SENATE CONFIRMS FIVE OF SIX

All But One Nomination of Neff Confirmed-Mrs. DeGroff to Be Exam-ined Monday in The Senate.

AUSTIN, March 1.-Governor Neff. accompanied by a delegation of legts-lators headed by Representative Chit-wood, left at noon today for Sweetwater to participate in the celebration tomorrow of the estaablishment of the college in West Texas.

FIVE APPROVED

AUSTIN, March 1.- Five of the six nominations of Governor Neif, which were held up by the Senate Tuesday, were confirmed this morning, the vote in each case being 27 to 2.

Those confirmed were Adjutant Gen eral Barton, Tax Commissioner Willacy, Health Officer Beasley, Labor Commissioner Myers, Sanitary Commissioner Chairman J. E. Boog-Scott.

The nimble penny is a better guide to fortune than is the elusive twentydoitar gold pieces.

In his boyhood days Frank Wool-worth and about barefooted, took care of cows and horses, and knew what it was to put hay back into the dusty haymows. When the little district school was open he went to it . and learned to add and to multiply. Then he went to a little commercial college and learned something about bookkeeping. 
