## TEC Office Opening Here

Friona will have an office of the Texas Employment Commission beginning Tuesday, February 21.

The office will be located in a trailer house adjacent to Lee's Barber Shop on Main Street.

Oziel E. (Ozzie) Gonzales will be the manager of the new office, or "pilot program" in Friona. The office hours will be Monday through Friday, 8 a.m.-5 p.m.

David Hernandez of Hereford, area manager for the TEC, said that a main factor in re-locating a TEC office in Friona after a number of years' absence is Friona's Excel Corp. plant, a major employer for the area. Excel is expected to provide referrals to the Friona office.

"We also will be working with other industries and businesses, and agri-businessmen in the Friona area, to assist their labor needs," Hernandez said.

The area TEC manager indicated that based on the need shown at the temporary trailer location, a more permanent office would be secured locally. The trailer was simply the quickest method of getting an office open.

Gonzales is a native of Snyder, where he graduated from high school. He also is a 1987 graduate of Texas Tech University with a

major in engineering. "He has worked with the agency, and knows the economics of the area," Hernandez said.

The area TEC head credited the efforts of Dick Wycker of Excel Corp. Chamber manager Kathryn Goddard, City Manager Beelee Goodwin, and SPS manager Bill Wilshire in helping secure the TEC pilot program locally.

## \$16,000 In Merchandise Is Taken

The Parmer County Sheriff's Department is investigating a robbery at Potts' Gun and Ammo just west of Friona the night of February 4-5, in which an estimated \$16,000 worth of guns, knives and ammunition was taken.

County Sheriff Rex Williams told the *Friona Star* that 76 guns, including rifles, shotguns, pistols and other handguns, were taken, along with some hunting knives and pocket knives, and several boxes of ammunition.

The guns taken included Remington, Winchester, Ruger, Smith & Wesson, Mossberg, Charter Arms and Colt.

The county sheriff's department has put the word out across the country regarding the burglary. "Potts had the serial numbers on the guns, so if they are ever sold, we should be able to trace them," Williams said.

The county sheriff said that the thieves broke a window in the office at the gun and ammunition shop, located on West Highway 60, then opened the door.

Sheriff's deputy Bob Davis was the investigating officer.

## Board Calls Election, Acts On Contracts

The Friona School board passed a resolution calling the annual school trustee election for Saturday, May 6, 1989, at its regular meeting Monday, February 13.

In personnel action, the board promoted Tony Igo from Assistant Elementary Principal to Principal of the Primary Building.

The contracts of James Warren, Cliff Stephens, Tom Johnson, Jerry Shelton, Tonya Gober, Charles Turner, Jackie Morgan and Sheryl Salyer were extended for one year.

In other business, the board passed a resolution to tax vehicles for the 1989 tax year, and adopted a T.A.S.B. update 33 for the local policy manual.

Parmer County is one of a handful of counties in the state which still had a Permanent School fund, and the money has been a political football for about as long as it has existed.

For many years, the four school districts have received the interest from the money each year. However, one of the arguments by the Friona School officials in favor of disbursing the funds is the fact that the state might begin to deduct the amounts received in interest from the state funds that the schools receive.

The money must be used either for permanent improvements or to pay off bonded indebtedness, and cannot be used for operating expenses.

## SCS Dist. Has New Leader

The Friona office of the Soil Conservation Service has a new District Conservationist, Gail Thompson.

She replaces Bill Donham, who is now an area agronomist in East Texas.

Her duties include serving as office manager and assisting farmers and ranchers and helping them to develop and carry out soil and water conservation plans on their land.

A member of the Soil and Water Conservation Society of America, Thompson previously worked out of the Hereford SCS office since May, 1987.

Thompson is a 1978 graduate of Northwestern State University in Natchitoches, La., where she majored in equine science. While attending NSU she was active in the Agriculture Club and band.

Upon graduation from NSU, she worked as a ranch manager and trainer on Arabian horse farms in Oklahoma and Texas.

She began her career with the SCS in 1981. Since that time she has worked as a soil conservationist in field offices in Beeville, Floydada, Canyon and Hereford.

and Robert White. Raymond McGehee of the Lazbuddie precinct voted against.

In previous recent votes, McGehee and Anthony had been opposed, and County Judge Porter Roberts has broken the tie by voting against. Anthony indicated that he had changed his attitude on the matter after spending several weeks polling his constituents, who indicated they favored dividing up the fund.

Friona Schools had led the drive to divide up the fund. School board president Jerry Hinkle listed capital needs of the district as: an overpass over the highway for junior high students crossing Highway 60; repairs at the athletic stadium, and bigger administrative offices.

Superintendent Hal Ratcliff was the main spokesman for the county schools. He pointed out that the state could pass a law to get the money from the county, and that the state has mandated more programs and more construction, for the 1-22 teacher-pupil ratio, and for the gifted-talented program.

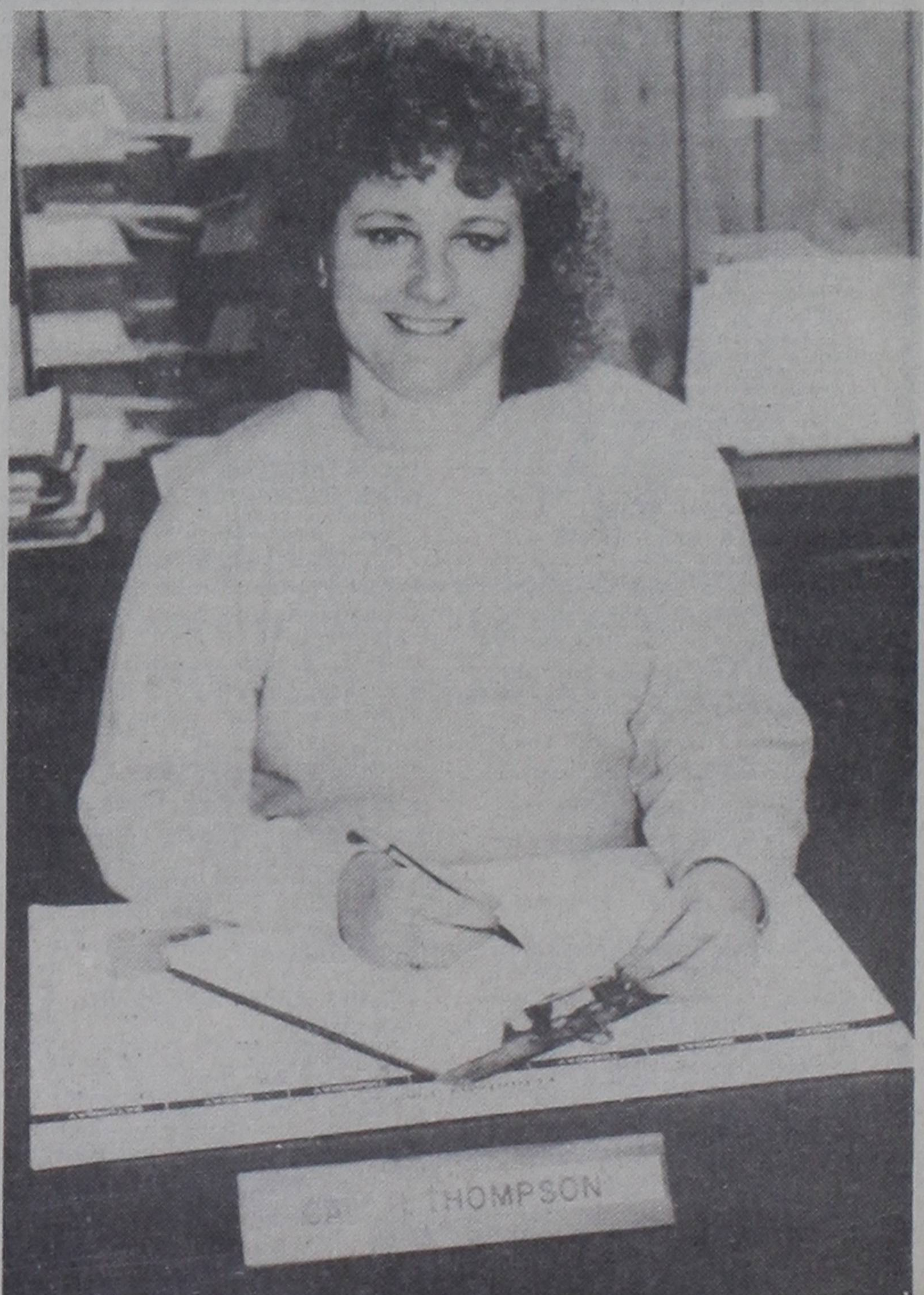
The fund will be divided up according to a "scholastic count." The exact figures aren't available, but Friona should receive roughly 51 per cent; Farwell 19 per cent; Bovina 19 per cent and Lazbuddie 11 per cent.

## Area Gets Some Rain

# Friona Flashbacks

**60 YEARS AGO--FEB. 15, 1929**  
The recent cold snap has given grief to quite a number of Friona folks on account of freezing water in their water pipes. In some instances, families were cut off entirely from their water supply for a few days but without any serious expense, while in other cases considerable damage was done and expense incurred by the bursting of pipes.

**55 YEARS AGO--FEB. 16, 1934**  
The corn and hog meeting held at the school building Tuesday night was well attended, under the supervision of county agent A.R. Bateman. Contracts were made available, providing hog raisers a sum of ready money on the number of hogs produced during 1932 and 1933.

**35 YEARS AGO--FEB. 11, 1954**  
A community auction has been announced by the Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture for February 20, as the latest in the planned activities for 1954. A similar auction will be held each third Saturday in the month.

A fund drive was officially launched on Monday evening to expand Parmer County Community Hospital. Dr. Paul Spring outlined the pressing expansion needs. Pete Buske, board chairman, presided at the meeting.

She was a homemaker and was a member of Muleshoe's First Baptist Church.

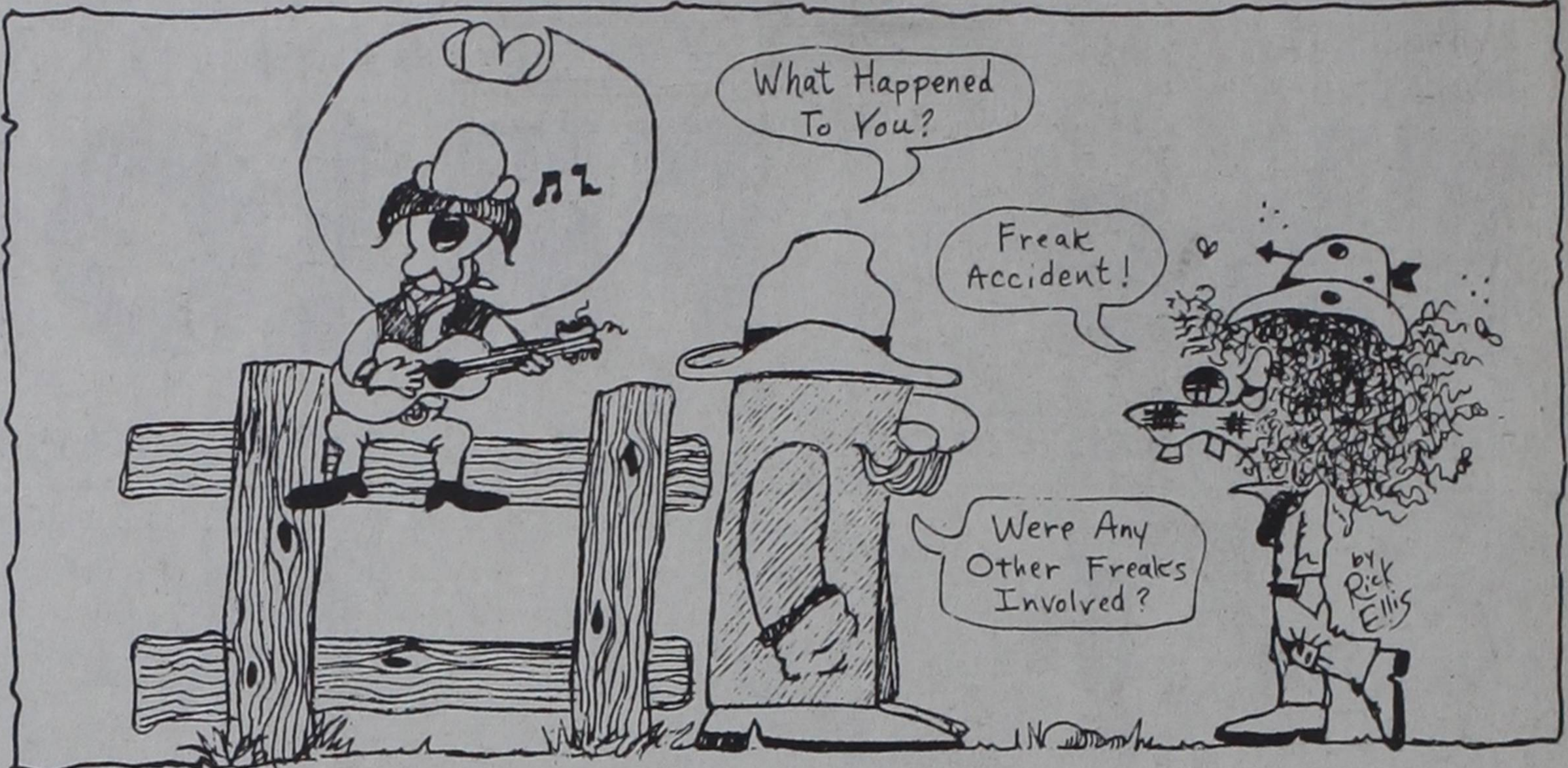
She married Raymond Houston July 12, 1939, in Wanette, Oklahoma. He died August 9, 1979.

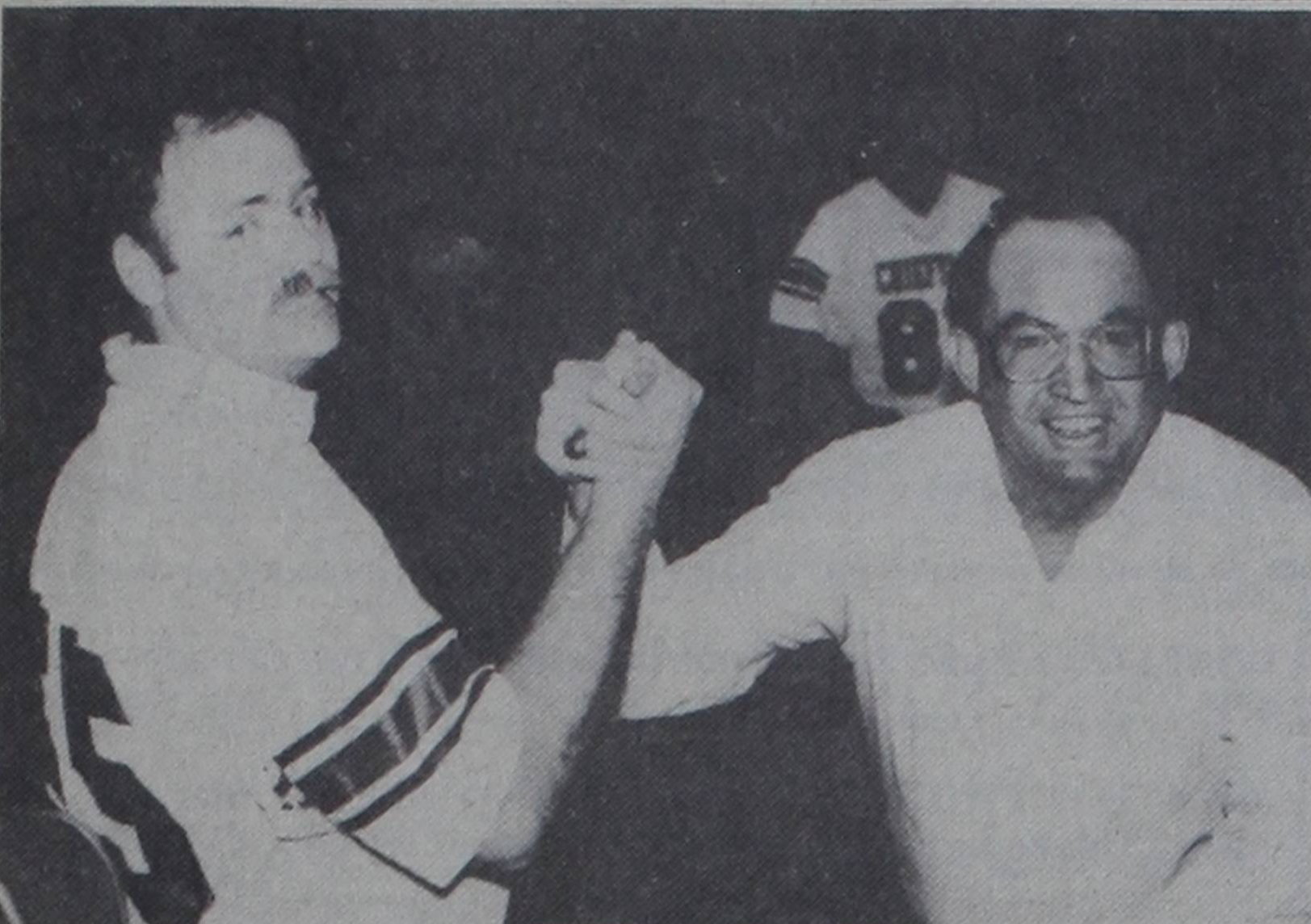

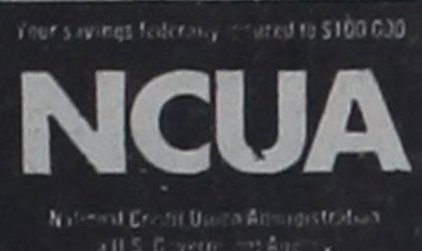

Fans attending the "60s Shootout" sponsored by the Friona Chamber of Commerce Thursday night saw a lot of hustle, muscle, and occasional flashes of bygone glory from the players who had performed during the 1960s and 70s (perhaps 50s??).

They also saw a pair of hotly contested games.

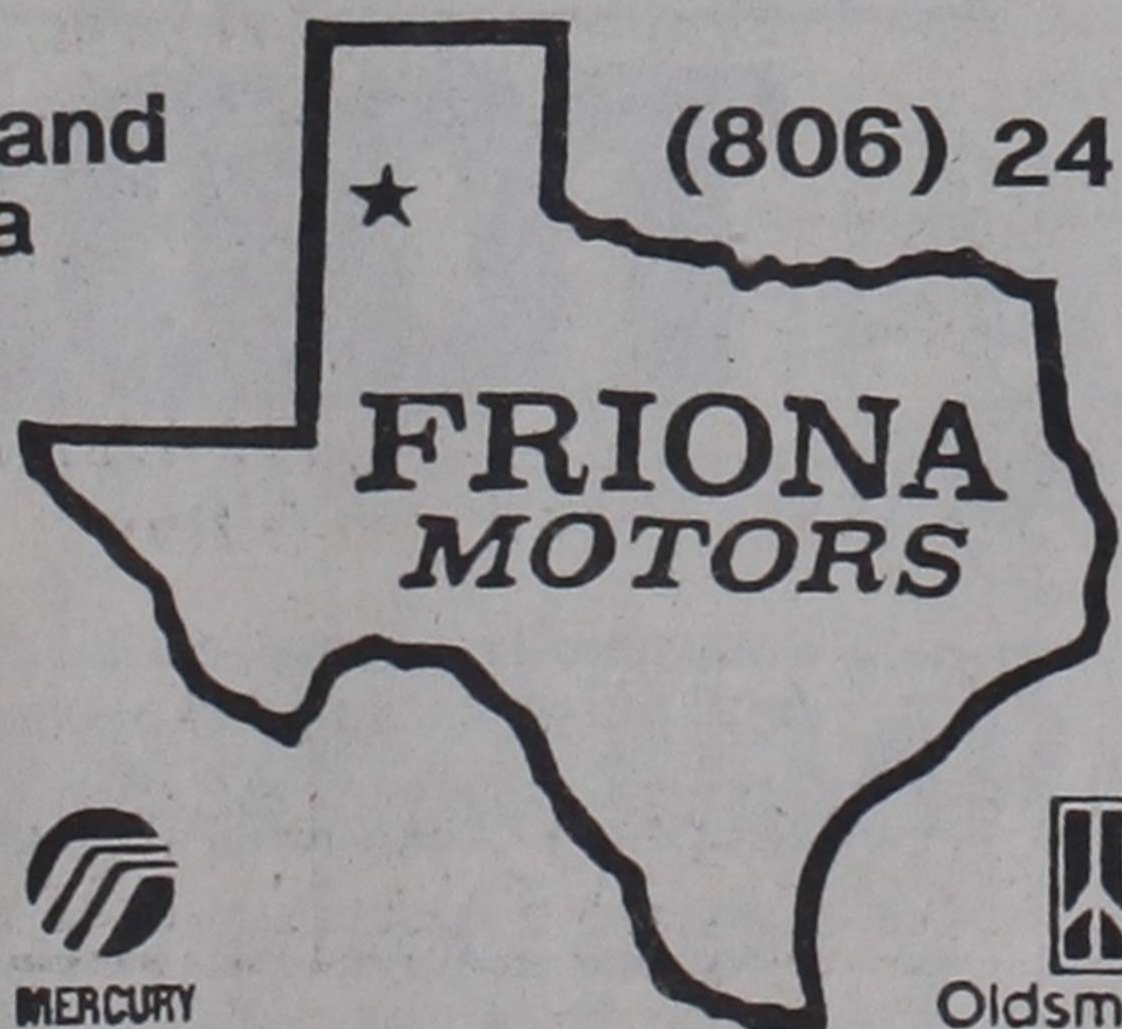

# Postmaster Says-- Mailbox Abuse Is A Federal Offense

"Using a mailbox for target practice seems like harmless fun," says Friona Postmaster Larry Rogers, "but it's really a serious federal offense."

"Mailboxes and mail are personal property, but they are protected by federal law. Anyone caught going through mailboxes and removing the mail or defacing the mailbox itself may be in for some stiff penalties," Rogers says.

The actual law reads: "Whoever willfully or maliciously injures, tears down or destroys any letter box or other receptacle intended for use for the receipt or delivery of mail on any mail route, or breaks open the same or willfully or maliciously injures, defaces or destroys any mail deposited therein, shall be fined not more than \$1,000 or imprisoned not more than three years."

"That's quite a price to pay for what may seem to be a harmless prank," he says.

Postmaster Rogers asks Friona customers who observe anyone defacing a mailbox or tampering with another person's mail in a mailbox to call the post office and/or the police.

You may also contact the Postal Inspection Service at P.O. Box 1919, Lubbock, Texas 79408-1919, or telephone at 806-762-7821. All information provided will be kept in strictest confidence, if requested.

"We at the Post Office are working to make your mail service as fast, reliable and secure as possible. Your cooperation in keeping the mail secure is greatly appreciated."

"Customers with curbside mailboxes have a special challenge when it comes to keeping them in top condition," Rogers says.

"The curbside boxes are subject to the weather as well as hazardous drivers, high weeds, parked cars

and pranksters. Even so, most customers manage to keep their mailboxes in good shape for proper delivery of their mail.

"The responsibility for these boxes rests with the customer. The curbside mailbox must be accessible to the carrier without requiring the carrier to leave his or her vehicle.

"There should be no obstructions, such as vehicles, trash cans, weeds or snow. The

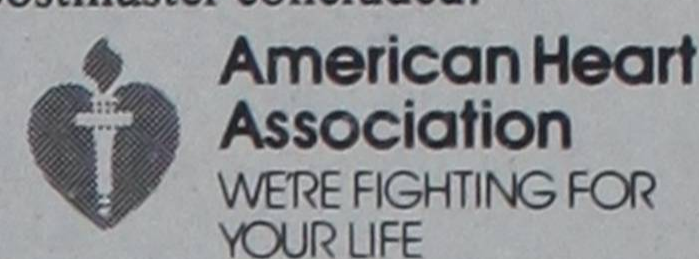
bottom of the box should be 3 1/2 to 4 feet above ground level, and the address should be clearly printed on the receptable, facing the carrier, to assure more efficient delivery.

"An old dented box with sharp

cutting edges, or a box that is too small should also be replaced, or mail delivery may be withheld.

"If you have any questions regarding the placement or upkeep of your mailbox, please call the post office. And thank you for

your continued cooperation here in the Friona delivery area," the postmaster concluded.

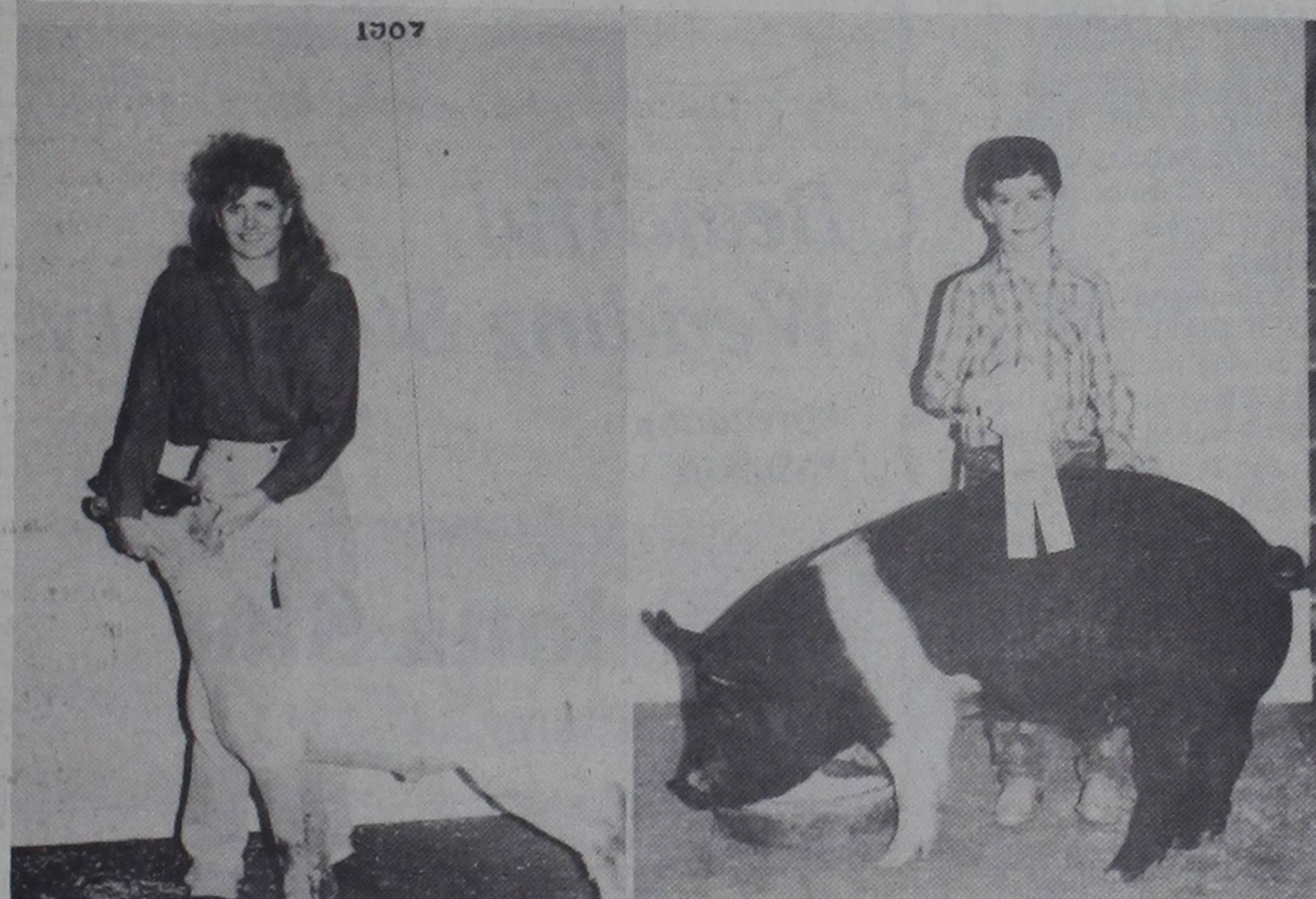

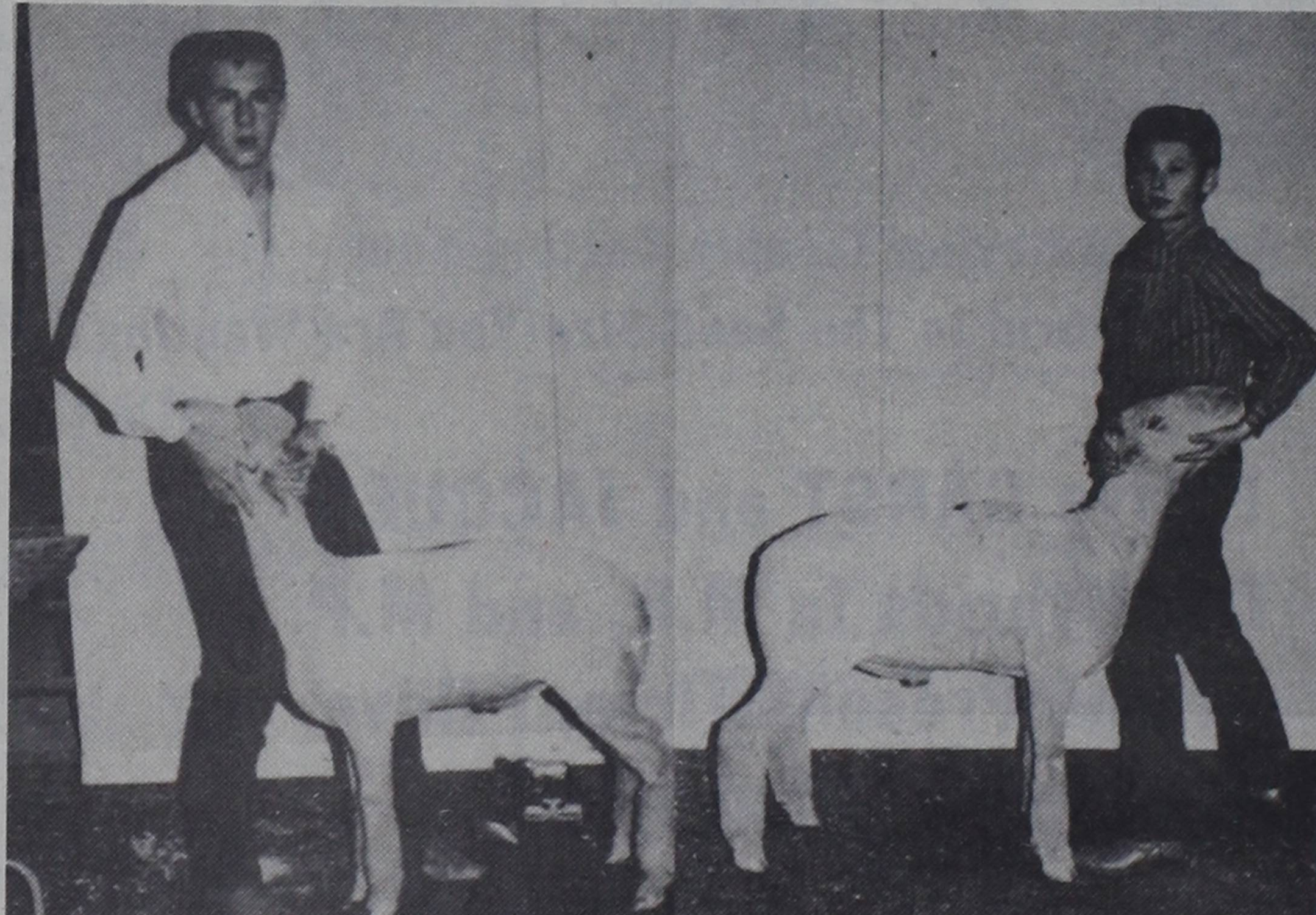

### Plan to Receive Your Retirement Benefits

Retirement plans offer not only the advantage of building security for later years but also significant tax benefits through the accumulating years.

Because of the deferral enjoyed by retirement plans, the IRS places strict regulations on when and how retirement funds may be withdrawn.

In most cases, 59½ is the earliest age you can begin withdrawing your retirement funds without being penalized. There are four exceptions to this age restriction.

According to the Price Waterhouse Personal Tax Advisor, the 1987-88 edition, you may avoid early withdrawal penalty if: 1) any early distribution is used to pay for deductible medical expenses; 2) early distribution is taken in the form of an annuity spread over your life or the joint lives of you and your beneficiary with certain restrictions; 3) the plan's requirement for early retirement are met and distributions begin after reaching the age of 55 but before 59½ (This does not apply to IRAs); 4) early distributions are taken from certain exempt Employee Stock Ownership Plans (ESOP) before Jan. 1, 1990.

One of the most common causes of early withdrawals occur when an employee leaves a job prior to age 59½ and is required to take retirement plan distributions. There's an automatic 10 percent early withdrawal penalty unless one of the above exceptions apply or the funds are rolled over into an Individual Retirement Account or

another qualified retirement plan.

Time is critical. You're allowed only 60 days to make this rollover. It's important to plan prior to receiving your early distribution where these funds will be reinvested. Don't be caught taking early distribution or you'll not only lose your tax deferral but you'll be forced to pay taxes and a penalty as well.

Many funds from early withdrawals go into approved IRA rollover accounts. These plans are simple and inexpensive to open and generally offer a variety of investment options. Most mutual funds, insurance companies and banks have an approved IRA prototype plan. Before you invest, however, make certain the IRA plan is approved and current, and make sure it accepts rollover accounts.

When the funds are deposited, take particular care to identify your funds as a rollover and not simply an IRA contribution.

While annual IRA contributions are limited to \$2,000, rollovers into IRAs often exceed this amount. This is perfectly acceptable because the rules of IRA contributions do not apply to rollovers.

Many people spend most of their working years preparing for retirement. Precious dollars are invested to enjoy later. It should be an important part of any financial plan. Much of the success of building, however, can be neutralized by poor planning at harvest time.

Plan as much to receive your retirement benefits as you do to build them. Keep what is yours.

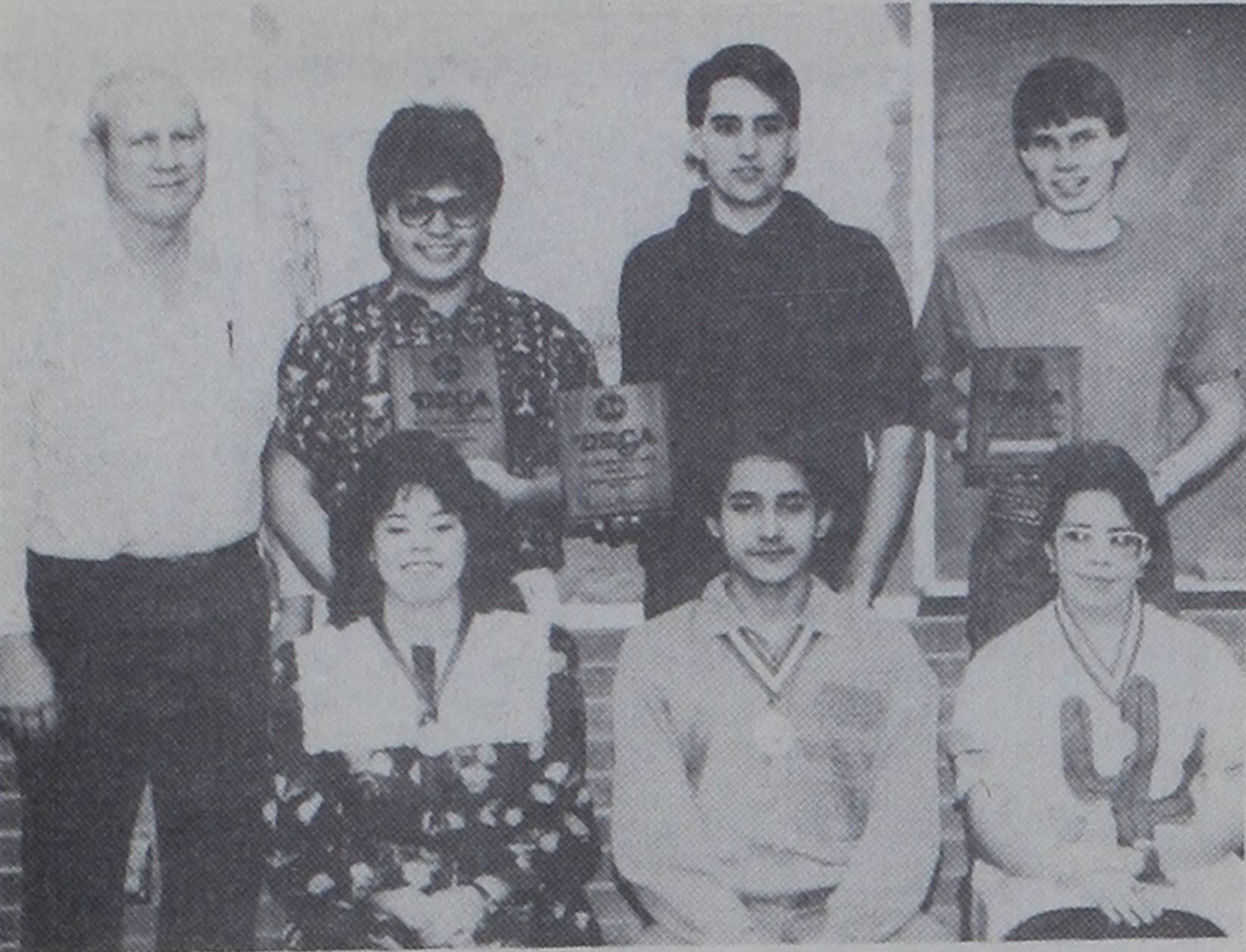

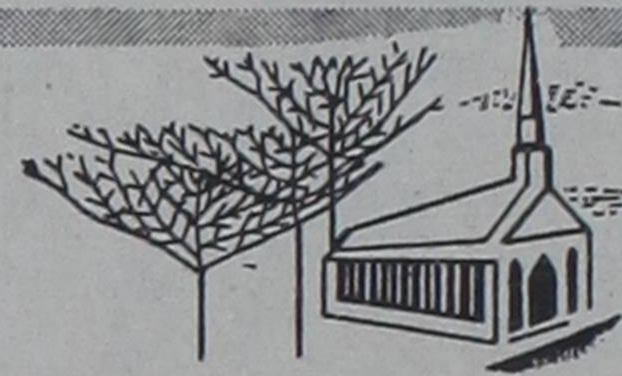

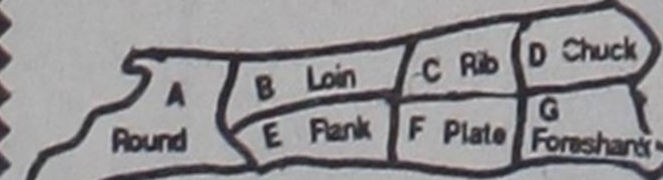
