Carol, as my "designated driver," had been hoping for a nice, dry road coming home. Instead, we found that an inch or two of snow had already fallen, and up to four more were expected.





Six Have **Filed For FISD Board**


Six people have filed for three places which are opening on the Friona School Board, with the filing deadline still five days away, Wednesday, March 23.







Thanks to a suggestion by an out-of-town reader, the Happy Homemaker is taking on a new dimension. She suggested that we make the column an exchange of household and gardening hints, interesting tidbits and other information.

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If any of our other readers need something or have something to share, just let us know and we will pass it on.

By the way, if you'd rather we didn't use your name, please make a note of it. Otherwise, we'll presume it is all right to use it.

This sounds like a very good idea to me. After all, isn't that what being a good homemaker is all about--sharing recipes, cooking and baking hints, gardening suggestions and other items of interest?

In addition to making this suggestion, our reader requested three recipes. She is a former Friona resident and wrote, "Do you have the recipe Decimae Beene used to 5 minutes, stirring vigorously, for yeast rolls?"

were so delicious and she was very generous in sharing them with others. Very often, she would pop in with a pan of raised rolls just ready to put in the oven about lunch time."

My answer to that question is positive. The Floyd family just happened to be one of the many lucky ones she shared rolls with and nothing could be simpler. we've had the recipe many years. We call it "Decimae Rolls" and here it is: 2/3 cup sugar 1/4 cup shortening 1 teaspoon salt 2-1/2 cups hot water 3 well beaten eggs 1 package dry yeast

pineapple, bean sprouts and chicken. Then, my memory fades out. If any of your readers could furnish me with the recipe by sending it to you for publication, I would appreciate it."

Now, folks, we need your help. Maybe some of you were at that same party, or know about the ingredients needed to finish it. If so, please send them to me.

Her third request was for "Play Doh."

I don't have one with that particular name. However, I do have the following, which is called "Creative Dough." 1 cup all-purpose flour 2 teaspoons cream of tartar 1/2 teaspoon salt 1 cup water 1 tablespoon vegetable oil 1 teaspoon vanilla, if desired About 15 drops favorite food coloring

Cook all ingredients in 1-1/2quart saucepan over medium heat 4 until mixture forms a ball. Her letter continued, "Her rolls Remove dough from saucepan and let stand on counter 5 minutes. Knead dough about 30 seconds or until smooth and blended. Cool completely. Store in airtight container in refrigerator.

Another out-of-town reader sent

the following cobbler recipe. I've not tried it yet, but it seems that MEXICAN COBBLER 1 can apple pie filling 2 teaspoons cinnamon 12 flour tortillas 1-1/2 cup water 2 cups sugar 1/2 cup oleo You may need to chop apples. Put 1-2 tablespoons filling in each tortilla. Sprinkle with cinnamon and roll. Place in baking dish. Add hot water, stir well and let Heat water, sugar and oleo until oleo melts. Pour over rolled tortillas. Cover and chill overnight. Bake at 350 degrees for 30 minutes. She added, "We have let it set as little as 4-6 hours and have also baked it immediately after getting it prepared. Cherry, apricot, blueberry or whatever pie filling would probably be just as tasty."

Dry Eyes

Nature provided our eyes with tears to wash away irritants, lubricate the normal blinking action of the upper lid and even regulate the temperature of the eye. Sometimes, though, the glands under the upper

lids reduce their production of tears--perhaps because of age or medi-cation; the result is called "dry eyes." There are not enough tears to spread across the eyes when you blink; the dryness may produce a ourning sensation, too.

There is a simple test with which your optometrist can measure the amount of tear fluid secreted by the tear glands. If it is determined that the production of tears is inadequate, your eye doctor may prescribe "artificial tears," a lubricating solution.

In certain cases, where normal tearing is seriously lacking, there is another alternative available: wearing a soft contact lens that will keep the eye moist and prevent the burning and discomfort that often accompany dry eyes.

High Price Doesn't Always Mean High Quality

One way of evaluating a stock is by looking at its price-toearnings ratio (P/E). P/E is calculated by dividing a stock's price by its earnings per share for the past 12 months. For example, a stock selling for \$20 that has earned \$2 in the past 12 months has a P/E of 10 (20 divided by two).

A recent study illustrated the importance of considering P/E when choosing a stock. By tracking the stock that had the highest P/E on the New York Stock Exchange in March of every year from 1982 to 1992, the study found that each of the stocks went on to perform miserably in subsequent years. In fact, seven of those "winners" actually lost value.

This occurred during a time when the overall stock market increased in value. In fact, the stocks in the Standard & Poor's (S&P) 500 Index more than doubled in value during the same period.

The stocks in the study had P/Es ranging from 24 to 70; in comparison, the P/E of the S&P 500 ranged from seven to 17 during the same period. The historic average P/E of the 30 stocks listed on the Dow Jones Industrial Average is about 14.

A high P/E might be a sign of an overvalued stock that could drop in market value. Most of the high P/E stocks in the study represented either a new technology or innovative business concept during their peak years, and investors bought the stocks despite sky-high prices. In every instance, new competitors entered the market, slowing and often neutralizing the pioneers' anticipated growth.

When stocks are priced too high in relation to their present earnings, investors pay for future expectations. If these expectations are not fulfilled, and the companies do not prosper as expected, the stock price collapses.

In choosing stocks, have reasonable expectations. Look for stocks with P/Es that are closer to conventional market trends.

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
