Indian Summer has definitely been in vogue in the Friona area this week, as warm, dry weather has favored the local area for the second straight week.

The mercury climbed to 91 degrees Thursday afternoon, the second time that the high temperature had hit the 90-degree mark during October, and forecasters were saying it might do that again on Friday and/or Saturday.

The mornings continue to be cool, as the low temperature was registered at 43 degrees on three different mornings during the week.

Meanwhile, the warm, dry weather has facilitated harvest activities to the point that the corn harvest is considered "over the hump."

"We're virtually through with the harvest," said Howard Fleming of Hub Grain on Thursday. Fleming said that from all appearances, the 1989 crop was

"not quite as good" as the 1988 corn, at least in that area.

The area's cotton crop should be benefitting from the prolonged warm spell and lack of a freeze. "I think the weather is helping the late cotton. That cold snap we had in September may affect the crop, but it's too early to tell for sure," said Jerry Butman of Friona Farmers Co-op Gin.

However, some of the cotton has matured to the point that farmers are spraying, so as to kill the leaves and hasten the opening of the bolls for harvesting purposes.

Local Farmer Has Ornamental Corn

Ken Jordan is in the process of harvesting a very colorful crop this fall, and is hoping that market demands will prove that it was a wise decision.

Last spring, Jordan planted four acres of Indian corn, and he now has a trailer-full of the brightly-colored ornamental corn in his barn just south of Friona.

The special corn, which is mainly used during the latter part of the year for festive decorations, has done right well from a standpoint of growth and development.

Jordan said that the corn plants are somewhat smaller than regular corn.

The harvest and preparation of the Indian corn requires somewhat more labor than harvesting regular

corn, since the ears must be hand-pulled and then shucked.

Jordan has marketed his ornamental corn to vendors from here to Amarillo. Locally, the ears are available at Hometown Hardware. The price is \$2.25 for a group of four ears.

Jordan also planted a small acreage of "blue corn," which is a food corn and is being processed at several area locations.

He said that the yield on the blue corn is only about 65 per cent of that for yellow corn, due to pollination difficulties.

He is growing his blue corn for seed, and will market it to Kelley Green Seed Company at Muleshoe.

"This has been quite an experience," said the young area farmer.

Good Attendance Can Mean \$\$ For Friona Schools

The Friona I.S.D. Board of Trustees met in its regular scheduled monthly session on October 9. Highlights of the meeting included:

1. The board gave permission for the 1990 Junior-Senior Banquet to be held at the Hereford Country Club.

2. The board cast its ballots for the Parmer County Appraisal District Board of Directors as follows:

Floyd Reeve 672 votes

Pat Fleming 672 votes

3. The board heard a report from the committee appointed to study the possibility of adding baseball to the athletic program at Friona High School. The board

voted to table the discussion on the baseball program at the present time.

4. Superintendent Hal Ratcliff reported enrollment on September 29, 1989 stood at 1,287 compared to 1,286 last year.

5. Attendance during the first week of the reporting period was outstanding. Friona Elementary School has the highest per cent of attendance at 98.76%. The overall percentage for the entire school district the first week was 97.7%.

"If our attendance stays at this level, it could mean as much as \$60,000 in state revenue for the school, and that would be a saving of around four cents on our tax rate for next year," said Superintendent Hal Ratcliff.

Chiefs In 2-3A Game

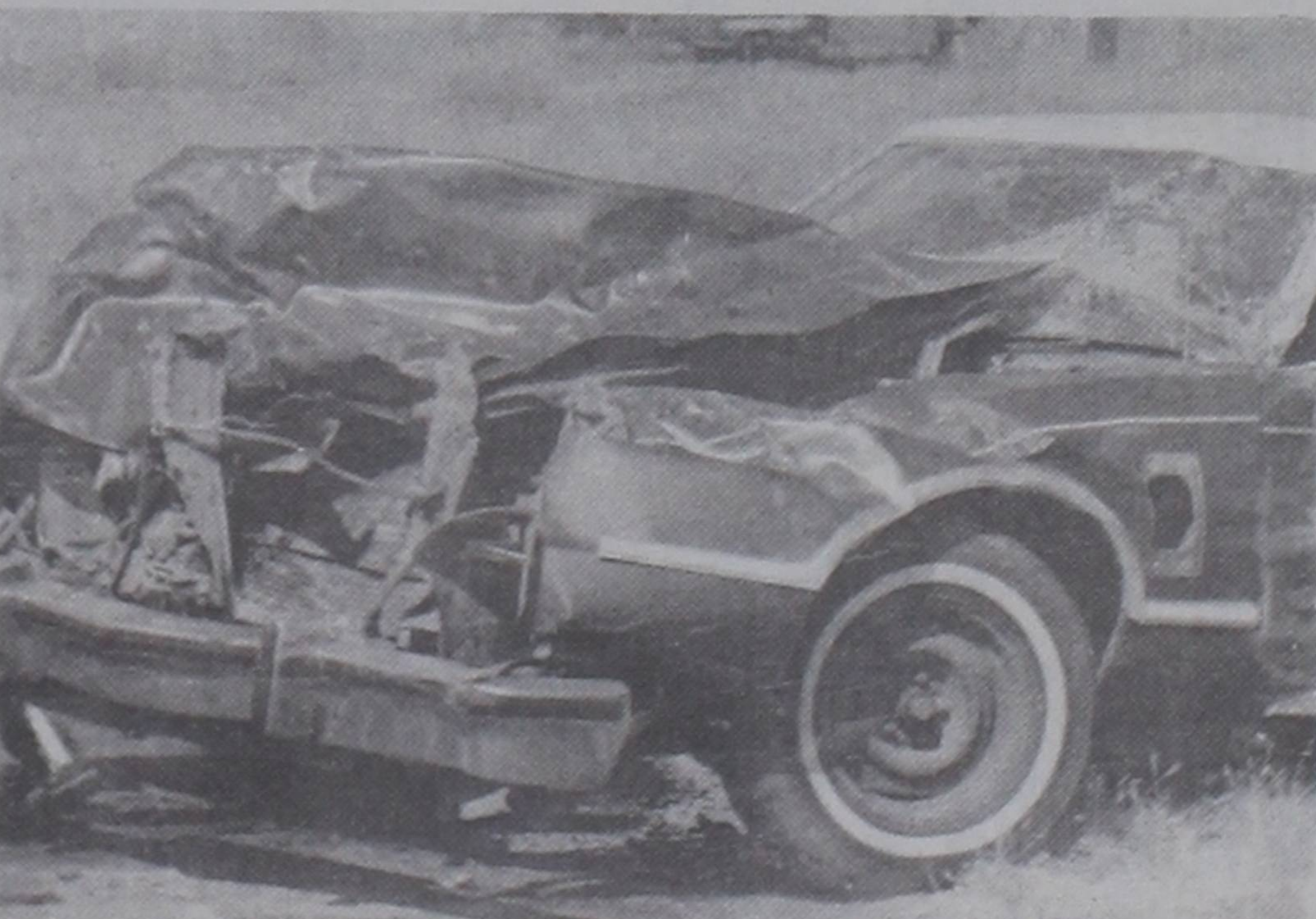
The FHS Chieftains were hosting the Littlefield Wildcats in their first district football game of the season Friday.

"EMOTIONS"

Improving Self-Soothing

After a recent presentation, a lady came up to talk with me. When she told me how much she enjoyed my speech, I replied, "Thank you. I know you enjoyed it because I kept focusing in on your sparkling eyes during the presentation." She quickly responded, "It must have been my contacts. No. Wait a minute... thank you."

She had resonated on one of the points I had made in the presentation. I had told the audience when someone praises you, say "thank you." Don't say something like, "Ah, shucks, I was just lucky," or "I usually don't do that well," or some other self-deprecating remark. Learn to take praise appropriately. When you rebuff praise, not only are you demeaning yourself but, in a subtle way, you are rejecting the one who praised you.

We humans are a weird race. We'll do just about anything to receive praise and then when we get it we reject it. For some reason, most of us feel awkward when we receive praise. Receiving praise, we blush, look down at the floor and mumble a half apology, as if we had done something wrong. The only correct response, of course, is a direct twinkle in the eye, a beaming smile and words, "Thank

you, I really appreciate that." Receiving praise graciously is an appropriate assertive response that affirms our self-worth and makes the praising person feel good, also.

Giving appropriate praise takes practice, too. Randolph K. Sanders, Ph.D., in his book, *Speak Up: Christian Assertiveness* states, "Giving people compliments is one of the most important communication skills in life." Compliments motivate and bring people closer together.

Perhaps one reason we have difficulty receiving compliments comes from society's tendency to criticize rather than applaud. Cynicism, criticism and complaints seem to be the norm. Dr. Sanders reported a therapy session in which a very talented young girl was blighted by criticism from her mother. After a time, Dr. Sanders asked the mother to step out of the room and as soon as the door was closed, the daughter broke down sobbing, "If she'd just once tell me that I did something right then I would at least know I was on the right track."

The daughter was correct: the mother was reinforcing bad behavior and confusion by dwelling on the negatives. Compliments give us feedback about our good behavior and tell us when we're "on the right track."

Dr. Sanders points out that good compliments are specific. For example, rather than telling your secretary, "You're doing a great job," be more specific by saying something such as, "I really like the way you're handling my travel arrangements. You scheduled the most convenient flight, arranged for me to be picked up at the airport, and made certain that I had a guaranteed late arrival at the hotel. Your attention to detail makes my travel worry-free." This powerful compliment expresses both general support and clear feedback, allowing the secretary to understand your exact expectations.

Here are some more examples of good feedback compliments:

"I really liked your sermon. You gave three specific, well-illustrated points, and you finished in fifteen minutes. We'll beat the Baptists to Luby's today, and I'll clearly remember your major themes."

"I really liked the way you reached over and hugged me at the football game tonight. It made me feel strong and powerful and reinforced my wanting to take care of you."

Praise galvanizes good behavior. Consciously watch for times when you can give others sincere, direct and specific compliments while responding to praise in positive ways and watch harmony and enthusiasm grow around you.

60 YEARS AGO—SEPT. 27, 1929

The Santa Fe Grain Company has this week begun the removal of the old warehouse on its property on Main Street just north of the railroad siding. This is one of the oldest buildings in Friona and was at one time, located near the center of the city from which place it was moved to the location above mentioned, and since the organization of Santa Fe Grain Company, the building has been used as a storage room for feeds, salt and other commodities handled by the company.

55 YEARS AGO—SEPT. 28, 1934

Costly fumbles prevented the Chiefs from dedicating the new Chieftain Stadium with a win last Friday when they played the Adrian Highs to a scoreless tie.

The contract for carrying the mail over the newly established Star Route from Friona to Summerfield and return, which is advertised to begin on October 1, was let to Lloyd Pope, son of Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Pope, he being the lowest bidder for the contract.

50 YEARS AGO—SEPT. 29, 1939

Another very disastrous farm fire occurred in the Friona territory about 2:30 a.m. Saturday morning, when the barn on the G.L. Mingus farm was destroyed as was the garage and the family car and a truck which were in it. A poultry house with a large number of chickens and a grainery with about 2,000 bushels of wheat, also burned.

The Parmer County Commissioner's Court voted unanimously Monday to allow discounts of one to three per cent on county and common school taxes for the current school year, in accordance with a bill passed by the last session of the legislature.

45 YEARS AGO—SEPT. 29, 1944

Mrs. G.H. Brock, who lives in the Parmerton community, was injured when a glass jar exploded as she removed it from her pressure cooker. A piece of glass cut a gash on her hand, and several stitches were required to close the wound. She escaped with only slight burns about her ankles.

Late Rally Falls Short As Hart Wins, 15-13

A frantic fourth-quarter rally last Friday wasn't enough to save the Friona Chieftains from their fifth season loss, as the team dropped a 15-13 decision to the visiting Hart Longhorns.

As has been the case in earlier games, the Chieftains started rather slowly, giving up a pair of first-half touchdowns, then gained momentum as the game went along, and outplayed their opponents throughout the second half.

Friona's momentum switch actually started following Hart's second touchdown, which came with 7:16 left in the second quarter.

The 'Horns had scored the go-ahead touchdown when Friona failed twice to field a Longhorn punt and found themselves backed up to their own eight-yard line. A 36-yard pass from Jay Davis to Carlos Velasquez got the visitors on the scoreboard.

Friona's bad luck was evident, as the Longhorns got a bad snap on the PAT try, and instead of one point, turned it into two for an 8-0 lead.

The Longhorns drove 62 yards following a Friona punt for their second score. Craig Skiles crashed over from six yards out and Hart had a 15-0 lead.

That's when Friona decided to get their offense untracked. A seven-yard run by Jeff Stowers and Scott Houston's four-yard gain on a reverse handoff gave Friona its second first down of the game.

Stowers gave the team another first down with a run, then hauled in a pass from Brian Brogden for 19 yards as the Chieftains set up

shop on the Hart 16-yard line with 1:28 left in the half.

Andre Duran and Berny Trevino took turns carrying the ball, and the Chiefs made a first and goal at the Hart six with 48 seconds left on the clock.

But on first down, as Trevino was headed for the end zone, a Hart defender hit Trevino a lick, the ball popped into the air, and Hart recovered.

Friona had driven 66 yards with no points to show for their efforts, and this proved to be the difference in the game.

Houston got things going for the Chiefs in the second half by recovering a Friona squib kickoff at the Hart 34.

But three plays gained only to the 30, and on fourth down, Mike Scott's 47-yard field goal attempt was just beyond his range.

The second time the Chieftains had the ball after that possession, they made a scoring drive.

Friona started on their own 21-yard line. Sophomore Curtis Brady, playing for the injured Trevino, ripped off a 10-yard gain. Stowers ran 16 yards, and a personal foul penalty against the 'Horns helped Friona's cause.

Brady rambled 19 yards around right end to set Friona up first and goal at the Hart five, and on the next play he carried over for his first varsity touchdown. The score became 15-6 with 10:27 left in the game.

Friona went for two points, but a running attempt by Stowers was stopped short.

The Chieftains held, forced a punt, and then scored on their shortest drive of the season.

The Chiefs, who had been avoiding opponent punts all game (and season) as though it was illegal to catch them, let alone run them back, finally turned an opponent's kick into a plus.

Duran fielded the punt at his own 35, found a wave of blockers on the west sidelines, and by the time he crossed the 50-yard line, had a full head of steam.

He cut back at about the 40-yard line, and had his sights set on the end zone flag at the southeast corner of Chieftain Field. But a Hart defender had the angle on Duran and finally hauled him down at the Friona two.

However, Duran's brilliant 63-yard kick return had put the Chiefs in business.

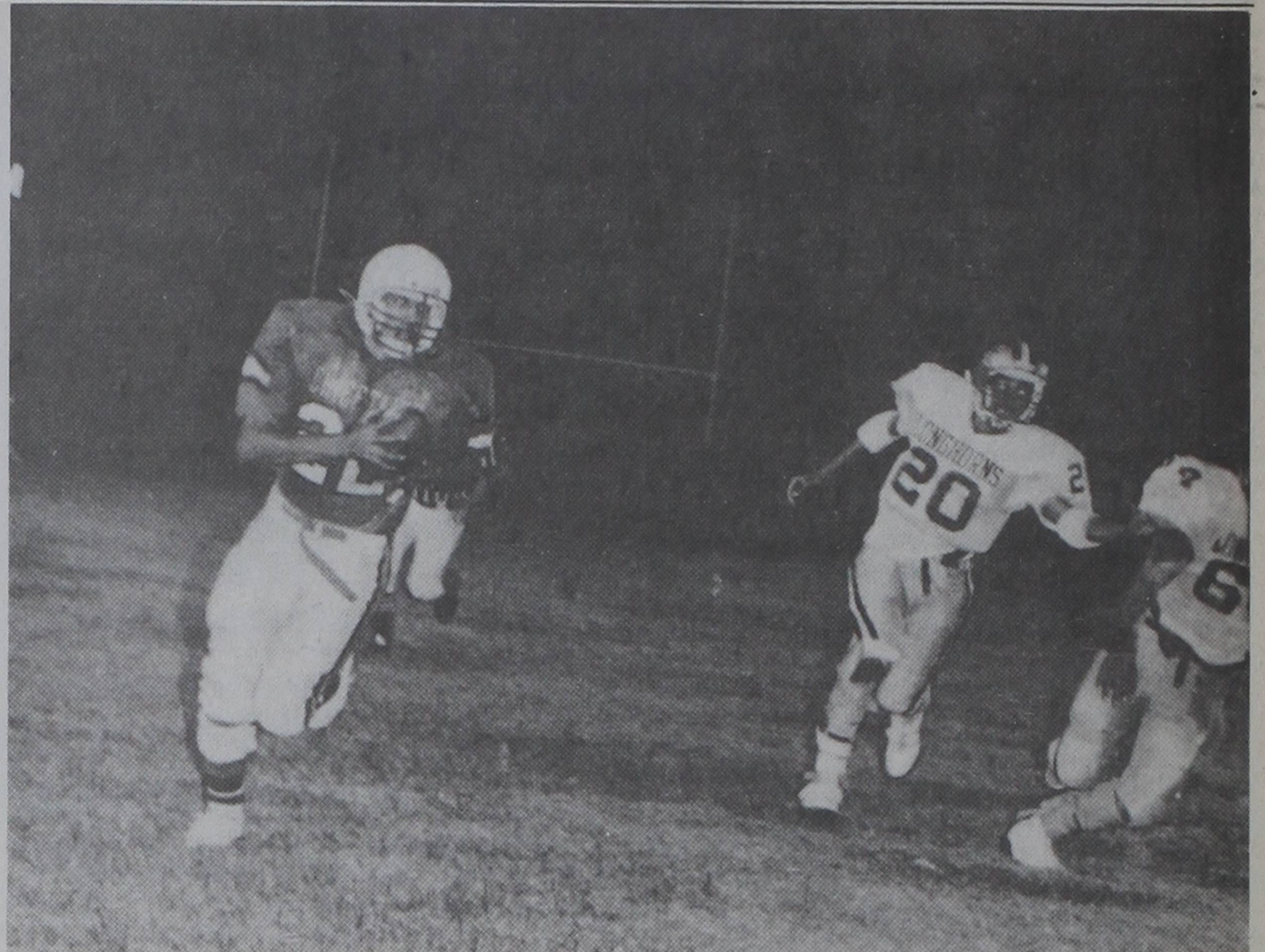
Two cracks at the line later and Stowers had a touchdown. Mike Scott's kick split the uprights, and the score was 15-13, with 7:51 left in the game. Friona's two touchdowns had come only 2:34 of clock time apart.

Hart awakened its sleeping offense for a pair of first downs in the late going, just enough to use up a lot of clock time. Friona also made a bad decision on accepting a penalty against Hart, and when they got the ball back, there was only 30 seconds left in the game.

Stowers passed for an 18-yard gain to Houston with just 11 seconds left, and Scott, the 145-pound junior kicker, tried another 45-yard field goal, which was just short to the left.

Friona led in first downs, 15-9, in total yardage, 231-160, but lost out on their bid to crack into the win column.

The win was only the third for Hart in the series, which has been "off and on" since 1955. The Chieftains hold five wins overall.

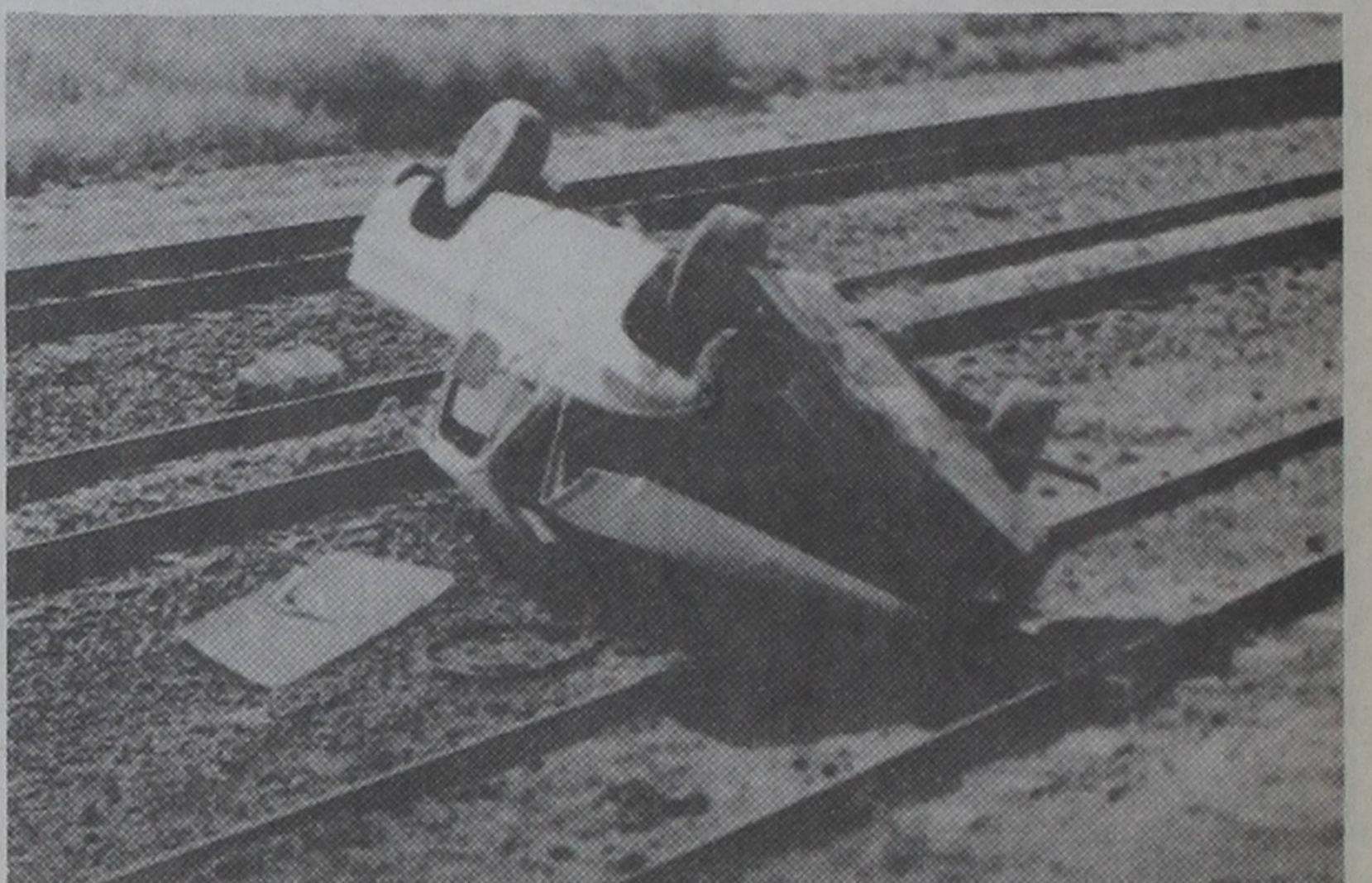

Fire Department Adds Equipment

The Friona Volunteer Fire Department recently bolstered its equipment resources with the acquisition of a truck through the Rural Community Fire Protection (RCFP) program of the Texas Forest Service, the state forestry agency. VFD officials plan to use the five-ton, fifth-wheel truck to pull a trailer/tanker it obtained from the TFS earlier this year.

The department's latest truck was acquired by the TFS and made available to the VFD at no cost. Cost-sharing aid on compressed air foam system units, water pumper units, and trucks also is available to qualified VFDs through the RCFP program.

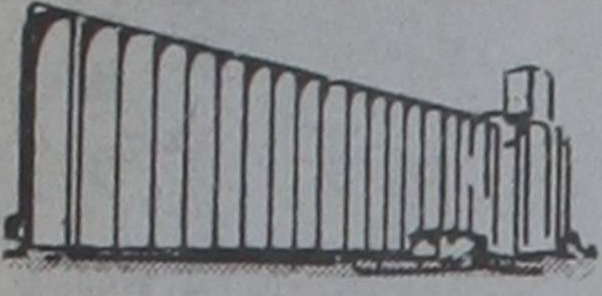
RCFP funds have aided the placement of over 1,600 trucks, WEPS units, water units and other fire apparatus since the program began in 1973. In addition, rural fire fighters have gotten discounts of around 20-30 per cent on purchases of over \$450,000 worth of bunker gear, Nomex clothing, fire rakes and flaps, and backfire torches obtained through the RCFP Fire-Safe Fund.

Thanks to its TFS contacts, the Friona VFD gained assistance toward the acquisition of a truck and trailer to use as a water tanker unit. Area residents stand to gain additional fire protection as soon as the truck is fully rigged out and operational.

"The Friona Fire Department offers thanks to the people of our area for their support during the recent fund raisings. In addition to repairs and remodeling of the water tanker unit, the Fire Department plans to add two mobile radios with greater communications capabilities. Plans are also under consideration to get new emergency overhead lights for some of the vehicles," said a spokesman for the department.

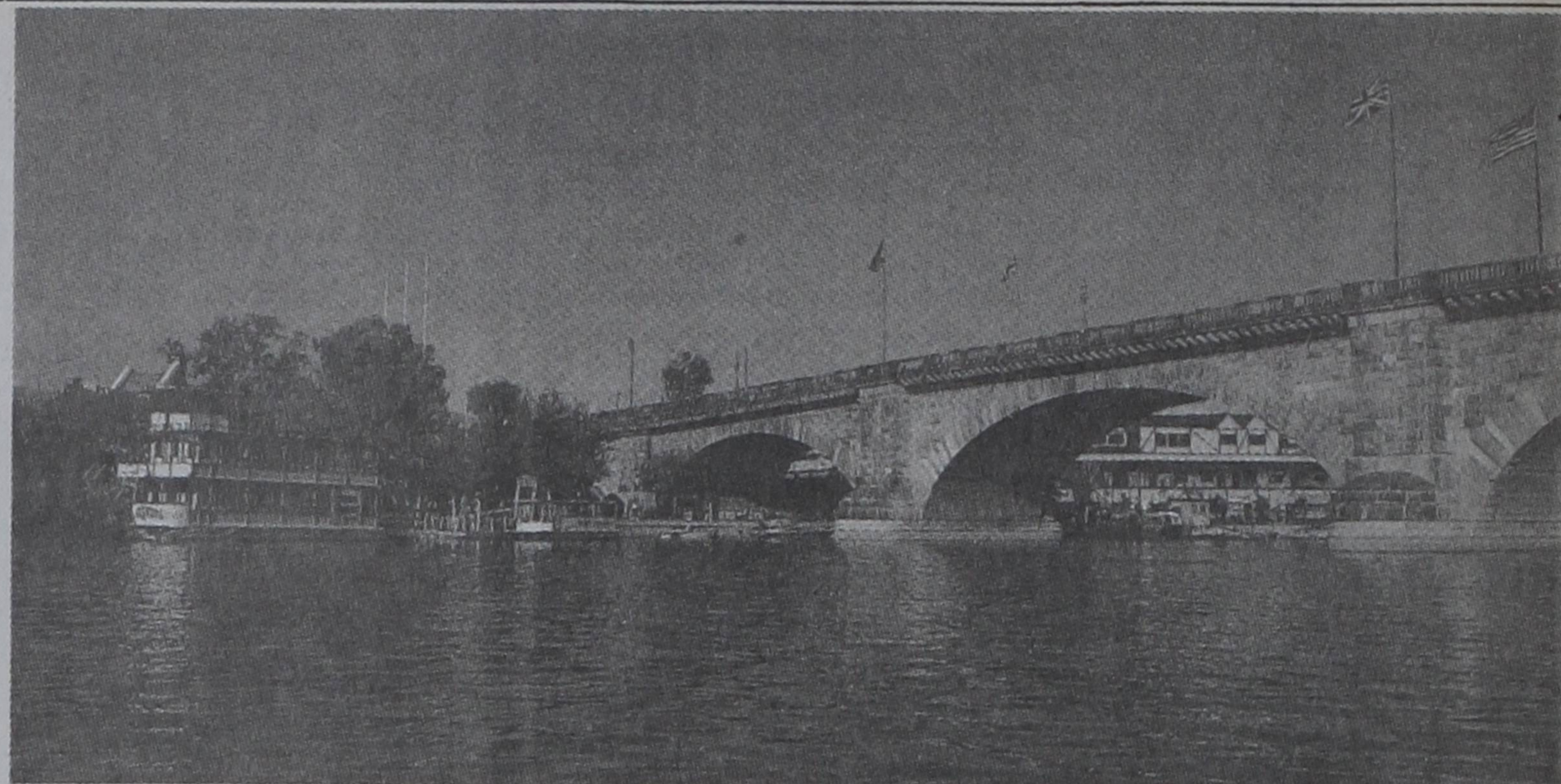

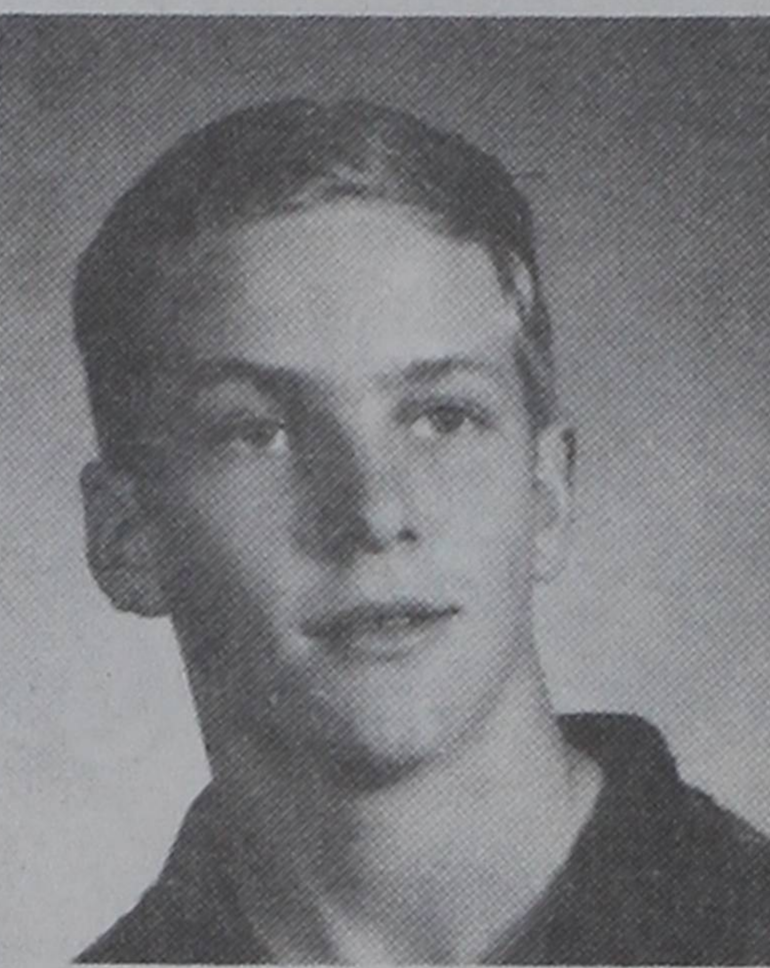
