## RE-ELECT PORTER WHALEY C OF C

Homer D. Wade and Balance Officials West Texas Chamber of Commerce Approved.

ADOPT BUDGET OF \$85,000

Call For Vigorous Prosecution Common Point Freight Rate Fight—Splawn at Meet.

Re-election of Porter Whaley as manager for the sixth time, the adoption of a budget of \$85,000 for expenses during the current year, vigorous defense of West Texas common point freight rates and the naming of standing committees were outstanding features of the all-day session of the Executive Board of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in session here Friday.

W. M. Splawn, State Railroad Commissioner, emphasized to the Board of Directors necessity of careful attention to the Orient railroad situation and also to see that certificates of necessity were issued in connection with proposed extensions of the Burlington, Frisco, and Katy systems in West Texas.

The most vigorous discussion of the morning session centered around the election of officers for the ensuing year. After long argument, on motion of ex-president A. B. Spencer, seconded by W. P. Hallmark of Dublin, Porter Whaley was elected manager for the sixth time. He submitted the following list of assistants for the ensuing year, which was approved by those present.

Homer D. Wade, assistant manager, B. M. Whittaker, exhibit manager, R. A. Hightower, convention manager, F. A. Leffingwell, traffic manager, B. F. Bennett, S. J. Cole and Harvey Allen, district managers, K. Goodman, advertising manager.

A budget expenditure totaling \$85,000 was authorized with the details of the expenditure to be settled at committee meetings.

Vigorous prosecutions of West Texas defense of its common point freight rate was authorized. Former President A. B. Spencer was continued in charge of this phase of the work of the organization. Expenditure of any needed sum, employment of special counsel, clerk hire, etc., was authorized.

A resolution was directed asking that all laws, especially prohibition laws be strictly enforced by authorities of any city where the organization meets in convention.

At noon the men present were guests of the Sweetwater Board of City Development at luncheon at the Hotel Wright, where the sessions were held.

A moving picture film of the Brownwood convention was exhibited at the Palace Theater at 1:30 to the directors.

Various committees went into session at 2 o'clock with a short general session called for three o'clock.

## WATERS OF GULF TAKE FOUR LIVES

Fifth Man Missing of Party That Went to McFadden Beach at Port Arthur.

NO CLEW IS FOUND

Only Car in Which Party is Known to Have Gone to Beach Remains—Bodies Recovered.

PORT ARTHUR, Texas, June 6.—Gulf waters claimed four lives today, with a fifth man missing at McFadden's beach early Thursday night.

The dead are: Mr. and Mrs. Randall, Bonnette; Miss Adele Montagne, 17; Romer Sonnier, about 28; Teddy Carlson Jr., about 24, is missing.

Only the abandoned Dodge touring car in which the party went to the beach gave a clue to the tragedy that transpired some time Thursday night. The four bodies were washed ashore on the beach near the Gulf View Hotel.

## INDICT YOUTHS

Millionaire Murderers of Robert Franks Formally Charged With Kidnapping and Murder.

CHICAGO, Ill., June 6.—Indictments against Nathan Leopold and Richard Loeb, formally charging them with the murder of Robert Franks, 14-year-old son of a millionaire, were returned in open court today.

The indictments which were voted by the Cook County grand jury Thursday accused the two millionaires' sons with kidnapping for ransom and the actual murder of the youth. Both carry the death penalty.

## VERNON BOY SHOT

Search is On For Unknown Assailant Who Attacked Youth Alone and Fleed.

VERNON, Texas, June 6.—Search was on here today for the unknown assailant who shot and wounded Buck Biggs, 16, at the home of Claud Lawhorn near here last night. Biggs was shot in the head, but not seriously wounded.

The youth was alone in the house at the time, and his assailant struck him after firing, and fled, he said. Biggs, who is employed by Lawhorn, gave no motive for the crime.

## LONDON STRIKE TIES UP SUBWAY

Thousands Walk to Work After Power House Men Quit Against Leaders' Protest.

BLAME COMMUNISM

Strike is Unofficial, Labor Leaders Declare—Transportation Paralyzed.

By The United Press. LONDON, Eng., June 6.—A strike charged to communists has paralyzed London's network of subways. Power house workers in over two-thirds of the plants have over-ruled the objections of organized labor, and walked out.

Not more than 10 per cent of the trains that carry millions to end from work each day were in operation this morning. Street cars, busses, and motor vehicles were unable to handle the crowds. Thousands walked from the suburbs to work.

The power house workers demand an increase of 10 shillings a week, a minimum wage of three pounds, with one week's paid vacation every year. Labor leaders call the strike unofficial, and charge that communistic influence is back of it.

## POSTAL TO OPEN

District Superintendent Hargrave Postal Telegraph Company in Sweetwater Friday.

J. Hargrave, district superintendent for Texas, Louisiana, and Arkansas, of the Postal Telegraph and Cable Co., was in Sweetwater Friday in interest of the office and the company is opening here. Fixtures and equipment for the office in the Bradford building on North West 2nd St., have been installed ready for the opening next week. A manager for the local office has not been named.

The line through Sweetwater is laid from Fort Worth to El Paso to Los Angeles and is the fourth transcontinental line of the company.

"We selected this being the ideal route for maintaining a line, Mr. Hargrave stated, "it being south of the street of the great sleet belt, and north of the tropical storm belt."

A long-distance telephone service will be maintained in addition to the telegraphic and cable service.

The Postal Telegraph and Cable Co., completed in 1923, the laying of the largest submarine cable across the Atlantic in the world, at a cost of ten million dollars. The line built from Fort Worth to Los Angeles through two million dollars. Fixtures and supplies in the local office will cost over \$1500, it is stated.

## AN OFF MONTH

May This Year Colder Than Usual—Year's Gain of Rainfall Now 5.97 Inches.

The total rainfall here this year, up to and including June 1, was 9.52 inches, according to the gauge at the Sweetwater Vulcanizing Co., and the average temperature for the month of May was 63 degrees. May was, as a whole, a cold month this year as compared with the average temperature of the month during the past years.

The highest point reached by the thermometer was 75 degrees on May 28, while on May 28, 1923, it climbed to 86 degrees. On last May 10 it went down to 51 degrees. The lowest point reached last year was 54 degrees on May 4th.

In the first five months of 1923, a total of 15.49 inches of rain was registered, being 5.97 inches more than for the same period of this year. The average temperature in May last year was 65 degrees, as compared with 63 degrees this year.

There were 16 cloudy days last month, as compared with 12 cloudy days in May last year. Sandstorms and winds were frequent in each month, and the storm and cyclone at Colorado, Lorraine and vicinity which killed 35 people and injured many more occurred on May 14 last year. The day this year was registered as being fair and cooler.

## NEGROES ROB K C BANK LARGE SUM

Hold-Up Two Months Ago Netted \$40,000—Crowd Witnesses Gun Battle On Street.

SECOND RECENT ROBBERY

Motorcycle Policeman Wounded When Shots Force Bank Car to Curb.

By The United Press. KANSAS CITY, Mo., June 6.—Negro bandits held up the Main Street Bank and escaped with \$26,000 today. A patrolman was shot and wounded while resisting the robbers.

In a similar hold-up by negroes two months ago, \$40,000 was obtained.

Charles Haake, cashier, and Frank Loddie, paying teller, were returning to the bank with the money in a satchel for payrolls. As they neared the bank, the bandits, in two automobiles, opened fire, and forced the bank automobile to the curb.

C. L. Dyer, motor cycle policeman, accompanying the bank employes, was injured in the first shots. After the auto was forced to the curb, the bandits seized the satchel at the entrance to the bank.

A large crowd on the street witnessed the shooting.

## DENIES CHARGES

Mellon Says Gaston's Liquor Permit Discourse is Without Any Foundation.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 6.—Secretary of the Treasury Mellon in a letter to Chairman Brookhart of the Senate investigation committee today denied that Gaston B. Means had a conference with former under-secretary Gilbert concerning illegal withdrawal of liquor, as Means testified before the committee.

Secretary Mellon also denied the charge made by Means, that he had an arrangement with Rex Shelton of New York, whereby whisky permits were given by Mellon in return for contributions to the National Republican committee.

## HEAR COMPLAINT

Bus Drivers Appear Before Commission—To Keep Walks Free of Obstruction.

The City Commission met in regular session Thursday afternoon when routine business was discussed, and a complaint from the local bus and service car drivers heard relative to the parking of cars at railway stations. Representatives of the service car lines declared that they were not receiving equal rights at the stations as the transfer companies in regard to parking spaces and the securing of passengers.

Ordinances were read in regard to the subject and the matter was turned over to City Judge Yantis, and Chief of Police Johnson for further consideration.

A contract was awarded to W. L. Supulver for the laying of sewer pipe on Patterson street, and alley from Orange street to Nueces street.

Bis bid was 55c a foot.

Bills for the month of May were passed on.

Mayor Joe Boothe was absent from the meeting, being in Kansas City where he is attending the national Shriners' convention.

Chief of Police Buck Johnson was instructed by the City Commission to see that the side walks in front of business houses are kept clean and free of obstructions. Display of merchandise on the side walks have obstructed passage in some parts of town, it was reported.

## Millerand Pays Little Heed To Attack On Him

PARIS, France, June 6.—President Millerand having refused to resign at the request of the Socialists, the latter considered ways and means to force his resignation today.

They appear to have a majority in the Chamber of Deputies and the support of the extremists in passing a vote censoring the president.

In the mean while, Millerand went about the business of finding a Premier. He resumed his conversation with leaders at the Elyses, and it was believed that he would find a successor to Poincare by evening.

## GERMAN OKEH ON DAWES REPORT

Reichstag Approves Measure as Basis For Reparations Settlement—More United Government.

FEW RESERVATIONS

Ask Return of Ruhr Prisoners—Means Great Advance in European Adjustment.

BERLIN, Germany, June 6.—The German Reichstag formally approved today the action of the government in accepting the Dawes report as the basis for the settlement of reparations problems.

Parliament adopted the resolution approving the Dawes plan, with only slight reservations, including the return of Ruhr prisoners, and repatriation of those expelled from the occupied zones.

The approval of the program of Chancellor Marx means a vast stride toward European adjustments, as a United Germany is now behind the government in dealing with the Allies.

## DOUBTS LOAN

Warren Says Outlook is Not Favorable—Denies Resignation is Contemplated.

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, June 6. Mexico's efforts to obtain a loan with which to pay the interest on her foreign debt do not look favorable, Charles B. Warren, American Ambassador to Mexico, stated upon his arrival here today on his way to Cleveland.

Warren said when asked if he would accept the vice presidential nomination at the Republican convention, that he did not like to discuss it. He added, however, that there was no foundation to the report that he was to resign as Ambassador.

## TO AID FARMERS

Any Further Tax Reduction Must Be Toward That End, Trade Commission Says.

C., June 6.—Any further tax reduction planned must be for the relief of the farmer, the Federal Trade Commission reported to the Senate today in compliance with the Norris resolution asking for detailed statistics as to taxes, wealth, and the ownership of tax exempt securities in the United States.

## EXPECT SERVICE ON MIDLAND-N-W

Railroad Commissioner Splawn Confers Here Thursday With C. of C. Officials.

IMPRESSED WITH CITY

Predicts Future Commercial and Industrial Growth—Building Commercial Center.

Belief that plans will be perfected within the next few weeks for the restoration of service on the Midland and Northwestern railroad was expressed here Friday morning by Walter Splawn, Railroad Commissioner, who conferred with officials of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce and R. W. Chancellor of Midland Thursday night.

Chancellor appeared to enlist the moral support of the Chamber of Commerce officials and the railroad commissioner in the efforts that have been made in the Midland community since last March, for the re-establishing of service over the Midland and Northwestern.

Porter Whaley, business manager of the Chamber of Commerce, Homer Wade, assistant manager, and A. B. Spencer and Clifford B. Jones attended the meeting. General railroad conditions in West Texas, with particular reference to the Midland and Northwestern, were discussed.

"The present bright crop outlook, with the work that has already been done, leads us to believe that plans will be perfected in the next few weeks that will bring about the desired restoration of service," said Mr. Splawn.

"The Midland and Northwestern is a line that is vital to the community through which it runs. The community needs the railroad service, and we believe that the line will again be put in operation."

Mr. Splawn, with Mr. Jones and Mr. Spencer, was taken to the plant of the United States Gypsum Company by State Representative R. M. Chitwood Thursday afternoon, and shown other points of interest in the city's commercial and business life.

"I am greatly impressed by the growth of Sweetwater," Mr. Splawn said Friday. "With the advantages you have here and the development that is being made, I believe that your city will some day be a commercial and industrial center."

"The three trunk lines in Sweetwater serve as an excellent outlet for your products. This fact should encourage the location of factories here. You have an immense gypsum plant near your city."

"Among your business houses I notice that you have three wholesale grocery firms that are serving an immense territory. I also understand that your wholesale windmill jobbing house here leads the state in its distribution of its products."

"I predict a future for Sweetwater. One of the most live evidences of your progress toward becoming a commercial center is the great amount of substantial building that is going on in your city today."

WORKMAN INJURED

Ceiling Old Wooten Grocery Building Falls on Him.

Henry Seegle of Abilene was painfully injured here Friday morning when the ceiling of the old Wooten building, which is being torn down by workmen, fell, tearing a gash a foot long in his back and inflicting numerous small cuts and bruises. Seegle was employed in wrecking the building, and he with several other workmen were inside tearing down the remainder of the walls when the accident occurred. He was the only one injured.

Seegle was treated by Dr. P'Pool and is resting nicely.

The Wooten Wholesale Grocery Co., is temporarily located in the old seed and grain company building owned by F. G. Robertson. A brick warehouse will replace their old building.

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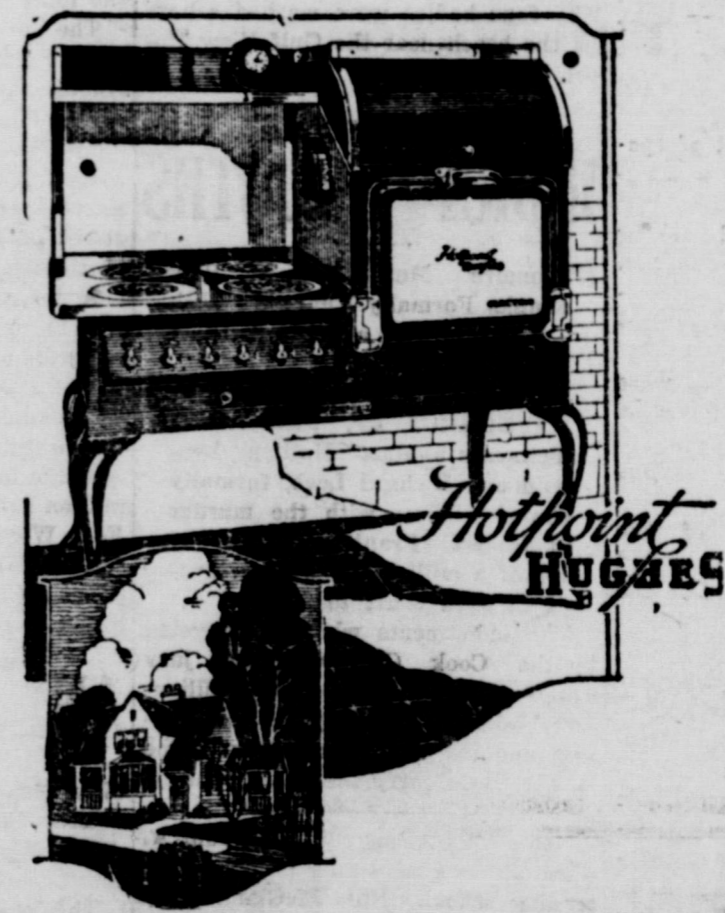

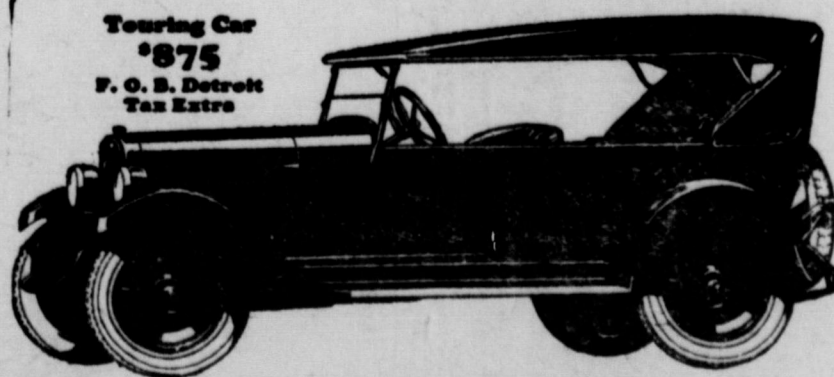

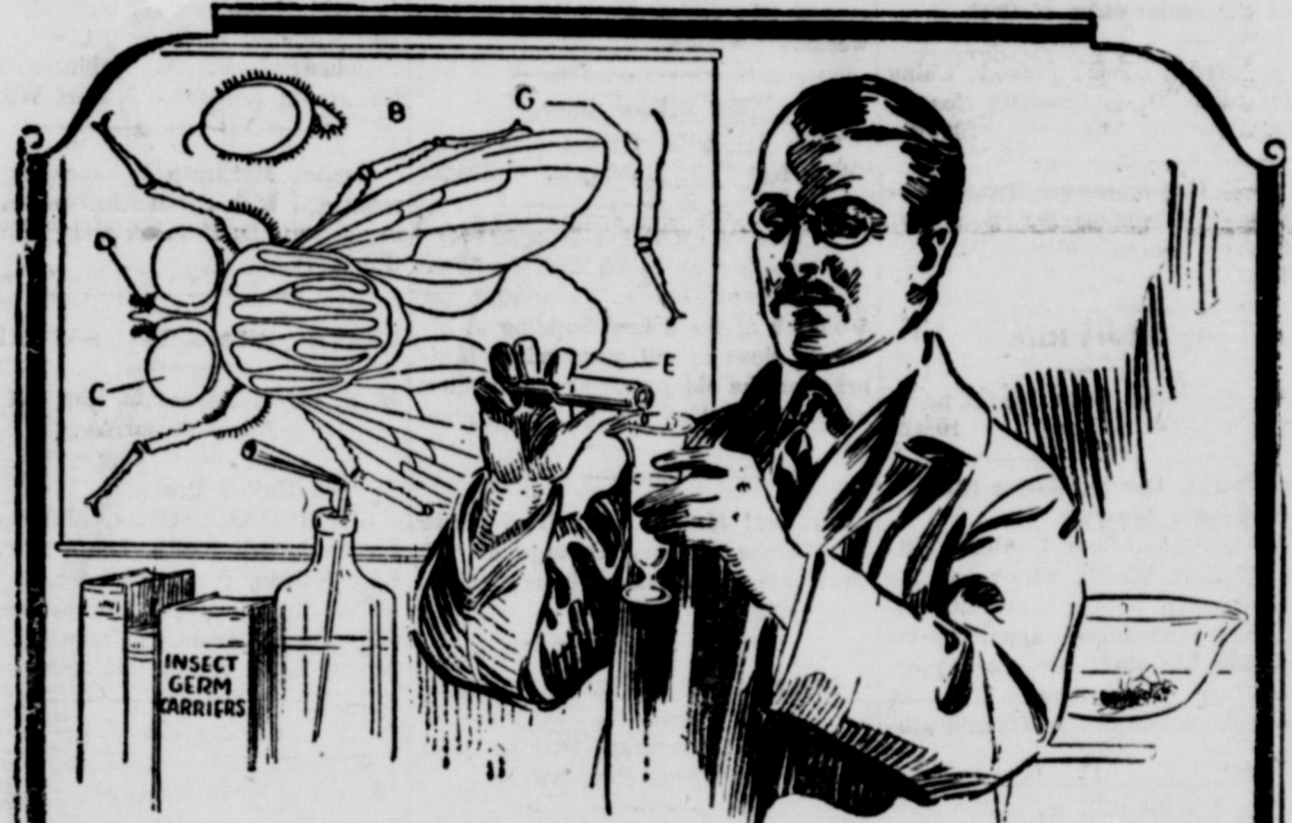
