Miss Friona Pageant Is Slated Saturday

WE KNEW IT WOULD happen. It generally always does, anytime the news focuses in on any kind of agricultural calamity--and that is the fact that the national grocer wholesalers have already begun to "gouge" the public with higher prices.

A report released this week revealed that the cost of food--all food--increased this past month by .4 per cent, the highest rate of increase in the past several years.

The cause for the increase was blamed on the severe drought which has plagued much of the nation's farmland during the summer of 1988.

But wait. If you'll stop and think a minute, you don't even have to be in the farming business to realize that the price hikes are 'way, 'way premature.

The reason being that it isn't even time for harvesting the 1988 crop. How can they already have the prices raised on certain items when the commodity from which it is produced has not even been harvested yet???

One of the items listed as having suffered a price hike was bread, which increased 1.1 per cent. There are two things wrong with this "little" increase.

For one thing, it has been pointed out on numerous occasions that only about two or three cents worth of wheat, at the most, goes into the price of a loaf of bread. The majority of that \$1 or so that you pay for your bread goes to pay for processing, packaging, advertising and the like.

The wheat producers have pointed out for years that with this small percentage of the cost of bread actually tied to the market price of wheat, the price could be doubled to the farmers, without causing the price of bread to go up appreciably on the grocer's shelves. That is, if you could assume that the wholesalers, bakers, retailers, etc., would be honest about the situation.

The other thing, as regards the price of bread, is the fact that wheat harvest came late last spring--considerably before the drought problems even came to exist. As far as we know, no wheat crop has yet been affected by the dry conditions. There is still time for any drought-stricken area to get enough rain for planting wheat, and that crop should not be affected at all.

And yet, the report said, the price of bread was going up 1.1 per cent.

One television commentator laid off politics long enough to make the observation that the prices of foodstuffs were rising faster than the drought would seem to indicate that they should rise.

Products being produced at the present time, the newsmen pointed out, are being made with last year's crop supply, and the companies are apparently taking advantage of the situation, and the adverse publicity, to go ahead and raise their prices.

It's a shame that consumers aren't able to keep tabs (perhaps some of them do) close enough so they can tell which grocery products are being raised unnecessarily, so that they could boycott these particular brands, and force the producers to be honest about the situation.

Food producers who prey upon the unsuspecting consumers with price hikes before their own prices have been affected are sort of in the same league with the attorneys who show up at the sites of airplane crashes, seeking out survivors of people killed in the crash, hoping to get a good lawsuit case.

School Term Opens Thursday, Sept. 1

The schedule for the beginning of school was released this week by Hal M. Ratcliff, Superintendent of Schools.

Friona High School students need to complete registration and pick up their schedules on Tuesday, August 30. Juniors and seniors need to report at 9 a.m. and freshmen and sophomores need to report at 10:30 a.m.

The first day of school for students will be Thursday, September 1. All kindergarten and first grade students are to report to the Primary Building. Kindergarten and first grade students will need to bring birth certificates or acceptable birth records and immunization records if they have not previously provided these documents to the school. Parents of kindergarten students are reminded that their child must be picked up at 12 noon from September 1-September 9.

All students in grades two and three need to report to the Grade School Building through the west doors on Cleveland Street. Students in grades four and five should report to the south wing of the Grade School Building. Assistance will be provided to help students get to their proper rooms.

Junior High students should

report to the Junior High Building. Students in the sixth grade should enter the west door of the Junior High School (Cleveland Street entrance). Room assignments will be posted in the hallway for all Junior High students once they enter the building.

Friona High School students need to report to the High School Building on September 1. All new students in the Friona Public Schools will be assigned and able to begin school without delay if they have pre-registered. Otherwise, they will have to complete the registration process on September 1.

Truck Company Has New Owners

Friona Industries has sold Friona Transport, Inc. to the principals of Winkles Truck, Inc. of Pecos, Texas.

Winkles purchased all of the tractors, trailers and office equipment, and is leasing the shop and office at the former Friona Transport location.

"We plan to operate the trucking company pretty well like it has been in the past," said Harold Warren, the new manager. Warren replaced Florian Jarecki as manager of the concern.

Warren said the truck company would continue its business relationship with Hi-Pro Feeds, and would be hauling feed to feed yards throughout the area.

"We feel we can do a good job in the trucking business locally, and hope to expand our business somewhat. Winkles was already doing some business here, and had considered establishing a base in the area before the possibility of buying Friona Transport came about," Warren said.

Warren pointed out that the business would continue to be known as Friona Transport. It will not be a subsidiary of Winkles Truck Company, but will be a separate corporation. Winkles has operated a truck depot in Amarillo for some time.

Warren and his wife Brenda are in the process of moving to Friona, although they have been staying in a local motel. They are coming here from Pecos, and have

Ratcliff died Saturday, August 20 at El Paso's Sun Towers Hospital following a lengthy illness.

Survivors include two sons, Hal Ratcliff of Friona and Jim Ratcliff of El Paso; one sister, Mary Flowers of Lubbock; one brother, Shade Ratcliff of Amarillo; four grandchildren and two great-grandchildren.

He was preceded in death by a brother, Sam, in 1979.

10 YEARS AGO--AUG. 27, 1978

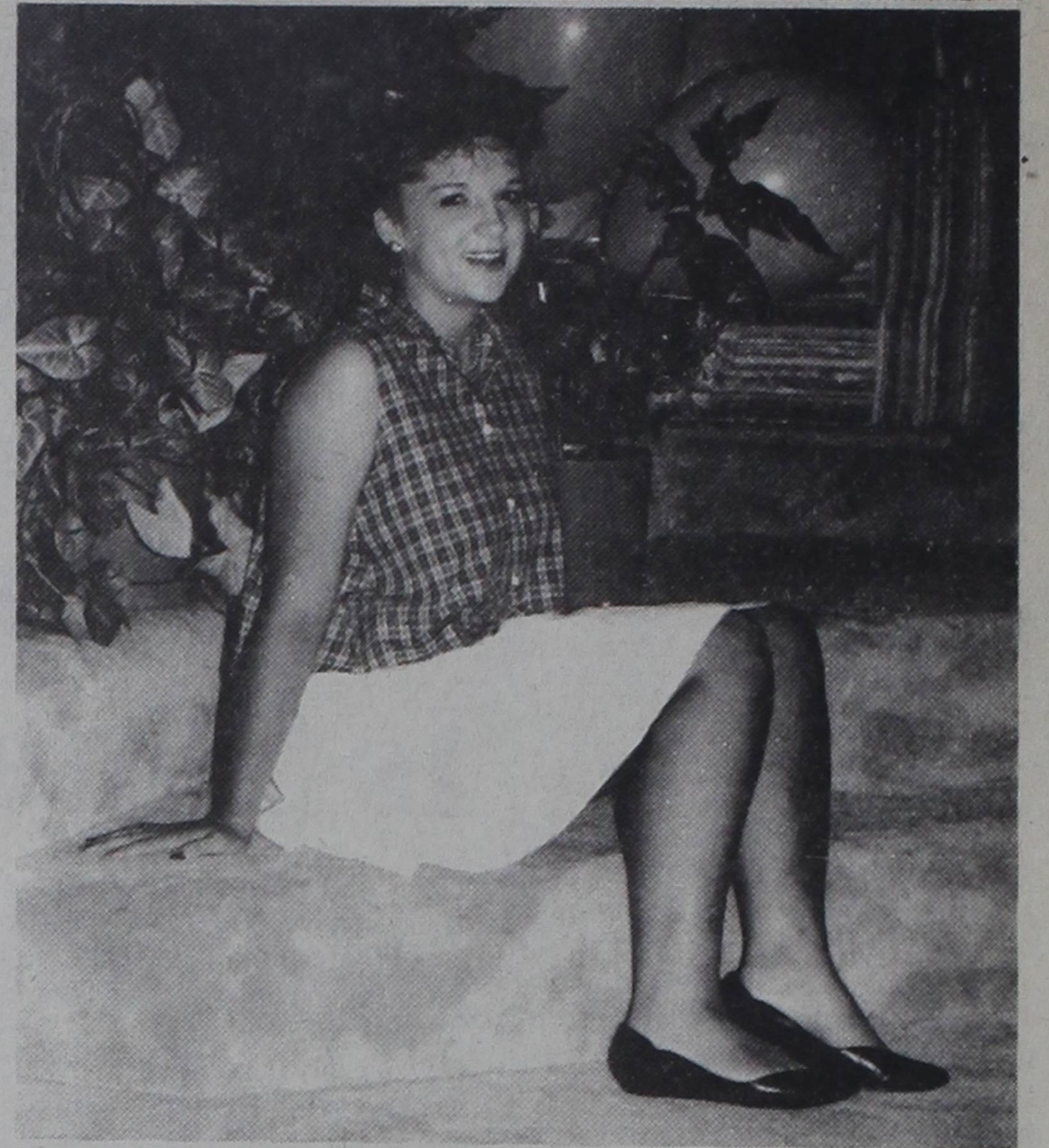

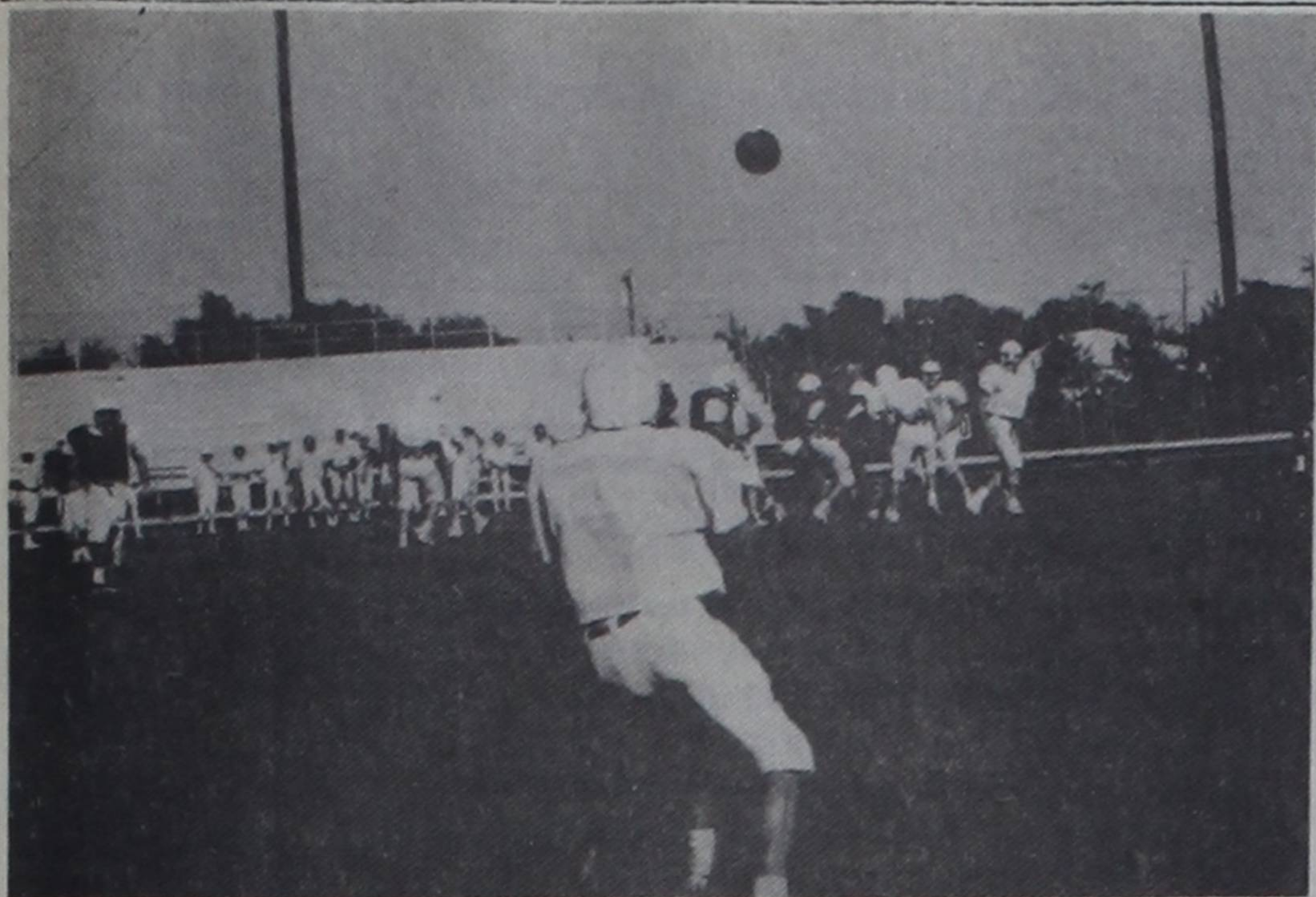

1988 Grid Schedule Has "New Look"

The Friona Chieftains 1988 football schedule has a new look, with four of the five non-district opponents having been met only a total of four times in the past 25 years.

In fact, one of the opponents, Brownfield, will be met on the gridiron for the first time ever.

Hart, another new opponent, has been met six times previously, the last time being in 1977. Friona holds a 4-2 edge over the Longhorns in previous meetings.

Dalhart has been scheduled 19 times previously, as far back as 1942, the last time being in 1983.

The Canyon Eagles have been met eleven times previously by the Friona Chieftains, the last time being in 1961. The Chieftains have never beaten the Eagles on the gridiron, although playing them to a 0-0 tie in 1941.

Of this foursome, Dalhart is the only opponent that Coach Tommy Moss has personally had experience with on the gridiron, and has a personal 1-1 record against the Wolves.

Of the non-district opponents, Brownfield is said to have their best team in a number of years, and will be fighting for one of the top spots in their district.

Canyon is down to class AAA after winning District 1-4A last season and advancing to the regional round of the playoffs. The Eagles have their talented quarterback returning, and likewise is favored to make the playoffs.

River Road, Dalhart and Hart are each rated about the "middle of the pack" in their respective districts. The Wildcats, Friona's opening game opponent, Dalhart and Canyon are all members of District 1-3A, so the Chiefs will meet three of that district's five teams.

Although the ten season opponents hold an overall 126-66-3 advantage over Friona in previous gridiron meetings, Coach Tommy

Football Scrimmages

The Friona Chieftains held a pair of scrimmages, the second of which was sponsored by the Booster Club as "Meet the Chiefs Night" on Thursday.

"I felt that Cody Burney performed well at quarterback and defensive back. Also, Cody Bracken ran well and hit hard on defense. Paul Trimmell and Louis Dunnam both played super defense," Coach Tommy Moss said of Thursday's scrimmage.

Moss said that after all of the team's workouts, they were a little tired, especially in the 90-degree humid heat on Thursday.

"We know we can run, so we decided to work on throwing the ball. We think we may throw the ball 30 to 40 per cent of the time. We have three or four possession receivers.

"If we can throw the ball, we can take some of the pressure off our offensive line, especially the tackles, and help keep Andre (Duran), Ben (Osborn) and Cody (Bracken) healthy," Moss said.

Moss said that offensively he expected the team to be in good shape. Defensively, he has some young kids, although the defense is anchored by good experience.

Moss has a personal 23-18-1 edge over the seven opponents he has faced.

Of the teams met previously, only Littlefield has eluded Moss' teams in the win column. Moss became Friona High School's all-time winningest coach last season, with an overall record of 43-28-2 and a winning percentage of .600 in seven years.



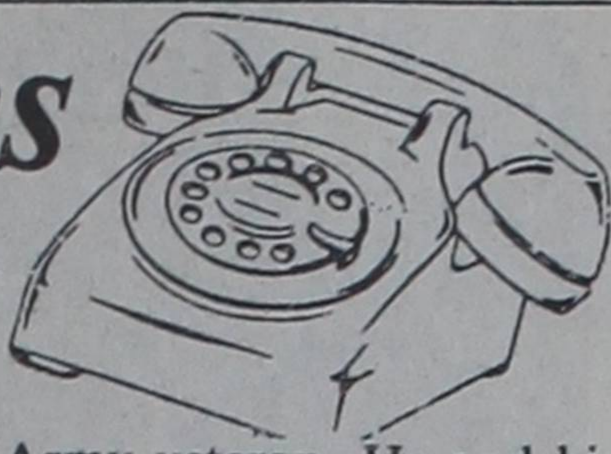

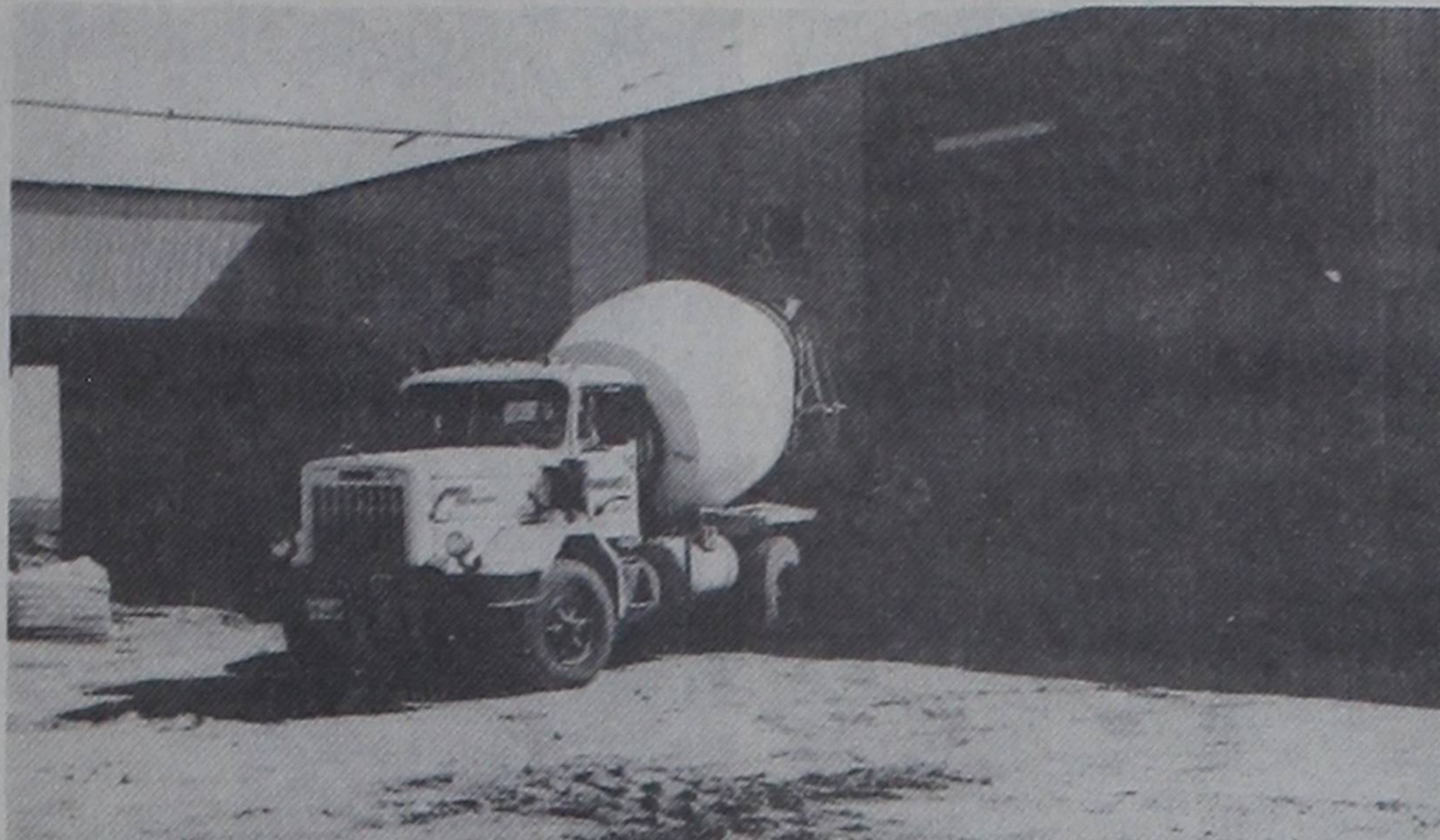

Lan Bentsen Gives Political Talk Here

Lan Bentsen, son of vice-presidential and U.S. Senate candidate Lloyd Bentsen, appeared in Friona on Thursday on behalf of his father's candidacy.

Bentsen spoke to a gathering of about 30 people at the Dairy Queen.

Bentsen preferred to skirt the issue of Republican v.p. candidate Daniel Quayle's National Guard service, saying he felt the real issue was "Who is qualified to be president, if the need arises."

"Michael Dukakis chose a running mate who was every bit as strong as himself, and yet Bush chose a running mate who appears to be subservient to him," the younger Bentsen told the Friona crowd.

Bentsen lauded his father's work in passing a trade bill even over the earlier protests of the Reagan administration. "He established a coalition in the House and Senate that took two years to develop. He secured 66 per cent majority on the second vote, after Reagan had vetoed the bill the first time," Bentsen commented.

Bentsen also established a National Energy Policy, and has helped create a national

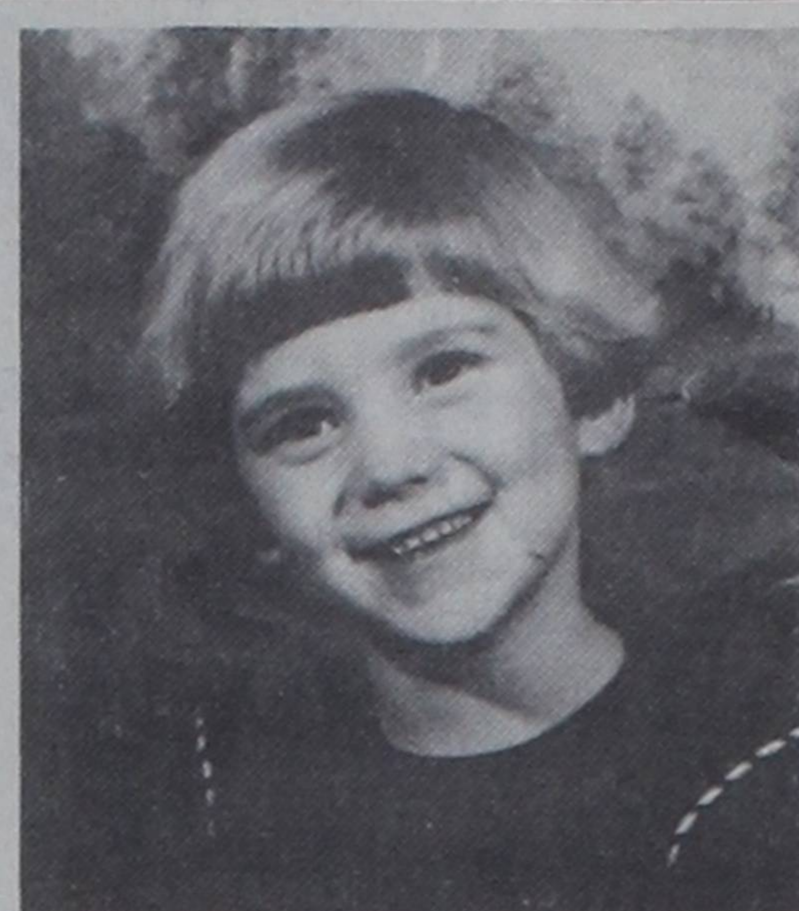
Bentsen, who has a distinguished career of service in his own right, also praised Dukakis for his record, having been voted the nation's top governor by his counterparts.

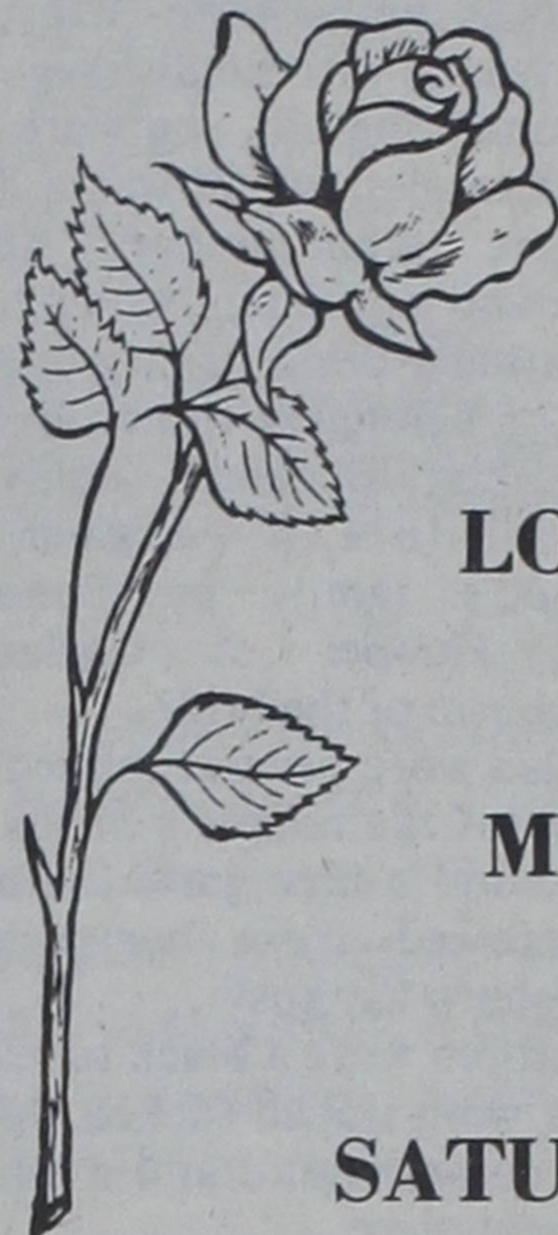

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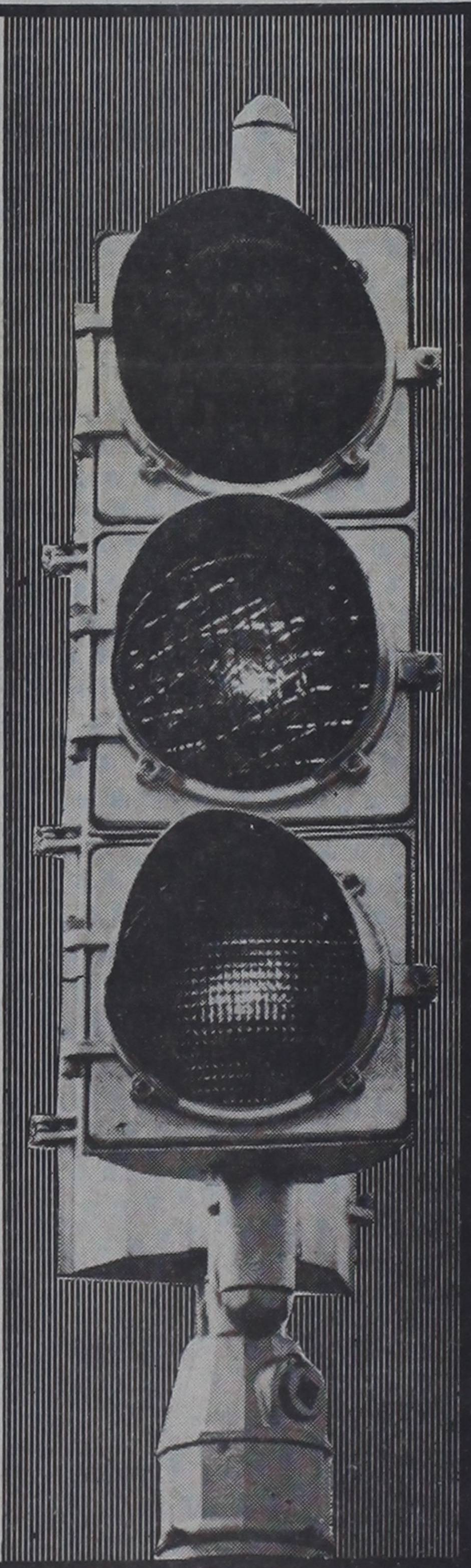
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Friona Native Heads WTSU Admissions

Her title is director of admissions at West Texas State University. Besides supervising recruitment and orientation efforts that add more than 1,000 new students each year to the Texas Panhandle's four-year university, Friona native Lila Gay (Buske) Vars fills the shoes of a job counselor.

A busy schedule does not allow time to moonlight at the University's Career Planning and Placement Center. But an always-open door invites hundreds of

freshmen and sophomores each year to her office for counseling about their academic concerns. Each time she uses a similar approach in helping them.

"I try to ask students who are having trouble in class 'Are you doing your part?' I consider someone going to school as having an occupation. They should consider it like any job for which they are getting paid," she says from her office on the 78-year old campus.

After graduating from Friona High School, Vars earned a bachelor of science in elementary education from Texas Tech University in 1962. Twelve years later, in 1974, she began her tenure with WTSU as associate registrar. In the positions of director of development and director of women's studies/new student relations before becoming director of admissions, she sees the fruit of her college degree as the fruit of a college experience.

"It is not necessarily which degree, but having a degree and the experience of college that counts," she says adamantly. "A liberal arts degree could have done just as well for me in this position."

The May graduation of Vars' younger daughter, Misty, from Texas A&M flavored her talks to parents at the 1988 one-day orientation and registration programs, New Student Registration. While one comment prompted hearty laughter--"My younger daughter just graduated from college, so I am very broke"--most evoked keep attentiveness.

"Your sons and daughters will be going through a lot of stresses..."

"Time management is another stress with classes, adjusting to new friends, doing the laundry..."

"You'll receive phone calls. They're panicking. Don't encourage them to come home. Encourage them to stick to it. More than likely it will pass. If you call back that evening, you'll find they're doing just fine..."

"You really need to encourage them to become involved in one

campus organization..."

"Previously I didn't think of the anxieties parents go through," Vars says of the sympathy she developed through parenting older daughter, Mayla, and Misty through their college experiences.

Experience has taught Vars to also look sympathetically toward the collegians who do not know what they want to major in.

"We try to pin them down to specifics much too early," she says. "Technology is changing, society is changing. The older I get, the more I am inclined to see things in greys instead of black and white and to encourage students to wait to declare a major until they have been here a year or so."

In the last few years, the lady who received the "Buffalo Chip Award" from the campus organization Herdsmen "for outstanding leadership, loyalty and devotion to WTSU," participated in formulating a general decision: Something needs to be done to improve retention at WTSU."

This fall, WTSU will celebrate its 25th anniversary as a University and the admissions staff will note the first anniversary of three steps taken to improve the attrition rate: establishment of a study skills course, opening of the Freshmen Advising Center, beginning of a Mentoring Program between faculty and students.

Higher admissions standards also went into effect in the fall of 1987 and success was evident by the end of the first semester. The overall grade point average for the freshmen class was four per cent higher than that of the preceding freshmen class a year earlier. Also, the number of freshmen on academic probation was 17.7 per cent, 14.3 per cent lower than that of the previous class.

"I think the philosophy of colleges has changed a lot since I started working. It used to be a sink or swim attitude in which new students were thrown into the classroom and left to make it or go home. No more."

In addition to New Student Registration, the 1982 winner of a Career Achievement Award from Amarillo Women's Network oversees Buff Branding, a three-day, festive orientation on campus prior to the start of the fall semester; Junior-Senior Preview for high school upperclassmen; Intro To College for prospective students and their parents; and High School Counselors Workshop. The advisors in the admissions office interest prospective students in these programs and the University through extensive travel in Texas, Oklahoma, New Mexico and Kansas.

Vars sees her previous WTSU roles as beneficial to her current

position. In the registrar's office, she learned the technical aspects of registration, transcripts, and grade sheets and got acquainted with faculty, staff and administration. Travelling throughout the Panhandle as director of development taught her how to market the University. During a brief time as director of women's studies/new student relations, "I learned of their special needs," she says.

Thus, "I feel I can answer questions on many aspects of the University," she adds.

She receives many opportunities to do that at the New Student Registration, which was offered six times in the summer of 1988. Vars developed this program and carried it with her to every position she has worked in WTSU administration.

NSR has endured many transitions. One of them is the scheduling of Parent Adjustment Hour at the same time new students register.

Parent Adjustment Hour puts a panel of WT undergraduate students before parents with an objective they speak candidly on any matter parents ask them. It is a highly rated component of the day's programs. Programs such as these are molded by group action, the thrust of productivity under her leadership.

As Vars describes this form of strategic planning, "Somebody has a thought. Everybody adds to it and it becomes the program."

A former associate in WTSU administration generated the idea for Buff Branding, based on her awareness of Fish Camp at Texas A&M and one at Baylor University. Vars contributed a concern that West Texas State University's orientation dig some roots in the campus soil, rather than someplace away. It passed.

Last spring semester, as one of

the instructors for the study skills course, Vars taught a session on creativity. She emphasized the value of ideas and the supreme importance of writing them down. She described brainstorming as an exciting, dynamic experience.

WTSU's admissions director regards those who regularly embark upon decision-making with her, including full-time and student part-time employees, as her body of friends. She enjoys befriending students in the course of employing them, counseling them or helping sponsor them in the campus organizations Student Foundation and Campus Services.

"A lot of WT students refer to me as 'Mom.' I'm just here when they need me," she says.

"I think I have the ability to see the best in people and, for the most part, pull out the best in people. I'm a very positive, optimistic person. I have an ability to choose people to work in this office who, even though they come from a lot of different backgrounds and have different interests, work well together."

While she feels sadness, disappointment and frustration when students do not see their potential, she feels "the greatest sense of accomplishment" at graduation. "It's a wonderful, wonderful experience. With the ones who worked harder, I feel a great sensation; students who took seven years to make it (for the bachelor's degree) for example. Seeing them get good jobs, becoming successful, I feel proud."

Pride in fellow man characterizes the Friona townspeople Vars remembers. "People knew everything you did, yet they supported you, encouraged you. They're proud when you do things well."

She remembers her high school teachers as individuals who "cared

about giving the kind of education we would need to succeed in life," notably her senior English teacher Mrs. Carmaleet Truitt, and retired superintendent of schools Tom Jarboe.

Vars' daughters both graduated from Canyon High School. Mayla, who earned a bachelor of science degree in math education from WT in three years, just completed her fourth year teaching in Amarillo. She and her husband, Kyle Paris, who is also a teacher in Amarillo, expect their first child in January. Younger daughter, Misty, just received her bachelor of science degree in nutrition from Texas A&M University. She is working an internship at Presbyterian Hospital in Dallas toward certification as a registered dietician and is engaged to marry Gary Evans November 25.

Mr. and Mrs. Don Max Vars attend First Baptist Church in Canyon, where she chairs the Centennial Committee for the city's 100th birthday in 1989. She serves on the Canyon Independent School District Board and has previously been involved in Canyon Study Club and WT Women.

In the admissions office she defines her role this way: "Basically I'm involved in identifying quality students for the University; students who will fit into the environment at WTSU."

For the coming year she embraces two hopes--hopes which align with her convictions about quality job performance. "I hope that every student who enrolls in the fall graduates and that everyone in the Panhandle knows WTSU is the place for a quality education--a place where the faculty cares."

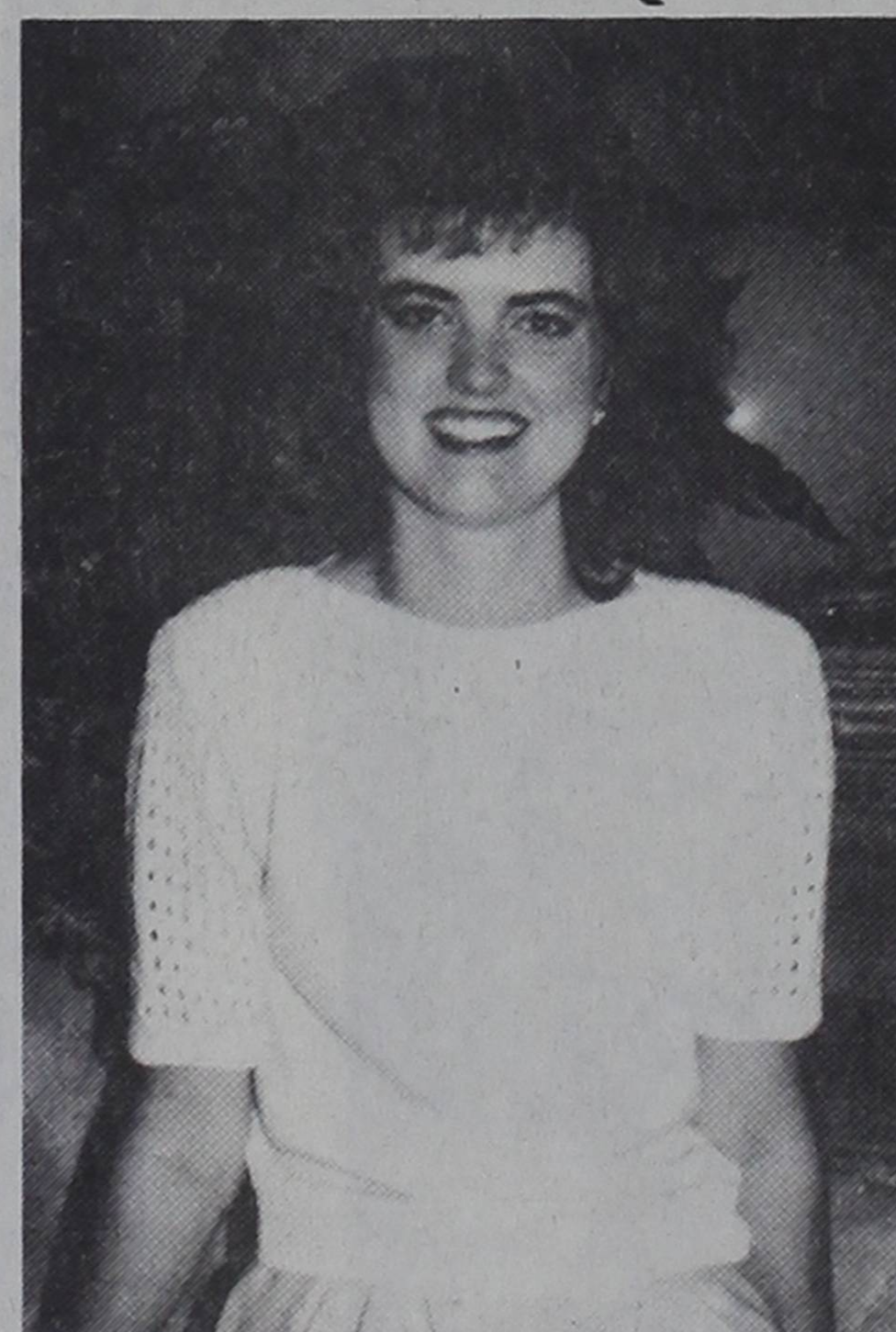
A booklet containing the class members' addresses and updated information was prepared as a souvenir of the occasion.

Letter To The Editor

To The People Of Friona:

It is not every day that someone gets the opportunity to take a three-week musical tour performing with the U.S. National Chorus throughout Europe. I NEVER would have been able to take such a tour without all of my hometown's support. I do not even know how to begin to say thank you. It is impossible to put into words the feelings I have from this experience.

The musical portion of this tour was truly outstanding. I can now say that I have been exposed to professional training and performing. The chorus spent the first three full days at Dickenson College in Carlisle, Pennsylvania, studying, memorizing, auditioning and training for our ninety-minute concert. Stan Kingma, the U.S. National Chorus director who directs Choral Music at Virginia Tech and is the director of the National FFA Chorus, had our show smoothly polished by the time we boarded the plane for Europe. Other small touch-ups fell into place while actually performing overseas so that while we were in Europe, we could relax, tour and enjoy performing without having to do but very little work on our show. The chorus consisted of seventy persons with exceptional musical talent from forty different states. Within this group, we also had a small orchestra. Our chorus was really fantastic.

We performed a variety of music in our show including contemporary Christian music, classical arrangements, some patriotic tunes and a few slow rock songs. As well as singing with the choir, I was also fortunate to have earned a soloist spot singing country music, along with five other soloists.

Within three weeks, we visited seven countries and gave concerts in five of them. We performed in some of the most beautiful and elaborate concert halls and sites. Most of our concerts were outside in town squares or parks because

the weather was cooperative. The concerts that were held inside were in huge civic centers or concert halls. They were unbelievable! Our audiences accepted us very gratefully and always invited us to come back again next year. The people were so pleased with two of our performances that they presented us with flowers.

While on the road performing or setting up to perform, we had opportunities to sightsee in such places as Grindelwald, Switzerland, where we took the longest chairlift in Europe to the top of the Alps. In Innsbruck, Austria, we attended a Tyrolean Evening performance and saw two Winter Olympic sites. Venice, Italy, was quite romantic while floating down the Grand Canal to St. Mark's Square which had strolling musicians, ancient palaces and cathedrals, and the famous Venetian glass makers.

In Salzburg, Austria, we visited Mozart's birthplace and some of the filming sites in The Sound of Music. We also took a steamboat cruise on the Rhine River in Germany. The last place we visited was Luxembourg. There we had the chance to visit the American-Luxembourg Cemetery, the final resting place for General Patton and over 5,000 soldiers killed in World War II. During most of the tour, we were on-the-go, but occasionally we did have time to sightsee some wonderful places.

I truly had the experience of a lifetime! I met 80 new friends from all over the United States. We grew very close musically and personally traveling in two buses for three weeks throughout Europe. This trip is something that I will definitely never forget. It's just not everyday that one gets to take a tour throughout Europe, stay in nice hotels, see some famous sites in Europe and do all of this while performing musically. I want to sincerely thank you, Friona, for giving me such a wonderful opportunity.

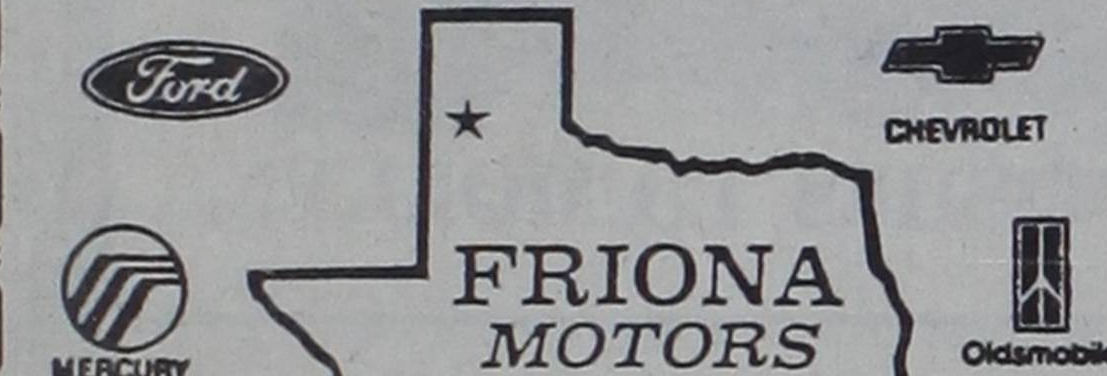

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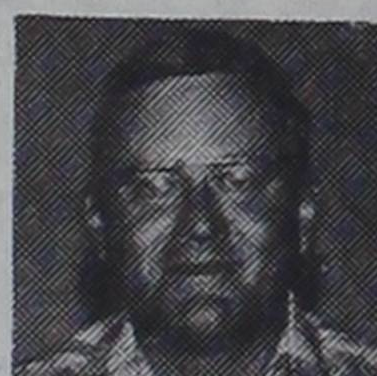
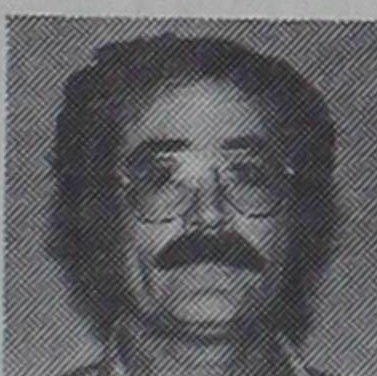


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
