SEE SURPLUS IN NATIONS BUDGET

Coolidge Forecasts \$373,743,714 in Treasury at End of Fiscal Year in Message.

ECONOMY IS STRESSED

Reduction of Revenue Proved Safe and Satisfactory—Predicts Further Tax Reduction.

(United Press Staff Correspondent) WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 1.—President Coolidge in his annual budget message laid before congress today forecast a \$373,743,714 treasury surplus at the end of the next fiscal year and urged a program of drastic governmental economy to permit another cut in federal taxes.

"I am for economy," the President declared. "If we continue the campaign, we will pave the way for further reduction in taxes."

Mr. Coolidge, however, proposed that consideration of further tax reduction be deferred until the effect of the present revenue law has become apparent.

The budget of governmental expenditures for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1926, transmitted by the President, totaled \$3,267,551,378, a decrease of \$266,532,430 below estimates for the current fiscal year. Receipts were estimated at \$3,641,295,092, an increase of \$39,326,795, which, with the \$67,884,489 surplus estimated at the end of the current fiscal year, would bring the unusually large surplus foreseen by Mr. Coolidge 19 months hence.

"For those things which we are now required to do we are fast reducing our expenditures to a minimum consistent with efficient service," said the President. "We have before us an estimated surplus of \$67,000,000 for the current fiscal year and \$373,000,000 for the next fiscal year."

"The confidence of the chief executive and the Congress that our revenues could be safely reduced has been fully justified," said the President. "The fiscal year which ended June 30, 1924, was closed with the surplus of receipts over expenditures of \$505,366,000."

"We have now completed five months of the current fiscal year which ends June 30, 1925. This affords an index of the probable reduction in our revenues under the current tax law. It also affords an index of the limits within which our expenditures can be kept under the continuing policy of economy. A revision of the estimate of receipts and expenditures for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1925, indicates today that the receipts will be \$3,601,968,297, and the expenditures \$3,534,083,806."

"This forecasts a surplus of receipts over expenditures for the current fiscal year of \$67,884,489. This estimate is most significant. On the one hand, we anticipate receiving this year \$400,000,000 less revenue than we did last year, due principally to the reduction in taxes. On the other hand, we must provide \$114,000,000 for the extraordinary increase in expenditures made necessary by the world war adjusted compensation act. Yet we are confident that the year will be closed with a surplus of more than \$67,000,000."

"Our aim should be not only to conserve this prospective surplus but to add to it."

SELECTING JURY

Expect to Begin Hearing Testimony Tuesday in Mrs. Billie Meek's Murder Trial.

The original special venire summoned for the case was exhausted this morning and 40 additional talesmen were ordered. It is believed that the taking of testimony will begin late this afternoon.

MURDERER KILLS WOMAN IN HOME

Wife of Prominent Physician of Birmingham Suburbs Chloroformed, Beaten to Death With Hammer.

HUSBAND ALSO ATTACKED

Hand Practically Shot Off in Struggle With Intruder—Children in Next Room Unmolested.

BIRMINGHAM, Ala., Dec. 2.—An unidentified intruder climbed through a window at the residence of Dr. George T. Edwards, prominent physician of Fairfield, Birmingham suburb, early today, brutally murdered Mrs. Edwards, and wounded her husband.

The slayer apparently chloroformed Mrs. Edwards and then crushed her skull with a hammer. Dr. and Mrs. Edwards were sleeping in separate rooms. The murderer first chloroformed Mrs. Edwards and was attempting to chloroform Dr. Edwards when he was awakened.

The two men grappled and the physician attempted to seize the intruder's pistol. The weapon exploded, practically tearing off Dr. Edwards' hand. Two children who slept in an adjoining room were unmolested.

Dr. Edwards' hand was amputated for the attack.

Soup Magnate Here.

PLAN CONCERT

Musical Organizations of City Schools to Give Program Early in the Month.

Preparations are under way by the city schools for staging a musical concert at some date early this month, according to Superintendent B. H. McLain. Plans call for a varied program in which the High School, east and south wards, would have parts.

Quite a variety and quantity of musical talent is found in the schools here, McLain stated, and a concert given by the students would doubtless attract a large audience.

The proposed entertainment would include numbers by the High School boys' glee club under the direction of W. O. Freeman; the girls' glee club under the direction of Miss Doris Daniel; the violin club, directed by R. E. Ward; the mixed glee clubs of the south ward and east ward schools, and numbers by the high school orchestra. A number of violin, clarinet and other solos will also feature the extensive program.

WORKERS FINISH CHURCH CENSUS

Baptist Sunday School Workers Winding Up Canvas of City in S. S. Enlargeement Drive.

CLASSES WELL ATTENDED

Teacher Training Courses Draw Good Crowds—Cards to be Distributed Among Churches.

Baptist census takers were to complete the city-wide census Tuesday as a part of the week's program of the Baptist Sunday school enlargement campaign. Good reports were made Monday by the census takers, who covered the city Sunday and Monday, a small portion yet remaining to be covered before the work is completed.

Approximately 3,000 cards have been turned out, representing some 3,000 people who have been interviewed by those taking the Sunday school census. Of the 3,000 reports, approximately 900 were members of the Baptist Sunday School or were Baptist prospects, with other churches in proportion.

The cards will be assorted and those other than Baptist prospects will be delivered to the respective pastors of various churches in the city.

The teachers' training classes which are being held at the church each afternoon have very large enrollments so far this week, with new members added daily. The classes are divided into primary, intermediate and other branches of the Sunday School work with competent instructors for each division.

TO OPEN OFFICE

Fort Worth Supply Co. Water Supply Jobbers, To Be Installed

An office of the Fort Worth Supply Co., jobbers of water supply goods, will be doing business in Sweetwater by January 1, J. T. Morrison, Fort Worth, treasurer of the company, stated Tuesday.

The company completed a deal Monday night for a location in the Jobe warehouse building. They will handle a complete stock of wind mills and general water supply goods for the wholesale trade. W. A. Hogan will be the manager of the Sweetwater office.

"Sweetwater is winning recognition as a distributing center," Morrison said in commenting on the new location of the company here. "We have chosen your city in preference to many others in West Texas."

The Fort Worth Supply Co. has offices in Fort Worth and Amarillo, in addition to the location in Sweetwater.

QUELL REVOLT

Hundred Communists Who Seize Public Buildings in Attempted Uprising Killed by Troops.

CHRISTIANA, Norway, Dec. 2.—More than 100 Communists were killed before an uprising at Reval was checked yesterday, it was learned today.

After the "Reds" had seized several public buildings in the attempted revolt troops drove them out with machine guns and bombs, after which a state of siege was proclaimed.

RAIN MONDAY

Nearly One-Half Inch Falls in Sweetwater—Rain General.

GERMAN BANDITS KILL 7 PERSONS

Band of 25 Descends on Lonely Villa, Chop Servants and Family of Owner to Pieces.

SET FIRE TO PROPERTY

Owner, Returning Home, Stabbed, Left For Dead—Five Year Old Daughter Believed Abducted.

SIEGEN, Germany, Dec. 2.—Bandits with axes murdered seven persons on a lonely villa near here, burned another alive, and fatally injured the owner of the villa, a quarry director named Augerstein, when he arrived on the scene of the carnage today.

The bandits fled into the nearby woods without the loot they came to obtain, and posses were searching for them. Twenty-five in number, they had arrived at the villa when Augerstein returned this afternoon and heard sounds of fighting in his home.

As he entered, two men halted him, stabbed him repeatedly, and left him for dead lying before the garden gate. Inside, members of the band were hacking his mother, and a neighbor woman to pieces with knives and axes.

Four servants who attempted to resist the slaughter were also chopped down. One girl fled to her room and locked herself in. The bandits made no attempt to break in, but set fire to the house, burning her alive, and incinerating the remaining bodies almost beyond recognition.

The villa owner's five-year-old daughter is missing, and was probably carried off by the bandits.

REPORT THEFTS

Two Homes Entered in Wave of Petty Robberies Over City—Suit Case Stolen From Car.

Two men are being held in the city jail in connection with the robbery of the home of Carl Williams on Ragland street and for investigation relative to other petty thefts reported to officers recently.

The home of Mrs. J. C. Montgomery on E. S. 2nd street was also entered this week. Only a few articles of clothing were taken from the Williams home, and the thieves were apparently frightened away before they were able to obtain valuables at the Montgomery residence.

A suit case was stolen from the auto belonging to Roy Hamilton in the downtown section Monday night. The bag was found by officers on the ground near the compress Tuesday with one end cut open and all valuables gone.

Man Writes Checks To Cemetery, Takes Life, Wounds Wife

GIANT LINER IS TOSSED IN SEAS

Leviathan's Passengers Rushed to Hospitals as Big Ship Docks After Two Day Storm.

BASEBALL STARS ABOARD

McGraw and Comiskey, With Players, Uninjured—Waves Break Over Bridge, 90 Feet From Line.

NEW YORK, N. Y., Dec. 2.—Fifteen passengers on the giant U. S. Liner Leviathan were taken to hospitals suffering from injuries received during a two day storm, when the liner docked here today.

Captain Herbert Hartley said that storm was the worst he had ever encountered, with the seas breaking over the bridge 90 feet above the water line. Eleven ports were stove in besides a number of windows on the promenade deck.

All During Saturday and Sunday, when the wind had reached hurricane force, some times exceeding 100 miles an hour, the giant ship was tossed about with but few of the 1,000 passengers aboard able to keep on their feet.

John McGraw, manager of the New York Yankees, and Charles Comiskey, turned on the Leviathan with the players who made a recent tour of England and France. None of the party of 83, including the players and their wives, was injured.

HUNTING NEGRO

Find No Trace of Man Who Disappeared in Box Car Enroute From Longview Here.

No further information has been gained by local police investigating the strange disappearance of John Moss, colored, whose bloody shirt and other clothing were found in a Santa Fe box car here Monday. Moss was supposed to have accompanied a car load of household goods from Longview here but had disappeared when the car arrived in Sweetwater.

Officers along the Santa Fe from here to Longview are staging a search for the negro, aided by Santa Fe agents. Sheriff King of Longview notified Chief of Police Johnson Tuesday morning that there was no trace of Moss in that section.

GUILTY OF INSANITY

VACCINATION

"With smallpox breaking out in epidemic form in several towns in Texas, people of the state should realize that this is a serious menace that can positively be eliminated through vaccination," states Dr. Malone Duggan, State Health Officer. "Smallpox is a dangerous, disfiguring disease and a community should consider it a disgrace to have it appear in epidemic form."

Smallpox is no respecter of persons. High and low are stricken alike if exposed to the disease. For this reason everyone should be vaccinated. The reason for the present outbreak is that vaccinations of many people have run out and they have been so long immune that they do not realize the danger. To comprehend the increase in smallpox we have only to compare the number of cases reported in Texas in 1923 and 1924. In 1923 there were only 669 cases while up to November first of this year there have already been 1080 cases. Texas is not the only place where this is taking place. Detroit recently had a serious epidemic. A general increase all over the United States has caused the surgeon general to send out a warning urging vaccination.

Every child should receive this protection before he goes to school, Dr. Duggan says. In one central Texas city where an epidemic broke out there was not a single case in the public schools—because they had compulsory vaccination. It is better to vaccinate during the first year of life and on entering school. This generally gives life protection. In the rural districts it is estimated that only 10 per cent of rural school children are vaccinated.

Vaccination lasts from five to seven years. If you have not been "scratched" within that time let your doctor immunize you again. Some people fear vaccination but there are as many as ten million successful vaccinations on record in one country and not one fatality.

DIPHTHERIA WARNING

Time of Year When Disease Spreads in Schools, Authorities Say

AUSTIN, Texas, Dec. 2.—"This is the time of year when diphtheria begins to appear among our school children," according to Dr. Malone Duggan, State Health Officer, "and every parent should watch his children carefully to be sure that an ordinary case of sore throat with a rise in temperature does not terminate with this dangerous disease."

Youngsters in rural districts are especially liable to diphtheria for they have not become naturally immune through frequent small doses of the disease producing germs as have city children who are constantly surrounded by them.

We formerly thought that diphtheria increases with the coming of cold weather but the real reason for its appearance at this time is that winter brings the opening of schools and the

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mingling of children in closed rooms. This contact affords better opportunity for the infection to be carried from one child to another on hands and books. The common drinking cup should not be permitted in any school or public place. Teach your children not to put pencils or other objects in their mouths, to cough or sneeze into their handkerchiefs, and to wash their hands carefully before eating.

In 1923 there were around 1400 cases of diphtheria reported in Texas and 189 deaths. Up to November of this year, with two winter months yet ahead, there have been 1238 cases and 70 deaths. Death from diphtheria usually indicates neglect on the part of some one, for if this disease is quickly recognized and properly treated there is no need for it terminating fatally. The discovery of antitoxin has given us an aid in combatting the disease and this treatment, if properly given, makes recovery nearly certain.

EXPECT GREAT GAME

Cisco and Cleburne, Evenly Matched, Promise Fast Contest.

CISCO, Texas, Dec. 2.—The most colorful as well as the most savagely fought athletic contest of the present football season will be fought in Cisco Friday afternoon when the Big Dam Lobos of Cisco tie up with the Cleburne Yellow Jackets in the first bi-district championship game. This game will doubtless be the biggest as well as the last West Texas football game for the present season.

Both teams have made great records. The Lobos eliminated the Abilene Eagles in the early days of the season and have since swept on to victory in their district and defeated the Class B winner of two districts last week. In ten games the Lobos have piled up 312 points to 28 for all opponents combined. Twelve of these points were made by the Class B entrant in the last half of the game after the Lobo regulars had been removed from the game. Cleburne has piled up a record equally as great having bowled over everything in North and Central North Texas and they are coming to Cisco flush from their recent 70-10 victory over Lampasas, the class B bi-district champion.

In dope and weight the teams are evenly matched with a slight edge favoring Cleburne. In Draper, Turner and Lee the veteran coach Erney of Cleburne has a trio of stars of the first magnitude. Protected by a big powerful line these men snap off their plays with amazing speed and no team in Texas has been able to stop their onward rush. The Lobos have the greatest line in the State and in Wilson and Alabrook have two ends unsurpassed in Texas. Their backfield is not up to their line but they have a fair punch as shown by their record.

What the World Is Doing

Hunter Protected by Armored Suit Tells of Battle with Wolves


Details of one of the strangest experiments in the history of animal hunting are related by Stanley Clarkson, of St.



Paul, Minn., who spent a winter in the Canadian wilderness seeking "hand to hand" combats with hungry timber wolves. Dressed in an armor made of heavy leather studded with 1,200 needle-sharp steel spikes, he invited attacks from wolf packs while armed only with a short double-bladed ax and a hunting knife. Although handicapped by an exceptionally open winter and an unusually large number of wild rabbits, which kept the wolves from suffering from hunger, he killed a number of the beasts with his ax. During a snowstorm on Steep Rock Lake, north of Atikokan, he was set upon by five timber wolves. He killed two of them and wounded a third. The wolves seized the hunter's arms and legs in their jaws, but could not do him injury because of the protruding spikes of the armored suit, which is made of specially tanned thick cowhide that will turn water and will not harden from rain or snow. There also is a helmet and heavy wire mask that can be raised to protect the face.

Non-Freezing Water Dish for the Poultry

A non-freezing water dish for the poultry is a necessity in late fall and winter, and it is a very simple matter to make one. As shown in the drawing, a pit is dug in the ground or poultry-house floor, to a depth sufficient to accommodate the lamp it is intended to use, and lined with concrete, the concrete extending upward to a height of about 10 in. above the ground. Through one wall, a pipe fitted with two elbows and a long nipple is placed, while the opposite wall carries a short pipe that merely extends outside, although it may be fitted with an elbow with the outlet turned down. The outside elbows prevent dirt from being scratched into the pit. Over the opening is placed a tight-fitting wooden cover, in which a hole is cut to fit the drinking pan snugly. The heating element is an old incubator lamp. A very small flame will keep the water warm even in zero weather. Fresh air follows the long pipe to the bottom of the pit and the hot air and gases pass out of the short pipe.




There is room enough on the platform for a number of fowls, but, because of the height of the pan above the floor, no litter can be tossed into the water.

Aerial Kinks

It is often quite a problem how to attach a pulley to the top of the aerial mast properly, especially if it is made of pipe. An excellent method of doing this is shown in the illustration. The end of the pipe is threaded and a floor flange with a hole drilled through it is screwed on; it



is then an easy matter to attach the pulley to the flange.

Another trouble frequently experienced is that the bridle breaks where it is tied to the rope or the rope itself breaks near this point, and both aerial and rope then come down, making it necessary to "shin" the pole to thread the rope through the pulley again. To prevent this trouble a small piece of pipe or other metal weight should be tied to the end of the rope, as shown, so that the rope cannot slip through the pulley but can be lowered and then tied to the bridle again.

Remedy for Overheating Bearings

Persistent overheating of bearings that are in constant duty may be overcome by applying a paste of flour of sulphur mixed with lubricating oil. This permits the use of an oil cup. The mixture will also be found useful on heavy-duty bearings in ram rolls and similar machine parts.

Oil the rocker arms on overhead-valve motors at least every two days. This takes only a moment and prevents wear.


