\* HARDY O FTEXAS, A PACIFIST. \* RETIRING, TELLS OF VOTE \* FOR WAR ...........

By FRASER EDWARDS (Copyrighted, 1923, by United Press.) WASHINGTON, Fb. 24.—"Zero hour struck for me-a pacifist-when the question of war with Germany came to a vote," said Representative Rufus Hard yof Texas.

That grave and solemn occasion in the House when Congressmen were called upon to translate the will of the people into law-a law that meant certain death, maiming and disease to thousands, even many of their own sons—was described today for the Uni-ted Press by the scholarly old Texas who voluntarily retires on March 4.

But the "Sage of Corsicanna" goes back to watch the plow turn his "black waxie' acres in Navarro county with the knowledge that, despite his conviction of the unrighteousness of wars, he did not shirk his responsi-bility when the test came. He told how the battle of conscience was fought and won before he stood up to be counted in the presence of his fel-low members and overflowing galler-

ies. Born in 1855 .Hardy was just old enough to have the horrors, the trage-dy and the tears of the Civil War imprinted vividly on his childish memory. He grew to manhood amid the strike of reconstruction in East Texas where the last stand of the "unrecon-structed rebels" was made, a thorough pacifist as a result of his experiences. Still A Pacifist

Instead of growing up with the customary boyish desire to be a soldier, I had ao use for martial music and clanking sabers," said Haray. 'I was a pacisist and still am. I voted for war, but I was in a torment coming to the decision I knew was right.


'My vote would have made no dif-ference in the result. War was inevitable before the House acted. Presi-dent Wilson had asked for authority and the Senate had already voted it. But the fact that it required more than 17 hours for House to come to a decision shows that other men were not taking their responsibilities lightly

'From the beginning of the war, I had opposed America going in. Just three months before, I went home and defended the President for keeping us out of war. I defended his course all through the 1916 campaign.


