Things are becoming more complicated in the Ruhr. But the determination of France to see the thing through is evidenced by the speedy reprisals exacted since the French-German clashes in the Recklinghausen district in which a French officer and French railroad man with eight Germans were killed.

AFTER COLLEGE.

Stamford In the Fight For New Tech School.

Special to The Reporter. STAMFORD, March 22.—Stamford is preparing a brief that will be entirely satisfactory and will make an impression on the locating board for the Tech College," said R. L. Haynie, in a talk before the Stamford Rotary Club at its weekly luncheon here.

Haynie declared that he believed the sites chosen by the local board together with other conveniences that will be brought to the fore will make Stamford a good bet for the college.

It is understood a very desirable tract of land has been secured that takes in part of the city, a large lake, a four story dormitory. Its location between two railroads, on the main line of a pipe line to Lake Penick, in a territory whose soil cannot be questioned, with privilege of irrigation at cost figures are some of the advantages which will probably be set forth in the brief that is being prepared.

No attempt will be made to set forth in the brief anything but facts and no effort will be made to depreciate some of the disadvantages other towns possess. In short, it was intimated, Stamford will fight a clean fight, resolved to bring out in the brief the salient advantages possessed.

The stricture on Stamford's water supply is hooted by physicians and others who have given the matter study. In fact, it is pointed out Stamford possesses one of the best water supplies in West Texas—water that is absolutely clear, wholesome. The slight saline content developed shortly after the supply was turned on has dissipated and the water is daily becoming more palatable and is good for irrigating. The quality will be high in a few weeks, it was stated by the board.

Filing one's name with the committee, is merely a precaution to make sure that no one will be overlooked when the inspection for the awarding of prizes takes place.

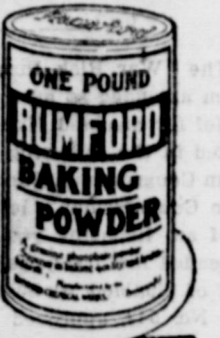

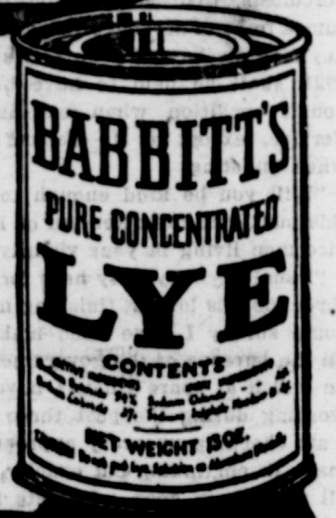

EARLY DAY COWMAN TELLS EXPERIENCES

G. G. Odom of Ballinger Was One Of First to Beat Out Cattle Trail Along Colorado.

ON VISIT IN SAN ANTONIO Tells of Huge Deal Made in 1883 When Thousands of Cattle Were Being Driven Up Trail.

first men to beat out a cattle trail up and down the Colorado river in the early 70's, a resident of Ballinger, was caught in a rather reminiscent mood in San Antonio, according to the following story reprinted in the Ballinger Ledger from the San Antonio Express:

"Garland G. Odom and John R. Blocker met in Austin in March 1883, at the usual place and made a \$7,000 trade. When the trade was made John Blocker wrote Garland Odom a check for \$7,000 and they separated without any further papers being drawn up. The deal was that Mr. Odom sold Mr. Blocker 5,000 yearlings at \$15 per, future delivery. The delivery was made in due time and the trade was finished. They do business differently nowadays, you bet your life. Mr. Odom is now in San Antonio to spend a month and yesterday got to reminiscing which brought forth this tale of how business used to be transacted. The 5,000 yearlings were on range in the Ballinger country and Mr. Blocker bought them for delivery in his Northwest trade, for in those days he was driving them up The Trail by the immense thousands. 'Immense thousands' may not be a commonly used expression, but that is just what John Blocker was doing in those days. Garland Odom spent his childhood and the rest of his hoods for that matter, in San Antonio and vicinity, operating out into Medina county. He began driving cattle up the trail in 1873 from this county. By the end of the 70's he was established in the Ballinger country, and that has been his home ever since. He went through many vicissitudes in the many years since then, while cattle went down to nothing per, and droughts ravaged the landscape. Now he is 'setting easy' as the phrase runs. He owns the Fort Chisnorra ranch of 17 acres and is president of the Farmers' & Merchants State Bank of Ballinger. Always he has stayed on the ranch and raised cattle, until recently, when he sold out his cattle lock, stock and barrel, and leased his ranch out for three years. The lessees are N. W. Ferguson and Henry Jones, Ballinger men. Mr. Odom is 70 years young and until he left the ranch recently he still could cut a yearling out of the herd as well as he ever did in the prime days. When he first moved down to Ballinger he wanted to take his favorite saddle crop, but finally abandoned the idea. Not so very long ago Mrs. Odom suffered an attack of the flu and he has brought here here to spend the remainder of the winter. They have taken up residence at the Gunter Hotel and their two daughters, Mrs. J. F. Currie and Mrs. C. H. Wylie are with them. The family plans to just rest and visit about for
