CYCLONE HITS IN MISSISSIPPI

Many Deaths And Injuries Reported From Save, Mississippi When Cyclone Wrecks Damage.

STORM AND SNOW WAS GENERAL

Panhandle Hit By Young Blizzard—Thermometer Drops to 24 Degrees In Sweetwater On Thursday.

By The United Press. MEMPHIS, Mar. 16.—The town of Save, Miss., was leveled by a cyclone which struck there during the night, according to refugees who reached here today. Numbers of people are missing and a score are injured, according to one of the refugees.

STORMS SEVERE.

By The United Press. KANSAS CITY, Mar. 16.—High winds, snow and freezing temperature were reported today from various sections of the South and Southwest.

The brunt of the storm, which came out of the north, struck Mississippi where winds caused heavy property damage and serious injury to a number of persons.

Snow was general through Colorado to Arkansas and from Nebraska to Texas.

A near blizzard was reported in the Panhandle with low temperatures in many parts of Texas.

RADIO WEATHER.

West Texas tonight and Saturday, fair and warmer.

General Conditions:—The prime high pressure area overlies the plains states and the southwest, causing freezing southward to El Paso and Abilene with 18 degrees at Amarillo. Low pressure, prevails in the Ohio River valleys, causing showers to heavy local rains in the Gulf bordering states and Atlantic seaboard states from northern Florida to Pennsylvania.

The thermometer registered 24 degrees Friday morning at 7 o'clock in proof of the weather warning as published in The Reporter Thursday via Sweetwater Vulcanizing Company radio. By 9 o'clock it had climbed to 32 degrees and rose steady as the sun got higher.

The biting wind out of the north was warning sufficient of itself Thursday afternoon. However, it was better than the blizzard that visited Amarillo and the Panhandle.

IS WORLD'S BIGGEST AIR PORT.

Le Bourget, France, Handles Heavy Traffic From Skies.

Le Bourget, near Paris is now dignified with the title of the largest and most important airport in the world.

No less than 4,812 passenger and freight airplanes were used in the various services during 1922.

In 1920 the number of passengers carried was 10,215. In 1922 the number had almost doubled—19,974. An average of sixty-five passengers daily took their places in the air expresses for destinations all over Europe.

A total of 463 tons of express were carried in 1922—an augmentation of 385 per cent over 1920. Compared with 1919, when the port was opened, the increase is of 2,200 per cent. Postal packets augmented to the extent of 143 per cent during the year.

The most optimistic provisions of 1919 have been more than tripled by the actual traffic of Le Bourget in 1922.

Lines from Paris to London, Tours, Amsterdam, Brussels, Berlin, Strasbourg, Prague, Warsaw, Vienna, Budapest, Morocco, Spain, Nice, Bucharest, Trieste, Sophia and new fast expresses will start next month for Constantinople. The trip will take two days.

TECH RALLY

Amarillo Planning Big College Jubilee

AMARILLO, Texas Mar. 16.—Plans are being made for the entertainment of several thousand people for the dedication of the new municipal auditorium and Legion home on April 3, 4 and 5 and for Technological College rally to be held here on April 4.

It is expected that all counties in the Panhandle-Plains country will be represented and ex-service men from all over the state and from Oklahoma and New Mexico will be here. It is practically certain that General John J. Pershing and Alvin M. Ohsley, National Commander of the American Legion, will attend the Legion event. O. V. Vernon and John B. Gilvin have returned from Ft. Worth and Dallas, where they met assurance of the attendance of many prominent Texans at the Tech rally on April 4.

Traveling Men Who Make Their Headquarters In Sweetwater Invited to Sweetwater Club.

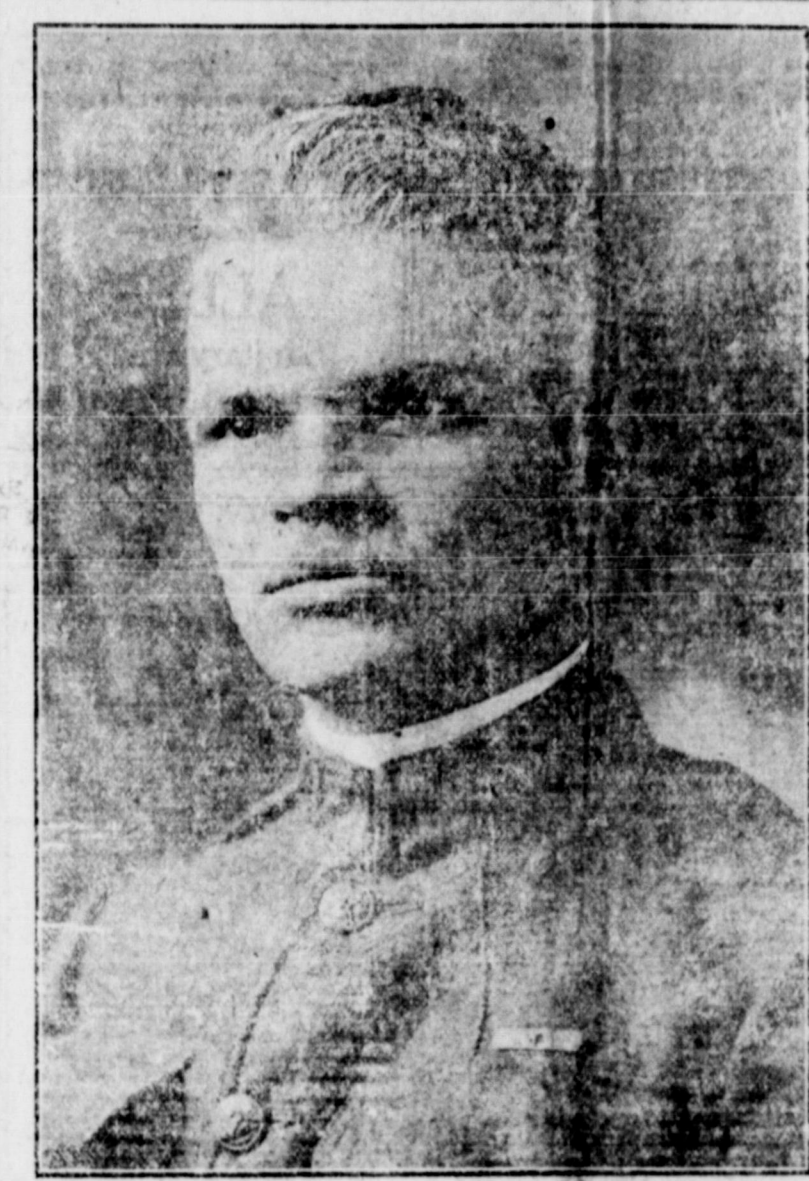
The dirt around the body was dry, indicating that he was buried Saturday night before the rain. Fresh dirt was thrown into the grave since the rain.

BALLINGER CALLS JURY FAILED TO E. W. McLAURIN FIND ANY CAUSE

March 25th Will Mark Last Sunday of Rev. McLaurin's Pastorate at Presbyterian Church Here.

IS PROMINENT IN SCOUT WORK

Re-Organized Boy Scout Work December 1921 With Assistance of Arnold Dressler—Active in Legion.

Rev. E. W. McLaurin, pastor of the First Presbyterian church has resigned, and effective April 1, will take the pastorate of the Presbyterian church at Ballinger. March 25th will mark his last Sunday in Sweetwater.

"I regret very much to leave Sweetwater," said Rev. McLaurin. "I firmly believe that the Texas Technological College will be located here and I would like to participate in the development of the town that will be sure to follow. The town has progressed very much in the time that I have been here and my relations with everyone have been so cordial that I will always remember Sweetwater with friendly feelings, indeed."

Sweetwater will have occasion to remember Rev. McLaurin in one very important respect at least, and that is in connection with his work for the Boy Scouts.

Some organization work had been done prior to Rev. McLaurin's arrival November 1, 1920, but it had been permitted to lapse. With the aid of Arnold Dressler, a troop of 24 boys was organized in December, 1921, and the movement kept alive and growing until the summer of 1922 when sufficient interest had been aroused to form the Scout Council which is now functioning. Rev. McLaurin acted as Scoutmaster with Arnold Dressler as assistant. There are now 75 Boy Scouts and it is planned to organize a first class Council with a paid executive to serve the four counties immediately adjacent to and including Nolan County.

Rev. McLaurin has also been very active in American Legion work, serving as Post Chaplain for two years and State Chaplain one year while here.

Rev. McLaurin served overseas during the World War, coming to Sweetwater from Edna, Texas. He expects to begin his pastorate at Ballinger on April 1.

RUHR SABOTAGE CAUSES DEATH

One French Soldier Killed And Several Others Wounded—Germans Hurt In Clashes And Bad Accidents.

TRAINS WRECKED, BLOW BRIDGE

Wendau Station Scene of Explosion—Telegraph And Telephone Wires Suffer As Result of Sabotage.

DUSSELDORF, Mar. 16.—One French soldier was killed and several German railroad workers were injured as sabotage swept the Ruhr district today.

Bridges were bombed and attempts were made to wreck trains in several parts of the occupied areas.

An explosion destroyed the bridge over the Stamarzich River and another occurred near the Wendau Station.

The collision of a French troop train and a freight or merchandise train was caused by the tempering with a switch in the Trier region.

Telephone and telegraph lines were also a victim of sabotage as they were cut right and left.

AID SWEETWATER

Roscoe to Work for Site Midway Between Two Cities for Location of New Texas Tech College.

ROSCOE Mar. 16.—The Roscoe Community Club has selected a committee to select a location between Roscoe and Sweetwater about half way, and work with Sweetwater in an effort to have the West Texas Technological College located there.

The site that has been settled upon comes within a mile of the east limits of Roscoe and extends to within a mile and a half of the west limits of Sweetwater. This site contains several grades of soil. In this tract is some of the best black land that can be found anywhere, a mixed land that is a black sandy loam soil, red sandy land, and rough broken land. The land lies so that it drains well and a sewerage system could be installed with very little expense.

Water In Abundance

An abundance of fine water can be had at a depth of about 150 feet. The stream of water found at this depth is strong and will furnish an endless supply.

Some of the best land that can be found in Texas is to be found around Roscoe. This, together with the different varieties of soil and the abundant supply of water and the railroad facilities of both Roscoe and Sweetwater makes the site Roscoe has selected an ideal place for the college.

Roscoe has two railroads, the Roscoe Snyder & Pacific and the Texas and Pacific. Sweetwater has three railroads, the Texas & Pacific, Santa Fe and Orient. The railroad facilities make it within easy reach of any part of the state.

Soil Fertility Shown

The soil will grow anything. The most extensive crops grown around Roscoe are cotton, maize, kaffir corn, cane, wheat, oats and some corn. All-most 7,000 bales of cotton were ginned at Roscoe last year, and with the new land that has been broken out this year a much larger crop should be ginned.

The population in and around Roscoe is almost entirely white. There are no negroes and but few Mexicans. Geographically, Roscoe is within a few miles of being in the exact center of the bounds mentioned in the bill. The altitude is almost 2,500 feet making an ideal climate. The summers are cool and pleasant and the winters mild.

This site lies along the Texas & Pacific Railway and the Bankhead and Roger Q. Mills highways.

Roscoe is right in the heart of the best farming district in West Texas.

CLAYTONVILLE NEWS.

A light rain fell here Sunday morning, adding renewed moisture to the already deep season. CHURCH HISTORY

S. M. U. College Gets Shettles Library

DALLAS, Texas, Mar. 16.—The library of the Southern Methodist University will have one of the most remarkable collections of church histories in the United States and the nucleus of one of the best libraries of Southern and Southwestern history in the country when the Shettles' library is catalogued, in the opinion of Professor R. A. Hearon, head of the department of history.

The Shettles' library was acquired a year ago by a gift and purchase from Rev. E. L. Shettles of Austin.

"Many publications of the eighteenth century and numbers of the rarest works of the nineteenth century, including a number of Wesley pamphlets pertaining directly to the history of the church are included in the collection," Hearon said.

"Mr. Shettles' library includes the lives of many figures prominent in the history of the southern states, such as memorials of General Wilkinson, Aaron Burr and Drayton," the professor said.

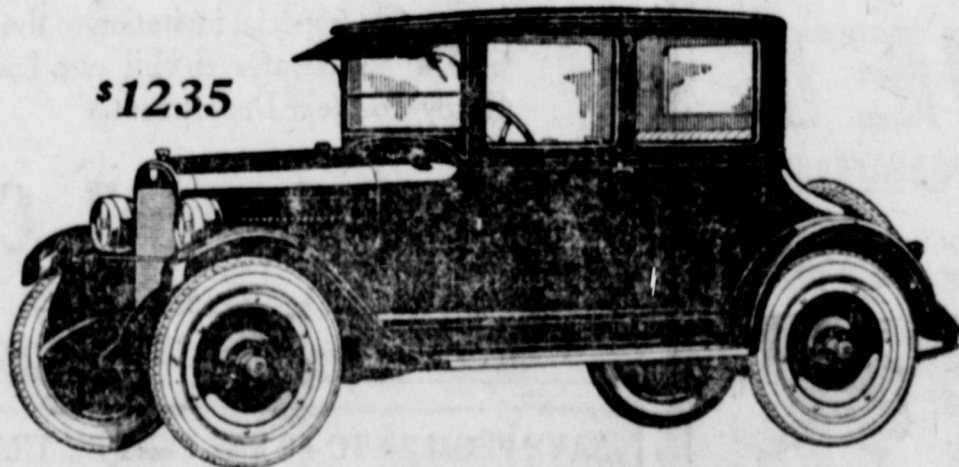

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

FRESH BREAD AND CAKE.
Bread and cake may be kept fresh by soaking a new medium sized clean sponge with cold water, set it in a small bowl and place it in the bread box. When the moisture is absorbed, wet it again.

HOW TO CUT A CAKE.
When cutting cake which is fed, put your knife in boiling water a few seconds, and you will be able to cut without the icing breaking.

HOW TO MAKE FRUIT PUFFS.
Two cups flour.
2 teaspoons baking powder.
Half teaspoon salt.
Sweetmilk to make stiff batter.
Put tablespoon of butter in each pudding cup (old cups which have lost their handles will do) the same berries or fruit and also, a spoonful of butter on top. Steam 20 minutes. Use juice from fruit slightly thickened, sweetened and a little butter for a sauce; or any pudding sauce may be used.

A GOOD THING TO REMEMBER.
When bottling ketchup or fruit juices, boil the corks in water for about twenty minutes. This process makes them soft and pliable, and they may be easily inserted and driven into the necks of the bottles. No wax need be used for sealing, as this method makes the bottle airtight.

HOW TO PRESERVE A HUSBAND.
First be careful of your selection, no not choose too young and take only such varieties as have been reared in a good moral atmosphere. When once decided upon and selected, let that

part forever remain settled, and give your entire thought to preparation for domestic use. Some insist on keeping them in a pickle, while others are constantly getting them in hot water. This only makes them sour, hard and sorry, times bitter. Even poor varieties may be made sweet, tender and good by garnishing them with patience (good measure) well sweetened with smiles, and flavored with kisses to taste. Then wrap up in a mantle of charity, keep warm with a steady fire of domestic devotion, serve with peaches and cream. When thus prepared, they will keep for years.

TO CLEAN HATS.
Put into a bowl a tablespoon of powdered sulphur, mix into a paste with one cup of peroxide of hydrogen. Then take small brush and rub it into the hat. Lay hat out in the sun for about an hour to bleach. Then take small dry brush and rub out the dry sulphur, and your hat will look as well as the day you bought it. This gives fine white color.

TO PROTECT POLISHED WOOD.
To prevent linen adhering to the polished wood in hot weather, place a piece of waxed paper under the center-plate. It will also prevent a stain from cold water in case a vase should run over.

TO RENOVATE POWDER PUFF.
Rip a short way and remove the cotton filling, wash outside in warm water and soap until clean. Dry, and brush to restore fluffy nap, put in some new cotton and sew up the rip.

and the puff will last as long again.
TO WASH SOILED VELVET.
Make suds of soft water and mild soap. Wash the velvet and rinse through three waters. Do not wring, but hang in wind to dry. It will look almost like new velvet.

WHEN YOU WANT TO DYE QUICK.
This recipe applies to ribbon, raffia, or thread:—Mix some oil paint with enough gasoline to wet the article. When the desired shade is acquired, dip the goods and it will have a never-fade, oil color.

MENDING STOCKINGS.
In mending stockings, small pieces of georgette crepe are very useful. Put crepe on stocking darning and darn stockings to crepe, trimming off the edges afterwards. The crepe is strong and thin, and saves much sewing.


