Mrs. Hortense Ward was appointed special chief justice with two women associate justices by Governor Neff several weeks ago after the regular judges had disqualified themselves from presiding owing to membership in the organization.

JOINT COMMITTEE NAMED

Senators Miller, Witt and Jesse Smith To Aid House in Prison System Investigation.

By United Press. AUSTIN, Jan. 30.—The Senate in Executive session today confirmed all 29 appointments submitted to it Thursday by Governor Miriam A. Ferguson. A committee from the Senate to work jointly with the House Committee for the investigation of the State Prison System was named by Lieutenant Governor Barr Miller today.

The Senate Committee is composed of Senators Eugene Miller of Parker county, W. E. Witt, McLennan County and Jesse R. Smith of Stephens County. Miller was the author of the resolution providing for the joint action of the senate in taking part in the investigation. Both Witt and Smith supported the resolution.

Deacons Meeting Requires Police Aid to End Row

Two negroes are slightly injured and have been charged with affray in Corporation Court as a result of a rough house in the negro settlement Thursday night which came as the result of a meeting of the deacons of the Little Zion Baptist Church. The brethren were gathered to discuss matters relative to the church and its pastor. Serious matters evidently came up before the deacon's meeting, for the affair grew very spirited and high feeling prevailed, according to officers who quieted the riot.

The colored pastor came up for a great amount of discussion, negroes riled in court Friday morning. Arrests were made and a crowd gathered at the church at the fight soon started. Frank Mingo, son of deacon Razz Mingo, paid a \$12.70 fine. Pete Hardin will be fined as soon as he is able to journey to the judge's office, according to police.

Holding the place which it has occupied for several months this section still stands in the center of the nation's largest area of "good business." This is shown by the many of business conditions in the February issue of The Nation's Business, publication of the United States Chamber of Commerce.

Three large "good business" areas are shown. The largest takes in all of North Texas and the Panhandle. Another takes in the entire state of Florida, and the third, most of the state of Kansas. Eleven other "good business" areas are shown, widely scattered, and much smaller in extent. The nation as a whole is about ninety per cent in the "fair business" area, with only three small areas classed with "business slow."

SUB HITS SHORE OFF PORTSMOUTH

United States Submarine S-43 Goes Aground Near Point Jeffery In Driving Snow Storm.

CREW ARE TAKEN ASHORE

Coast Guard and Men from Ft. Constitution Aid in Removing Crew—Hope to Refloat Sub.

By United Press. PORTSMOUTH, N. H., Jan. 30.—After a wild night which the craft was buffeted by icy seas, the crew of the stranded submarine S-43 were removed to safety today.

Coast guard aided by soldiers of Fort Constitution took the stranded men off the underside boat after a night of struggle.

Efforts are being made to refloat the craft which went aground here night of Jeffery Point during a snow storm which swept the harbor during the night. The vessel is making considerable water in the forward compartment and is listed at an angle of 45 degrees on a mudbank.

Naval officials hope to refloat the submarine with the aid of a tugboat.

SAPULPA, Okla., Jan. 30 (INS)—Glaziers have completed replacing 2 windows in the city jail after Mabel Barton, arrested for being drunk, went on a rampage in her cell.

GOLD OF WORLD HAS DECREASED

United States Has Large Amount Of World's Gold Reserve But Where Is Balance?

SOME USED INDUSTRIALLY

Industrial Use Does Not Account For Entire Amount of Auriferous Metal of Globe.

By United Press. LONDON, Jan. 30.—Who has all the gold?

The United States has the great bulk of the gold that is in circulation, but this is only a small part of the gold that is known to be in existence. And before Great Britain resumes the gold standard—that is, before she promises to produce a gold sovereign or half sovereign for that much paper money—she wants to know pretty definitely how much of the world's gold she can drag from its hiding place.

This far the best answer to the question has been furnished by the experts of the United States mint, who assert that since Christopher Columbus discovered America in 1492 the world has dug up gold to the value of \$,955,000,000 pounds in English money or \$20,000,000,000.

Now since gold does not decay or wear out appreciably it is argued that the vast bulk of this is still in actual existence. But the authorities of the United States mint say that they can trace in actual circulation in the various countries only \$9,210,000,000. By the painful operation of subtraction we learn that some \$10,615,000,000 in pure gold has disappeared from view.

No wonder everybody feels poor! Perhaps \$5,000,000,000 of it has been converted into gold ornaments of various sorts. These goldsmiths with a taste for antiquarian research reared five billion as the very outside figure as an estimate of the gold "consumed" in the art. Granting the estimate is sound, this leaves \$5,615,000,000 of gold that has mysteriously disappeared from view.

Joseph S. McCoy of the United States Treasury has produced some figures which deeply interest experts of this question. He says that foreign born citizens of the United States have sequestered at least \$25,000,000,000 in gold while farmers, suspicious of their local banking resources, have concealed another \$125,000,000 and the "misers" of the towns and cities "who live in squalor and gloat over their hoards hidden in socks, coffee-pots or fruit jars, or buried at the foot of trees" have concealed another \$44,000,000.

All this gold is far, far beyond the reach of Great Britain, struggling to get back the old-time gold standard.

But of course there is India—and when it comes to hoarding gold, the United States cannot hold a candle to India. India is where the gold is. From ryal to rajah the Indians know gold, like it, and keep it. The women folks of the most impoverished Indians have gold bangles, anklets, armlets, or nose-rings. The murravari, or local money-lender turns his day's proceeds into gold and buries it. The native princes exhaust their rich oriental imaginations in contriving new ways of "consuming" gold.

Scores of Indian temples are decorated with pure gold, offerings of the devout. Every few years the domes of these temples are re-gilded with the precious metal.

As for the Rajahs—their treatment of the expensive stuff is enough to make the Westerner gasp. There is one Rajah—not Mr. A—whose fancy it is to have his palace illuminated with multitudinous small panes of glass in the center of which is a gold sovereign forth at par, \$4.86. Another Indian prince has had the hobby of collecting hundreds of thousands of gold mohurs and "great-mohurs" which were the gold sovereigns and double-sovereigns in India many years ago.

South Africa, too, is known to have a great hoard of gold. A South African bank recently estimated that the Kaffir alone had concealed \$90,000,000 worth of gold. As for China—she exports gold into India at the rate of \$20,000,000 worth a month and her hoards show no signs of exhaustion.

But it is one thing to know where the gold is and quite another to know how to coax it back into the world of affairs. This is one of the big conundrums facing those countries—of which Great Britain is only one—who wish to get back on the gold standard.

## HOUSEHOLD HINTS

To those who throw away the top leaves of celery, the green outer leaves of lettuce; who dislike spinach and refuse cabbage; this is especially addressed.

We are not all like Irvin Cobb, crusading through the North for turnip greens and hog's jowl; finding in this dish the highest form of gastronomic enjoyment. But while we live we still may learn and there is much to be learned about green leafy vegetables.

The protective growth of vitamins is found in this class of foods. This vitamin is health insurance, giving to the human body protection against disease and the necessary elements for sound development.

Appetite after all, is merely a matter of education. We do not eat celery tops because we have never eaten them. Their pungent taste is new to our tongues. Lettuce makes a more attractive appearance in our salads

when crisp and blanched. So we throw away the outer leaves without a thought. We have always eaten the roots of the radish, turnip and other bulbous vegetables. And so we see no reason for endeavoring to utilize the tops in our daily menus.

Combine celery tops with coarse outer stalks of the celery. Simmer in scant amount of water till tender. Remove lid from stew pan to permit complete evaporation of liquid. Season with butter, salt and pepper.

Celery tops may be used as a substitute for lettuce in Waldorf, banana and vegetable salads. Dressed with melted butter and combined with chopped peanuts they make excellently flavored sandwiches.

The outer leaves of lettuce may be bunched together and sliced into thin strips with a sharp knife or cut with scissors. So prepared it makes a foundation for any salad.

Scrape and cook young carrots in boiling salted water till tender. Cut in halves, lengthwise; roll in cracker

crumbs, then in beaten eggs and crumbs again and fry in butter till a golden brown. Sprinkle with minced parsley and serve very hot.

Cabbage may now be had in quantities in the market, large or small heads, according to choice. Serve it—once in Cold Slaw—skipping a day—then serving it "Au Gratin," according to the following recipe, or possibly boiled with a ham butt.

Cook cabbage eight minutes in boiling water, chop in small pieces, put in greased baking dish, sprinkle with salt and pepper, cover with white sauce and sprinkle if desired with grated cheese. Mix cabbage and white sauce gently with a fork, cover with buttered crumbs and bake until crumbs are brown.

Cauliflower and onions "au gratin" are also delicious and certainly a change from the everyday, plain boiled vegetables.

## RECIPES

### Cheese Fondue

2 cups flour 1-2 cup butter  
1 level tsp. salt 1-4 tsp. cayenne  
1-2 cup milk 1 egg  
2-4 cup dry grated cheese  
2 level tsp. Baking Powder.

Sift flour, salt, baking powder and cayenne together three times. Put in mixing bowl and chop in butter. Make hole in center of mixture and put in unbeaten egg, cheese, and milk. Mix together. Turn out on molding board. Roll 1-8 inch thick and cut in narrow strips. Bake at 350.400 degrees until light brown.

### Butter Scotch Pie

1-2 cup milk 2tsp. butter  
2 eggs 1 cup brown sugar  
2 tsp. powdered 3 tsp. cornstarch sugar

1-2 level tsp Baking Powder.  
Dissolve sugar in 1 cup hot milk. Add corn starch to remaining half cup, combine with slightly beaten egg yolks and add to first mixture, stirring carefully. Cook over hot water till thick, stirring constantly. Let stand over boiling water ten minutes. Take from fire and add butter. When cool pour into pastry shell.

Make meringue of whites of eggs, powdered sugar and baking powder.

whipping until very stiff. Cover butterscotch mixture with this meringue and brown in a slow oven.

### Pommes Pierrot

6 large cooking apples  
1 cup cream  
2 tablespoons butter  
1-2 cup water

Make a syrup of the sugar and water. Pare the apples, cut each into eighths and core. Stew carefully in the syrup until they are nearly, but not quite done. Add the butter and let them finish cooking in that; they should drink it all up, gently, stirring carefully all the while so as not to break the apples. As soon as all are well mixed, take off the fire and pour into a glass serving dish. Grate nutmeg over the top and serve just warm.

### Frozen Cranberries

1 quart firm, ripe cranberries  
2 cups boiling water  
2 1-2 cups sugar.

Wash the cranberries, add the sugar and water, heat to the boiling point and boil for 15 minutes. Rub through a course strainer, cool and fill small molds of baking powder tins to overflowing. Cover tightly, seal the edges with melted fat and bury in equal parts of ice and salt for three or four hours.
