JUDGE MAUZEY ELECTS OFFICERS CALLS MEETING OF PRESBYTERIAL

Chautauqua Guarantors to Meet at Court House Auditorium Monday Night 7:30 to Plan Campaign.

CHAUTAUQUA IS HIGHLY PRAISED

Presidents Wilson, Roosevelt and Harding Say, Among Others Things, "Most American Thing in U. S."

A meeting of the guarantors of the Redpath-Horner Chautauqua has been called by Judge A. S. Mauzey, president of the Association at the Court House auditorium Monday night at 7:30 o'clock.

At this meeting, ways and means for a successful campaign will be thrashed out. It is important that every guarantor be present.

In the opinion of the President of the United States, Warren G. Harding, uttered only last December, 1922, the following words:

"The time has long since passed when there could be any doubt of Chautauqua's service to the Country; we are far past the era of misunderstanding when this great work could be waved aside with the light word and gesture of tolerant superiority. Chautauqua has served to reveal the individual American community to itself at its best."

President Harding has but followed in the foot steps of two former Presidents in his valuation of the Chautauqua in its relation to American life. Theodore Roosevelt said:

"The Chautauqua is the most American thing in America."

During the war President Wilson called the Chautauqua "an integral part of the national defense."

All of this appreciation by foremost men of this country is but recognition of the widespread acceptance by American communities everywhere of Chautauqua and the certain fundamental things which it supplies.

Because it brings direct to American communities the wide range of contemporary thought in a democratic American way, the Chautauqua has permeated every fibre of American life.

Chautauqua tents are places where whole families go; and American families are the foundation of the Nation. The wholesome inspiration there requires no censor and the people on the platform are living the same life as the people in the audience.

ATTEMPT ESCAPE

Six Prisoners Shot And Several Beaten When Wholesale Attempt Is Frustrated.

By The United Press. ST. LOUIS, April 27.—Six prisoners were shot by jail guards and several others beaten when an attempted wholesale escape, or delivery from the St. Louis workhouse was frustrated, after sawing through the bars of the cells.

The prisoners were discovered in the jail yard in search of an exit, according to guards. After the first volley of shot order was restored.

TENEMENT BURNS

Twelve Persons Reported Killed When Fire Sweeps New York Tenement House.

By The United Press. NEW YORK, April 27.—Twelve persons were reported killed when a fire swept through the upper east side of a tenement house here, early today.

Heavy smoke filled the corridors in the place, and many, arising hastily from their beds, ran towards fire escapes, only to be overcome and drop within sight of safety.

This is responsible for the heavy casualties, according to the police, since the fire was not of great proportions.

The following greeting was extended to the delegates by Mrs. William Wight:

"Madam Chairman and Ladies of Fort Worth Presbyterial: 'I believe it is customary in extending a welcome to our guests to offer the keys of the city thereby expressing the thought that everything is wide open for your pleasure. Call on us and it will be our pleasure to respond. Let me again say we are glad to have you."

By The United Press. IDABEL, Okla., April 27.—Three adults and two small children were murdered at home, four miles southeast of Haworth, near here, last night. Reports to officers here early today said that John Pope, farmer, was being sought in connection with the affair.

Those killed were Pope's wife and two children. Pope and his wife had been separated, and she took the children to live with her parents, according to reports. All of the victims were shot outright, the statement said.

Industry Turning Out Products at Greater Rate Than in The Boom of 1920.

THE RESERVE BOARD REPORTS

Basic Industries During March Were 67 Per Cent Above Low Point Of Year 1921.

WASHINGTON, April 27.—Industry throughout the United States is turning out its products at a greater rate than in the boom of 1920, the Federal Reserve Board in its monthly survey of business reported today that production in the basic industries during March was 3 per cent higher than at the 1920 peak and 67 per cent above the low point of depression in the year of 1921.

Moving time is here again—symbolic of human nature in America. Being a nation of rainbow chasers, nervously restless, we are forever yearning to move to the new—new houses, new jobs, new amusements, even new towns.

It may surprise you to learn that farmers are becoming as chronic, at moving, as city people. It surprised us. Nearly a million and a quarter farms (about one out of every five in the United States) changed occupants last year.



In the above pen-picture, Artist Satterfield shows a farm family "moving on." This picture mirrors American restlessness. Also, it is symbolic of our civilization—conquest of the unknown that lies ahead, and the constant desire to better self and family.

The restlessness that makes us move frequently is not altogether due to dissatisfaction with what we have now. Some of it is inherited from nomadic ancestors who hit the trail over the hills, across the plains and through the jungles when spring stirred in their blood.

We read the other day of a French family that has been farming the same patch of land, generation after generation, for more than 1000 years. That couldn't happen in America—not yet. Ours is a young country, not ready to settle down. The moving spirit dominates us. Why, we're not yet certain what the ten largest cities of America will be in another hundred years.

Restlessness, widely condemned, keeps our viewpoint fresh and spurs us on to new discoveries and general progress.

Judge James Hamilton Will Rule On Writ of Habeas Corpus This Afternoon At Four O'Clock.

FAVORS ANTI-TECHNICALLY BILL

Considerable Comment in Both Houses of Legislature About Klan—Leave on Junket Trip.

By The United Press. AUSTIN, April 27.—The House committee on Criminal Jurisprudence this morning rendered their anti-technically bill favorably by a vote of 8 to 2.

To Render Decision. Judge James R. Hamilton, of Travis County District Court, who heard the application of Hull Youngblood for a writ of habeas corpus, announced that he would render a decision on the application at 4 o'clock today.

In the application, Youngblood alleged that he was being illegally restrained of his liberty.

K. K. K. Considerable comment was heard on the floor of the House and Senate about 70 members of the Ku Klux Klan who in full regalia last night, during a concert given by the Ebelub, presented the organization a sum of money. The organization is composed of negroes.

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G. WILLIS RESIGNS

Increasing Demands Upon His Time By Dabney Motor Co. Reason For Leaving Texas Bank & Trust Co.

The resignation of George Willis as cashier of the Texas Bank & Trust Company, effective May 1, has been accepted by the directors of that institution.

Mr. Willis' successor at the Texas Bank & Trust Company had not been elected Friday, President G. E. Bradford stated, who added that it would be announced soon.

The increasing demands made upon his time by the affairs of the Dabney Motor Company, are given as the reason for his resignation by Mr. Willis. He stated that this company was doing at least three times the business this year as last year.

Mr. Willis has been a director ever since the Texas Bank & Trust Company was organized. He served as assistant cashier until January 1921, when G. E. Bradford, then cashier, succeeded Ellis Douthit, as president.

Mr. Willis has disposed of all his interests in the bank and will devote his entire time in the future to the Dabney Motor Company.

CLASS WAR FATAL

Northwestern University Freshman is Killed And Six Persons Injured In An Auto Wreck.

CHICAGO, April 27.—One Northwestern freshman was killed and six persons injured, one seriously, in an automobile wreck, which was blamed to the variety "class war," today.

Louis Aubrey Chicozo, was killed. Another freshman, Ralph Williams, is unconscious with a fractured skull and possible internal injuries.

Special Pullmans Will Be Used to Carry Sweetwater to West Texas Chamber of Commerce Meet.

WOMEN ARE GOING THIS TIME!

Total Fare Including Pullman Will Be \$11.93 or \$16.52 if Two Share Berth—Plan Decorated Car.

Further plans for a live wire, representative delegation from Sweetwater to attend the West Texas Chamber of Commerce Convention at San Angelo, May 21, 22, 23, were laid by the committee in charge which met at the Board of City Development office Friday afternoon.

The women are going this time. Persistency on their part won them this recognition this year. They are going to accompany their husbands in the special Pullmans, or if they are not burdened with one of those appendages or decorations then they may make their own reservations through the committee or at the office of the Board of City Development. Many women have already announced their intention of going.

The cost for the round trip will be \$11.93, including Pullman. In case man and wife, two men or two ladies wish to share a berth, the additional expense would be \$4.59 for the railroad fare, making a total of \$16.52. The Pullmans will be parked in San Angelo railroad yards, and used for sleeping purposes at night, thus doing away with the necessity of hunting up accommodations after arrival. Of course the above figures do not include eating expenses which will vary, according to the individual.

There will be a special train to handle the Sweetwater Pullmans. It will probably leave the morning of the convention, so that only two nights will be spent on the road.

The Orient railroad, however, must be advised within the next two or three days as to how many Pullmans will be required and everyone is urged to make their reservation promptly, Chairman W. E. Wade is appointing a committee to interview business men relative to this matter, but it is pointed out that the committee cannot see everyone.

It was decided to provide a decorated car for Miss Lois Hogue, who will be "Miss Sweetwater" in the pageant and that matter too was left to the chairman to carry out.

Advertising committee, stunt committee and one to interview Colorado relative to band matters, were also arranged for.

RADIO NIGHTHAWK.
The Kansas City Nighthawks now have 35,000 members among radio fans all over the United States and Canada.

The Nighthawks broadcast a radio concert from Kansas City Star after midnight. Between jazz numbers of the Coon-Sanders orchestra, the announcer reads telegrams from out-of-town radio bugs who are "listening in." The reading of these telegrams makes the senders members of the Nighthawks. The ceremony is completed by "the professor," in charge of the band, ringing them up on a gong.

This announcer in Kansas City has a better line of "patter" than any of the old-time minstrel show interlocutors. Chicago has a similar concert-broadcasting outfit—the Sun Dodgers.

There's something almost uncanny in sitting up late at night, when concerts come in clearest because there are fewer stations sending, and by a few slight dial changes shifting from one distant concert to another.

It's like pulling teeth, for a radio has a peculiar lure, unlike anything else. This lure is in the fact that radio eliminates distance and carries the listener hundreds or thousands of miles in a twinkling. Radio beats the Magic Carpet in the "Arabian Nights."

Recently we were "listening in" on a concert from Minneapolis. The usual telegrams were read, between musical selections, from radio enthusiasts. Then came one from an Indiana woman. She wanted to get word to her brother, somewhere in the woods, that father was dead. We wondered whether the brother heard the announcer read the telegram, or whether some friend heard and passed the word along.

The incident had a dramatic touch that is seldom equaled on the stage.

You can't imagine a dyed-in-the-wool radio bug drinking bootleg in some dirty back room or making home-brew in the cellar, while concerts are waiting to be heard. Outfits like the Kansas City Nighthawks and the Chicago Sun Dodgers are embryonic scientific organizations that incidentally are keeping a lot of people out of mischief.

the eggs in a bowl with the sugar and salt. Add hot milk slowly, stirring, and return mixture to the double boiler. Cook until custard will coat a silver spoon. Strain and serve. If the custard curdles, set the pan into cold water and beat the custard until it is smooth.

STEAMED OR BAKED CUSTARD.

1 pint milk
2 eggs
1-8 teaspoon nutmeg or cinnamon
1-4 cup sugar
1-8 teaspoon salt
Mix eggs as for soft custard. Strain into custard cups and steam until firm over hot water which is boiling gently. To bake, strain the custard into cups and place in a pan of warm water. Bake in a moderate oven until the custard is firm. To test a steamed or baked custard, slip a knife blade to the bottom of the cup in the center of the custard and draw out without turning. If the knife is not coated the custard has cooked enough. Grate the nutmeg over the surface and cool before serving.

FLOATING ISLAND.

2 1-2 cups milk
1-8 teaspoon salt
1-2 cup sugar
5 eggs (yolks)
1-2 teaspoon vanilla
Prepare as a soft custard. The whites should be beaten light and 2 tablespoons of powdered sugar (or 4 tablespoons corn syrup) added for the meringue. When the custard is cool it may be poured into sauce dishes and the meringue dropped in large spoonfuls into it.

CUSTARD PUDDING.

1-2 cup pearl tapioca or rice
2 eggs (yolks)
1-2 teaspoon vanilla.
1-2 cup sugar
2 cups milk
2 eggs (whites)
1-8 teaspoon salt
Soak the tapioca in enough hot water to cover it, until it absorbs the water. Add the milk and cook in a double boiler until the tapioca is soft and transparent. Combine the yolks of eggs with sugar and salt and add to the mixture in the double boiler. Cook ten minutes. Add stiffly beaten whites and flavoring and when cold, serve. Rice must be cooked in boiling water until soft.

APPLE WHIP.

2 cups apple sauce
4 eggs (whites)
Cream for serving
Cook 6 or 8 medium size apples until soft in just enough water to keep them from burning. Add syrup to sweeten sufficiently and one-eighth of teaspoon grated nutmeg. Cool. Press the apple sauce through a strainer and add to it the stiffly beaten whites of eggs. Beat until light and foamy. Pile onto saucers and serve with fresh cream or a custard sauce, made of the egg yolks. This sauce may be prepared by the same method as for soft custard, omitting the whites of eggs. Canned fruit such as peaches, figs, cherries, or guava may be substituted in the same proportion as the apples.
