The Hereford factory employs 150 to 160 people on a year-around basis, plus an additional 400 during the processing season. The plant's annual payroll is around \$5 million.

The Holly plant began processing the 1988 crop on October 1. It will operate 24 hours a day, seven days per week until processing is complete, according

"When the plant first opened, and they told us who could dig beets, and when they could dig them, there were a lot of upset farmers, because they did not understand the workings of the plant," Cleavinger told the members of the press.

"But as we became more affiliated with the plant, and share in the profits of the plant, we realized that what was good for Holly Sugar Corp. is good for us Cleavinger growers," continued.

It was explained that due to the extreme high costs of operating the plant, Holly officials try not to have to stop the processing once it has started. "Sometimes that means that some growers have to dig beets while their fields are muddy," Cleavinger said.

In recent years, Holly has added a giant warehouse that has allowed the plant to really "go after" the grocery chain sugar market.

As a result, at the present time Holly is packaging sugar for 20 different labels, in addition to their own Holly label. "So if you don't think you want Holly's sugar, and you reach for another brand at the super market, you might be
