FIRST DEATH IN TOURIST CAMP

C. W. Watson of Breckenridge Dies in Local Tourist Camp From Heart Trouble—Enroute To Montana.

DEATH OCCURRED THURSDAY
Were Driving Overland in Buick Roadster From Breckenridge—Arrived Here About 5:30.

The first death among the thousands of people who have used the Tourist Camp at City Lake, occurred Thursday night at 7:30 o'clock when C. W. Watson of Breckenridge died there from heart trouble.

Mr. Watson was accompanied by his wife. They were in a Buick Four and had left Breckenridge on Thursday morning enroute to Montana for the benefit of Mr. Watson's health. They encountered some mud during the day's journey and Mr. Watson had found it necessary to exert himself beyond his strength as it later developed.

Arriving in Sweetwater about 5:30, he was stricken shortly after pitching the tent for the night. Dr. Fortner was called, but was unable to render aid, death ensuing about 7:30.

Mr. Watson had severed his connection with the Texas Company at Breckenridge. The body is being held here pending advices from relatives at Rising Star and other points.

MERKEL, May 11.—David Crockett Rister died at his home in the Campers community Wednesday afternoon, May 9, following a short illness. The funeral was held from the Campers Baptist church at 12 o'clock Thursday, interment taking place in the Midway cemetery, near Huges that afternoon at 1 o'clock. Rev. Ira Far-rack, pastor of the Merkel Baptist church conducted the funeral services. Mr. Rister was born in Alabama and was in his 78th year. He fought in the Confederate army during the Civil War. He was converted at the age of 12 years and lived a consistent member of the Baptist church for 65 years, and will be greatly missed in this community by all who knew him best. In his death he leaves a widow, five sons, three daughters, thirty-six granddaughters and seven great grand children.

WILL SHOW FILM

American Legion Bringing Another Famous Film to Sweetwater For One Day Showing Only.

On Monday, May 14th, afternoon and night at the Palace Theater the American Legion's film classic, "The Man Without a Country" will be shown by the Oscar McDonald Post No. 109 of the American Legion of this city.

This picture is based upon Dr. Edward Everett Hale's masterpiece by that name. It is said to be one of the most remarkable photoplays ever produced. In its introduction run at Washington, D. C., it commanded a top admission price of \$10 per seat. This picture has also had a long run in New York City, where the most critical reviewers described it as a picture which will stir the blood of every American. It is historical, educational and probably the most patriotic picture version ever produced. It is an eight-reel production and contains, with the immortal story of its name, the romantic points in the nation's history from post revolutionary times to the big world war. It is not, however, a war picture, rather a great love story of adventure and romance with dashes of mystery. This picture is said to be too big, too great, to attempt a complete description of its theme. One of the New York reporters said: "No word thus far spoken: no picture thus far shown, contains so much inspiration for Americans."

CAPTIVES PLEAD MOTHER SCOUTS TROOPS REMOVAL AT SUICIDE HINTS

Victims of Chinese Bandits Say They Are Threatened With Death Unless The Troops Are Withdrawn.

CHINA STRICTLY ACCOUNTABLE

Diplomatic Corps Gives China Until Midnight Tonight to Recover the Captives or Heavy Indemnity.

TIEN TSIN, China, May 11.—"For God's sake, take away the troops; the bandits have threatened to kill us all."

This message of despair came here this afternoon from J. B. Powell, an American newspaper man, who has been held a captive with many other foreigners in the camp of the Shanghai-Pekin Express Sunday, and carried off its foreign passengers.

Cries from the hills to which the brigands, now being close pressed by the Government Troops, have withdrawn, which has caused consternation here.

Grave fears are felt here for the safety of the underdetermined number of foreigners still held.

PEKIN GETS HOT SHOT.

PEKIN, China, May 11.—Diplomatic corps delivered an ultimatum to China today, demanding that the Chinese Government obtain the release of all the foreign prisoners being held by the bandits by midnight tonight. Pe-kin time, otherwise heavy progressive indemnity would be imposed immediately.

CHINA WARNED OF CONDITION.

WASHINGTON, May 11.—American Minister Schurman at Peking has warned Chinese authorities that death of any of the foreigners among the prisoners of the Shantung bandits, will mean that China will face a serious international complication. It was announced today by the State Department.

SPEND \$15,319.72.

Lubbock Chamber of Commerce Make Profit from Their Chautauqua.

LUBBOCK, May 11.—In the annual report of the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce published here, expenditures amounting to \$15,319.72 for the year were reported. Of this amount \$4,226.15 was for salaries, \$5,926 for special trains and \$877.38 for advertising, among other things.

During the same year the Junior Chamber of Commerce spent \$1,220.51. The Redpath-Horner Chautauqua netted \$435.68 after all bills were paid.

OFFICER OF CZAR KILLS A DELEGATE

Lausanne Conference Thrown Into Panic When Maurice Conradi Assassinated Soviet Delegate.

TORTURED HIS AGED PARENTS

Conradi Charges Bolsheviks With Cruel Treatment of Kinfolks—"Glad I Got My Revenge," He Says.

LAUSANNE, May 11.—"I am glad I had revenge," Maurice Conradi, former officer in Czar's army said, who late yesterday threw the Lausanne conference into consternation by assassinating M. Vorovsky, the Russian delegate and mortally wounding the latter's secretary and shooting another Russian.

Conradi made the above statement as part of his lengthy plea before the examining magistrate today.

Conradi charged the bolsheviks with torturing his aged parents and his two sons, who, he said, died of starvation and cruel treatment in Russia after the revolution.

ACCUSES SWITZERLAND.

BERLIN, Germany, May 11.—The Russian representatives at the Lausanne conference handed a note to the Swiss Government today formally accusing Switzerland of failing to take precautions to protect the lives of Vorovsky, Ahrens and Dibrikosky, after being notified of the attack on the Soviet delegates that had been previously planned.

The note says that the Allies will be held morally responsible for the death of Vorovsky and the wounding of two others by the former officer of the Czar's army last night.

INSURE FOR RAIN.

San Angelo Takes Out \$8,000 Rain Indemnity.

SAN ANGELO, May 11.—As an indemnity against rain interference to the pageant of progress and the stupendous banquet for 4,000 persons during the Fifth Annual Convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce here May 21, 22 and 23, the board of directors of the convention today took out insurance, in the sum of \$8,000 distributed \$5,000 for the pageant and \$3,000 for the banquet. This sum represents the amount expended by the convention financial committee for the execution of provisions for these phases.

BEYOND CONTROL

Bodies And Skeletons of Dead Plainly Visible As Flames From Burning Gusher Writes in High Wind

CORSICANA, May 11.—Efforts are being made today to bring under control the terrific fire which savagely rages on the spot where the J. K. Hughes Developing Company early in the week brought in its first gusher on the Hughes-McKie lease, near here.

Workers labored frantically all day yesterday and most of last night in connecting up giant boilers from which steam is to be shot in the burning mass of charred timbers, human bodies and the powerful gusher in an effort to put out the fire.

Seven bodies have been recovered. Six still remain unaccounted for.

Four skeletons plainly visible thru the flames, are beyond the reach of the workers. One more body besides the ones mentioned is said to have been seen in the burning oils.

A fund has been started by the Humphreys Foundation for the benefit of the families of those men killed in the fire. Colonel A. E. Humphreys led the list with a bequest of five thousand dollars.

Many have flocked to the scene of the horrifying accident, which brings a deep vein of sadness; added horrors are presented as one peers thru the mad flames at the unrecovered bodies.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS.

Preserving eggs when they are cheap for use when they aren't.

TIME TO PRESERVE.

Eggs laid in April, May and early June have been found to keep better than those laid later in the season. It is recommended, therefore, that ordinarily only eggs laid at this season be preserved.

KIND OF EGGS TO PRESERVE.

Very careful attention should be given to the condition of eggs preserved. If satisfactory results are to be obtained, the eggs should be fresh and clean. Eggs that float when placed in the solution are not fresh and, therefore, can not be preserved. When only slightly soiled, a cloth dampened with vinegar can be used to remove such stains. Under no circumstances should badly soiled eggs be used for preserving; if put into the jar while dirty they will spoil, and washing removes a protective coating which prevents spoiling.

WATER GLASS METHOD.

Use 1 quart of sodium silicate to 9 quarts of water that has been boiled

and cooled. Place the mixture in a 5-gallon crock or jar. This will be sufficient to preserve 15 dozen eggs; and will serve as a guide for the quantity need to preserve larger amounts of eggs.

First, select a 5-gallon crock and clean it thoroughly, after which it should be scalded and allowed to dry.

Second, heat a quantity of water to the boiling point and allow it to cool.

Third, when cold, measure out 9 quarts of water, place it in the crock and add 1 quart of sodium silicate, stirring the mixture thoroughly.

Fourth, the eggs should be placed in the solution. Be very careful to allow at least 2 inches of the solution to cover the eggs.

Fifth, place the crock containing the preserved eggs in a cool, dry place well covered to prevent evaporation. Waxed paper covered over and tied around the top of the crock will answer this purpose.

LIME METHOD.

When water glass can not be obtained, the following method may be used in its stead. Many consider this method entirely satisfactory, though instances are known where eggs so preserved have tasted slightly of lime.

Dissolve 2 to 3 pounds of unslacked lime in 5 gallons of water that has previously been boiled and allowed to cool and allow the mixture to stand until the lime settles and the liquid is clear. Place clean, fresh eggs in a clean earthenware jug or keg and pour the clear lime water into the vessel until the eggs are covered. At least

2 inches of the solution should cover the top layer of eggs.

Sometimes a pound of salt is used with the lime, but experience has shown that in general the lime without the salt is more satisfactory.

USING PRESERVED EGGS.

Fresh, clean eggs, properly preserved by either of these methods, can be used satisfactorily for all purposes in cooking and for the table. When boiling preserved eggs, a small hole should be made in the shell with a pin at the large end before placing them in the water.

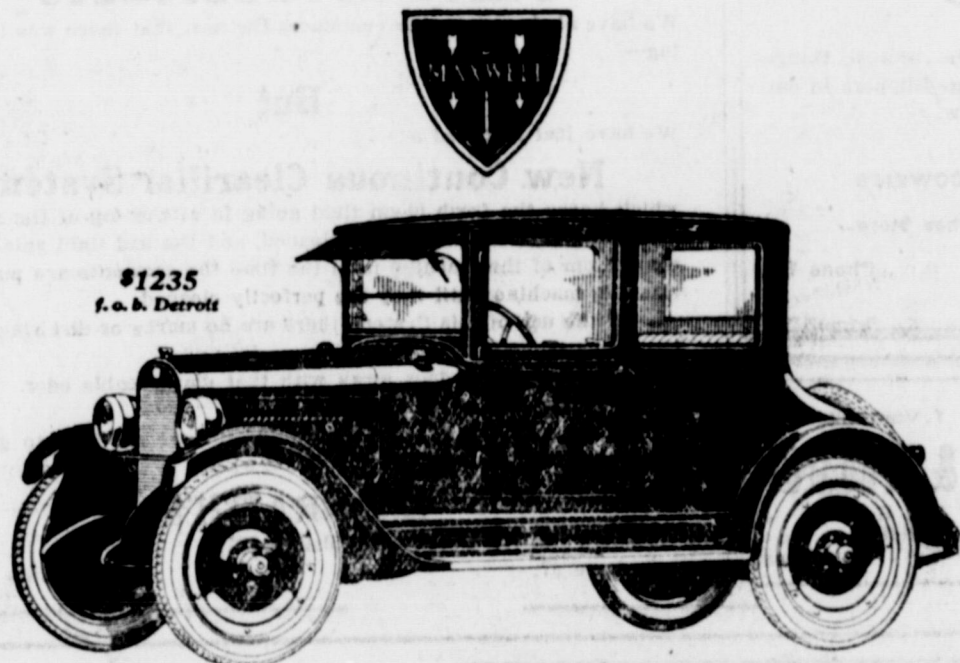
