Gentlemen: In connection with our Jubilee meeting which will be held March 2nd, as you no doubt know, Governor Neff and quite a party from Austin will reach here on the Texas and Pacific the morning of the second. Our plans contemplate meeting this party at the pullman, which will be set out here at seven-thirty in the morning and escorting them to the Wright Hotel for breakfast. About 9 o'clock we will give them an automobile ride over the city and show them as many points of interest as possible. At ten o'clock we will take them to the reviewing stand and let them review a parade of school children. After this parade we will escort them to the Wright Hotel for luncheon, and in the evening after the banquet, will escort them to their train going east.

To take care of the above program, it will be necessary to have a certain number of automobiles, and this letter is to request you gentlemen to furnish your car for the occasion. You would be expected to furnish your car and preferably drive the car yourself, or at least, if you do not drive the car, be present so that you can entertain the visitors that are assigned to you.

Program Outlined

Judge Crane reported as chairman of the program committee and stated that the program arranged tentatively was substantially as outlined in Mr. Simmons' report. His committee had been in practically continuous session since the appointment Tuesday night, and in addition to working out the program, has arranged for a reviewing and speaker's stand on the Southwest corner of the Courthouse lawn where the parade of 3,000 school children could be reviewed by the Govern-

nor Friday morning. After the parade would come a reception at the Hotel Wright, followed by luncheon. At 2 would come the meeting of the Board of Directors of the New College to be followed by the mass meeting at 3 with Judge Rosser presiding, followed by Dr. Coleman of Colorado, who would deliver officially the thanks of West Texas, then Senator Bledsoe, Representatives Chitwood and dCarpenter and Porter Whaley all prior to the address of the Governor.

His committee has further arranged for barrels of drinking water on the street corners, information and checking bureaus and other details.

Abe Levy chairman of the Decorating Committee introduced Mr. Dreyfuss of Dallas and stated that the directors for the streets were being taken care of with the matter of decorating store fronts left up to individual merchants.

L. J. Geer reported for the banquet committee that 200 guests had been arranged for and other details were proceeding satisfactorily.

Chairman Brand of the Finance Committee was in Fort Worth but Jack Moss reported that ten assistants were drafted and work of getting the money would begin Friday morning.

For Barbecue

Then came the round table discussion, which was led by C. O. Erwin in a forceful plea for a barbecue to entertain the guests of the city. After complimenting Miss Davis for her splendid elocution, Mr. Erwin stated the big problem was how to entertain the guests of Sweetwater. He said that a barbecue could be arranged for \$1,000 to feed the people that the hotels and restaurants were unable to take care of.

Costephens Warehouse can be had for the asking, Mr. Costephens told me," said Mr. Erwin, "and while discussing the matter, a carpenter offered a free beef for it. I will be one of the 100 men to give \$10 toward it."

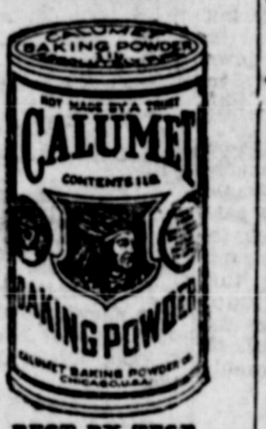

TO FARM Houston Will Send Vagrants To The City Farm.

HOUSTON, Feb. 23.—"Down on the Farm" will be the song that will be sung to hoboes and others who plead empty pockets when assessed a fine here.

The old city farm has been reopened and improvements are being made, to take care of any number that might have the impression that Houston is "easy pickin'." The first batch of prisoners in four years are at work making the improvements.

The farm, which is some eight miles from town, consists of about 325 acres of land, 200 acres of which can easily be cultivated readily. The present building is a frame structure with six rooms on the ground floor and two large rooms on the upper floor.

A new building is being erected, which will accommodate about 100 prisoners, although there have never been that many in jail here at one time.

It is rumored that the word has already reached the "King of the Road and Rail" to stay away from Houston, "if they don't want to work like a hick."

FINDING HOMES FOR BOTTLES

BOSTON, Mass. Feb. 23.—Milk dealers of New England have partially solved the problem of reclaiming and restoring to their rightful owners the thousands of milk bottles that go astray from kitchen door steps every morning.

Through the medium of an organization, known as the Milk Package Exchange, Inc., these countless bottles and cans are returned to the dealers whose name is printed on the receptacle.

The loss to dealers from stolen or destroyed bottles became so great that to remedy the evil the dealers banded together and formed the exchange the expense of which is borne by the members.

Milk bottles and cans are found in many cases miles from their home stations. Families moving away often take bottles with them. Others in purchasing milk from stores, return the wrong bottles. Thousands of bottles are never returned, either being destroyed or used to hold other fluids than milk.

HARDY OF TEXAS, A PACIFIST, RETIRING, TELLS OF VOTE FOR WAR

By FRASER EDWARDS (Copyrighted, 1923, by United Press.) WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—"Zero hour struck for me—a pacifist—when the question of war with Germany came to a vote," said Representative Rufus Hardy of Texas.

That grave and solemn occasion in the House, when Congressmen were called upon to translate the will of the people into law—a law that meant certain death, maiming and disease to thousands, even many of their own sons—was described today for the United Press by the scholarly old Texas who voluntarily retires on March 4.

But the "Sage of Corsicana" goes back to watch the plow turn his "black waxie" acres in Navarro county with the knowledge that, despite his conviction of the unrighteousness of wars, he did not shirk his responsibility when the test came. He told how the battle of conscience was fought and won before he stood up to be counted in the presence of his fellow members and overflowing galleries.

Born in 1855, Hardy was just old enough to have the horrors, the tragedy and the tears of the Civil War imprinted vividly on his childish memory. He grew to manhood amid the strife of reconstruction in East Texas where the last stand of the "unreconstructed rebels" was made, a thorough pacifist as a result of his experiences. Still A Pacifist

Instead of growing up with the customary boyish desire to be a soldier, I had no use for martial music and clanking sabers," said Hardy. "I was a pacifist and still am. I voted for war, but I was in a torment coming to the decision I knew was right.

"My vote would have made no difference in the result. War was inevitable before the House acted. President Wilson had asked for authority and the Senate had already voted it. But the fact that it required more than 17 hours for House to come to a decision shows that other men were not taking their responsibilities lightly.

"From the beginning of the war, I had opposed America going in. Just three months before, I went home and defended the President for keeping us out of war. I defended his course all through the 1916 campaign.

"In the meantime, I began to study the 'blood and iron' philosophy of Bernhardi and Nietzsche, and the 'Gott and me' idea of the Kaiser.

"Germany, with her might makes right' policy carried out through her murderous U-boats, threatened to tip up our commerce, and it was evident she proposed to make the United States pay indemnity if she was successor in her war on Great Britain and France.

Point of Self Defense. "We had been attacked. It had come to a point of self-defense. The supreme hour had struck.

"All these things revolved in my mind as the debate grew hot and fur-

ous. The House was in a tumult of packed.

"When my name was called on that eventful roll call, constrained against emotion, it was nearing three o'clock in the morning, yet the galleries were all feeling I voted for war. I did so knowing it meant the blood of thousands of our dearest sons and the expenditure of untold billions in treasure, which would place a burden of debt on our people for a hundred years. It was the biggest, bravest thing I ever did in public life and I am proud of it."

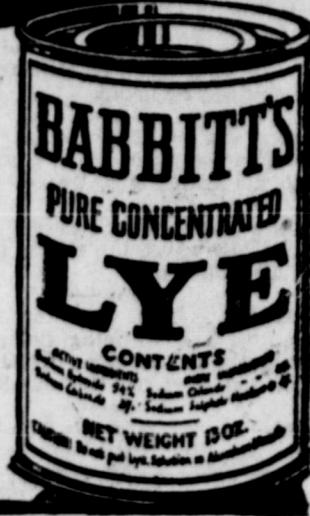

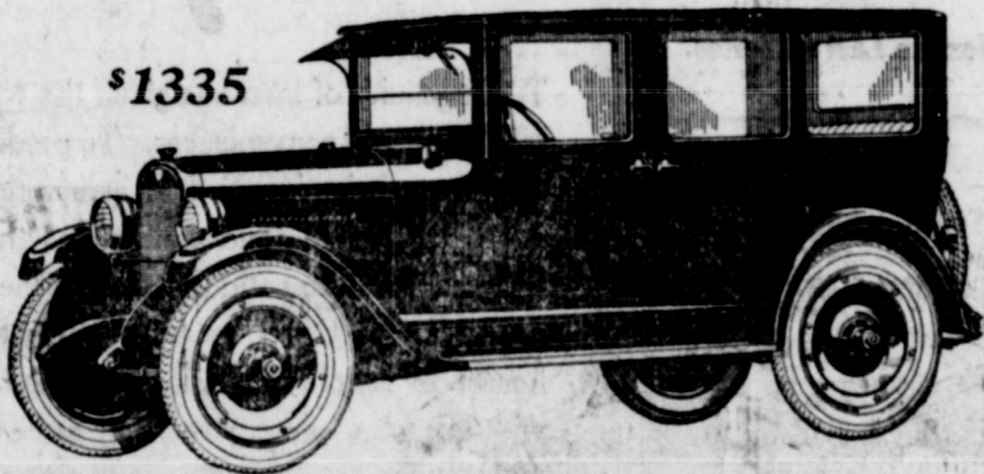

ZR-1 IS BUILDING

Uncle Sam's New Airship Ready About September 1—Being Built at League Island Station.

By The United Press. PHILADELPHIA, Feb. 23.—The ZR-1 Uncle Sam's new airship is nearing completion at the League Island Naval Aircraft Factory and will take the air about September the first.

The ship may revolutionize the construction of lighter-than-air craft. The zipler work is made from a new alloy, known as "duraluminum." This metal is lighter heavier than aluminum and possesses the tensile strength of steel.

"Duraluminum" is expected to eliminate the danger of buckling of the hull, a contributing cause of many air disasters, and the use of helium, a non-inflammable gas, will safeguard against explosions.

The ZR-1 will measure 680 feet in length, with a diameter of 78 feet and a total capacity of 2,150,000 cubic feet. It will be equipped with motors of original design, as well as controls for the operating system evolved by naval aeronautical engineers.

The flying weight of the huge ship will be 135,000 pounds, which is addition to the craft embraces the fuel cargo, a crew of 28, provisions and water.

A maximum speed of 75 miles an hour, with a cruising speed of 50 miles an hour, is predicted by the construction engineers. The cruising radius of the ZR-1 on its full capacity of 48 tanks, each holding 113 gallons, will be sufficient for a 3,500 mile trip. The ship, with six powerful motors totaling 2,040 horsepower, will be able to stay in the air at least 75 hours.

Each of the six 340 horsepower motors will be contained in an inclosed car, and connected to the ship by runways to allow the mechanics to move back and forth between the control room, living quarters and engine room.

Living quarters will be built along the keel inside the main bag, while a ladder or climbing shaft will run through the center of the bag to the top of the envelope, on which will be the observation platform.

The bag or "hull" has been divided into 20 separate gas bags or "cells" covered with layers of fabric. At the present time helium costs \$120 for 1,000 cubic feet, which would make the total cost of charging the ZR-1 \$275,500.

TO SOUTH SEAS

Local Boy Going To Island of Guam Soon.

The South Sea Islands, which have always held a charm for young men in search of adventure, will soon be visited by Ernest M. Bell, son of Mrs. Annie Bell of Sweetwater, Texas, who is with a detachment of U. S. Marines who recently embarked on a naval transport at San Francisco for service in the island of Guam.

Bell joined the Marines at Fort Worth, November 28, 1922, and for several weeks was stationed at Mare Island, Calif. It is customary to send small groups of Marines to Guam from time to time to take the place of other soldiers of the sea who have completed a tour of duty abroad. Bell will probably remain in Guam a year or longer before returning to the United States.

The island of Guam was ceded to the United States by Spain, shortly after the Spanish-American War. It is a typical island of the South Seas with a population of about 14,000 of which the great majority are native Chamorros. The Marines find much interest in studying the customs of the natives while they perform their regular guard duties at this outpost.

CAKE FILLINGS AND FROSTINGS.

CARAMEL FILLING.

1 pound brown sugar Half cup milk 2 eggs Vanilla to suit

Boil sugar and milk until it will harden when dropped into cold water. Beat yolks of eggs and whites separately and then combine them. Gradually pour the hot syrup over them, beating all the time. Add flavoring and beat until cool and quite thick.

CHOCOLATE FILLING.

1 1/2 squares chocolate Cup of powdered sugar 3 tablespoons milk Half teaspoon vanilla

Melt the chocolate, add one-half of the sugar, and the milk. Stir until smooth. Add the remainder of the sugar and cook over hot water 20 minutes, then add the vanilla.

COCOANUT FILLING.

Two eggs Powdered sugar Grated cocoanut

Beat egg whites until stiff, enough powdered sugar to spread on cake and sprinkle with the grated cocoanut. Use for a layer cake, having filling between and on top.

CREAM FILLING.

1 cup sugar Third cup of flour 2 1/2 cups milk One teaspoon vanilla Two eggs, well beaten

Mix sugar, flour and eggs, and stir into hot milk. Cook in top of a double boiler 10 minutes. Add vanilla.

FIG FILLING.

One-half pound of figs chopped fine, 6 tablespoons of sugar, 1-3 cup of orange juice, rind of half an orange; cook in double boiler until the thickness of cream.

LEMON FILLING.

3/4 cup water Juice of a half lemon Quarter cup of sugar Rind of a half lemon

Bring these to a boil and then stir

in the 1-4 cup of sugar and 2 tablespoons of flour mixed together. Take from fire, add 1 egg well beaten, 1 teaspoon of butter; set back on fire until egg is set.

ORANGE FILLING.

Juice of 1 orange, juice of 1-2 lemon; dil cup with water, put in small pan, add 1-3 cup of sugar, bring to a boil and stir in 1-3 cup of sugar and 2 tablespoons of flour stirred together; take from fire and add 1 egg well beaten and 1 teaspoon of butter; set back on fire until egg is set.

PARISIAN CREAM.

2 cups confectioner's sugar White of 1 egg 1-2 cup butter 2 tablespoons burnt sugar Cream until light.

BOILED FROSTING.

2 cups sugar Stiffly beaten whites of 2 eggs 3-4 cup water Lemon or vanilla

Boll sugar and water until it threads without stirring. Then gradually pour it into beaten eggs, beating mixture rapidly all the time. When all in, and mixture has thickened and is cool, it is ready for use in icing cakes.

CHOCOLATE FROSTING.

3-4 cup sugar 3 tablespoons milk 2 squares chocolate 1 egg yolk

Melt chocolate, add sugar and milk. Cook in a double boiler until smooth; add egg yolk and cook one minute. Spread on cake.

EGG FROSTING.

Whites of 2 eggs Pulverized sugar Lemon juice.

Put whites of 2 eggs in a bowl, add

1 tablespoon sifted confectioner's sugar, beat three minutes. Add another tablespoon sugar, beat again; continue until icing is very stiff and glossy, adding 1/2 teaspoon lemon juice. Spread on cake; let it stand until dry.

ORANGE FROSTING.

1 grated orange rind Tablespoon orange juice Half teaspoon lemon juice Yolks of two eggs Confectioner's or pulverized sugar To grated rind add fruit juice. Let

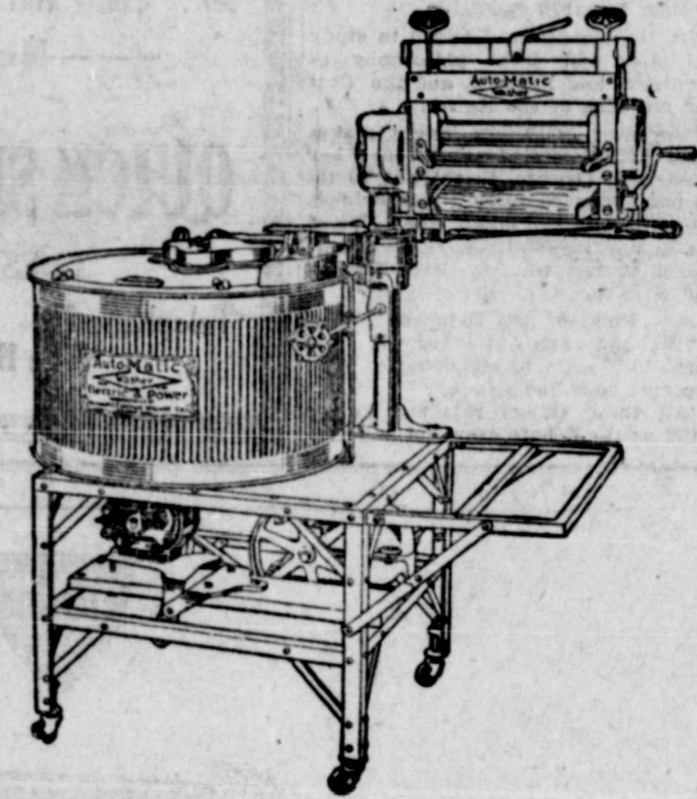
