The usual plan of dollar for dollar, that is one dollar from the state and Federal government and one from the county to be spent on improved roads can be bettered on the Bankhead high. Directors For Pine Line Company way, the commissioners told local citizens, because of the fact that it is perhaps the leading highway in the state and carries such a heavy interstate traffic. As a matter of fact, it is a transcontinental highway and is used by a much higher percentage of people living out of the county or even out of the state. It is therefore more of a state broblem than a local prob-

Funds available for expenditure in the building of improved roads are of course limited, and they are being used, the commissioners said, in those counties which show enough local interest to spend a little of their own money to help in the proceedings.

It was also made very plain that people paid for good roads whether they had them or not, especially the automobile owners, who paid in repairs, gasoline, car depreciation and for tires, enough in a year, to pay the interest and sinking fund on half a dozen bond issues.

The proposition of the State Highway Commission of course has the usual restrictions that the type of road must be approved by the engineers of the State Highway Commission and of the Federal Government. In the case of the Bankhead Highway an 18-foot roadway would probably be required. Cost of such a highway varies. according to the type, whether of concrete, brick or asphalt. His breathing was less labored, with but little cough and the lungs in the same condition as yester-

The president is still exhausted but retains his normal bouyancy. Small amounts of food are taken at regular intervals and the elimination is satisfactory.

The temperature at 10 o'cleck this morning was 99, pulse 114, respiration 30. While progress is being made, every care must still be exercised. the doctors declared unofficially. All indications were that another ten

days or two weeks would be required before the president could be moved from the hotel.







PRESIDENT HARDING DIES

END COMES SUDDENLY AT HOTEL IN SAN FRANCISCO

Following First Reports of Serious Illness of Nation's Chief Executive, The Official Bulletins Gave Every Promise of A Speedy Recovery From Ravages of Disease.

DEATH CAUSED BY CEREBRAL HEMORRHAGE ATTACK

Physical Condition of Harding Precluded Recovery-Nation Is In Mourning for Its Dead President-Calvin S. Coolidge, Vice President, Automatically Becomes New President.

(By The United Press.) PALACE HOTEL, SAN FRANCISCO, Calif., Aug. 3.—President Harding died suddenly here at 7:30 o'clock last evening.

The following official signed statement was

"President Warren G. Harding of the United States, died instantly, without warning, here Ihursday evening, and while he was conversing with the members of his family at 7:30 o'clock. His deathwas apparently due to some brain development, probably apoplexy.

"During the day, the President had been free from discomfort and there was every justification for anticipating a prompt recovery.

WAS COMPLETE SURPRISE TO MEMBERS OF THE FAMILY.

(BY THE UNITED PRESS.) SAN FRANCISCO, PALACE HOTEL. Aug. 3 .- President Harding's death from a stroke of apoplexy, came as a complete surprise to members of the official party

He had been improving steadily and was expected to fully recover. Death occurred at 7:30 o'clock Thursday evening, with Mrs. Marding and two nurses being in his room at the time the end came. Mrs. Harding was reading to the president when, without warning, a shudder passed through the frame of the sick man and everyone

then realized that the end had come. Within a few moments all the members of the president's official party had been summoned.

Dr. Sawyer, personal physician of the president, had been conferring with newspaper men a short time before the president died, and had confirmed his earlier reports that the president's period of convalescence had definitely begun.




