## Star Lites

IT HAS BEEN SAID that most Americans are "nervous as a cat" during the time that congress is in session. If you need a good example of why they're nervous, just read on.

Last week, the United States Congress was on the verge of passing legislation that would have had tremendous humanitarian impact, and opened the door for funds to be used to help in President Bush's War on Drugs.

But in the end, our senators and representatives showed their true colors, and underscored the fact that they're really not interested in saving taxpayers' money, especially if it means trimming one iota of their own personal "perks."

In its original legislation, congress was persuaded that in order to have money to aid children born to mothers who were drug addicts, it should stop its periodic mailing of newsletters to the congressmen's constituents.

The mailing of the newsletters, which is done at no cost to the congress, costs an estimated \$650 million per year in taxpayers' money—more than \$3.00 for every man, woman and child in America.

It was pointed out that the congressmen take up most of their newsletter space extolling their own virtues and underscoring their wonderful accomplishments. Thus, the newsletters serve as a tax-funded and on-going campaign vehicle for the elected officials.

One member of congress admitted that if the newsletter funding could be scrapped, it would be no sacrifice of any great intellectual material.

So, congress voted to do away with the newsletter funding, to make the funds available for providing for the children born to drug addicts.

But in a special night session, some members of congress, who apparently realized they were voting themselves out of one of their "freebies," began to talk their fellows into reconsidering the action.

The result was that a joint committee of congress met and re-instated the money to fund the congressional newsletters.

"It is now apparent," one observer stated, "That the first priority of this congress is its own self-preservation."

And, lest we forget, there is still the vital interest in congress to pass legislation giving themselves a hefty pay raise, in spite of the tremendous outpouring earlier this year in which voters across the country rose up as one loud voice and shouted "NO" to the greedy bunch in Washington who were about to more than double the salaries of congressmen and federal judges.

It is the opinion of most congressional observers that congress is biding its time, and just waiting for an opportune time to sneak the pay raise legislation back in—perhaps as an amendment to some bill which is extremely popular. They are hopeful to get this accomplished without bringing the matter to nearly as much attention as it did the last time around.

But, thanks to its latest escapade, the conservative element can be forewarned, and reminded to be ever vigilant, because their congress doesn't give a diddly-squat about saving the taxpayers' money, as long as they can continue to line their own pockets.

Module XI: Planning for the Future  
—Who Will Get Your Estate?

It's estimated that estate taxes affect roughly ten per cent of the population. As income and personal wealth increase in this nation, that percentage could rise.

If the joint estate of you and your spouse is approaching \$1 million, you need to begin some serious financial planning.

Although that number may appear high, you could be closer than you think. Many fail to realize an estate consists of everything one owns. That includes home, property, securities, savings, business interests and a long list of items you may never consider. Often, property, securities or a business has appreciated beyond expectations. When valued as part of an estate, they could present serious tax consequences to your heirs.

The problem could be compounded by the fact that many assets have a limited market. For example, a prospering family business without the leadership of its owner/manager could not only lose a portion of its value but also limit the number of prospective buyers. Unfortunately, the IRS does not always consider these problems when assets are appraised for estate purposes. The only time these potential problems can be effectively resolved is prior to the estate owner's death.

The first rule of any serious estate planning is to select a competent tax attorney. This does not mean letting your fingers do the walking through the telephone directory. Make certain the attorney you select is knowledgeable and current in tax law. A good starting point is to ask your respected friends and associates for recommendations. Then, after doing your homework and armed with the proper questions, arrange an interview. You may wish to interview several attorneys before making your

selection. Once that decision has been made, there are several key estate-planning questions you should explore. These vary depending on your state of residence and your wishes as to the distribution of your estate.

For example, if you plan on leaving a portion of your estate to a favorite charity or institution, charitable lead trusts and charitable remainder trusts are two options.

With a lead trust, the income is designated to a charity for a specified time and then reverts to a named beneficiary. With the remainder trust, the income first goes to a named beneficiary and is then remaindered to the charity. Both can benefit your estate, but neither should be attempted without your full understanding and the counsel of an attorney.

If you're more family oriented and wish your estate to pass to your descendants, this can be accomplished through insurance trusts.

With an unfunded trust, the life insurance policy is irrevocably transferred and the premiums paid by the trustee. With a funded trust, there's a transfer of the policy and enough money or income-producing assets to pay the premiums.

Restrictions apply to both of these plans, so ask your attorney to explain them in detail.

Most people who have accumulated large estates have worked hard to do so. In fact, many times they've worked so hard to accumulate wealth that they've neglected to maintain it. If you're one of these people, some time dedicated to serious financial and estate planning could mean the difference between leaving your estate to those who deserve it or letting the government take the lion's share and distribute the remains as they see fit.

It's your choice—at least for the time being.

Here is the checklist that any qualified heating professional will follow:

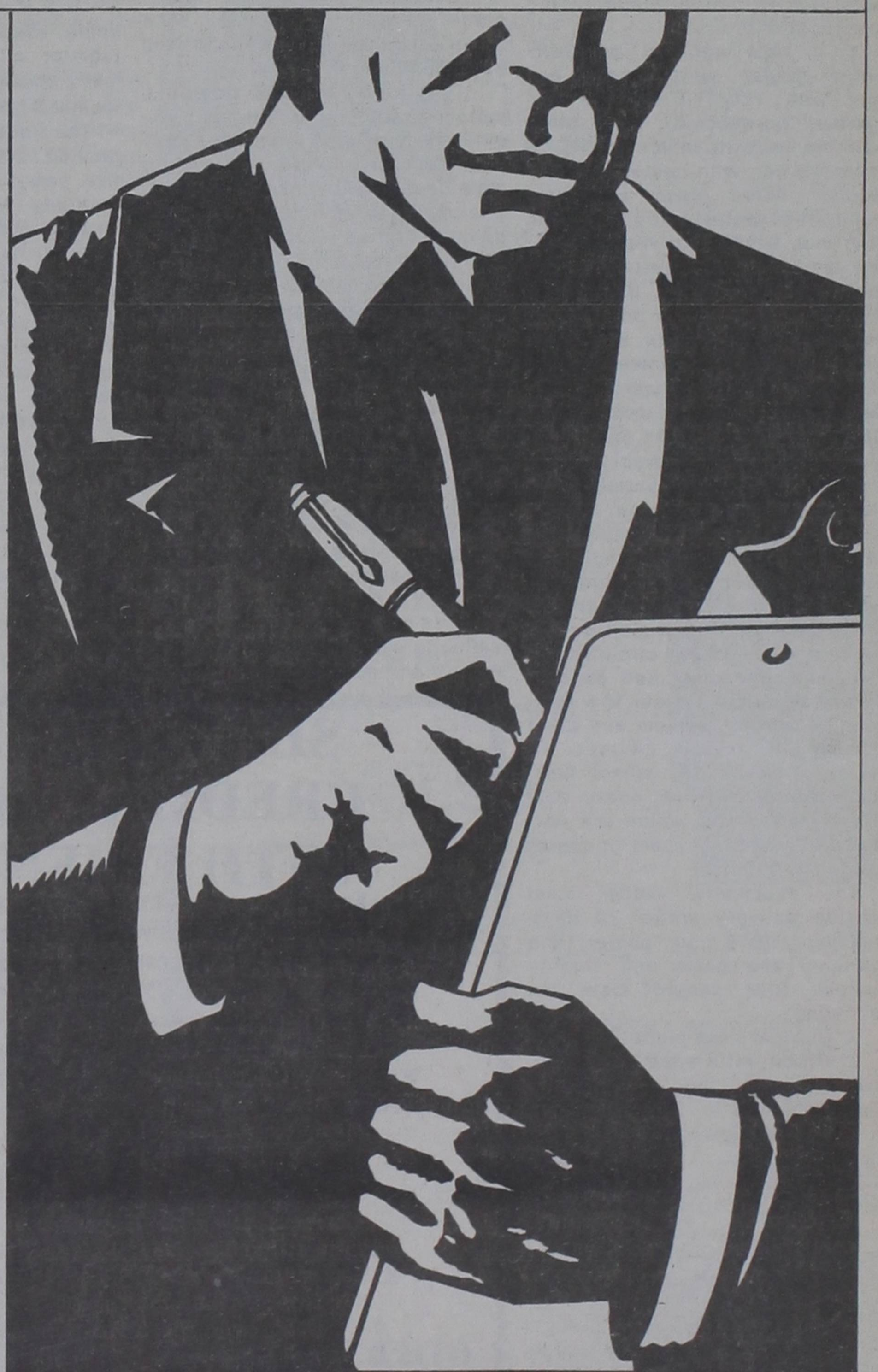
- ✓ Check the exhaust vent for rust and corrosion.
- ✓ Clean and replace the air filter.

- ✓ Light the pilot light.
- ✓ Perform a carbon monoxide test.
- ✓ Conduct a complete safety inspection.
- ✓ Be certain there are no materials of any kind stored in the furnace closet.

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2. Keep young children from playing on the floor furnace.
3. During heating season, keep open any door between the floor furnace and the room where the thermostat is located.
4. Do not put a rug, carpet, or piece of furniture over a floor furnace. Keep it uncovered at all times during the heating season.

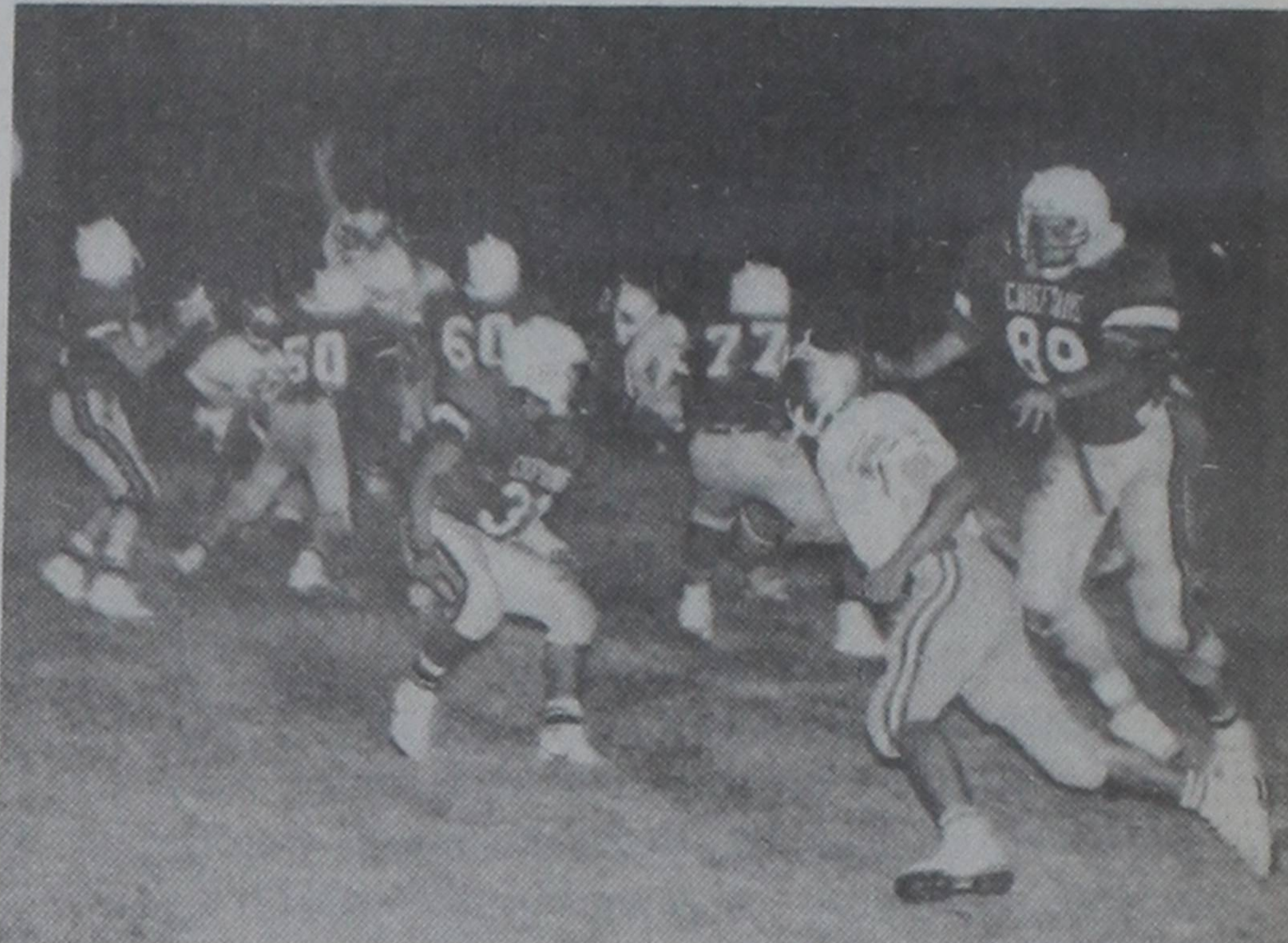

# Wolves Spoil FHS Homecoming, 14-3

For the most part, the Friona Chieftains played a good game against Dalhart in their Homecoming game last Friday night. The Chieftain defense was beaten on only two plays, but that turned out to be enough for the visiting Wolves, who spoiled the Chieftains' homecoming with a 14-3 win at Chieftain Field. The Wolves came out passing, throwing the ball five times in their first nine offensive plays. That was a perfect set-up for their tenth play, when quarterback Koby Koelzer handed to fullback Derrick Brady on a draw play. With the defense backed off for a pass, the 130-pound senior, who is a cousin of the Chieftains' Curtis Brady, raced 78 yards up the east sidelines, giving the visitors a 7-0 lead with 6:17 expired in the opening period. Dalhart penalties helped the Chieftains to a pair of first downs in the opening period, but Friona couldn't capitalize. In fact, the Chiefs more than returned the favor with a high snap to punter Andre Duran, who proceeded to shank a punt for a net of only 45 yards, giving the Wolves the ball at their own 43-yard-line. Two plays later, runningback Ricky Galdean rambled 43 yards for Dalhart's second score. The kick gave the visitors a 14-0 lead with four seconds left in the opening period. Brian Brogden hit Jeff Stowers on a 17-yard passing gain from the Friona 45 to the Dalhart 38. But a few minutes later Brogden was sacked for a 10-yard loss on third down, and Friona had to punt from their own 48. The Chieftains got another break, when the punt receiver fumbled the ball, and Anthony Padilla recovered for Friona at the Dalhart 15. But once again the Chieftain offense couldn't respond. Brogden hit Mike Sutter over the middle on a pass play, but Sutter couldn't hold the ball. On fourth down, kicker Mike Scott came in and booted his second perfect field goal of the season, this one from 33 yards out, to get Friona on the scoreboard. The score became 14-3 with 7:25 left in the half. Unfortunately for Friona, this was to be all of the scoring for the evening. The next time Friona had the ball, Duran burst through the line for a 12-yard gain, but a clipping penalty against the Chieftains forced a punt. Once again, Duran got off a high kick, and Dalhart had the ball at the Friona 30. The Chieftain defense dug in, and the Wolves attempted a field goal, which never got "head high." Early in the third quarter, things looked good for the Chieftains. Duran ran nine yards to the Dalhart 45. On the next play, the 191-pound tailback appeared to have his longest gain of the season, a nice 25-yard run, only to have the

play rubbed out by a holding penalty. This led to a quarterback sack and a Friona punt. Duran had gains of eight, seven and seven yards later in the game, but the main drawback for Friona once again was its inability to make a sustained drive. Friona fans had a hope late in the third quarter, when Duran's booming kick was muffed by the receiver, but the ball rolled out of bounds at the Dalhart five. In the fourth quarter, Brogden completed a pass of 14 yards to Sutter and Jeff Stowers winged a 29-yard gainer to Scott Houston, a play that set the Chieftains up at the Dalhart 16.

But a holding penalty, three bad passes and a sack foiled his scoring opportunity. "I thought the kids played hard. There were just a couple of plays that were bad, and other than that I thought we played a pretty decent game," said Friona coach Tommy Moss. On the 78-yard run, Moss said, "We were stunting on that play. If he (the ball carrier) had gone one way, we would have wiped him out, but he went the other, and scored instead."
