'MY TURN'

IN 1989, Shakespeare's "Rose by another name" might end up being R'Ouze' or something equally unspellable.

"NAMES MAKE NEWS" is the very first thing they teach you when you take up a career in journalism. And people usually insist that you spell their names correctly. Rule number one is to get those names right.

A few years ago, Bill and I got interested in genealogy which is another "name game." Combining our vocation with our avocation, we've seen a lot of trends in names down through the years.

For instance, it was about 1700 when people were labeling their little baby daughters with such names as: Thankful, Patience, Submit, America, Remember, Desire, Grateful, Mourning, Mercy and Temperance.

In those days, little boys got to be: Ananias, Barzillai, Manoah, Ezekiel, Ephraim, Lysander, Vespasian, and Caleb.

People have always been fond of naming their offspring after their heroes. A lot of little guys went through life with: George Washington, James Knox Polk, Isaac Newton and Andrew Jackson. In later years some poor kids have been saddled with John Wayne, Elvis and Farrah.

How long has it been since little girls were named for gems such as Jewel, Ruby, Pearl or Opal? Today not many girls turn up with flowery names like Daisy, Rose, Violet or Lilly.

It has been a long time since these names were popular: Ethel, Mabel, Vivian, Hazel, Maude, or Beulah for girls, or Calvin, Horace, Alfred, Otto, Floyd and Walter for boys. These are perfectly good names but people just aren't using them much anymore.

The current vogue in naming babies is to go for perky-sounding names which in years gone by would have been considered merely nicknames and not something you would actually put on the child's birth certificate. Now we get names like: Sparky, Kori, DeeDee, Candy, etc.

In this country, from about 1800 through the late 1950s, there were some fairly standard rules regarding nicknames. Peggy was the nickname for Margaret; Polly was for Mary; Jimmy was James; Dick was Richard; Tad was Thaddeus; Jinsey or Jane were for Virginia; Ann or Nancy were for Nanette; Penny was Penelope.

If you had a boy named William you might call him Billy, especially if his father or grandfather was also William. A girl named Wilma or Winifred might be called Billie, but hers would be spelled with an "ie" on the end. Francis was a male spelling and Frances was for a female.

Unorthodox spelling of names is a trend designed to drive newspaper people straight into the psychiatric ward. Start the name with a K instead of a C; end the name with an I instead of a Y; throw a few consonants together and call it a name.

We'd like to find the first person who ever put an apostrophe in their kids' name. We would love to string him or her up to the nearest tree. This has started people to using all sorts of punctuation in names, which falls far short of making them appear more elegant or ritzy, if that was the desired goal.

Here's some advice from an editor to young couples currently expecting babies (yes, we know they probably won't heed it, but here it is anyway!): Your child is going to live with that name for approximately 70 years.

Think how that cutesy, trendy name is going to look on your little darling when he or she reaches the age of 20, 40, 60 and then while tottering around the halls of the nursing home, calling to one another, "Hey, Bambi!", "How ya' doing, Skippi?", "Had your enema yet this morning, J'Krysi?"

Time To Move Up To C.D.T. Area Misses 'Rain Man'

Area residents are reminded that Saturday night is the time to move their clocks and watches forward an hour, or else they could be an hour late to church on Sunday morning.

Daylight Savings Time officially begins at 2 a.m. on Sunday, April 2, and may be viewed as a late April Fool joke by most people. DST will be in effect for seven months.

Prior to last year, Daylight Savings Time was begun on the last Sunday in April, but a law passed on July 8, 1987, moved the changeover to the first Sunday in April, rather than the last.

The ending date for DST this fall will be on October 29, when the clocks will be moved backward an hour.

The time "springs forward" one hour in the spring, and "falls backward" one hour in the fall.

City Gets 4 Names On List

Four candidates beat the filing deadline for spots on the Friona City Council, and will vie for three seats which will expire in April.

Although portions of the region received some beneficial moisture the first of the week, the Friona area was by-passed, and remains extremely dry.

Both Amarillo and Lubbock had rains on Monday, and Littlefield was reported to have received an inch of moisture. But the Friona gauge did not catch enough drops to even register a "trace" for the day.

Temperatures were mild all week, although the mercury dropped to a low of 27 on Friday morning after the second straight night of northerly winds.

Awards Presented At Chamber Fete

The Friona Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture honored the city's outstanding citizens for 1989 at the 33rd Chamber of Commerce Banquet Thursday evening at the Friona Community Center.

Floyd Reeve and Kitty Gallman were honored as Man and Woman of the Year; Mary Ford was named "Most Courteous Employee," and Jim Parker was selected as "Teacher of the Year." Deena Willard and Lon Outland were honored as outstanding young people.

During the banquet, Randy Lewis was installed as president of the Chamber board for 1989; Larry Rogers was introduced as vice president; Barbara Maynard as secretary-treasurer and Ab Hendley as president ex-officio.

New members of the board are Betty Chaney, Terry Wilkerson, Tom Jarboe and Claudia Hanes. Holdover members are Lewis, Ted Procter, Mrs. Maynard, Dave Buske, Cecil Maddox, Allan Haile and Rogers.

Evelyn Hughes was introduced as president of the chamber's Women's Division.

Miss Willard, reigning Miss Friona, entertained the crowd with a song, and was joined by Heather Griffin in a production number, "Me and My Shadow." Assisting with this number were Claudia Hanes at the piano and Terri Outland, choreographer.

Also, Lory Tannahill and Daylen Gallman, from the FHS Speech Department, gave a dramatic duet acting skit from "Anne of the Thousand Days."

In his remarks to the crowd, banquet speaker Jerry Kunkel admitted that "It's tough being in business in Texas today." However, Kunkel offered the audience a formula they could follow in order to overcome today's problems.

Kunkel admonished the crowd to do the following: Rebel against normality. "Normal doesn't cut it anymore," he said.

Evacuate our Egyptians. "We need to take ourselves out of our bondage."

Learn to laugh. "Laughter is the world's greatest medicine," Kunkel said.

Others-oriented. "You must have a significant somebody in your life," he said.

Accept your limitations. "We can't all be great, but we can be great at what we do."

Defeat defeat. "If you're not a fighter, you might as well throw in the towel right now," Kunkel said.

He pointed out that the first letters of his formula spell "RELOAD."

Kunkel kept the audience in stitches in the early part of his remarks with his humorous stories.

In introducing the outstanding young people, new Chamber president Lewis said he did not think there is a town in Texas or the U.S. which has better young people than does Friona.

Miss Willard was praised for her activities in many organizations, and ranking in the top three members of her class. She has won awards in one-act plays, speech contests and UIL literary events.

Miss Willard, the daughter of Dee and Connie Willard, holds offices in National Honor Society, FHA, Thespians and Student-Faculty Congress. She represented Friona in the Presidential Classroom in Washington, D.C., and served as drum major of the Chieftain band.

She is active in First Baptist Church and serves on the state Acteen board. She shares her talent of signing, an art which she has taught to others.

Outland has been called the most versatile boy in the senior class. He played varsity football, is a member of the band council, National Honor Society, Science Club, has been active in S-FC four years, and is currently president of the Forensics team and is a Thespian officer.

Outland, the son of Hank and Terri Outland, has donated countless hours helping with the Miss Friona pageant, Little Miss pageant, Summer Drama Workshops and Thespian and UIL plays, and always helps his mother with her dance recitals.

He is an Eagle Scout, and is a state finalist for a Fina academic scholarship. Active in First United Methodist Church, he participated in the state meet in debate last year and is having another successful year in that area. He has taken all of the honor classes available at FHS, and is currently the number two rated student in the senior class.

Mary Ford was said to be "Very friendly to everyone and knows how to make people feel comfortable and is happy to do business with each person entering her office. She is always radiant."

A 1967 graduate of Friona High School, she teaches a Sunday School class for fifth and sixth grade girls. She is the mother of two daughters and enjoys fishing and mowing lawns.

Mrs. Ford has been employed at Production Credit Assn. for over ten years. She is married to Kenny, has daughters, Lee Ann, a seventh grader, and Stephanie Birdsong and a granddaughter Kasi Birdsong.

While in college at Sul Ross University, Jim Parker was a member of the Chamber Singers and was on the tennis team. He served in the Army two years in Vietnam. Before coming to Friona he taught 12 years at Borden County, where he also coached tennis.

Director of bands locally since 1981, his program includes well over 300 students. The Chieftain Band has won many honors, and this year participated in the regional marching contests at Wichita Falls.

He serves as choir director at the Methodist Church, and has been involved in other musical activities in the community.

As one person said, "Consider the task he has, especially during football season. He must prepare a halftime show, drill it into 100 kids, get those kids plus instruments and uniforms on buses, drive one of the buses himself umpteen miles, direct the band and keep some measure of discipline, then get those same 100 teenagers safely back home."

Mrs. Gallman, a life-long resident of Parmer County, received her degree from Texas Tech. Always active in community affairs, she has been a Girl Scout leader, a Sunday School teacher, has worked with arts and crafts at Prairie Acres and worked in the Parmer County 4-H program as an adult leader.

The new Friona Library is a reality due partly to her leadership through the Friends of the Library and the Library board. She helps provide clothes and presents to the county's foster children.

She returned to school several years ago, became certified and has been teaching in the local school system for six years. She helps her students achieve their potential and succeed in many areas.

Of Reeve, it was said that he had been "very active in all aspects of life in Friona, and a leader in everything in which he is involved."

He is serving as president of the board of Friona Wheat Growers, is chairman of the administrative board at his church, and president

60 YEARS AGO—MARCH 22, 1929

The mill is capable of taking any kind of feed stuff in any form in which it may be taken from the farm and converting almost instantly into the very finest of feed for any and all kinds of stock.

50 YEARS AGO—MARCH 24, 1939

The program committee of the Friona Chamber of Commerce has announced a banquet, to be held in the basement of the Congregational Church next Tuesday night. Mr. Cal Farley of Amarillo will be the speaker for the evening.

Glenn Reeve has become the owner of the Ralph Tedford residence property on Fifth Street. Mr. Reeve has taken a position with his father, Mayor F.W. Reeve, in the Reeve Chevrolet Company, and will move his family to town from the farm a half mile west of town.

Jamerson was active in farming and held various business interests, including being a part owner of Bovina Pump Company. He was a Navy veteran of World War II.

Survivors include his wife; three sons, Ken and Ricky Don, both of Bovina, and Kelly of Midland; a daughter, Carol Scott of Abilene; two sisters, Ruth Wilson of Lubbock and Lovine Grise of Long Beach, California; and nine grandchildren.

Two Men Killed In Thursday Wreck

Two men were killed in a rural accident in southern Parmer County Thursday morning.

Highway patrol officials said that Alfredo Acosta, 30, and Gilberto Reyes, 34, both of Muleshoe, were occupying a 1982 Ford pickup truck at the time of the accident, which happened three

miles east and three south of Clay's Corner at a county road intersection.

One source said the pickup was following an 18-wheel truck, causing dust to billow. The dust may have been a factor in the crash.

Burial was in Friona Cemetery, under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home.

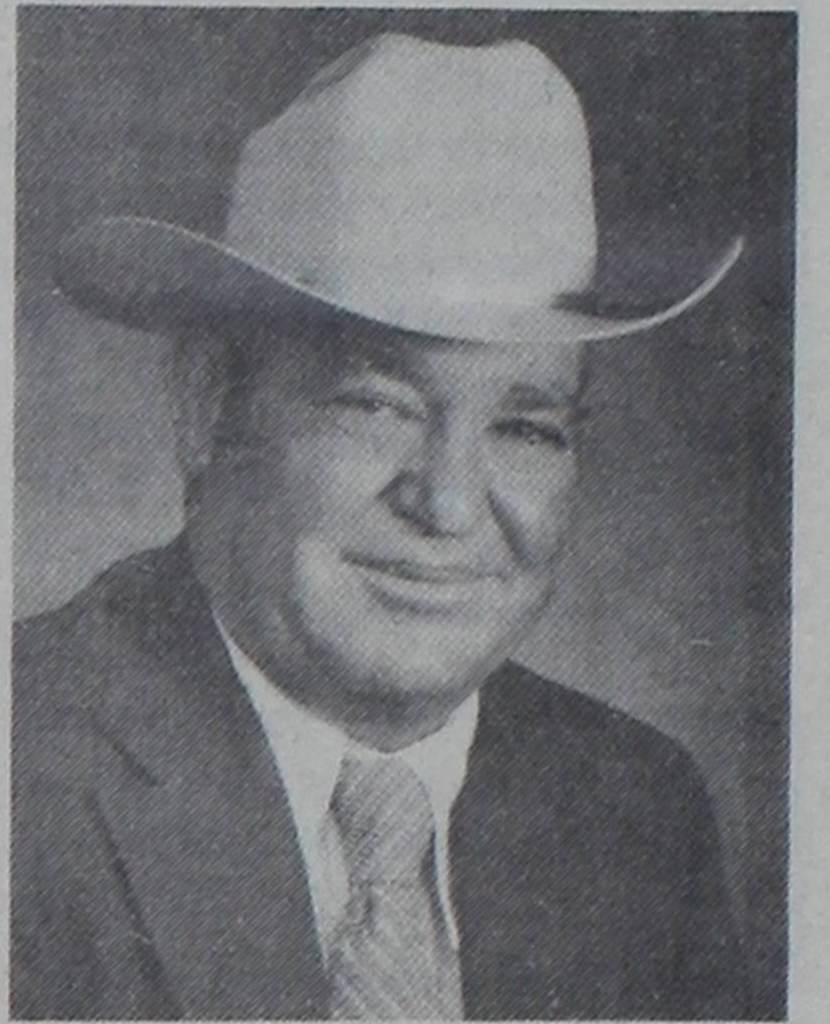
Barker died at his home in Friona March 27, following a lengthy illness.

of the Parmer County tax appraisal board.

 Reeve has held many positions in his church, including youth sponsor, Sunday School teacher and member of the choir. He has served as a class parent many times and is on the Farm Bureau board of directors.

A teepee-shaped pile of wood was burned last Wednesday morning in the Lazbuddie area at the crack of dawn. The south wind blew the smoke from the fire toward the north and according to Crim, this means a poor crop year.

The tradition of forecasting was passed down to Weldon by his father, who performed the Indian ceremonial rites for many years. The forecast custom had been passed down to J.W. Crim by his father, Taylor Crim, who was taught the ritual by the Indians.

It is said that this ceremony is well known throughout the Panhandle and South Plains area and J.W. Crim had performed this ritual near Lazbuddie from 1923 until 1980, when he died. His wish was that his sons continue the tradition, which Weldon does.

A bumper crop is on its way if the wind is blowing from north-northeast at sunrise on March 22. A northwest wind means a fair year. A west, south or southeast wind indicates a poor crop year with little moisture.

It may be interesting to mark this date on your calendar and see how it goes each year.

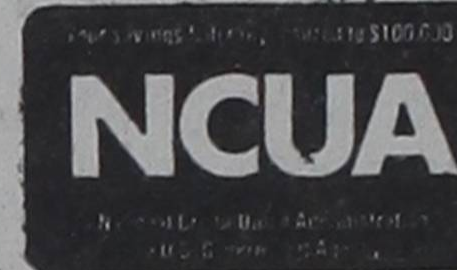
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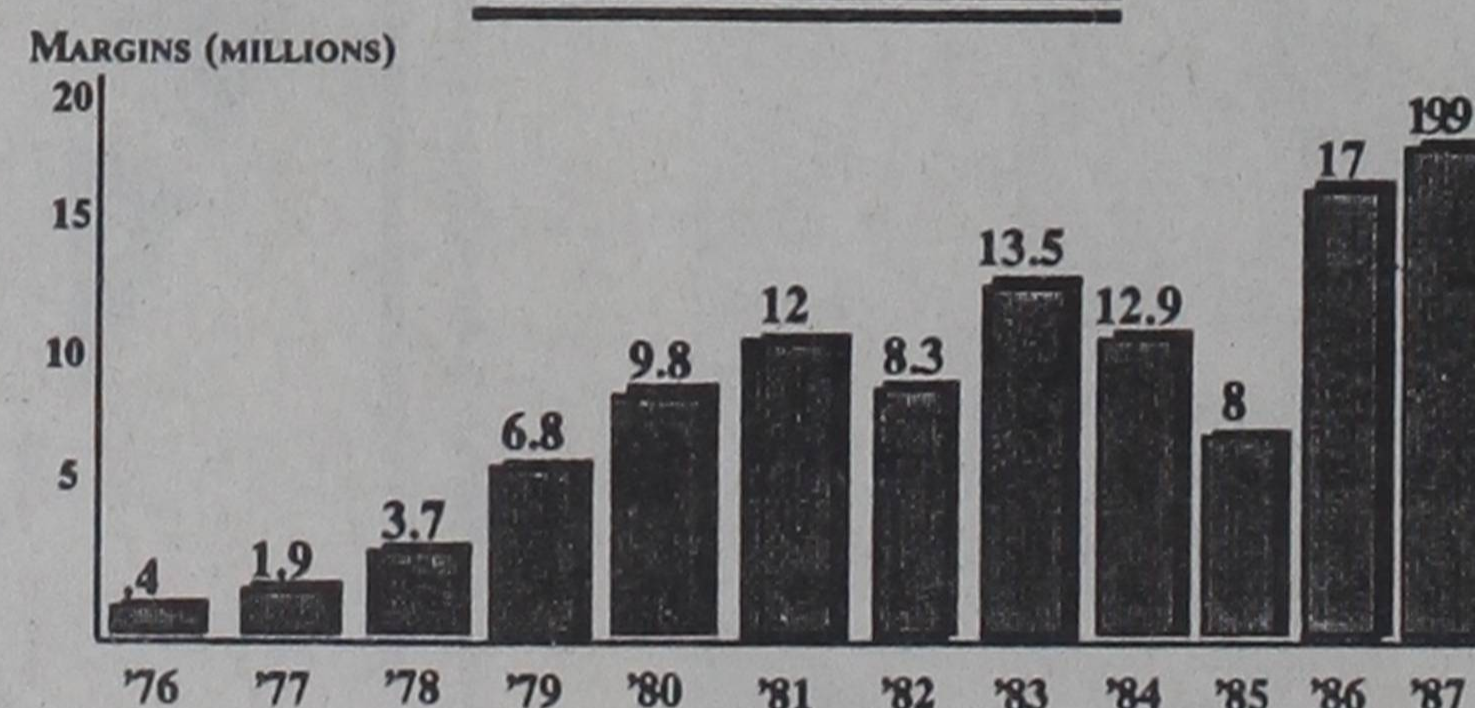
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District Honors Local Woman

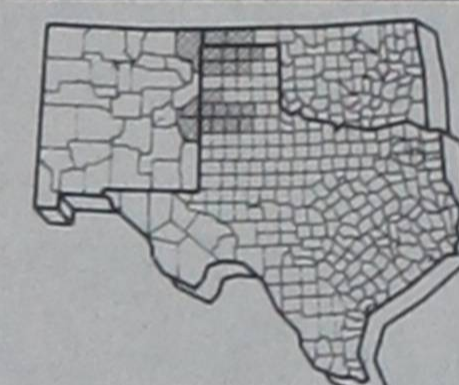

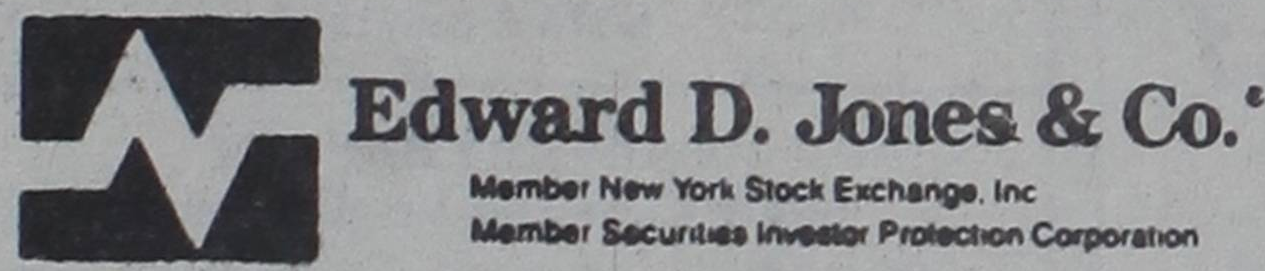
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
