"MY TURN"

FOR ABOUT THE past year, that good old boy who lives with me over on Maple Street (you know, the fellow who fills up this space every other week?) has served as the local official USWS representative.

That means he is the local weatherman. This job is just about as lucrative as most of the other business ventures he's ever gotten into. It pays \$0.00, but if you keep at it for 30 years, they'll give you a nice engraved plaque. So with that criterion, this newspaper will be due to present him with a plaque in about three more years.

It is befitting that he is the official weatherman, because he has always been the UN-official weatherman. I think it has something to do with being raised on a farm on Grandpa Ellis' place over in Bailey County.

For many years, he has gotten up in the morning and announced to our kids, "take a light jacket," or "bundle up good before you go out," or "get back in there and put on some socks," or "don't leave this house without something on your head," etc., etc.

When our oldest child, Laura Ellis (now Laura Valentine), left home to go to college, she would get up each morning and ask her roommate, Joan Clements (now Joan Linderman), "what's the weather going to be like today so I'll know what to wear?" Whereupon Joan would reply, "What are you asking me for? Do I look like the weatherman?"

My official weatherman quite frequently goes out in the back yard and yells epitaphs up to the sky. His favorite is, "Rain, damn ya', rain!" That's one of Tucker Yellendell's lines from the Palo Duro Canyon TEXAS play, in case you thought it sounded familiar. Bill mostly gets a lot of response from barking dogs. He sure doesn't get any response from the sky.

We have a couple of weird-looking pieces of equipment out in the yard that we get to mow around. Then there is a digital readout thing in the house which records temperature highs and lows. Last winter we sat in our nice warm kitchen watching the temperatures steadily dropping. There were several days when it was a lot more interesting than watching television.

The other piece of equipment out in the yard looks like a small rocket launcher but it is (HA!) a rain gauge. The only thing it has collected for 35 of the past 36 days has been some dust and several dead bug corpses.

As of this writing, we have received just .13 inch of rain for the month of April, which is supposed to produce "April showers."

The moisture for March and April combined amounts to only .36 inch, Bill says, with just 1.33 inches for the first four months of 1989. Since the latter part of 1988 was light on moisture, the area, as anyone who farms is well aware, is woefully dry.

There is a tradition that if you write something about the weather and plan to publish it in the paper, by the time it gets printed and out on the newsstands, the weather will do something different, just to prove you wrong. So be it!

My daddy was also an unofficial weatherman. He was raised on a farm in the Ozarks. Grandpa Stone's place was located on the state line between Missouri and Arkansas.

He used to check the twigs on the trees, the bug holes in the ground, and the wooliness of the caterpillars. He'd look for such things as whether the cows were standing with their backs to the wind, whether small animals were burrowing or heading for high ground. He'd check a lot of other stuff that I didn't pay any attention to. Then he would announce what the weather was going to do.

I guess being around that weatherman stuff all the time sort of grows on you. After all, I grew up and married a weatherman.

Reduction Told For Elec. Rate

Beginning this week, Texas retail customers of Southwestern Public Service Company (SPS) who live outside city limits will receive on their bills a credit related to a 4.3 per cent reduction in electric rates.

"These customers have been billed at the new, lower rate since December," said Jerry Dillon, SPS Group Manager of Rates and Regulation. "On April 19, the Public Utility Commission of Texas (PUCT) finalized the lower rate. This decrease was made possible primarily by lower federal income tax rates on corporations and SPS's ability to hold down other costs."

The electric-rate decrease was first agreed to by SPS, the PUCT staff and others on July 8, 1988. The finalization of the rate allows SPS to credit customers' bills as though the new rate had been in effect beginning July 8.

"The credit will be based on the actual amount of electricity each customer used between July 8 and the date interim lower rates began," Dillon said. "These one-time credits total \$3.4 million and average about \$13 for a residential customer outside city limits."

SPS's Texas retail customers inside city limits received a 3.1 per

cent rate reduction on March 28, 1988. They soon should receive an additional 1.2 per cent reduction to match the amount of decrease for customers outside city limits. They also will receive a credit as if the additional reduction had been in effect since July 8.

"When the cities approved the rate reduction last year, we planned that if the PUCT approved a larger decrease, SPS would match the decrease for customers inside city limits," Dillon said. "We expect to implement the additional decrease in each of the 74 affected cities within the next 60 days, with a one-time credit to follow shortly thereafter."

The staggered effective dates are the result of the regulatory process in Texas, in which cities regulate rates within city limits and the PUCT regulates rural rates.

"When it's all said and done," Dillon said, "rates inside and outside city limits will be identical and all SPS's Texas retail customers will have received an average 4.3 per cent rate reduction. In all, the actions amount to a \$20.6 million reduction in SPS's Texas retail rates."

The 4.3 per cent rate reduction which has been in effect equals a decrease in the monthly electric bill of \$3.84, from \$73.51 to \$69.67 for a residential customer who uses 1,000 kilowatt hours of electricity.

Weather Remains Warm-Windy

Weather in the Friona area continued to be warm and windy during the past week.

High temperatures reached into the 90s two days, and topped out at 89 on two others.

A cool front had lowered the temperature to a brisk 38 degrees on Friday morning, lowest reading since April 15, and the highs for the weekend were expected to be considerably lower than they have been lately.

Thursday's high had leveled off at 76 degrees, and the mercury was expected to only climb into the 60s on Saturday.

Chieftains Compete In Regional Track

For the most part, it has been a highly successful sports year for senior Cody Burney.

And the Chieftain star will quickly admit that it doesn't hurt to be a little lucky, either.

After first failing to qualify for the regional meet in his favorite track event, the high jump, Burney got new life this week when Dimmitt's Coby Moke came up with an injury and was forced to withdraw from the event.

Burney had placed third in the district meet, having probably his worst series of jumps of the spring. Having never failed to clear 6-2 in a meet this season, Burney only made it to 5-10 in the district event.

The high jump was won by Tula's Michael Smith, who beat his season's best by a bunch at 6-6. Moke placed second at 6-0.

But Moke's injury allows Burney to compete this weekend at Odessa, and he hopes to make the most of this "second chance."

With no dominant jumper in the region, it's really "anybody's ball game" at the regional meet.

Joining Burney in the meet is Jerry Lafuente, who placed second in the 800-meter run with a time of 2:01.86.

Burney had qualified for the regional meet in the pole vault by clearing 12-0 at the district meet, but having hurt a hand in the meantime, has withdrawn from that event to concentrate on the high jump, allowing Tula's Charlie Adkins to advance.

Four vaulters cleared 12-0 at district, but Burney won the silver medal on the basis of fewer misses.

Distance runner John Edd Duke, who had started the spring strong, had to settle for a distant third place in the 3200-meter run, with a time of 11:33.34.

The Chieftains' relay teams both finished fourth. The sprinters ran a time of 45:01. Members are Marcus Reyes, Jacky Lafuente, Ismael Rocha and Jeff Stowers.

The 1600-meter team (Stowers, Rocha, Jerry and Jacky Lafuente) ran a 3:34.17.

Stowers placed fifth in the 300-meter intermediate hurdles with a

41.05 time. Rocha was fifth in the 400-meter dash at 42.48. Louis Dunnam was fifth in the shot put with a 44-8 effort and Reyes was fifth in the 100-meter dash at 11.35.

Reyes also placed sixth in the 200-meter dash with a time of 23.39, and Jacky Lafuente placed sixth in the 400-meter dash with a 53.05.

The young Chieftains finished third in the team standings with 66 points. Tula won with a whopping 197, and Dimmitt scored 146.

City Has Outage

The City of Friona, as well as those in Bovina and in the rural area for a number of miles, experienced a power outage of from 45 minutes to almost two hours last Monday afternoon.

In Friona, the power was off from about 5:15 until approximately 6:27 p.m.

A number of businesses, such as supermarkets, which depend on electricity to operate their cash registers, were obliged to close up during the outage.

Lewis McDaniel, district manager for Southwestern Public Service Co., Hereford, said the reason for the outage was somewhat of a mystery.

"Something happened at the Parmer County substation that locked the line down," McDaniel said.

It had been just over a year--April 9, 1988, to be exact--since the area experienced a similar outage.

In the power break of 1988, a racoon was blamed for causing a short circuit that caused power to be off from 11 p.m. until 12:45 a.m.

60 YEARS AGO--APRIL 26, 1929

Friona was visited last Saturday by what was perhaps the most costly fire in its history, when the immense piles of grain heads and ear corn in the Doggett Grain Company's yard caught fire. Wind swept the fire from the northwest corner of the yard to the south, and soon the entire yard, consisting of three city blocks, was in flames. Estimates put the loss at not less than \$12,000.

Dedication services for the new St. Teresa's Catholic Church will be held Sunday, April 22, at the church, located in the northern part of the city.

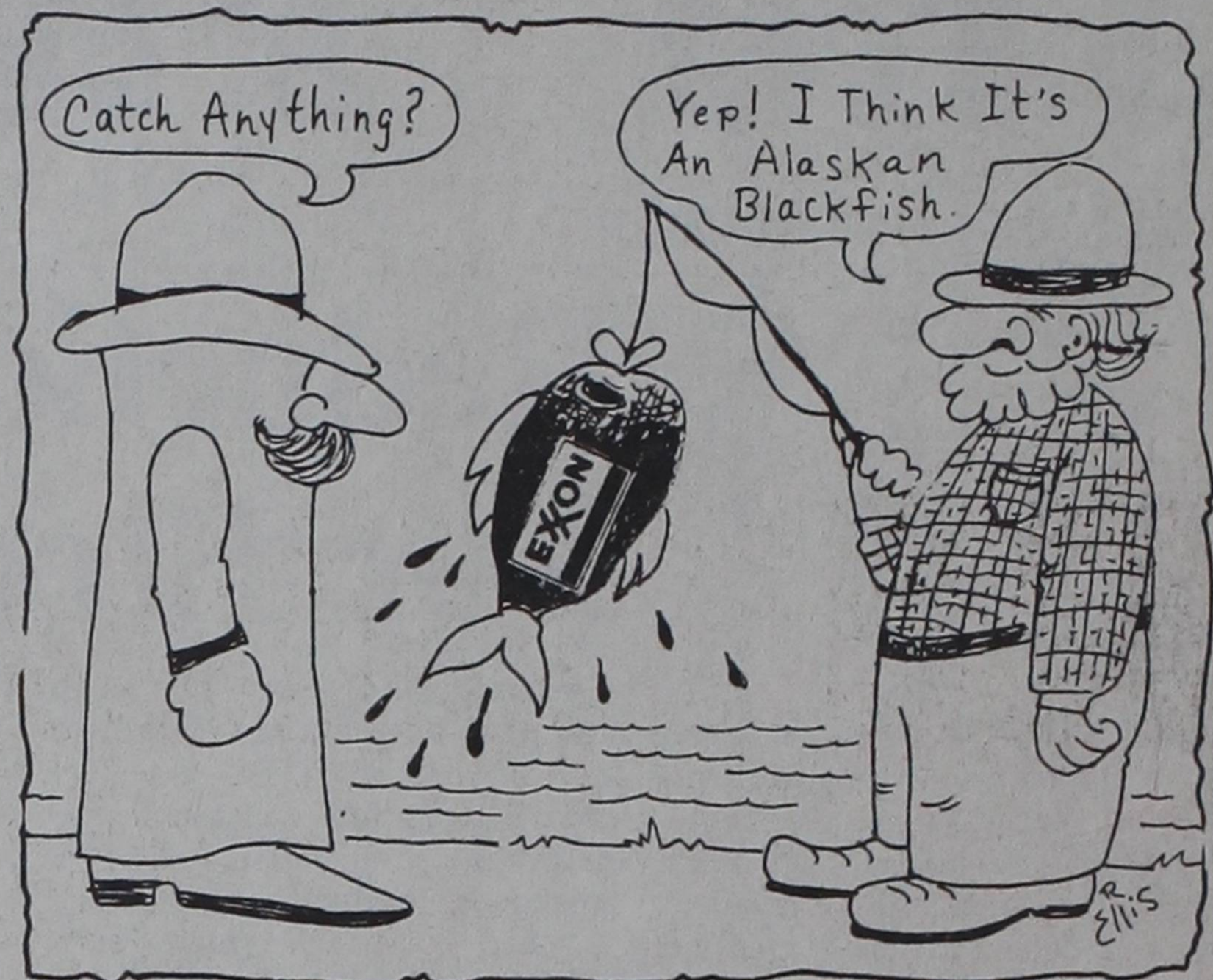

Salesman Confesses

Claims newspaper is best salesman

On Monday, Jules Wintner, owner of a local retail establishment, confessed his job as a salesman was obsolete due to the impact of newspaper advertising. Wintner, in an exclusive interview, said sales were made in the local paper instead of in the store.

"Sure, we get a chance for additional sales," Wintner commented, "but the newspaper has become our best salesman." Wintner reported that consumers name the local newspaper as their usual source of "Best Buy" information, 10 times more than radio or television. This conforms with a recent Consumer Data Service report that indicated 60% of the consumers seek "Best Buy" information from the newspaper versus only 6% for radio and 7% for television.

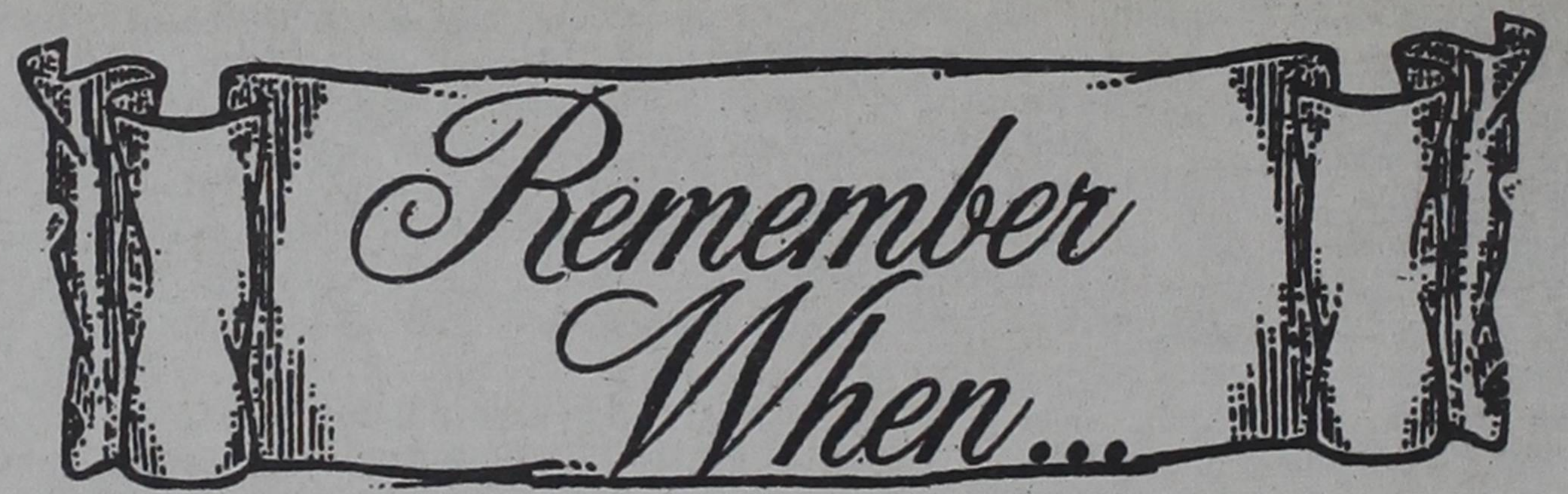
Wintner later remarked that because the newspaper is read by all Texans, regardless of income, his business was able to sell both upper end products as well as value priced items. "No matter what we're selling, we get good response in the newspaper," he said. "In fact, the more expensive the product, the better our response seems to be." This fact is substantiated in a survey by the Texas Newspaper Advertising Bureau that documented readership of the newspaper increases as income increases. In the survey, almost 75% of Texans with incomes exceeding \$50,000 a year read

the newspaper. "My job has become redundant," Wintner admitted. "Used to be I had to really sell each customer, but now I'm just an order taker." Asked what he intended to do now that the newspaper was doing most of the selling, he replied, "Spend more in newspaper advertising than last year."

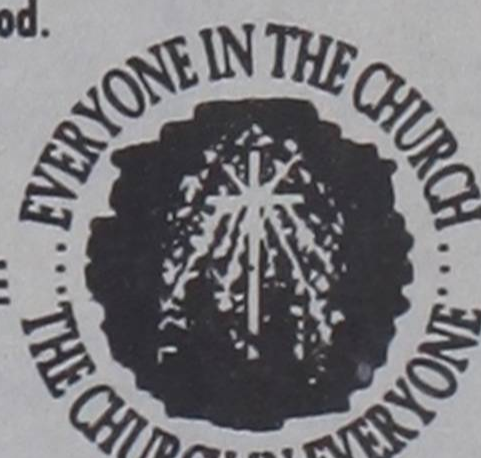
REST

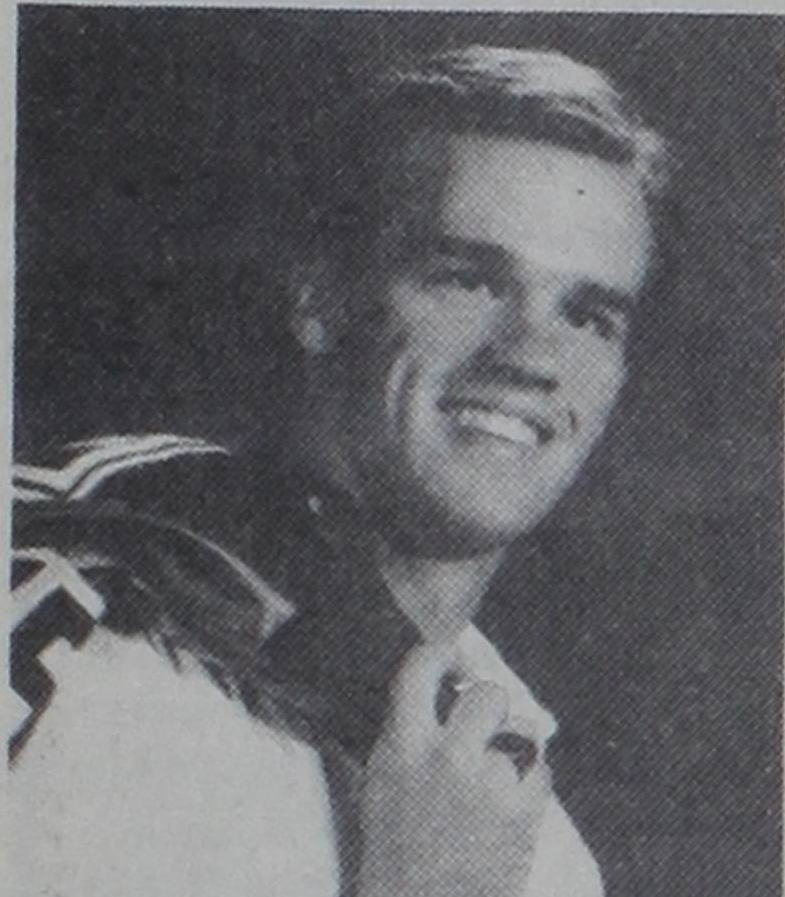



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Tips Are Given For Holding Your Mail



"If work or vacation should ever take you away from home, the Postal Service would like to remind you that there are several options available when determining what to do with your mail," says Friona Postmaster Larry Rogers.

"If you'll be away just a few days and don't have time to notify the Post Office, ask a friend or neighbor to pick up any mail from your box," Rogers says. "Accumulated mail in a box is an advertisement that the house is vacant."

"We will be glad to hold your mail at the Post Office for up to 30 days," says Postmaster Rogers. "Either stop by the office here, or ask your carrier for a hold mail card. Be sure to specify the dates which you would like your mail held, fill out the card, sign it and hand it to a clerk or your carrier a day or two before you leave."

"The Postal Service does not accept requests to hold mail for one day or requests made by telephone," Rogers says.

"When you return, you can either pick up the accumulated mail at the office, or call and ask that it be delivered the next day. Since there may be more mail than will fit in the box, someone should be available to receive it."

"If you expect to be away for more than 30 days, you should consider a temporary address change," says Rogers. "Simply pick up a change of address order form from the Post Office or your carrier and fill it out completely, including the effective date and the date you wish to terminate the order."

"This service is commonly used when families travel to vacation homes. It allows them to stay current with bills and correspondence. Again, it's a good idea to call when you return so that

normal delivery will resume. "We want to work with you to ensure uninterrupted mail service," Postmaster Rogers concluded.

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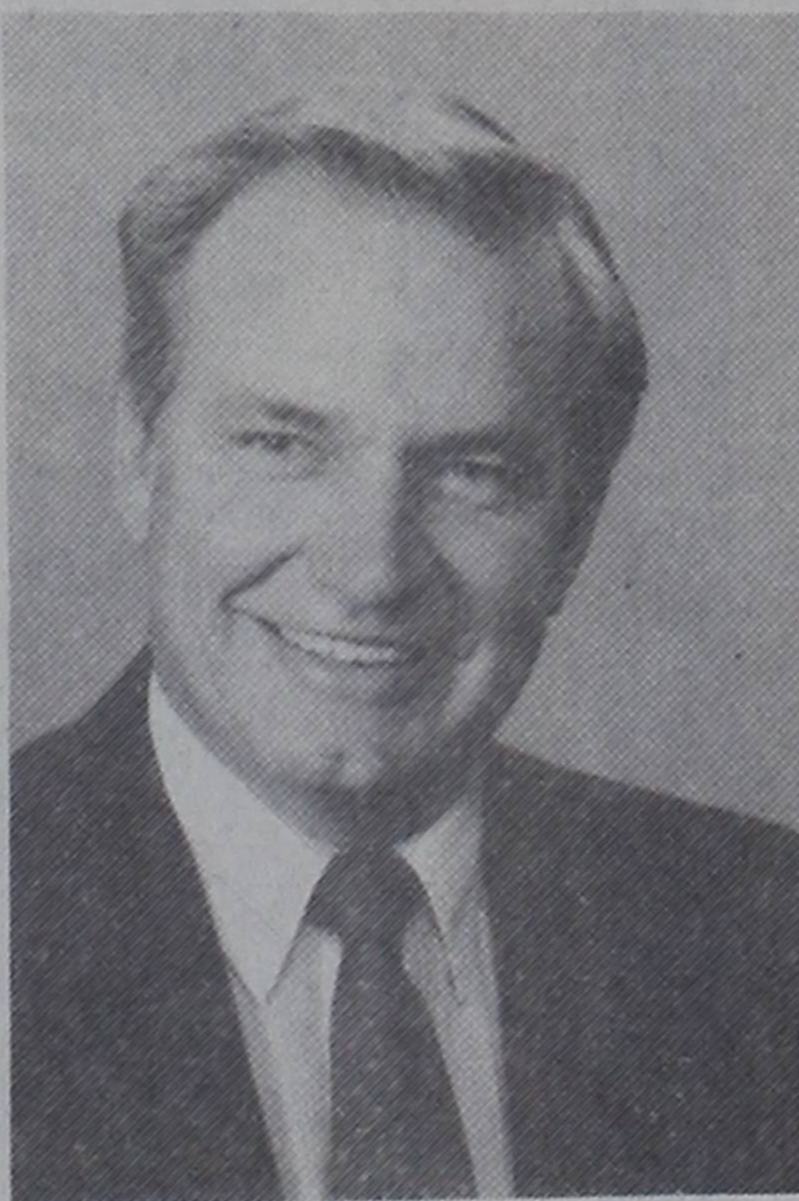

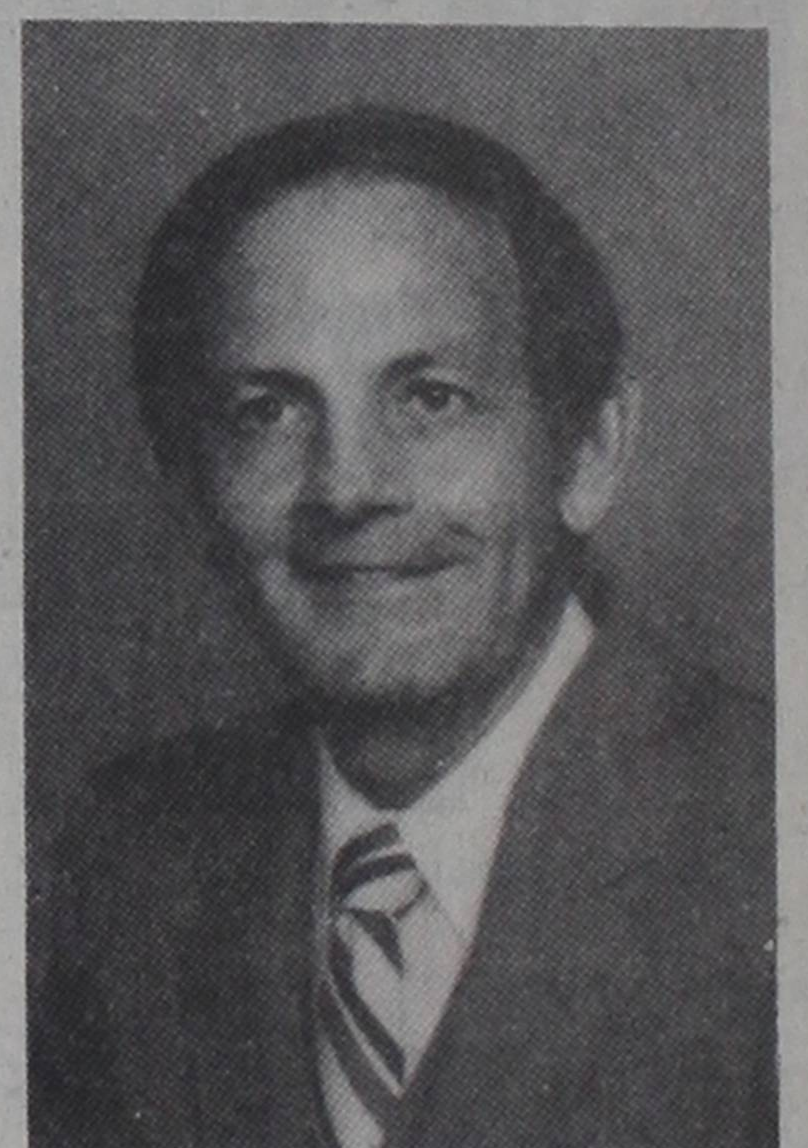


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
