met with the Council to

report on the change of ownership of Friona Cablevision, which has held the paid cable television franchise in Friona.

Neel told the council he appreciated the good working relationship he had had with the City of Friona, and indicated that had he kept the company, he would have had to have a rate increase.

Williams told the council that he

did not expect any personnel changes for the local cable office. Nancy Peace is serving as office manager, and Ernest Mills is the serviceman.

Williams also mentioned the possibility of adding two new channels to Friona's lineup, with a rate adjustment at the time they were added. It was not stated which channels might be added. Currently, Friona Cablevision has 14 basic channels available, in addition to the local weather channel, which has been off for repairs, plus the two premium channels, HBO and Disney.

Williams said that the weather channel (6) should be back on the air in about two weeks.

The PBS channel, which formerly was on Channel 3, also has been off, and it was reported that it was the company's plans to add the new Amarillo PBS channel in its place when it signs on later this fall. The Amarillo channel is expected to offer a much stronger signal than the previously available from KTQM, of Eastern New Mexico University, Portales.

Neel lives in Muleshoe. He has operated cable companies in Muleshoe, Friona, Bovina, Sudan and Earth for a number of years.

Neel's son, Michael, also has been working in Friona as a serviceman for the past several months. He plans to return to school at the beginning of fall classes.

Weather Warming Up To Occasion

The month of July started out on a mild note, as it was the 14th of the month before the first 90-degree reading was recorded at Friona's official weather station.

This was in contrast to the month of June, which produced 11 days of 90 or above readings, including nine days in succession late in the month.

It was so mild last weekend, that on Monday morning, a low of 59 degrees was registered. The high for the previous day only managed to climb to 73 degrees, following the rainy spell of last Thursday-Friday.

However, late in the week things began to look and feel more like July. Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday's high readings were 89, 93 and 92 degrees. Added to the

higher than usual humidity, made the area's "heat factor" top the 100-degree mark a couple of days.

Farming activities are in full gear in the area. Due to the excellent rains, some farmers are finding that weeds are doing great, as well as their crops.

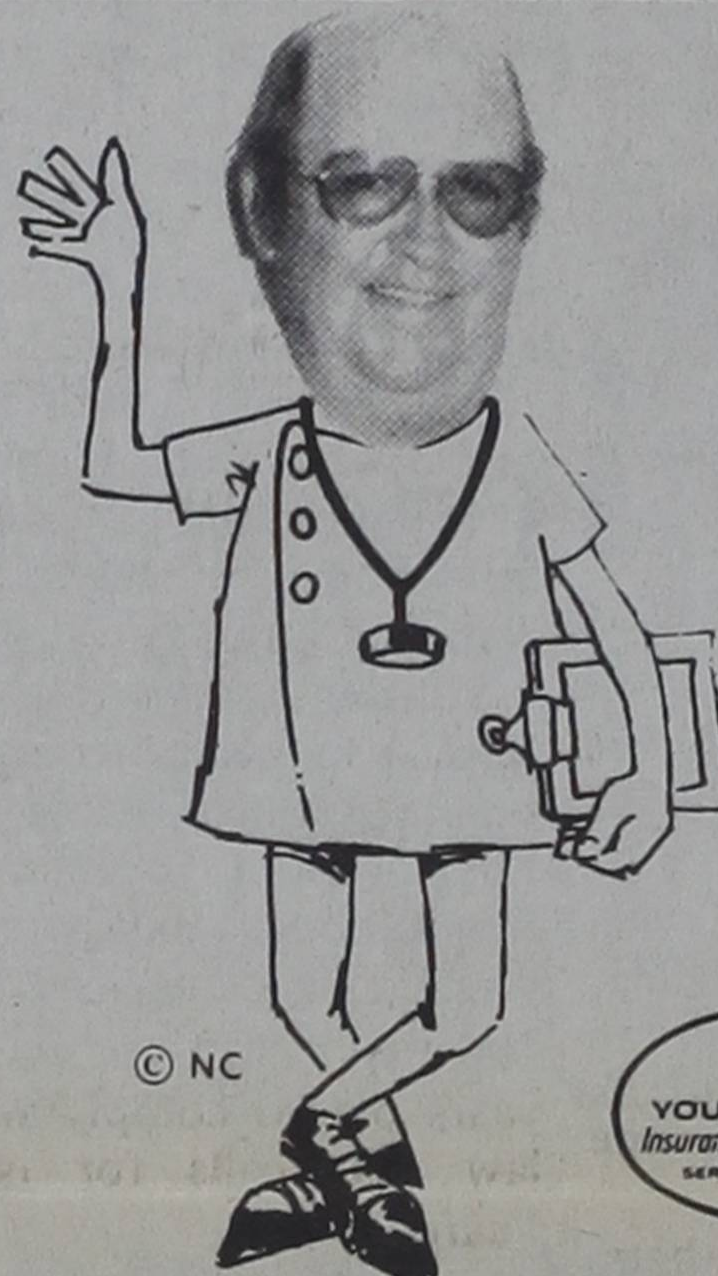

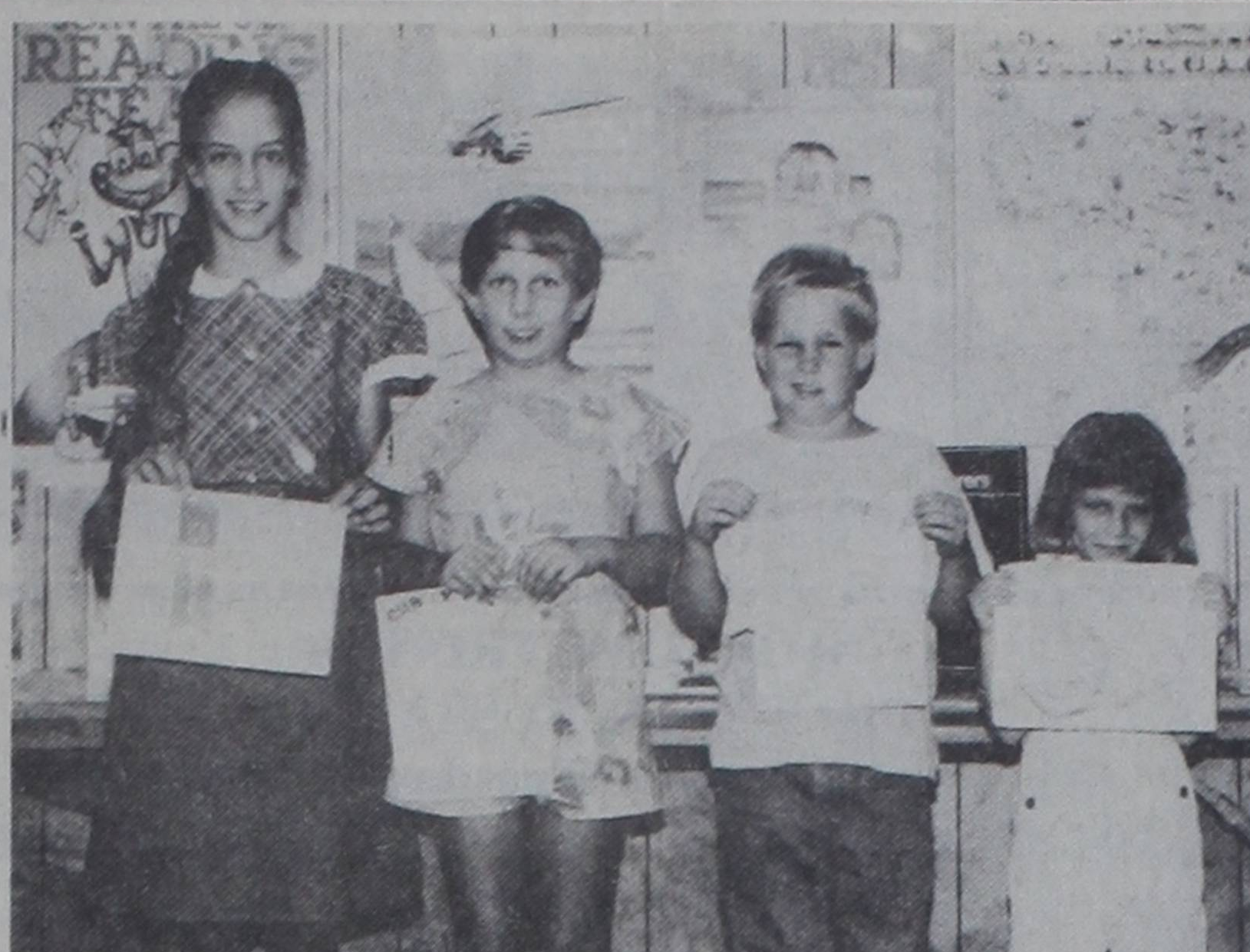
This facility is certainly an asset to our community, while visiting other nursing care facilities, we have realized how fortunate we are to have this one in our community.

Hwy. Dept. To Recall Old Plates

Some vehicle owners will see a new message on their registration renewal forms: "New Plates Required."

The State Department of Highways and Public Transportation will start a program of recalling plates more than eight years old to comply with a state law that calls for issuance of "safety plates."

Highway Department testing personnel have found that "the reflective value of license plates sheeting begins to deteriorate dramatically after eight years," said Dian Neill, head of the department's Motor Vehicle Division. The dull plates are difficult to see in the dark.

Over the next 12 months, the department expects to issue 1.4 million replacement plates for all light trucks and passenger cars with tags originally issued from 1975 through 1980. Next year, recalls for 1981 plates will go out in the continuing program, conducted through county tax assessor-collector offices.

Vehicle owners who volunteer to trade their 5-8 year old plates may still do so free. "The state collects fees sufficient to replace license plates every five years, so you're just getting your money's worth if you trade them in on time," said Hugh Moseley, tax assessor-collector for Parmer County.

In addition to the recall message on the registration renewal form, owners of old plates will get a notice advising them to contact their county tax office for locations where new plates can be obtained.

The Highway Department has plenty of plates ready and plans to monitor county inventories closely so no one runs out. The plates will be lettered in blue, with "TEXAS" and a state silhouette in red.

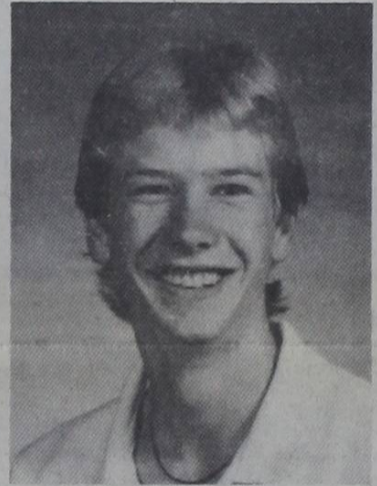
