**CIVIC LEAGUE.**

There is ample work in Sweetwater for a Civic League, should one be formed among the men and women of the city who have the beauty and welfare of the city at heart. Not that there are not already numerous organizations of one sort and another with various phases of that work already in hand or planned.

But there is at present no such organization with men and women both on its membership rolls, nor any with as comprehensive a scope as should fall upon the shoulders of such a League.

For a Civic League should not merely labor for the present. It should see Sweetwater as it will look five, ten, fifteen, or twenty-five years from now. Among other things, it should arrange for a system of parks. It should study city building from a fundamental standpoint to provide beauty of architecture for buildings, yet undreamed of, to plan for landscape effects, boulevards, to encourage beautiful school grounds. Such a League would not usurp the powers or functions of any existing organization, from Rankin, worked most of Mon-encouragement and proper planning supplement them all to the end that beauty will greet everyone on every hand.

There are at the present time all too few cities in the United States that

can properly be termed beautiful. That is because there was no concerted effort to make them attractive, no planning.

City builders were prone to lay too much stress upon the financial fundamentals to the exclusion of everything else and by the time such foundation had been laid, the expense of beautification was either prohibitive or prevented by natural obstacles that could have been overcome in the city's infancy.

This town will become just what its citizens make it.

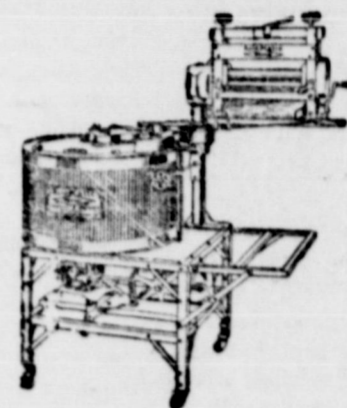

AN ORDINANCE TO PREVENT THE SPREAD OF WHOOPINGCOUGH WITHIN THE CITY LIMITS OF SWEETWATER.

Anyone violating this ordinance, shall be fined in any sum not to exceed twenty-five dollars.

**NEW BUICKS OUT.**

**Announce Four Wheel Brake—Other Developments Accomplished.**

**Special to The Reporter.**

FLINT, Mich., Aug. 1.—There is no question that the 1924 Buick cars will be hailed as a substantial advance in automotive engineering, but it will be noted that the new features are developments rather than innovations, throughout with Buick fundamental principles.

Fifty per cent more power is claimed for its famous valve-in-head six cylinder engine, external brakes are extended to all four wheels in both Sixes and Fours, with a specially designed carburetor that is heralded as a wonder, and literally dozens of other developments, major and minor.

The thousands who are certain to see these cars in the leading centers this week—and very soon in the show rooms of all Buick dealers—will first observe a change in body lines, undoubtedly influenced to a degree by recent refinements in foreign design. Thus a more modish appearance, even than the 1923 Buick, has been accomplished by a departure in radiator and hood contour on both open and closed bodies. This applies to both the six and four cylinder models, of which there are fourteen body styles.

Exterior features noted at first glance are the new head lights, nickel radiator on the sixes, water-tight hood hinge, open hood support, newly designed crown fenders, a more effective weather-proof windshield strip, operating instruments, conforming in design to the head lamps, flush ventilator, new dust apron and a heavier and better looking gasoline tank.

It will next be noted that a two to four inch longer wheel base on the six cylinder chassis has created more room in both the front and rear compartments, thus affording greater comfort to both driver and passenger coupled with an improved spring suspension, easier riding qualities also.

The six cylinder valve-in-head engine has been so re-designed that it actually yields 50 per cent more power and a speed of 60 to 70 miles an hour. It has forced feed lubrication, removable heads, larger valves, heavier crank and cam shafts, greater piston displacement, and a new marvel carburetor that includes a simple dash adjustment for economy.

The extension to all four wheels of the highly successful Buick external

brakes is a feature that, it is announced, has been in process of development for a period of years and recently subjected to more than 150,000 miles of hard and varied road tests. These brakes enable the car to be brought to a standstill much more quickly and smoothly thus affording an added factor of safety inestimable in its advantages. The brakes are operated by a light pressure on the foot pedal and the mechanism is both simple and ingenious.—(Adv.)

## PRESIDENT HARDING DIES

### END COMES SUDDENLY AT HOTEL IN SAN FRANCISCO

Following First Reports of Serious Illness of Nation's Chief Executive, The Official Bulletins Gave Every Promise of A Speedy Recovery From Ravages of Disease.

#### DEATH CAUSED BY CEREBRAL HEMORRHAGE ATTACK

Physical Condition of Harding Precluded Recovery—Nation Is In Mourning for Its Dead President—Calvin S. Coolidge, Vice President, Automatically Becomes New President.

(By The United Press.)

PALACE HOTEL, SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Aug. 3.—President Harding died suddenly here at 7:30 o'clock last evening.

The following official signed statement was issued:

"President Warren G. Harding of the United States, died instantly, without warning, here Thursday evening, and while he was conversing with the members of his family at 7:30 o'clock. His death was apparently due to some brain development, probably apoplexy.

"During the day, the President had been free from discomfort and there was every justification for anticipating a prompt recovery.

"(Signed:) C. W. Sawyer, M. D., Ray Lyman Wilburn, M. D., C. W. Cooper, M. D., J. T. Boone, M. D., Hubert Work, M. D.

WAS COMPLETE SURPRISE TO MEMBERS OF THE FAMILY. (BY THE UNITED PRESS.)

SAN FRANCISCO, PALACE HOTEL, Aug. 3.—President Harding's death from a stroke of apoplexy, came as a complete surprise to members of the official party.

He had been improving steadily and was expected to fully recover. Death occurred at 7:30 o'clock Thursday evening, with Mrs. Harding and two nurses being in his room at the time the end came.

Mrs. Harding was reading to the president when, without warning, a shudder passed through the frame of the sick man and everyone then realized that the end had come.

Within a few moments all the members of the president's official party had been summoned.

Calvin S. Coolidge has also been informed of the death of the president.

Dr. Sawyer, personal physician of the president, had been conferring with newspaper men a short time before the president died, and had confirmed his earlier reports that the president's period of convalescence had definitely begun.

Following is the telegram sent to Vice President Calvin S. Coolidge, Chief Justice Taft, and to members of the President's Cabinet, not in San Francisco:

"President Harding died at 7:30 o'clock Thursday evening from a stroke of cerebral apoplexy.

"The end came peacefully and without warning."

Four members of the President's Cabinet met as soon as they could be called together, and drew up a message, notifying Vice President Calvin S. Coolidge, and then immediately began plans and arrangements for the burial of the President's body.

Warren Gamaliel Harding was the 29th president of the United States. He was born at Corsica Morrow County, Ohio, November 2, 1865, the son of Dr. George Tyron and Phebe Elizabeth (Dickerson) Harding.

As a boy he studied at the Ohio Central College (now defunct) at Iberia. On July 8, 1891, he married Florence Kling, of Marion, Ohio.

He started in the newspaper business at Marion, Ohio, in 1884, and for many years he was the owner of the Marion, (Ohio,) Star, which he sold only a few months ago.

#### SERVED IN SENATE.

He was a member of the Ohio Senate from 1900 to 1904. Lieutenant Governor of Ohio from 1904 to 1906; was defeated as the Republican candidate for Governor in 1910 and was elected to the United States Senate from Ohio in 1915. His term expired in 1921.

fifteen years as manager of the Marion Water and Gas Works, of which Mr. Harding was the owner.

#### COOLIDGE IS PRESIDENT.

Until sunk in the comparative obscurity that enshrouds the vice-president of the United States, Calvin S. Coolidge, who now becomes the nation's chief executive, led a rather lively political life as governor of Massachusetts.

Calvin S. Coolidge was born at Plymouth, Vermont, July 9, 1872. He took an A.B. degree at Amherst in 1895 with honorary degrees from that college as well as Tufts, Williams, Bates, Wesleyan, University of Vermont in later years, and studied law with Hammond and Field at Northampton, Mass.

#### BEGAN EARLY.

He began the practice of law at Northampton in 1897, beginning his political career shortly afterward as city councilman, later city attorney, clerk of courts and chairman of the Republican city committee following in order shortly thereafter until he was elected mayor in 1910. In 1912 he was elected to the state senate. From 1916 to 1918 he was lieutenant governor of the state and beginning in 1919 served two terms as governor.

He was elected vice-president of the United States in November, 1920, as-

suming the position in March, 1921.

#### WORD COMES LATE.

At a late hour Thursday night, The Reporter was called on the long distance telephone from Dallas and told of the president's death. But few people were stirring on the streets. The news spread very rapidly, however. And everywhere the news was received with every expression of sadness.

### GEORGE IS COMING

Former British Premier And Outstanding World War Figure to Visit United States in Fall.

By The United Press.

LONDON, Aug. 2.—David Lloyd George will sail for New York in September for a tour of the United States and Canada.

His purpose, he said, is to thank Canada for her "magnificent services" during the late war and to become personally acquainted with the United States, its cities and its people.

Lloyd George, who is perhaps the most outstanding figure of the World War, will make a number of speeches in the United States and will visit the American Shrine at Washington. He will travel by auto as well as by train, for he wants to get close to the people and will visit several of the smaller "Main Streets" of the country.

#### ON LABOR SURVEY.

T. S. Myers To Confer With Labor Officials Friday.

AUSTIN, Aug. 2.—J. S. Myers, state labor commissioner, left here today for Fort Worth where he will confer with labor officials in regard to the supply of labor during the cotton season and will also make a survey of labor conditions.

#### HARDING.

The lines of worry and of care that had replaced the genial smile that these United States had come to know so well on the features of its president, W. G. Harding, have been smoothed forever by the caressing fingers of the Angel of Death. All unexpected, he entered the ban room in the Palace Hotel at San Francisco and at his touch that bed of pain was eased, forever.

Now will come a funeral cortege across the continent as the chief executive of the greatest nation in the world is born to his last resting place. Gone are the strife of political wrangling and for the moment the nation will pause and pay its last tribute to its first citizen—one of the few who have died in office.

That Harding was a victim of his position will hardly be denied. Few realized the wellnigh superhuman efforts required of the man elected as president. Woodrow Wilson his predecessor, succumbed to its crushing burden.

Harding's place in history will not be fixed for years to come. Attempting to readjust the tangled web of human existence after the war was no easy task. There is no question but what he attempted to do the best he could with a most difficult situation, and although his "normalcy" may have fallen short somewhat from expectations, none will deny that he will deny that he has paid the supreme sacrifice. He died in harness. He took his policies to the people, paid a personal visit to Alaska, for first hand information of that great empire, and so exhausted his physical resources that illness found an easy prey.

Harding in his life peculiarly exemplified Americanism and all that it stands for. From a position of the direst poverty, he fought his way up from the ranks, from printer's devil to president. By sheerest hard work, coupled with undaunted spirit and genial smile, he won for himself wealth and then achieved the greatest political gift within the power of the American people when he went from the halls of the Senate to the White House.

### IS GUEST OF TEXAS

"Lion of The Argonne" Says He Likes Action And That The Wild West Texas Appeals To Him.

HOUSTON, Aug. 2.—Gen. Henri Joseph Gouraud, "Lion of the Argonne," was the guest of Houston and the State of Texas today.

A slight change in the entertainment program was made this morning when the general expressed his desire to see a cotton mill. A train was chartered and arrangements were made for a demonstration.

Gov. Pat Neff, who was scheduled to deliver the address of welcome in behalf of the State of Texas, failed to arrive this morning from Austin. Lieut. Gov. Davidson was commissioned to act in the place of Gov. Neff.

The general expressed a deep interest in this country which has developed so fast.

"I am always interested in action," said the general, "and in seeing things done. Here one can see matters expedited and this wild West Texas appeals to me," the general concluded.

#### QUESTIONS PRODUCTION TAX.

AUSTIN, Aug. 2.—Councillor Smith is taking steps in regard to the opinion held in the gross production tax on oil, which levied a 2 per cent tax, including the month of June.

### MASONS ADDRESS LARGE AUDIENCE

Hundreds Hear Members Of Masonic Service And Education Committee Speak Here Wednesday Afternoon

#### LOCAL ORCHESTRA GIVES MUSIC

Special Program For Masons Held Wednesday Night at Masonic Temple—Banquet Is Tendered.

The program in Sweetwater of the Masonic Service and Education Committee working under the authority and direction of the Masonic Grand Lodge of Texas, opened Wednesday afternoon at 3 o'clock at the First Christian church, where a full house of Masons and friends were present. Besides the Sweetwater Masons, a number of visitors from the Masonic Lodges of near-by towns attended the program.

A program of splendid music by the Sweetwater Orchestra under the direction of Prof. LaMaire preceded the addresses. Solos by Miss Ruby Hemby and J. A. McCurdy were also enjoyed by the audience.

R. C. Crane acted as chairman of the proceedings, and after a prayer by Rev. J. C. Moore, Chaplain of the Sweetwater Lodge, the welcome address was made by County Judge A. S. Mauzey.

"I am glad, indeed, to welcome you to the city of Sweetwater," Judge Mauzey said. Speaking of the work the committee was doing, he continued:

"They have come to our town to do us good. We are glad to have them here, and appreciate their coming and we will try to make their stay here pleasant."

A cordial welcome was also extended to visiting Masons, the families of Masons and any others who had gathered for the program. His welcome, he declared, was to all, and the meeting was open to every one. Goat riding, he concluded, was not held in public nor in churches, but was reserved for the lodge room.

Judge Crane next introduced Wilbur Keith, member of the Service and Education Committee and Executive Secretary of that body, who made a response to the welcome address.

The committee, according to Mr. Keith, had traveled on their present tour, over 3,000 miles, visited 20 cities and held over 40 programs, just as they were doing in Sweetwater.

In his brief address, Mr. Keith stated that the body had found no greater welcome than was extended them in Sweetwater.

Mr. Collins, Past Grand Master of Texas, spoke on "The Mason, and His Relationship to His Community and City." Mr. Collins is superintendent of one of the public schools in El Paso and is well informed on educational matters and conditions of public schools over the country.

The Masonic principles stand for never-ending search for light, declared Mr. Collins, and for service, the knowledge that all men were equal, for free education, and the Masons were the friends of public schools. 

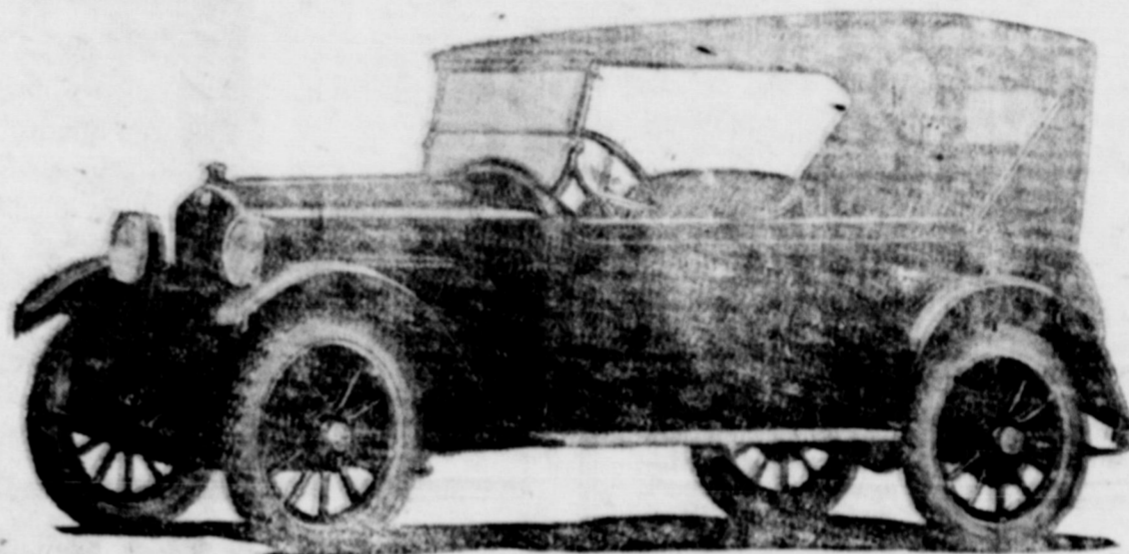

tish Rite Dormitory built at the State University for daughters of Masons. Three hundred and sixty girls now stay in the building where they are cared for and protected. He spoke of other works the Masons were doing along the educational line.

After the song "America" by the audience, accompanied by the orchestra, and a prayer by Rev. Moore, the meeting dismissed.

A buffet supper for the guests in the dining room in the Masonic Temple was attended by a large crowd at 7 o'clock in the evening, after which the special program was held.

W. C. Berrickman of Dallas made a short introductory talk and two reels of motion pictures of the home for orphan boys and girls, three miles from Fort Worth, was shown. Mr. Berrickman explained the work being carried on there.

The home is completely furnished including a well stocked farm. A herd of Jerseys, all of which are blooded stock furnish the milk and butter for the home. The home uses seventy gallons of milk daily.

In addition to the agricultural features, of which the boys and girls are taught the fundamentals of farming, a school of eleven grades is maintain-

ed and is a district in itself and receives support from the state school system.

The school has a print shop in which those who are interested are taught job printing. Many of the lodge forms and notices of the Fort Worth lodges are printed in this shop.

The girls are taught to make their

own clothes. Mr. Berrickman said that when a boy or girl leaves the home he or she is thoroughly prepared to meet responsibilities.

Following the pictures the meeting was adjourned and opened to Masons only.

The sealed copper box, which was obtained from the corner stone of the old Masonic Temple at Third and Oak streets, was opened by Judge R. A. Ragland, who was a member of the lodge at the time of the ceremony July 3, 1891.

The box contained the charter, names of the building committee, members of the lodge at that time, minutes of the meeting at which the

local lodge was organized in 1852, copies of The Nolan County Record and The Fisher County Call, an American dollar, half dollar, quarter, ten-cent piece and a nickel, and about one

the orphans of Scottish Rite Masons the Masonic Home at Dallas where cob of shelled corn.

The contents of the box was turned over to M. C. Manroe.
