## WEST TEXAS NOTES.

With The Amount of Sod That Has been broken out in this territory this year, and most of it will be planted to cotton, Roscoe will gin the largest crop of cotton this fall we have ever ginned. We have only two gins in town, but by the time the ginning season opens, there will be another one. The Farmers' State Bank is going to build a first class gin, work to begin in the near future. Guitlar has promised to build a new gin, but he has promised the same thing before, but as yet the same old gin stands. The present ginning facilities of Roscoe cannot handle the crop that will be ginned here this fall.—Roscoe Times.

Improvement at Power Plant—Improvements that will run into many thousands of dollars were started at the plant of the West Texas Electric Company in this city Monday. The ca-

acity of the power plant will practically be doubled when the big new 225 horsepower Deisel engine has been installed, which will be within the next thirty days. W. J. Smith of Waco is here to superintend the installation of the big engine. The work of building the foundation is now under way and everything will be in readiness to put the engine in place just as soon as it arrives. In addition to enabling the West Texas Electric Company to take on much new business, the installation of this engine will insure an improved service in the way of electric lighting. A stronger and steadier light will be in evidence when the improvements are completed.—Big Spring Herald.

## C. I. A. GROWING.

DENTON, April 17.—The faculty of the College of Industrial Arts, state school for girls, has increased from fourteen to 110 members during the nineteen years that have passed since the institution was established, according to figures given out today from the office of the registrar.

The total number of teachers ranged from fourteen to seventeen during the first six years, but in 1909-10 the numbers grew to twenty-three, followed the next three years by an addition of two each twelve months. At the beginning of the session of 1915-1916, the attendance of the college had increased to such an extent, and so many departments of study had been

added, that the teaching force was increased one-third, making a total of sixtythree.
