Enrollment Gains In Scholastics

THE LONG, HOT summer draws to a close. The weather gets cooler, while the political races are heating up...finally!

Attend The Maize Days Events Saturday

Enrollment in the Friona Independent School District on Tuesday, September 6 stood at 1,278, according to Superintendent of Schools Hal Ratcliff.

The enrollment totals reflected an increase of 27 students, or 2.2 per cent, from the early enrollment figures for 1987.

As usual, the elementary section of the school showed not only the largest number of students, but also the best gain. Tuesday's enrollment stood at 658 students in elementary school, a gain of 40 over last year's first school count.

High school had a total of 341 students, four less than last year's total but five more than the year before that. Junior high logged 279 students, which was down by nine students from 1987.

This year's first count came on the third day of school, compared to the fourth day in 1987, but this year the third day fell after Labor Day, whereas last year's first count was on the Friday prior to Labor Day.

Enrollment totals, with last year's totals in parenthesis, were as follows:

Pre-kindergarten: 34 (31); Special Education, combination unit: 2 (12); E.C.U.: 7 (5); kindergarten: 100 (108); first grade: 110 (97); second grade: 110 (102); third grade: 103 (92); fourth grade: 97 (89); fifth grade: 95 (101). Total elementary: 658 (634).

Sixth grade: 91 (88); seventh grade: 78 (92); eighth grade: 85 (94); Life Skills unit: 25 (14). Junior High totals: 279 (295).

Ninth grade: 92 (96); tenth grade: 88 (98); eleventh grade: 86 (79); twelfth grade: 75 (72). High school totals: 341 (345). Grand totals: 1278 (1251).

Exit Level Schedule Is Given

On October 25 and 26, the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) Exit Level Test will be administered at Friona High School. This test measures basic skills in the areas of math and language arts.

Students must pass both sections of the test before receiving a high school diploma. The mathematics test will be given Tuesday, October 25 and the English language arts test Wednesday, October 26.

Mark Neill Wins First '88 Grid Prize

Mark Neill picked up right where he left off nine months ago in the Friona Star Football Contest, as the 1988 contest got underway.

The Brownfield Cubs, who are the number one rated team in the Panhandle-South Plains area, were visiting for Friona's first home football game of 1988 on Friday.

Brownfield, touted to have their best team in a number of years, came off a 35-0 win over Muleshoe in their season opener.

Giant Fire Cause Of Area Haze

Friona residents, like those across most of the Western U.S., have seen evidence this week of the massive forest fires burning in the Yellowstone National Park area.

The hazy skies, especially evident nearer to sunrise and sunset, have been caused by a part of the smoke drift from these western fires.

Earlier in the week, residents awoke to low temperatures of 47 degrees on Sunday and Monday mornings. Friona took honors both days as the coolest reporting station in the entire Panhandle-South Plains area.

But summertime returned, with a high of 93 on Thursday. Only .07 inch of precipitation was measured during the past week.

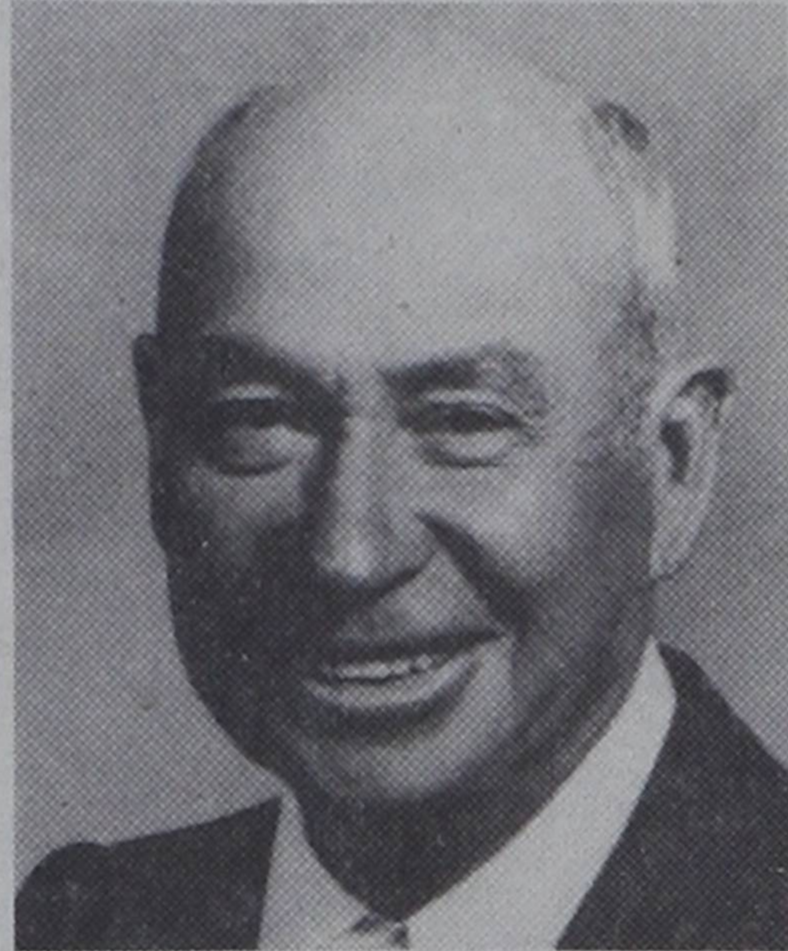

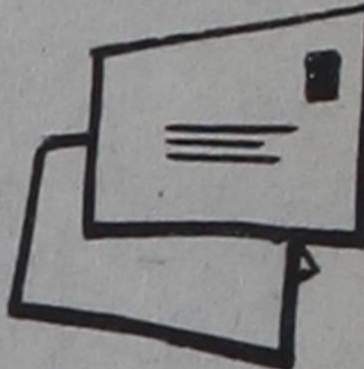
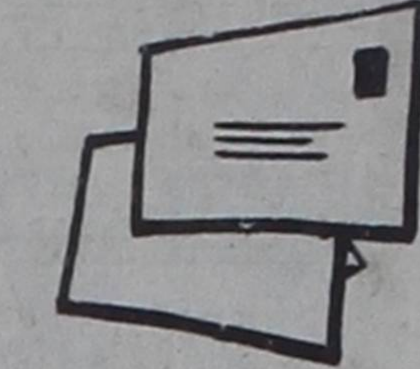
Before her retirement, she taught science at the Highland Park High School in Dallas, Texas seventeen years.

Letter To The Editor



Dear Editor:

Dr. Guadalupe Quintanilla is a woman worth listening to. A Mexican youngster brought by her parents to Brownsville, Texas, she quit school at the age of 12, after intelligence tests indicated that she had an I.Q. of 64, some 30 points below average. This test was given in English when Dr. Quintanilla only spoke Spanish. When her children needed her help to overcome the same problem she wanted to go to school herself to learn how to help them learn. She then found out her records showed that she was "mentally retarded."

With a lot of persistence, she did go back to school. Taking classes in basic English, basic math and typing at Texas Southmost College she started her education.

Her appetite for knowledge was insatiable. Three days a week she studied at Texas Southmost; two days she attended classes at Pan American University in Edinburg, 70 miles away. After three years, she received both her junior-college degree and a Bachelor of Science degree, with honors, from Pan American.

She then cast her eyes on the University of Houston, where she could study Spanish literature. In 1971, she received her Master's degree; in 1977, her doctorate in

education. In the years that followed, she became the first Latina to win an American Council of Education Fellowship.

The grade school dropout without a high school degree is now Assistant Provost for the University of Houston.

Dr. Quintanilla will be speaking in Friona at the Junior High Auditorium, Euclid Avenue, on Monday, September 26 at 7 p.m. Friona PTA invites everyone to come hear about her experiences.

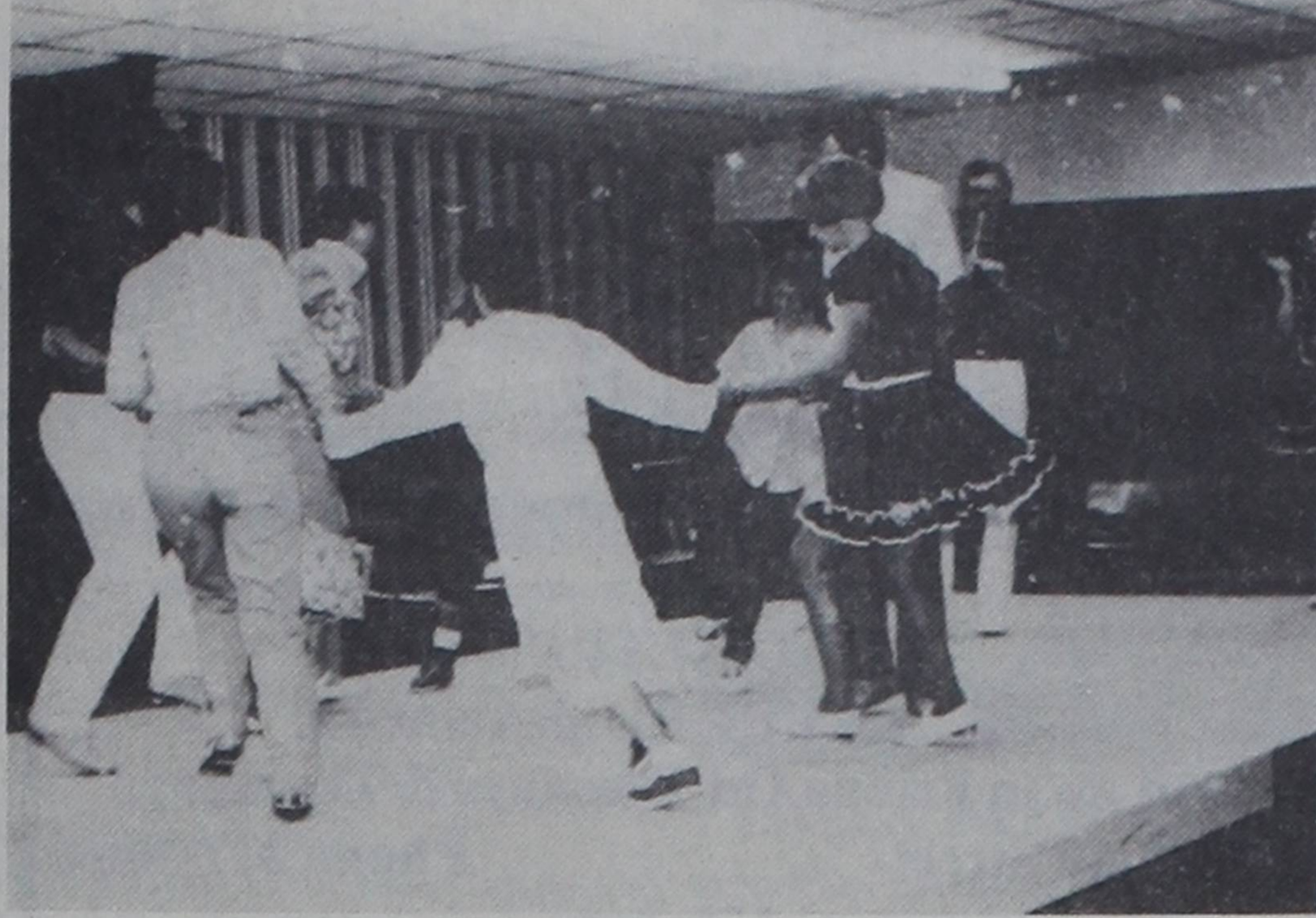



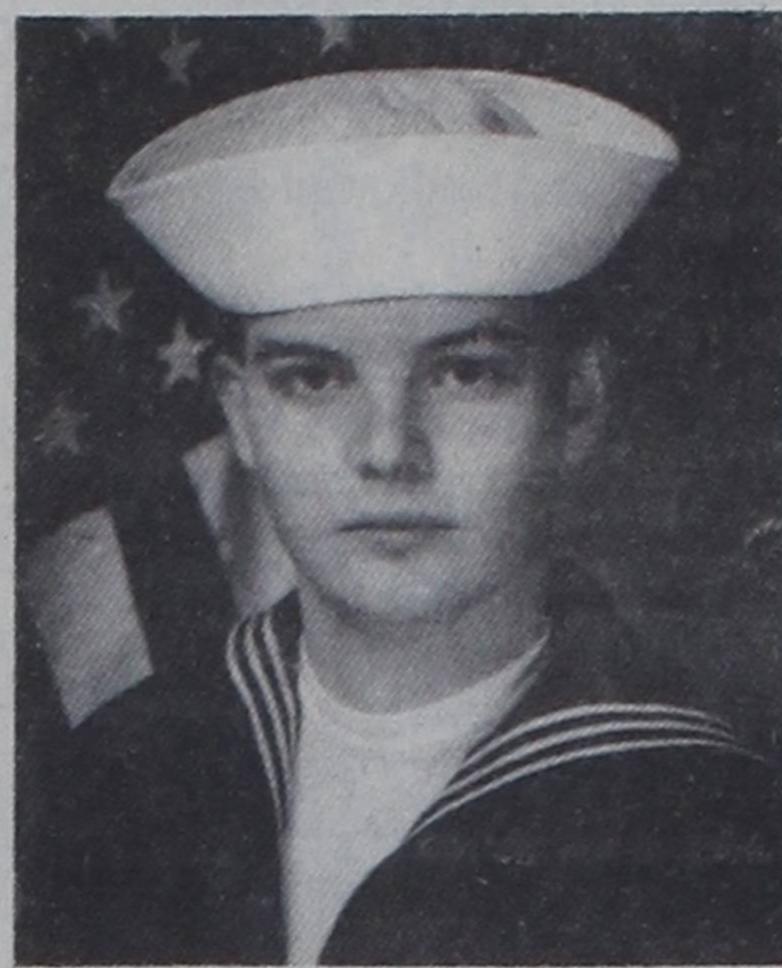
L.D. Blake Graduates In Florida

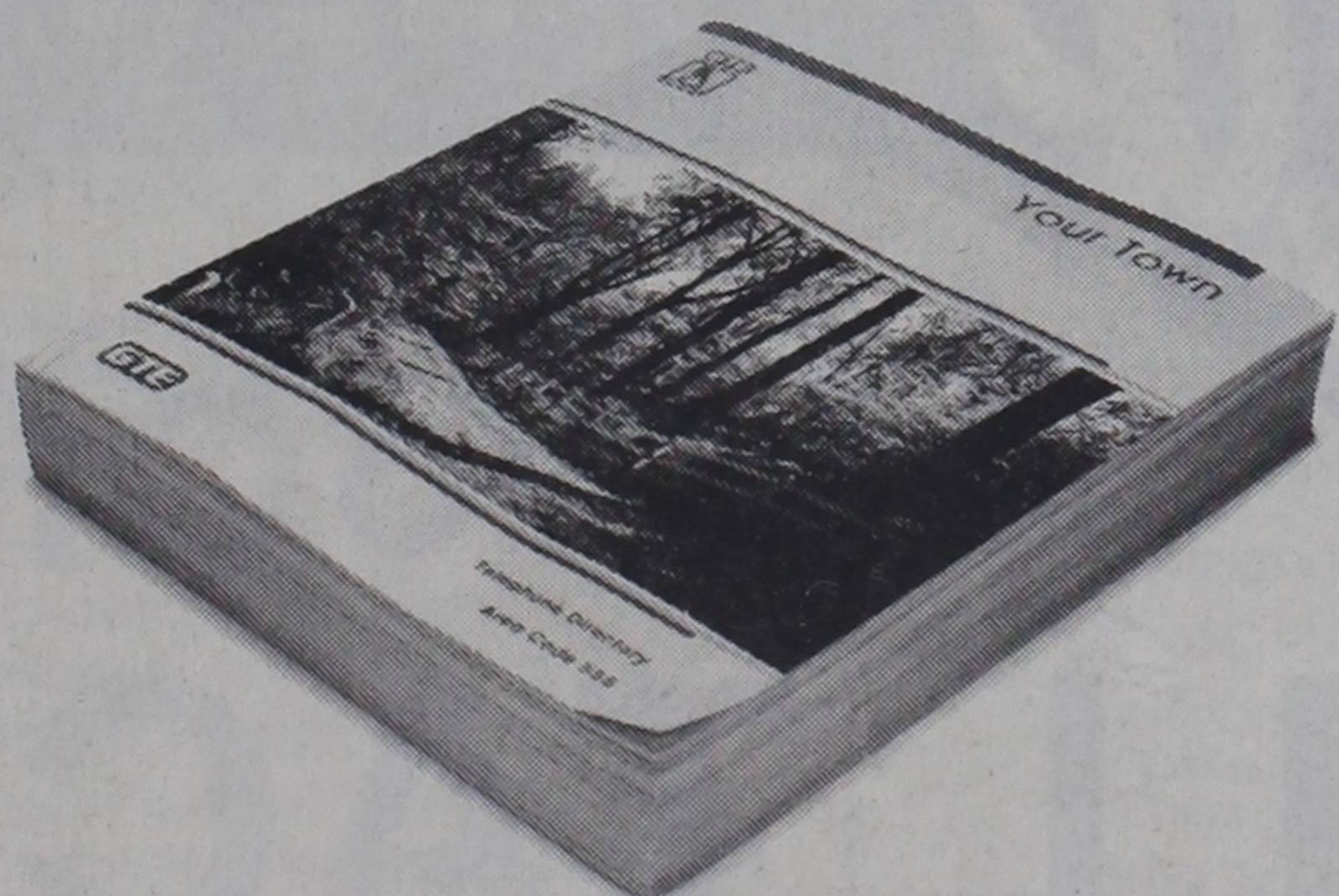

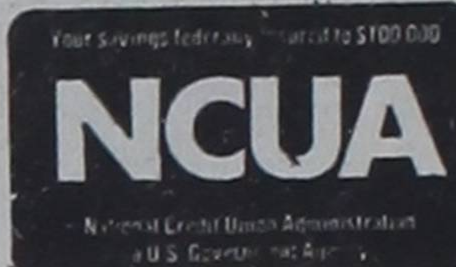

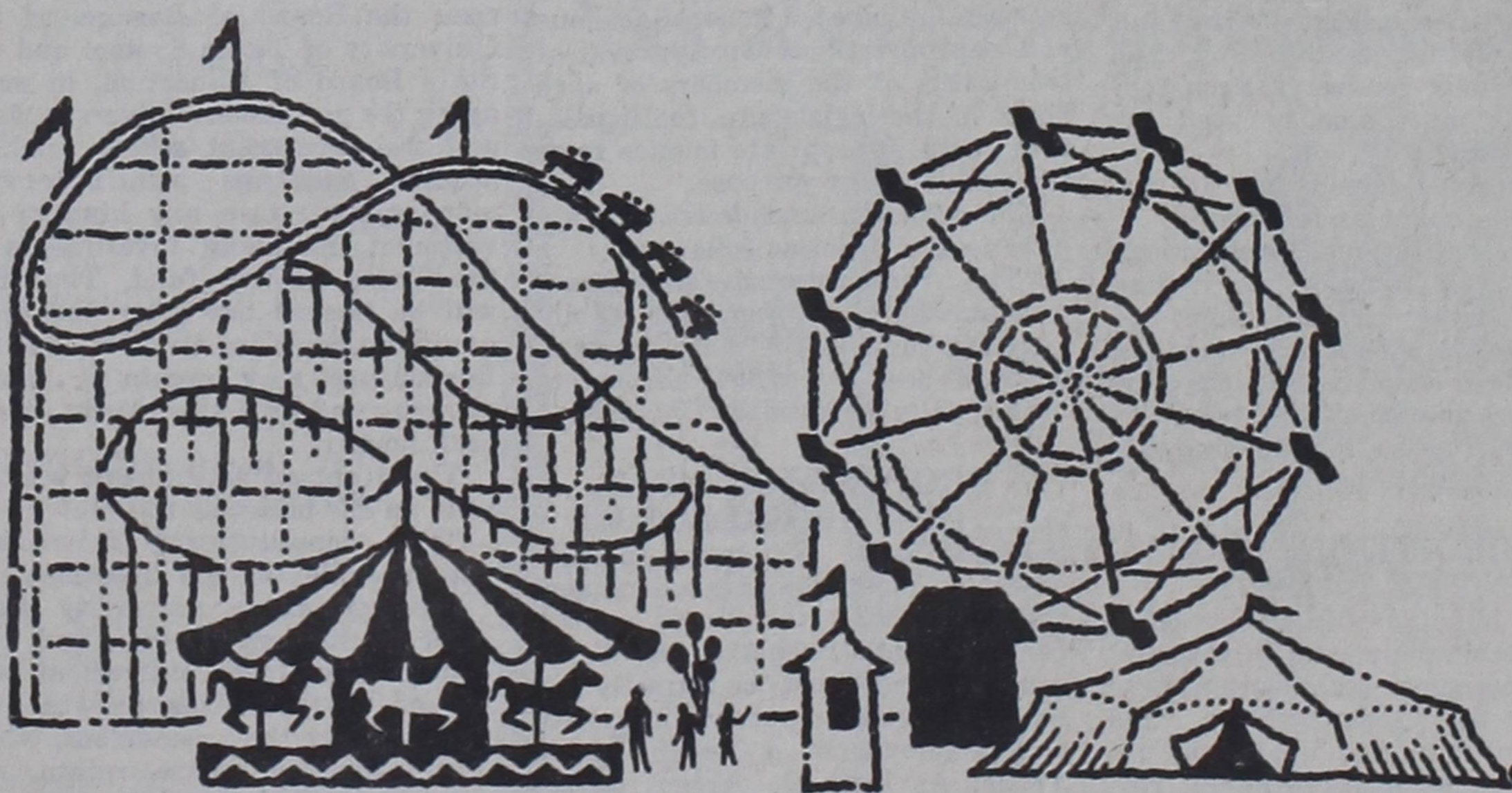

growth fund will be managed by a board of trustees consisting of four members appointed by the Governor and one member from and elected by the membership of each of the following: The Board of Regents of the University of Texas System; The Board of Regents of the Texas A&M System; The Board of Trustees of the Teacher's Retirement System of Texas; The Board of Trustees of the Employee's Retirement System of Texas; and the State Board of Education. The trustees may set the investment policy of the fund, enter into investment contracts, and take any action necessary for the creation, administration, and protection of the fund. The amendment authorizes the Board of Regents of the University of Texas System and the State Board of Education, in managing the permanent university fund and the permanent school fund, to acquire, exchange, sell, supervise, manage, or retain any kind of investment, including investments in the Texas growth fund. The fund will be phased out after the tenth anniversary of its creation, but the Legislature may create a second growth fund by a two thirds vote of each house.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment to provide for the investment of the permanent university fund, the permanent school fund, and public employee retirement systems in the Texas growth fund created by the amendment, which will directly create, retain, and expand job opportunity and economic growth in Texas."

BRIEF EXPLANATORY STATEMENTS OF PROPOSED

CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENTS

GENERAL ELECTION

NOVEMBER 8, 1988

PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

Senate Joint Resolution 8 proposes a constitutional amendment providing that when the federal government reimburses the state for expenditures of state funds dedicated to acquiring rights-of-way and for constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways, such federal funds must also be used for those purposes.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment and/or clarification providing that federal reimbursement of state highway dedicated funds are themselves dedicated for the purpose of acquiring rights-of-way and constructing, maintaining, and policing public roadways."

PROPOSITION NO. 2 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 2 proposes a constitutional amendment to establish an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury. The fund would consist of one half of the unencumbered balance of general revenues at the end of a biennium and three fourths of the difference between the net oil and gas production taxes received in a fiscal year and the net oil and gas production taxes received in the 1987 fiscal year. During any fiscal biennium, the amount in the economic stabilization fund could not exceed 10% of the total deposited in general revenue in the preceding biennium.

The state comptroller and the state treasurer could decide to trans-

fer monies from the fund into the general revenue fund to alleviate a temporary cash shortage in general revenue. The legislature could make appropriations from the fund on approval by a three fifths vote of each house to make up the difference between anticipated general revenue and appropriations. On approval of two thirds of the members of each house of the legislature, the legislature could appropriate monies from the fund for any purpose.

The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows:

"The constitutional amendment establishing an economic stabilization fund in the state treasury to be used to offset unforeseen shortfalls in revenue."

PROPOSITION NO. 3 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 5 proposes a constitutional amendment that establishes the Texas growth fund. All investments of the Texas growth fund must be directly related to furthering economic growth and employment opportunities in Texas. At least 50 percent of the fund must be invested in equity and/or debt security for the initial construction, expansion, or modernization of business or industrial facilities in Texas. Not more than ten percent of the fund may be invested in venture capital investments. Of the funds available for venture capital investments, not more than 25 percent may be invested unilaterally, and the remaining investments must be matched at least equally by funds from other sources. River Road Edges Chiefs; Friona Dominates Game

It was a frustrating opening game for the Friona High School Chieftains when they visited the River Road Wildcats last Friday night north of Amarillo.

The Chieftains dominated the game from a standpoint of ball control, statistics and everywhere except the scoreboard.

River Road took advantage of Friona's only defensive lapse to return a punt 75 yards, and made that stand up for a 6-3 win. The River Road win broke a string of five straight Friona wins in the series, which the Chieftains still lead, 7-5.

But for all of their good gains, the Chieftains never could get the ball into the end zone. Only Cody Burney's 40-yard field goal in the second quarter averted a shutout.

Friona made good yardage between the 30 yard lines, but managed to crack the Wildcat 20 on only one occasion.

That came on the opening drive of the game, after Friona received the kickoff. Jeff Stowers gave Friona good field position by returning the opening kick to the Friona 35.

Andre Duran gave Friona a first down with a nine-yard sprint across midfield, to the River Road 47.

After a penalty and an incomplete pass, the Chieftains found themselves facing third down and nine to go. Burney went back to pass, but finding no receivers open, decided to run with the ball. He was forced out of bounds at the River Road 33 after a nifty 13-yard run and a big first down.

Ben Osborn burst through the line for 12 yards, giving Friona its third first down at the River Road 21-yard line.

Duran gained four, Osborn four and then one, bringing up a crucial fourth and one situation at the Wildcat 12-yard line.

Friona was flagged five yards for illegal procedure, moving before the snap, and that pushed the team back to the 17. The Chiefs then tried a pass, that fell incomplete.

Thus, the team came away from their opening drive, which had looked so promising, with no points to show for their efforts. They were never to get that close to the 'Road end zone again, as the Wildcat defense seemed to get stronger as the game went along.

River Road made a pair of first downs on their first possession,

but the Chieftain defense forced a punt.

The Chieftains again were their own worst enemy, as a procedure penalty hampered a drive, bringing up their first punting situation.

Duran got off a good 36-yard punt, but the Wildcats had a trick up their sleeves.

The kick was fielded at the R.R. 25 yard line, and the receiver handed off to a crossing back on a reverse play. But the Chieftain defenders elected to stay with the original receiver, while the ball-carrier sped up the west sidelines, 75 yards for the game's only touchdown.

The PAT kick failed, leaving River Road with a 6-0 lead. The runback came on the last play of the opening period, as the horn sounded during the play.

Burney threw an excellent pass to Jackie Lafuente on the second play following the kickoff, to get Friona going. Lafuente had worked behind his defenders, and Burney laid the pass right in his waiting arms. The play was good for 44 yards.

That set the team up at the River Road 21, first and ten.

However, after a fourth

procedure penalty against Friona, a recovered fumble and an incomplete pass, the Chieftains found themselves still on the Wildcat 21 facing fourth and nine.

They lined up for the field goal, and Burney's kick was true to form, travelling the necessary 40 yards in spite of the misty, heavy air and splitting the uprights. The kick got Friona on the scoreboard with 8:51 remaining in the second quarter.

Friona's defense began to shine, and virtually shut down the Wildcat offense for the rest of the game.

Osborn caught the 'Cats thinking of a pass and ran 20 yards midway through the second period to the River Road 35.

The drive advanced to the River Road 25-yard line before another pair of penalties stymied the Chieftains. Burney was sacked on a fourth and 15 play from the

Wildcat 30. At the half, Friona had 152 net yards to 26 for the Wildcats, and the Chiefs led in first downs, 7-2.

The Chieftain defense kept it up in the third quarter. They didn't allow R.R. a single first down, and a net of only 14 yards for the quarter and no first downs.

Friona, meanwhile, had one opportunity, when a pair of nice runs by Osborn got the ball in enemy territory. But an intercepted pass stopped this drive.

In the fourth quarter, the Chiefs committed only their second defensive lapse, allowing a 57-yard run up the sidelines to their own seven-yard line.

But the Chieftain defense met the challenge, and forced the Wildcats back to the 15, and then forced a fumble which they recovered at their own 20.

Osborn got yet another nifty run, bursting through the middle of the line for 32 yards across midfield. The Wildcat safety had to bring Osborn down in the open. But on a fourth and one play, Burney was tripped up and the drive once again fizzled.

Friona led in total yardage, 229-84, and in first downs, 12-3, but their inability to penetrate the end zone cost them the win. The Chiefs ran 73 offensive plays to 36 for the Wildcats.

"We played pretty well, both offensively and defensively. But we had a few breakdowns, and penalties killed us. Burney would have had better luck throwing the ball if we'd have given him a little more time," said Coach Tommy Moss.

Big lineman Loren Lookingbill suffered a strained knee, and is expected to be out of action for a couple of weeks.
