

YOU'LL BE GLAD to know that the old traditional fairy tale dream of a "happy ending for all" is alive and well and living in the hearts of our American youth.

The editors of "Seventeen" magazine were recently successful in getting a number of teen-agers across the country to take the stereo headphones out of their ears long enough to answer some survey questions about what they expect in their future lives. The biggest majority of them, boys and girls alike, expected to fall in love, get married and raise a family. The family unit is still the single most important item in our society and I was happy to see that the dream has not faded in spite of the fact that it has taken quite a beating in the past few decades. Just getting from childhood to adulthood is no simple task in today's world. In a single day's time, 2,269 illegitimate children are born, 2,753 teenagers get pregnant, five teenagers commit suicide, 609 teenagers get a veneral disease, 988 children are abused, 110 babies die before their first birthday, 49,322 children are in juvenile-correctional public facilities, 2,989 kids see their parents get divorced, and 3,288 children run away from home. Fifty-one per cent of our population is currently involved in a divorce and by 1990 there will be more people living in second marriages than those who are living in first marriages. It is difficult, but still possible, to raise our children in an atmosphere of love in spite of awkward family situations created by divorce. It requires a great deal more dedication on the part of the parents.



One of the contest games, Lazbuddie vs Silverton, ended in a tie, so was counted "wrong" on all of the entries, since it is technically possible to pick a tie.



Attendance Emphasized **By School**

The first four weeks of October have been designated by the Texas Education Agency as the official pupil attendance reporting period and will be the basis for state funding for the 1989-90 school year.

Last year Friona received \$85,000 in additional state funds because of increased ADA during the attendance period. "We would like to encourage parents to make doctor and dental appointments after 11 a.m. if possible during the month of October," said Superintendent Hal Ratcliff. "Our district goal for 1989 is 98% attendance. Last year our attendance rate was 97%."

Attendance incentives will be in place on all four campuses for perfect attendance during the October reporting period.




