

My son's friend recently returned from basic training for the National Guard. He kept saying he was glad to be home and the sincerity of his voice made the statement irrefutable. But, he also shared a pride that he had experienced something out of the ordinary. He had learned discipline and self-reliance and he was understandably pleased with himself.

We then viewed a training film that summarized his experience. Despite the film's cliched message, it was undeniably inspirational. It showed anxious, raw recruits, greeted by the drill instructor, screaming for mindless pushups and other disciplinary activities. As the viewer follows the progress of basic training, it becomes evident that boys turn to men when they realize they can do more than expected. 

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

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
Appling Completes Basic Training





PROPOSITION NO. 1 ON THE BALLOT

House Joint Resolution 102 proposes a constitutional amendment that would increase the salary of members of the legislature to onefourth of the Governor's salary and increase the salary of the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker of the House of Representatives to one-half of the Governor's salary. The annual salary of members of the legislature, the Lieutenant Governor, and the Speaker of the House of Representatives is currently \$7,200. Under this provision, the annual salary of the Lieutenant Governor and the Speaker would be \$46,716, and the annual salary of members of the legislature would be \$23,358, based on the Governor's current annual salary of \$93,432. The increase for the Speaker and the members of the legislature would take effect when the legislature convenes for its regular session in January 1991. The increase for the Lieutenant Governor would take effect when the term of that office begins in 1991. The salary increase for the Lieutenant Governor would not make members of the legislature ineligible to run for the office of

Lieutenant Governor. The proposed amendment will appear on the ballot as follows: "The constitutional amendment to limit the salary of the lieutenant governor and the speaker of the house of representatives to not more than one-half of the governor's salary and to limit the salary of a member of the legislature to not more than one-fourth of the governor's salary."

The additional bonds are to be used as follows: \$250 million of the bonds are to be used for water supply loans and facilities acquisition; \$200 million of the bonds are to be used for water quality enhancement projects; and \$50 million of the bonds are to be used for flood control. The legislature may provide that \$100 million be used for subsidized loans and grants to economically distressed areas of the state for water and wastewater facilities.
