TEXAS TECH HERE SEEKS A LOCATION

Rev. J. T. McKissick Impersonates the New College And Various Towns Seek His Favor at Club Meeting.

ALL SECTIONS ARE HEARD FROM

Orators Recite Praises of Brownwood, Coleman, Tecfic, San Angelo, Colorado, And Other Points.

The Texas Tech wasn't located at the meeting of the Sweetwater Club Thursday night.

"Texas Tech" in the person of Rev. J. T. McKissick, a very dignified gentleman in frock coat, searched diligently for a location. Town after town got up and sang the glories of the various sites that were offered.

Buck Johnson presided as toastmaster and introduced Texas Tech first. Rev. McKissick recited the needs for the college location and what was proposed to teach at the new institution.

And then "Mich Autry" from Brownwood, Coleman and View, was introduced in the person of Judge Hamner and there was a very lively exposition of the merits of this section. Possibly some of the individuals who reside there might have differed from the judge somewhat in some of the conclusions he drew, but there was a lively few minutes.

Then came Squire Jones, known in private life as James Henry Beall, Jr. He drew considerably upon a large fund of imagination in his oratorical picturization of the size, grandeur and beauties of the section.

Harve Allen came up from San Angelo to represent that town, although the speaker is known locally at other times as Postmaster M. B. Howard. And again a resident of San Angelo might have differed somewhat in the argumentative presentation.

Abilene was represented by J. McAllister Stephenson. He was a good sport and entered thoroughly into the spirit of the occasion. In order that his future residence in Abilene may not be imperilled, the screen of silence is drawn over what he said. He was a former resident of Sweetwater, anyway.

Colorado and points west on the Texas & Pacific were delineated by W. S. Cooper, of the Colorado Chamber of Commerce. Mr. Cooper also entered in to the spirit of the occasion, continuing in a more serious strain, he said in part:

"I believe I know the chivalry of the men of West Texas and know that the decision of the Locating Board on the Texas Tech College location will be met with the same spirit of fairness and good humor that I have seen exhibited here tonight.

"I was in Austin a day or so ago and talked with President Bizzell of the A. & M. College, a member of the Locating Board, and I believe that when the time comes for the Board to make a decision in this matter that an invitation will be extended to every town in West Texas that is a contender to send delegates to Austin to a large mass meeting, where the votes will be cast in public."

J. A. McCurdy of the Sweetwater Board of City Development said that he heartily concurred in the various claims advanced, and thoroughly believed in the merits of the different sections represented—therefore, why not put the college in the center of all these various activities by locating it at Sweetwater.

The program closed with a hearty expression of appreciation to the program committee for the merit of the program prepared for the occasion.

Following the formal program came the announcement from the Choral Club of Music Week to be held in Sweetwater May 1, to May 6, closing with a community Sing Song, the later date. The complete program will be announced later.

Buck Johnson asked for the co-operation of the business men and every one present in cleaning up the city, keeping it clean and reporting to the authorities anyone who dumps rubbish or otherwise fails to comply with the city ordinances.

Jack Moss was named as toastmaster of the next meeting.

BLANTON SUES

Oscar Calloway Defendent in \$52,000 Defamation of Character Suit

RAIN FALLS IN ALL WESTERN TEXAS

Texas & Pacific Reports Rain From Baird to Allamore—Orient From Altus South to Ft. Stockton.

RAIN IN SWEETWATER .92 INCHES

Total for Year is Now 11.67 Inches— Nearly a Record for This Early in The Season.

Additional rainfall of .92 inches fell in Sweetwater Thursday night, bringing the total for the year to 11.87, very nearly, if not a record for this early in the year.

The rain was accompanied by considerable lightning but no damage was reported other than streets were washed some more, and roads damaged.

The rain seemed to be fairly general. An additional foot of water was put into Lake Trammell by the rains at Maryneal and all points south reported good moisture as far as San Angelo, where they received .68 inches. Rain was reported on the Texas & Pacific right of way from Baird clear to Allamore, which is near Sierra Blanco, Colorado, Big Spring, Monahans, Pecos and other points all reported heavy rain. The downpour was especially heavy at Roscoe.

North, the Orient railroad reported a heavy rain falling at Altus Friday, with a good rain at Hamlin, Thursday night and at other points. From one half to one inch of rain was reported from every point on the Orient from Altus, Oklahoma, south to Fort Stockton, Texas.

Reports from the Santa Fe railroad, indicate that rains averaging one inch fell all over the Panhandle from Amarillo and Clovis, N. M., clear on to Houston, with good rains at Coleman, Brownwood, Snyder and other points.

VOTES FOR BOOZE

House of Commons in England Votes Against Prohibition By a 236 to 14 Majority.

By The United Press. LONDON, April 20.—The House of Commons by a vote of 236 to 14, rejected prohibition here today.

The bill was introduced by Edwin Scrymgeour, member from Dundee. The bill was up for second reading. If passed, it would have prohibited the manufacture and sale of alcoholic liquors, except for scientific purposes.

TENT SHOWS NO LONGER BARRED EIGHT KILLED IN A SERIES OF RIOTS

City Commission Repeals Recently Enacted Ordinance—Support of Band Is Continued For 6 Months More.

TO PROD THE TRANSFER MEN

Truck And Service Car Men Negligent About Paying License Fee—J. H. Beall, Jr., Resigns, City Attorney.

Repealing the ordinance barring tent shows, serving notice on the city attorney to file complaints against all transfer and service car men who have not paid their license, continuing the payment of \$50 per month toward the salary of a band director, the acceptance of the resignation of James Henry Beall as City Attorney; these were a few of the many items of business transacted at the regular session of the City Commission Thursday afternoon. It was a long session, and a busy one.

The matter of the tent shows came up with reference to one such organization which proposes to make Sweetwater headquarters if the ordinance in question be repealed. On motion of W. T. Trammell and seconded by Len Musgrove, the motion to repeal was carried. Mayor Boothe voting in the negative. All three commissioners were in favor, however, of increasing the license tax from the former figure.

Band Continued.

M. C. Manroq appeared on behalf of the Band. Mr. Manroq stated that the Band Director agreed to coach the proposed Boy Scout Band one night a week in addition to his work with the Booster Band. Members of the latter band would also aid the Boy Scouts. Mr. Manroq stated, The commission voted to continue paying the director \$50 a month for six months, the previous arrangement.

The resignation of James Henry Beall, as city attorney, was read by Mayor Boothe and after some discussion, accepted. The resignation takes effect May 1. Appointive officials of the city, which include city attorney, fire marshal, members of the Board of City Development, etc., will be announced at the next regular meeting of the commission, which will be held May 3.

Must Pay.

Transfer men and service car drivers in some instances are not complying with the city ordinances requiring the payment of license fees. It was brought out. After some discussion, the city tax collector was instructed to turn over to the city attorney a list of all who had not paid, for filing of formal complaint and assessment of penalty.

Robert Withers brought up the question of whether or not the city would send the Fire Marshal to the Firemen's Convention at San Marcos in May. While the fire marshal will not be appointed until the May 3 meeting, the City Commission voted to send the City Fire Marshal to this convention.

The city attorney was instructed to send legal notice to the proper Texas & Pacific officials regarding the installation of a culvert under their right-of-way east of town, where the highway crosses the railroad for the purpose of alleviating the present mud hole and preventing its recurrence.

There was a lot of discussion relative to the City Cemetery and needed work in connection with fencing, grading and price of lots. No definite action was taken pending a visit to the scene.

Park Is Discussed.

Paul Sorenson appeared before the city commission relative to the City Lake Park. Mayor Boothe, George Sheppard and Mr. Sorenson were named as the committee to administer affairs of the park this year. This is practically the same committee as last year, except that Mayor Boothe replaces J. H. Snell, who could not serve. It was brought out that several individuals were desirous of building private bath houses at the City Lake, as the public structure was inadequate to hold the crowds. The commission went on record as favoring this with the provision that the new structures comply with the city requirements. No further action was taken regarding the park, pending a visit to the City Lake Park.

Hunger-Mad Workmen Storm Mulheim In Ruhr—Police Finally Beat Them Back And Arrest Many.

SETTLEMENT NEAR, BELIEVED

Diplomatic Adices Reaching Washington To Reveal Impending Negotiations—Explosion Kills In Budapest.

By The United Press. BERLIN, April 20.—Eight have been killed and many wounded in hunger riots in Mulheim since yesterday. The torch of revolt is being carried through the Ruhr valley by excited crowds of unemployed workmen.

Barriades of mattresses and household furniture have been set up in the streets of Mulheim where enraged men camped about the city hall, besieging the authorities.

The police, assisted by some citizen volunteers, finally succeeded in chasing the rioters from the city hall and the inner section of the city. More than 20 of the rioters were arrested.

PEACE IN SIGHT.

By The United Press. WASHINGTON, April 20.—The settlement of the Ruhr crisis between France and Germany is now in sight, it was learned here on high authority today.

Negotiations between the two countries to end the Ruhr situation, which is believed to threaten the peace of Europe, may be expected in the near future, according to diplomatic advices reaching here.

A direct and definite reparations proposal from Germany to France is looked for in the next few days.

100 BURNED ALIVE.

By The United Press. WASHINGTON, April 20.—One hundred workmen have been buried alive here in the cellar of a celluloid factory, which was wrecked by a terrific explosion.

Twenty bodies have been recovered and the balance of the victims are as yet unaccounted for.

RUDE NAMES ARE HURLED IN HOUSE

Legislators Strenuously Object to The Terms "Hill Billies" and "Rabbit Chasers" Applied to Them

RECONSIDERS QUO WARRANTO

After Passing Bill, The House Votes This Morning to Reconsider—Victory for the Floor Leaders.

AUSTIN, April 20.—Floor leaders scored a victory in the House this morning when they pushed through a motion to reconsider the vote by which the Quo Warranto bill was finally passed late yesterday. The vote on the bill then was 75 to 24.

"Hill Billies."

Pandemonium broke loose in the House this morning following the reading of an article published in a Texas newspaper dated April 19, which purported to report an address of Hull Youngblood before the San Antonio Salesmanship Club.

The article reported Youngblood as alluding to the members of the legislature as a "bunch of rabbit chasers" and "hill billies."

Twelve Dictators.

He charged that twelve members of the legislature were dictators of that body, and as they said, the "rabbit chasers" and "hill billies voted."

Following the reading of a concurrent resolution from the senate calling for an investigation, the article itself was read from a copy of the newspaper.

When the clerk finished the reading, there was loud cries of "Speaker," "Speaker," from all parts of the house.

OIL MEN INDICTED

Federal Grand Jury Returns 92 Indictments in Fort Worth—Mail Frauds Charged in 15 Cases.

By The United Press. FORT WORTH, April 20.—Ninety-two oil promoters and associates were indicted here today by the Federal Grand Jury for mail frauds.

Among those named in the indictments were E. C. Kingsbury, and Dr. Cook, of North Pole fame.

The arrest of the accused promoters by United States marshals was started immediately.

Bonds expected to be made ranged from \$5,000 to \$10,000 each.

The indictments involve 15 separate oil promotion schemes.

PREPARES TO FILE SUIT SCHOOL CASE

Judge Mauzey Preparing Suit to Recover Nolan County School Land in Brewster County.

PAYMENTS NOT BEEN MADE YET

Ownership of Various Sections Traced Down—Suit to Be Brought Next Term of The District Court

The status of the Nolan County School Land has been finally traced down by County Judge A. S. Mauzey, who is preparing suit to be filed for the next term of District Court.

The land is located in Brewster County. Title in part of it is already vested in Nolan County, and payments of interest or taxes have not been forthcoming for some time on the balance of the property.

On League No. 1, the title appears to be vested in Mose Novisch, residence unknown, for 1,280 acres, with the title of the balance vested in W. A. Miller of Potter County.

One League No. 2, 860 acres are in the name of J. E. Collins, residence unknown; 1,065 acres to John D. Town send, Arkadelphia, Ark., 640 acres to N. F. Phippen.

The ownership of 1,860 acres is split up as follows: One half by Grant Lauchner; one fourth by J. T. H. Lipscomb and one fourth by the First State Bank of Kaufman.

Nolan County has a quit claim deed to League No. 3 from N. P. Barclay and W. B. Largent, who secured it through a tax deed.

On League No. 4, the county purchased a judgment at a foreclosure sale of a second series of vendor lien notes.

Neither interest nor taxes has been paid on any of the foregoing parcels for some time, and the suit to be filed in the District Court is to recover the land for the purpose of resale for the benefit of the Nolan County schools.

SCHOOL TAXES.

According to a recent article in The Reporter, Sweetwater is paying less for its schools than average cities. The only towns listed in the article as having a lower cost per capita were New Orleans and Birmingham. These towns have a large percentage of negro population, which probably accounts for the lowered cost per capita. The assumption is that they do not spend as much for their negro students.

The facts in the case would seem to warrant a little additional expenditure in Sweetwater. The budget for the coming year is bound to be a little higher anyway, in order to provide for the interest and sinking fund for the bond issue. A little increase in the salary budget for the hiring of additional teachers would not be amiss either.

Sweetwater will not be satisfied with anything other than the best school system to be had. We owe that much to our children, and to the children of people who may be induced to make this town their home. Schools like everything else, cost money. The facts might as well be faced now as any time.

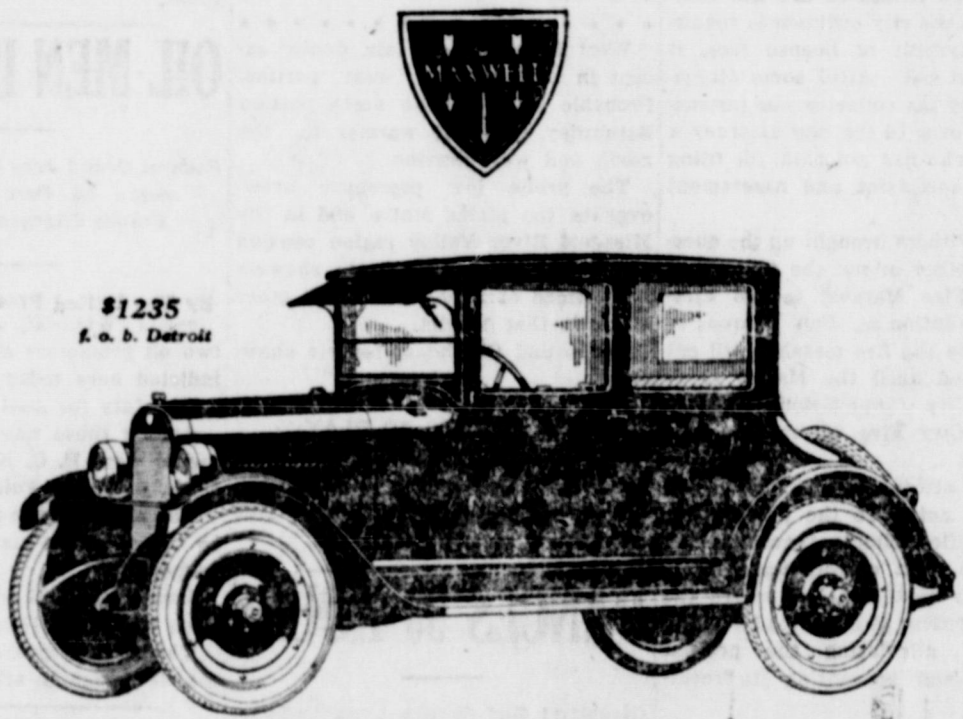

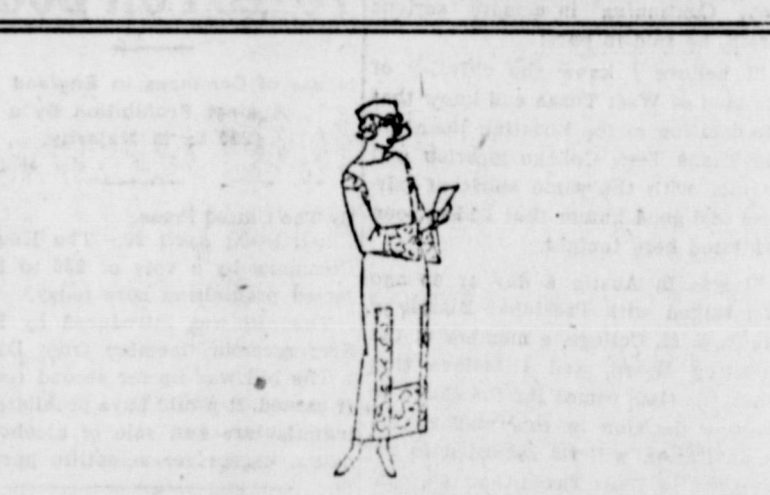

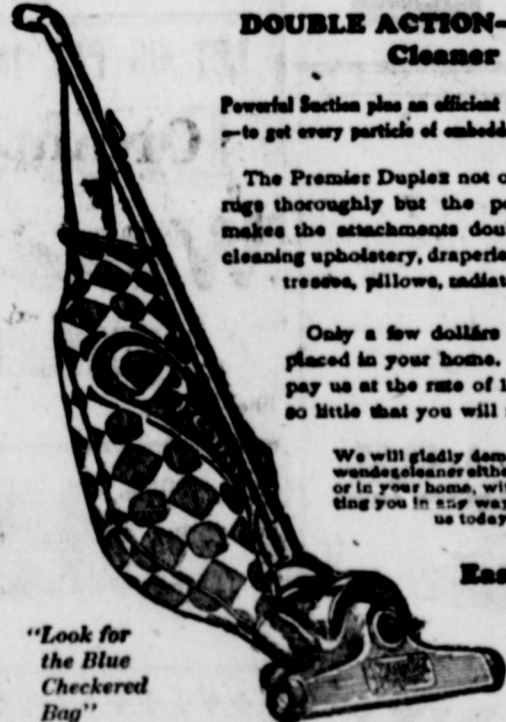

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

SIMPLE WAYS OF COOKING EGGS.

Poached Eggs And Tomato Sauce.

Allowing half tablespoon of salt to 1 quart of water, have a shallow pan two-thirds full of boiling water. Break each egg separately into a saucer and slip them into the water. Cook as for poached eggs and serve with the following sauce:

- 2 cups canned tomatoes and
- 1 slice onion, or
- 1 cup tomato sauce
- Quarter teaspoon salt
- 2 tablespoons butter
- 2 tablespoons flour
- Eighth teaspoon pepper.

Cook tomato and onion 20 minutes, then rub through a strainer. Melt the butter, add dry ingredients and strained tomatoes. Tomatoes will retain their red color if the flour is browned before using. Pour this sauce over the eggs and serve.

Shirred Eggs.

Cover the bottom and sides of a small baking dish, preferably an earthen one, with fine bread or cracker crumbs. Break each egg into a saucer and carefully slip it into the dish. Cover with seasoned buttered crumbs and bake in a moderately hot oven until the whites are firm and crumbs are a golden brown.

Egg in Nest.

Carefully separate the white from the yolk of an egg. Beat the white until stiff and pile lightly on a nicely trimmed slice of toast. With a spoon make a depression in the top of the white and slip the egg yolk into it. Place on a baking dish in a moderate oven and when the white has become a golden brown remove and serve. It may be seasoned to taste.

Eggs Baked in Tomato.

Cut a slice from the stem end of a small tomato and scoop out part of the pulp. Refill this with an egg, sprinkle with salt and pepper, and add a few small bits of butter. Cover the

opening with buttered crumbs and bake in a moderate oven until crumbs are a golden brown.

Addition For An Egg Dish.

Cottage cheese makes an attractive addition to the recipes for eggs, and for each egg with sauces, allow one heaping tablespoon of cottage cheese which has first been neutralized with a scant one-eighth teaspoon of soda.

Eggs Goldenrod.

- 1 cup milk
- 2 tablespoons butter
- Quarter teaspoon white pepper
- 1 1-2 tablespoons flour
- 4 hard cooked eggs
- 1 teaspoon chopped parsley
- Quarter teaspoon salt
- 6 slices toast

Melt the butter, add the dry ingredients, and stir until smooth. Add the heated milk slowly, stirring constantly, and allow to come to the boiling point. Separate the yolks from the whites of the hard cooked eggs, Chop the whites fine and add them to the white sauce. Cut the slices of toast in half and after arranging on the platter, pour the sauce over them. Put the yolks through a potato ricer or press them through a strainer, sprinkling them over the sauce. Garnish with parsley and serve.

Delicate Eggs.

- 1 1-2 tablespoons butter
- 1-8 teaspoon pepper
- 1-2 teaspoon salt
- 2-8 cup milk
- 6 eggs.

Break eggs into a bowl and beat only enough to break the yolks. Add the seasoning and milk. Pour mixture in to the upper part of a double boiler in which the butter has been melted. Continually stir and scrape from the bottom of the pan, allowing to cook until of a creamy consistency.
