POULTRY EXHIBIT UNDER APA RULES

Nolan County Fair Show to Be Official National Poultry Association Event
MUST OBTAIN MEMBERS
Seven More Members Necessary to Organize Unit—Noted Judge Coming—Many Prizes

If plans of Nolan county poultry breeders work out as expected, the poultry show to be staged here during the Nolan County Fair will be an official show conducted under rules and regulations of the National Poultry Association and one of the leading judges in the nation will be in charge of the exhibits.

This announcement was made Friday by local poultry breeders who are active in arrangement of the fair exhibition.

If the Nolan county show, held here annually during the fair, is to be a unit of the American Poultry Association which is the highest rank poultry exhibit can attain, at least ten members must be secured in the county. When 10 or more members of the N. P. A. are secured, the unit is officially recognized by the association and shows are conducted under the direction and approval of the organization. There are three members of the A. P. A. in the county at the present time, while it is believed that the remaining seven members needed can be readily secured.

Membership application blanks have been secured, and a drive for members for the A. P. A. is planned. Oscar Pate and R. L. Shaffer are two of the local members of the association, and poultry breeders who desire to join have been requested to see Pate or Shaffer.

O. L. Tribble of Little Rock, Ark., is the judge that will be brought here to pick the winning birds and pens at the poultry show during the Nolan County Fair. Tribble is one of the leading poultry breeders in the South, is owner and manager of the Tribble Poultry Farm of Little Rock, and is a licensed A. P. A. judge. Not stopping at judging an exhibit, Tribble answers all questions concerning poultry raising, and his presence at any show is said to mean a short course in poultry raising to those who are interested in the rapidly growing industry.

Tribble is expected to arrive here early Wednesday, Oct. 28, the first day of the fair, and will remain here during the entire four days.

If a unit of the A. P. A. is organized here before the fair opens, exhibitors at the poultry show will have an opportunity to win some of the regular A. P. A. prizes that are offered at each A. P. A. show, in addition to the cash awards arranged by the Nolan County Fair Association.

The A. P. A. prizes include a silver special medals for the best cockerels loving cup for the winning display, in each class, and an A. P. A. diploma to the first prize winner in the cock, hen, cockerel, pullet and pen exhibits of all classes. For the boys' and girls' division, special medals and diplomas are awarded similar to the other contests.

In addition to these prizes, \$30 in cash awards will be distributed to winners in various divisions of the show. These prizes are listed in the fair catalogue and range from the \$10.00 prize for the best display of birds of all varieties, to \$2.50 for the best dozen eggs.

The poultry exhibit building will be completed at the fair grounds before the fair opens, and splendid quarters will be provided for this department of the fair.

EVIDENCE VARIES IN MARTIN TRIAL

Defense Claims Special Officer Imported to "Get" Martin—State Denies This

TILTS ENLIVEN PROCEEDINGS

Counsel Filed \$100 and Two Days in Jail for Making Improper Remark to Witness

DALLAS, Oct. 9.—Conflicting evidence was given surrounding the capture of W. A. Martin, on trial here for the slaying of deputy sheriff R. S. Parsons at Denton, by officers who participated in his capture, today.

The point of dispute was the nature of the order given Sheriff Schlyer Marshal, Jr., Dallas county, by Sheriff W. F. Fry, Denton, immediately preceding the attack and capture of Martin who barricaded himself in defiance in his home. Fry, a state witness, denied allegations made by the defense counsel yesterday to the effect that he had insisted to the Dallas county sheriff to "go out to Martin's home and kill every one in there."

Marshal testified during the morning session that the Denton county sheriff did tell him to kill everyone in the house.

Several character witnesses were called by the state during the morning and gave testimony concerning the general conduct of and law respecting nature of the slain officer who is alleged by the defense counsel as being imported to Denton for the purpose of "getting Martin."

Legal tilts marked the morning session. Frequent attacks against evidence by opposing attorneys slowed up the proceedings and Monroe, Martin's counsel, was fined \$100 and given two days in jail for an improper remark to a state witness.

MEET FRIDAY

Court of Honor Makes Arrangements for Awards to Boy Scouts Who Have Earned Advancements

The preliminary meeting of the Boy Scout Court of Honor for the Sweetwater troops was held Friday morning when dates were set for the first public session. This meeting will be Friday, November 6, and at that time awards will be made to local scouts.

The Court of Honor is composed of B. H. McLain, chairman; Rev. B. B. Hestir, Gas Farrar, R. K. McAdams, Dr. A. H. Fortner, James Henry Beall and John Focht. Focht is chairman of the board of review which is composed of all local Scoutmasters.

The Court of Honor makes awards for advancement earned by the Scouts and will hold a meeting each month. At the November session, Scouts who won advancement during the summer camp or in the past few months, will receive certificates of promotions and the badges and medals will be awarded later. Advancements include passing the requirements for Second Class, First Class, Merit Badges, Star, Life and Eagle Scouts.

The board of review will pass on and review examinations taken by the Scouts and certify the boys to the Court of Honor. The first meeting of the board of review will be held here November 2.

According to Scout Executive W. S. Barcus, similar courts of honor will be organized in each county in the Buffalo Trail Council.

POSTPONE THIRD GAME OF SERIES

Decision to Postpone Friday's Washington-Pittsburgh Game Account Rain Made by Landis

FAVORS THE SENATORS

Will Give Bluege Extra Day to Recover from Injury—Johnson and Coveleskie Will Rest

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—The third game of the World Series between Washington and Pittsburgh was postponed today because of rain.

The decision to postpone was made by Judge Landis after a conference with representatives of the two clubs after he had been advised by umpires that the field was not fit to play on.

The postponement favors the Senators as it gives Orville Bluege, Washington third baseman who was hit in the head by a pitched ball yesterday at least another 24 hours to recover. It also gives Walter Johnson and "Doc" Coveleskie, veteran twirlers of the World champions, an extra day to rest their arms.

Bluege was rapidly recovering from his injury today and will be in the Washington lineup tomorrow.

MANY TEACHERS WILL MEET HERE

Joint Institute for Howard, Mitchell, Seurry and Nolan Counties, December 14 to 18

STRONG PROGRAM PLANNED

H. W. Morelock of Sul Ross in Charge—Sandifer, Hunt, Horn and Baxter to Speak

With two additional counties included in the Teachers Institute to be held here this year, around 500 teachers are expected to spend a week in Sweetwater December 14 to 18, when the sessions are scheduled.

Howard and Mitchell counties will join with Seurry and Nolan in a joint institute this year. Last year Snyder entertained the two counties of Nolan and Seurry, while Howard and Mitchell had other arrangements.

A very strong program is being arranged by County Superintendent of Schools Will Scott. H. W. Morelock, president of Sul Ross State Teachers College at Alpine will have charge. Among the speakers who have already arranged to speak during the institute are J. D. Sandifer, president of Simmons University; J. W. Hunt, president of McMurry College, Paul W. Horn, president of the Texas Tech and Russell Baxter, president of Abilene Christian College.

BLAST PUZZLES

Officials Laude Light and Power Co. Seek Cause of Explosion Which Killed Four

ST. LOUIS, Oct. 9.—Company officials today started an investigation into the cause of the blast which swept the lower floor of the Laude Light and Power Co. building here, killing four and injuring 35. Fifteen others were treated for abrasions and bruises.

First reports declared the explosion which shook the business district of St. Louis was caused by a bursting ammonia tank. This could not be verified by officials today.

Officials were unable to estimate the amount of loss. The lower floor which had been recently remodeled at a cost of \$70,000 was ruined. The basement was also wrecked and the second and third floors damaged.

Jury Is Liberal

DALLAS, Oct. 9.—For one time an attorney not more than he asked for a jury.

An assistant prosecutor asked the jury in a case against a man for driving an automobile while intoxicated, to assess a fine of \$25.

The jury fined him \$50 and costs and sent him to jail for a month.

MRS LANSDOWNE BLAMES WILBUR

Widow of Shenandoah Commander Testifies Before Naval Court and Attacks Navy Chief

SAYS HUSBAND PROTESTED

Youthful Widow Testifies Husband Protested Against Fatal Trip—'Wilbur Is Wrong'

WASHINGTON, Oct. 9.—Responsibility for the Shenandoah disaster was directly charged to the Navy Department by Mrs. Margaret Ross Lansdowne, youthful widow of the ship commander when she testified today before the Naval Court of Inquiry.

Terse, Mrs. Lansdowne charged that the navy chief's order for the westward trip of the navy dirigible were over the protests of her husband and that the trip was inspired wholly by political motives.

Dressed in mourning for her dead husband, the widow told the court she was appearing to answer Secretary Wilbur's accredited statement that her husband made no protest to the department. The record of the inquiry will prove that Wilbur is wrong, she said.

The court adjourned until Monday following Mrs. Lansdowne's testimony.

RAIN AND COLD IN NORTH TEXAS

Norther Hits Bringing Low Temperature and Rain—Extends to Oklahoma City

THERMOMETER 44 DEGREES

New Low Mark for This Fall Reached in Sweetwater—Rain Gauge Here .13 at 8 O'clock

DALLAS, Oct. 9.—Rain varying from a sprinkle to an inch downpour followed a norther which blanketed north Texas and extended as far north as Oklahoma City today.

Dallas received .93 of an inch, Amarillo, .80, Taylor .70, and Abilene .04.

Friday proved to be a repetition of Thursday, only more so, in so far as the weather dished out in West Texas was concerned.

The thermometer sank to 44 degrees, a new low level for this fall with the disagreeableness heightened by a cold drizzle sweeping down from the north.

Only .13 of an inch of rain was recorded at 8 o'clock, however, according to the Sweetwater Vulcanizing Co. volunteer weather observers for this section. Another .53 inches was recorded up to two o'clock.

Misting rain and low temperatures were reported by all three of the railroads in Sweetwater as extending generally over all their lines.

The Orient reported the same slow drizzle as being general, but heavier to the north around Chillicothe.

The Santa Fe reported rain and cool weather as being general over the South Plains and Panhandle. Cloudy weather with northeast wind and temperature of 40 was reported by Amarillo.

Rain and cold was reported both east and west by the Texas and Pacific railroad.

Al G. Barnes circus the time-honored circus parade was abandoned during the season of 1923, and, for the same reason the street pageant was omitted last season and again this year. There seems to be little chance of ever restoring it again as the big show of 1925 is even larger and heavier than those of the past seasons.

As even the laymen know, the circus man's first business is to get the show paraphernalia and vast properties from the railroad yards to the show grounds and then put them and the great tents in place. 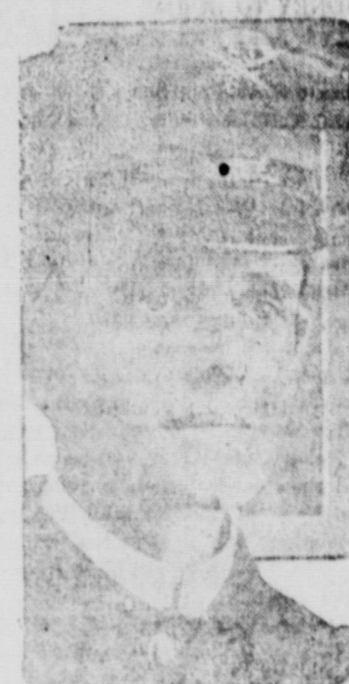

Pecan and Cherry Torte
Prepare the cake mixture below, baking at the day before it is needed in fairly deep muffin pans. Just before serving cut off the top, hollow out the center and fill with a mixture of whipped cream, chopped pecans and maraschino cherries. Replace top and decorate with whipped cream.

3/4 cup flour, 4 tablespoons sugar, 2 tablespoons melted butter, 2 eggs, 1 teaspoon baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon vanilla, 1/4 teaspoon salt.

Beat eggs thoroughly with sugar, adding mixture over a pan of boiling water. Remove from water and beat until cold. Sift in flour, salt and baking powder. Mix carefully and add melted butter and flavoring. Bake in moderate oven.

dimination of the street parade an absolute necessity.

It is estimated that the Al G. Barnes circus, which arrives to give two performances in Sweetwater on Monday, Oct. 12, is at least a third larger than when last in this district.

HOUSEHOLD HINTS

1. In reheating rolls or biscuits to keep them from drying out, try putting them in a paper bag, fasten the bag and put in a moderate oven for ten or fifteen minutes, or until the bag begins to turn brown. The rolls or biscuits will be almost like fresh.

2. Instead of using sugar to sweeten whipped cream, use maple syrup; this gives a delicious flavor and also takes the place of sugar.

3. To remove grease spots from woolen use vinegar instead of gasoline; it removes it much quicker and leaves no ring.

4. Try sprinkling grated cheese over the crust of your apple pies. This must be done while the pie is hot. This makes a delicious addition.

5. Instead of taking the time to want brown gravy, prepare a large quantity at one time by browning the dry flour in a skillet on top of the stove. It may be stored in a can or paper sack and kept indefinitely.

6. A spoonful of left-over salman added to left-over mashed potatoes gives a variety of your potato balls or cakes.

7. Instead of throwing away a few spoonfuls of pancake batter left over from breakfast, it may be used for dipping chops, veal or croquettes, which would otherwise be dipped in egg and rolled in crumbs.

RECIPES

Corn Fritters

2 cups corn, cut from cob, 2 level teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 cup flour, 2 beaten eggs, 1/2 level teaspoon salt, pinch pepper, 1/2 cup milk, 1 tablespoon melted shortening.

Sift dry ingredients thoroughly, rub in butter and add liquids, beat well and fry like other fritters in a deep kettle of hot fat.

Hot Cheese Biscuits

4 cups flour, 4 teaspoons baking powder, 4 tablespoons fat, 1 1/2 cups milk, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-2 cup grated cheese.

Sift flour once, then measure, add salt and baking powder and sift three times. Add grated cheese, rub in fat with fork; then add milk and mix to a soft dough. Turn on floured board and roll out to 3/4 or 1 inch thickness, cut and bake in a quick oven (450 degrees F.) for fifteen minutes.

Bran Muffins

1 cup flour, 1 cup bran, 2 level teaspoons baking powder, 1/2 level teaspoon salt, 1 egg, 3/4 cup milk, 2 tablespoons melted shortening.

Sift dry ingredients except bran into mixing bowl. Add bran and mix well. Beat egg until light; add milk. Combine with dry material, add melted shortening. Beat batter three or four times, pour into greased muffin pan and bake 15 minutes in hot oven. This makes eight large or twelve small muffins.

Peach Dumplings

Dough—2 cups flour, 3/4 teaspoon baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 cup fat, 1/2 cup water.

Filling—6 peaches (fresh or canned), 1/2 cup sugar, 3/4 teaspoon mace 1/4 cup dates, 1/4 cup nuts.

Make dough like biscuit dough. Roll 1/4 inch thick and cut in squares. On each square place a peach half. In the cavity of each peach place some of the filling. Fold edges over peach and press together. Place folded edge down in baking pan, and bake in a moderate oven until brown. Serve with cream or hard sauce.

THE USE OF BACON

By using bacon frequently the housewife adds greatly to the flavor and interest of the food she serves. Bacon can be cooked and served with greens and beans, and used to garnish and give flavor to many vegetables, poultry and meat dishes. A small amount previously cooked and cut up makes any soup tastier. Bacon with eggs, scrambled or fried, is hearty enough for a dinner dish occasionally.

Savory rolls made out of chopped meat, such as beef and pork mixed, a round steak, are improved by laying over them thin slices of bacon which keeps the surface moistened with fat during the baking. These slices should be scored on the edge so that they will not curl up in cooking. The bacon is particularly needed for flavor and fat when the chopped meat is chiefly beef. Two or three slices of bacon placed under the roll in the baking pan will prevent the meat from sticking and add to the fat available for gravy making.

Try placing a few slices of bacon on top of your macaroni and cheese just before putting in the oven. It greatly improves the flavor.

In the autumn there is always much scattering of people in the direction of the four winds—children starting off to school, older brothers and sisters to college, and summer visitors returning home. The air is filled with "Good

Bye's" and "Good Luck's" and farewell parties are on all sides.

If you want to be different, make your party a "Bon Voyage" luncheon.

A very amusing table center piece can be arranged out of a toy yellow taxi cab with a picture of the person who is leaving pasted inside the window, large tears (made with pen and ink) flowing from her eyes. Grouped about the cab are a number of small dolls dressed as neatly as possible like the assembled guests, all waving handkerchiefs and some shedding painted tears.

For placed cards used stamped addressed post cards which can be given the departing guest for her to send back to the owners with impressions of her trip. For the guest herself, a little gift in the shape of a line a day diary with her name inscribed on the flyleaf will serve as a place card.

Instead of ordinary nut cups of bon bon dishes, use the little pasteboard hard bags or suitcases which can be found at any 5 and 10 cent store.

The following menu is suggested because much of the preparation can be done ahead of time.

Chicken Mousse
Stuffed Tomato Salad
Coffee or Iced Tea
Pecan and Cherry Torte

Chicken Mousse

2 tablespoons gelatine, 4 tablespoons cold water, 2 1/2 cups cooked chicken, minced, 1/8 teaspoon paprika, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 tablespoon finely chopped parsley, 2 tablespoons finely chopped pimiento, 3/4 cup whipped cream.

Soak gelatine in cold water 10 minutes. Set in pan of boiling water until dissolved. Mix chicken, paprika, salt, parsley and pimiento and add dissolved gelatine. Mix well together and fold in whipped cream. Put into individual molds. Chill thoroughly. Unmold on lettuce and garnish with watercress and olives.

He snatched it out, however, while it was still recognizable and in accounting for his error explained that he thought only of safe guarding it, and didn't have "money to burn."

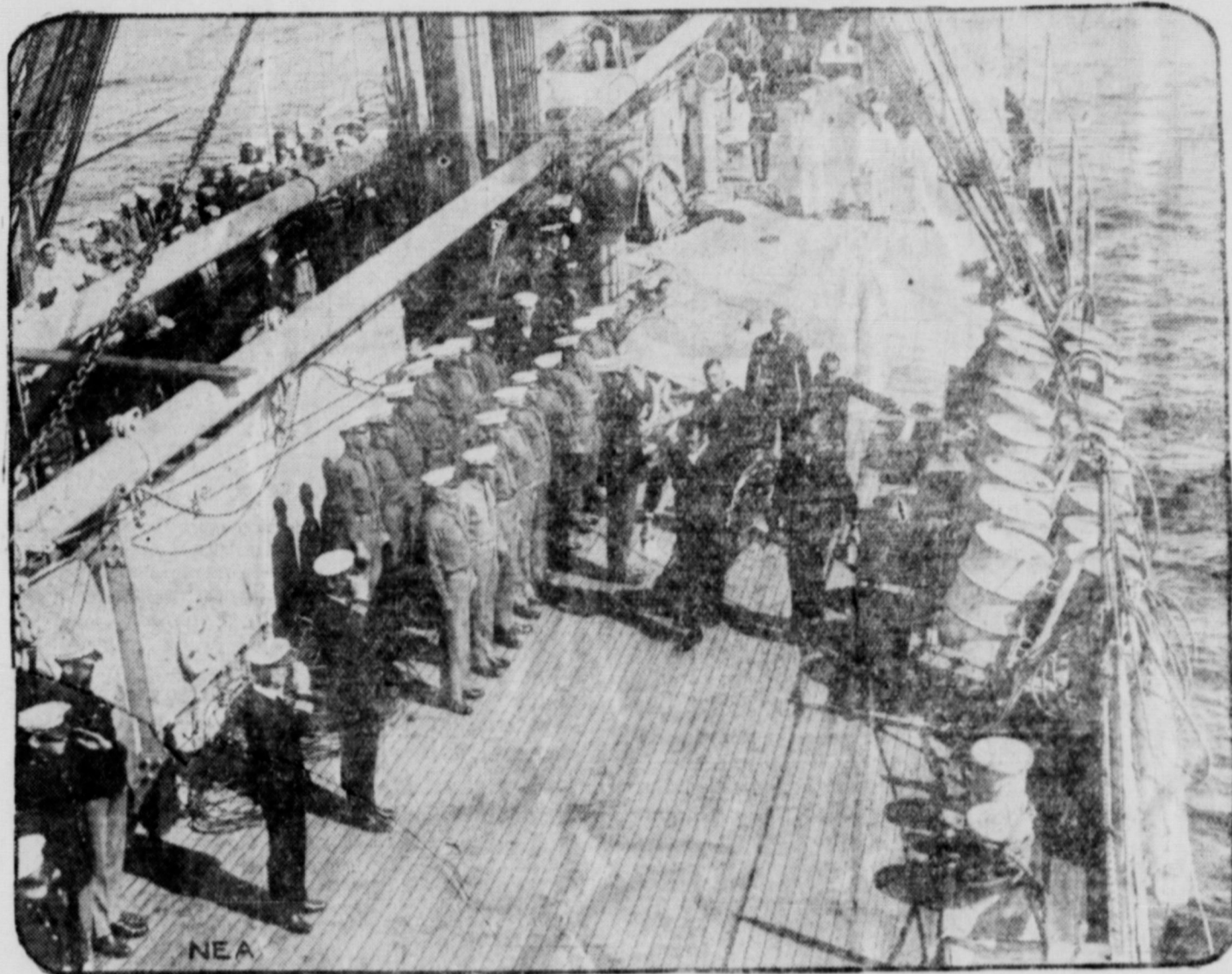

SOUPS

With the approach of the cold days of winter, we are all more or less inclined toward the piping hot dishes, and especially soups, fragrant and appetizing, served as a first course, or possibly heavier soups to form the main dish. This, with bread and butter, hot baking powder biscuits or cornbread, makes an excellent and nourishing meal for both children and grownups.

Soup, in most instances, is a very economical and wholesome food. Inexpensive and at the same time, a most palatable one may be made from bits of meat and vegetables combined with a stock saved from the preparation of some other food. Where all fresh meat and vegetables must be purchased just for the soup, of course it is more expensive. This is especially true of the small families where the housewife is better able to regulate the amount of food to be bought and cooked for each meal, so there are few leftovers. In this case, it is advisable to keep a few cans of some

well known quality brand of commercial soup on the pantry shelves, as an emergency sock.

There are two classes of soups—milk and stock soups—and these include practically all kinds. Vegetables are combined with either milk, or meat stock, or both. The many varieties of soup get their names from the different materials used in them, which give substance and flavor.

Some of the vegetables most commonly used in soups are, potatoes, young carrots, celery, ripe tomatoes, fine corn, parsley, barley, rice, macaroni, baby lima beans, Dutch cabbage, okra, onions and sweet seed peppers.

For soup stocks, pieces of rough muscle and bone, such as shin, neck, ox-tails and calves' heads are used. Smoked, salted, or very fat meat in any large quantity is undesirable, although sometimes a bit of ham or bacon is used for flavor.

The general rule for stock is to allow for every pound of meat and bone, 1 quart cold water, 1 teaspoon salt, 4 peppercorns, 4 cloves, 1-4 tea spoon mixed herbs, and 1 tablespoon of each vegetable cut fine.

For clear soups, the top should be skimmed as it cooks, however where nutriment is the chief end, the stock should not be skimmed for this would mean removing a large part of the albumen and globulin of the meat. When the soup has been cooked sufficiently

it should be allowed to cool so that the fat will rise to the top and can be taken off. It is then ready to be heated and served.

For invalids, clear broths or consommé, and tomato soups are preferred. For the heartier appetite, vegetable, meat and vegetable mixed, or all and chicken soups are ordinary.

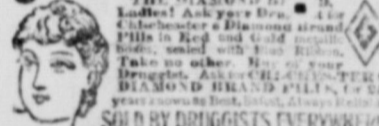

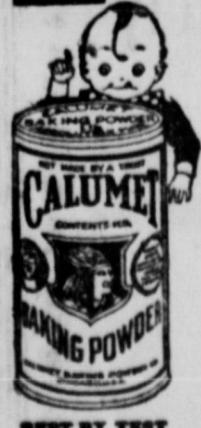

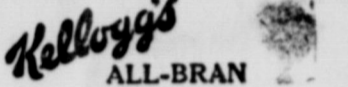

"Fluffy" is just the name for these lovely, light biscuits. A recipe by Mrs. Ida Chitwood, who was in charge of the Cooking School recently conducted by the Reporter.

2 cups flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
1/2 teaspoon salt

2 tablespoons Crisco
