## MAYOR CHANGES CITY FINANCES

Water Works Cash to Be Handled by City Secretary in Future Instead of Superintendent

### POLK OFFERS RESIGNATION

Was Employed by Water Commissioner Barndwell—Call Special Salary Election Nov. 10

All funds of the city water department have been turned over to the city secretary, Mrs. Mattie Trammell, who will henceforth handle water revenues and the water works fund as well as all other city funds, following an order by Mayor John J. Ford. This order revokes one enacted in 1917 and reverses a custom of eight years' standing.

Funds of the water department have previously been handled by the water superintendent.

According to city records, in 1917 the water works checks and drafts commenced to be signed by the water superintendent, who, in most instances was the water commissioner. All water works funds have been handled by the water superintendent until the Mayor ordered the funds and accounts delivered over to the City Secretary.

Since the inauguration of the new city administration, Louis Polk, resigning for and employed by Roy Barndwell when the latter took office as water commissioner and shortly thereafter became seriously ill, has been in charge of the water department. During Barndwell's absence or account of illness, his salary as well as Polk's salary, continued to be paid by the water department. The mayor said Polk was not employed by the city commission, and that salaries for Barndwell and Polk were never authorized.

Polk has offered his resignation. He stated that he was resigning with the realization that the administration was striving to cut down expenses and operate on an economical basis as possible, and because his services could now be dispensed with. It has not been announced what will take over the active handling of the water works department.

The salary matter and the changing of the water department funds to the city secretary may be brought up in the commission meeting scheduled for tomorrow.

With the city administration practically at a standstill on account of water commissioner Barndwell's continued illness, any routine matters could be disposed of, although Mayor Ford is carrying out a shake-up in various city affairs. The commission has ordered an election for November 10 to fix the salary of the street commissioner at a sum not to exceed \$150.

The salary for street commissioner has been \$25 a month. In addition to this amount, street commissioner

## MOODY APPEARS BEFORE PROBERS

Attorney General to Testify Before Travis County Grand Jury—In vestigate Road Contracts

### TO BRING ROAD SUITS

Moody Will See to Cancel Delaware Corporation's Maintenance Contracts, It is Indicated

By United Press.

AUSTIN, Oct. 14.—Grand jury investigation of State Highway Commission records of maintenance contracts began today when Attorney General Dan Moody went before the Travis county grand jury to testify. His testimony, it is presumed will be concerning the three weeks' investigation of contracts awarded by the state road commission.

Representatives of the American Road Co., a Delaware corporation, for holding a number of contracts for maintenance, conferred with Moody before the latter went into the grand jury session. Moody is expected to bring suit to cancel the Delaware corporation's contracts.

Moody said today that the case would not be settled out of court.

Warrants on all claims held by road maintenance contractors are being held up by State Comptroller, S. H. Terrell, at the request of the Attorney General.

One boy was captured at Rosses and brought to Sweetwater. The second youth was followed to this city by a group of farmers who lost his trail on the west side of town. Chief of Police Hendrick discovered that the youth had slipped into a residence of a relative on N. W. 3rd street and he entered the house in search of the lad.

Finger prints in dust on the shelves in a closet led the chief up into the attic where the boy had hid in hollow. With the arrest of the boy, one of who gave the name of Opal Woodson, who is said to have once lived here, two suit cases and a quantity of clothing were recovered.

After Woodson was questioned at length by Chief Hendrick and deputy sheriff McGraw, the robbery of the Mrs. Elizabeth Humes residence here about four months ago was cleared up and information leading to the recovery of a water meter here was obtained by Hendrick and McGraw. Woodson had been jailed before in connection with the theft but was later released. He is now being held in connection with the Holmes burglary. The second boy, gave the name of Bepko.

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## BAIL IS FINALLY GRANTED TO POLK

Long Legal Battle for Bond Finally Ends by Decision of Court of Criminal Appeals

### JUDGE BRYANT OVERRULED

Bail Changed With Murder Death Jim Bob Lambert at McCauley—Twice Applies for Writ

Bail in the sum of \$10,000 has been granted James Polk of Fisher county, by the Court of Criminal Appeals, according to a telegram from Olin W. Flinn, clerk of the high court to T. Vard Woodruff, received in Sweetwater Wednesday.

This was the second appeal on a writ of habeas corpus that the high court had granted in this case, overruling Judge Bruce W. Bryant in the first and overruling him in the second.

Polk is in jail at Baby, Fisher county, where he has been held without bond following transfer of the case from Jones county. He is charged with murder in connection with the death of Jim Bob Lambert following an attempt to rob the latter at Sweetwater, Texas, in a store on the night of Nov. 10, 1924. Polk was taken after the shooting.

Bail was denied at the preliminary hearing. Judge Bruce W. Bryant denied an application for a writ of habeas corpus and on appeal, the Court of Criminal Appeals sustained his ruling. Following the indictment by the grand jury, Judge Bryant refused an order of habeas corpus hearing. The Court of Criminal Appeals overruled Judge Bryant, who accordingly granted the hearing but denied the writ. This was carried up on appeal and Judge Bryant was overruled, according to the word received Wednesday.

T. Vard Woodruff and Beverly Nelson, attorneys for Polk, also filed a motion for the disqualification of Judge Bryant, but Judge Bryant overruled this. Bond will be made, according to defense attorneys.

## MELLON TO WORK WITH TAX BOARD

Secretary of Treasury Will Personally Appear Before House Ways and Means Committee

TO DRAFT NEW LAW

Further Stashes in Taxes Planned—May be 25 Per Cent. Cut—Session to Open Monday

By United Press.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—Secretary of the Treasury Mellon will personally appear before the House ways and means committee with his theories of taxation when congressional machinery starts Monday to grind out a new tax collecting device.

The new law will probably include a 25 per cent. cut in taxes of this year, perhaps a twenty-five per cent. cut in 1926.

Congressional leaders announced a schedule whereby they plan to pass on the new law through both branches by next March 1.

After 10 days, the hearing will no longer close doors with the treasury department experts assigned to writing the first draft of the new bill.

House of the house committee starts Monday.

Mellon will give his opinion as to how the \$20 million dollars available for the new cut can best be distributed.

## RECOVER JEWELS

Danahur Jewels, Other Gems Worth \$250,000 Returned by Private Detective

NEW YORK, Oct. 14.—The Danahur jewels have been returned under circumstances as mysterious as those for which they disappeared.

## SIMS RAPS NAVY DATES CONFLICT HEADS ON STAND IN TWO MEETINGS

Retired Admiral U. S. Navy Enters Aircraft Controversy by Criticizing Administration

### NOT FIRST CRITICISM

Was Engaged in Bitter Controversy With Navy Heads 20 Years Ago—Tribute to Mitchell

WASHINGTON, Oct. 14.—Admiral William S. Sims, retired commander of the United States fleet in European waters during the World War, and a hero himself of a contest 20 years ago between himself and the Navy Department over gunnery, entered the aircraft controversy before the special aircraft investigation board today.

Aggressive as ever with the insatiable thirst for perfection which drove him as a young lieutenant stationed in China, to challenge his superiors with charges of inefficiency, attacked the present directive heads of the sea forces for ignoring progress.

"The Navy Department is violating every known principle of command and administration of the air force," he said tersely. "It belittles as well the power of airplanes while airmen are enthusiastic over its development and purpose."

The Navy for many years has been controlled by "uneducated, untrained officers," Sims continued. Sims denounced the Navy for believing that battleships can successfully defend themselves against armed aircraft and for harping on "a well balanced fleet." He belittled the Navy Department's investigation into the real value of airplane versus battleship.

"The Secretary of the Navy returned from a speaking tour and ordered an investigation after declaring that the battleship was the backbone of the Navy. The board held its investigation and reported that the battleship is still the backbone of the Navy. That is investigating in a circle."

## MOTHER AND SON SHOT BY MANIAC

Young Man Kills His Mother and Brother by Firing Thru Window of Farm House

TAKE HIS OWN LIFE

Three Children Witness Triple Killing—Had Previously Threatened Family With Axe

KELLOGG, Idaho, Oct. 14.—Three persons were dead today, slain by the hand of an apparent maniac.

Arvie Jutila, 21, shot and killed his mother, Mrs. Ida Jutila, and his brother, Arthur, and then took his own life. The shooting occurred last night on a farm near Kingston.

A few nights ago, Mrs. Jutila called authorities after Arvie threatened her and four children with an axe.

Arvie escaped from the house and eluded a search by authorities.

He returned again last night with a gun and fired thru the window at his victims. Three children, left orphans, witnessed the shooting.

SHOW INCREASE

Postal Receipts Ahead of Last Year Postmaster Says

BERLIN, Oct. 14.—Secretary of State E. E. Kerper, a member of the German delegation to the Locarno conference today reported to President Von Hindenberg prior to his return to Switzerland today.

He arrived here late yesterday and promptly went into conference with the German president. He explained the progress of the Security Pact negotiations with reference to the conditions the Allies wished to impose on Germany in connection with her entrance into the League.

## Nolan County Road Hearing at Austin and Orient Meeting in Sweetwater Same Day

County Judge A. S. Mauzey and the Commissioners Court will attempt to have the Austin road hearing date, on which the County officials will go into session with the State Highway Commission, moved up a few days in order that it will not conflict with the meeting of county judges, Orient officials, and West Texas Chamber of Commerce officials here on October 26.

### JUDGE WIRES FOR NEW DATE

Declares Will Be Necessary for Nolan County Commissioners to Attend Austin Parley

Mauzey made this announcement Wednesday morning following the receipt of information that the Orient tax rate parley was scheduled for this city on October 26. This date had previously been named as the day when the Highway Commission would hear statements from county officials in connection with the highway construction program in Nolan county. It is Mauzey's intention to attend both the Austin hearing and the "Orient meeting" here providing a new date for one of the sessions can be arranged.

If the date cannot be changed, the county judge and commissioners will probably go ahead and carry out their scheduled session in Austin rather than remain in Sweetwater for the other meeting. This is because of the fact that the highway meeting date was named first, and because it carries greater direct importance to the county, it was pointed out.

Clifford Histed, attorney for the Orient railroad, and W. T. Kemper, president of the road, plans for reorganization of the K. C. M. & O. will be the subject of discussion at the meeting here Oct. 26. Orient officials, West Texas Chamber of Commerce officials, and county judges from every county that the Orient line traverses from the Red River to the Rio Grande will attend the session here.

The meeting is scheduled to begin at 10 a. m., Monday, October 26, in the court house.

Legal questions will be gone into as they affect the organization plan, and it is probable the county judges will name committees to take such action as may be necessary to place Texas squarely behind the plan which according to those informed, offers a time the only solution of the problem of continued operation of the road which serves some 700,000 people.

It is possible the county judges will also settle upon some plan for taxing the road at a fixed rate commensurate with its income in the respective sections, if this can be done in accord with the law.

State Railroad Commissioner Lon Smith has joined with the West Texas Chamber of Commerce in issuing the call for the judges to meet. Smith and other officials of the Railroad Commission will attend the Sweetwater session.

The Sweetwater Board of City Development will entertain the county judges and other guests at lunch the day of the meeting.

## FRANCE TO SEND NEW DEBT PLAN

Counter Proposal Being Worked on by French Ministry of Finance, United Press Told

MEANS REJECTION U. S. PLAN

Reported Intention Would Cut Under U. S. Proposal of Forty Million Annual Payments

By United Press.

PARIS, Oct. 14.—The French government will send a counter proposal to the United States relative to the funding of the debt to America, it was semi-officially admitted at the French Ministry of Finance today.

The proposal brought back from America by the Debt Commission for the five year breathing spell during which forty million a year is to be paid is still being studied with no decision in sight, the United Press was told.

However the reported intention to make a counter proposal is taken to mean that the Washington proposal has already been rejected.

The tremendous influx of cotton pickers into this section from here and there and everywhere is bound to bring a flood of undesirables along with it.

It behooves the public to be on its guard.

JUST GETTING BY

A prominent local business man told us the other day that his greatest trouble was in securing competent help.

"People these days seem to try and see how little they can do and get by on. They are right on the ragged edge all the time. Instead of taking an interest in their employer's business and helping it to grow, so that he in turn can afford better salaries as his employees are worth more, they skimp and stall and hedge around."

The world is full of people like that who live virtuous but beyond price, nothing for them. For the man who earns only what he gets is going back ward all the time. He is gradually worth less and less to his employers, to himself and to the world.

Loyalty to one's employer is a simple virtue but beyond price. And that brings to mind the story of the man who told his friend that he was going to have a share in the business where he was employed. "How come?" asked the friend. "Well, the old man told me that he was going to fire me if I didn't take an interest in the business, so I guess he must want me in the firm."

MAYOR CHANGES

Tammell has received \$125 a month as traffic policeman and park superintendent. If the election carries and the salary is fixed at a sum not to exceed \$150, Tammell will continue to act as park superintendent, but will receive no additional salary for this work. He is no longer connected with the traffic police.

With only one commissioner and the mayor now forming the city governing body, no ordinance can be passed and no other work done that requires the vote of the entire commission.

Paving of two streets, ordered some time ago, can not proceed until an ordinance is passed, and the ordinance can not be authorized without the vote of the two commissioners and mayor. Neither can extension of water or sewer lines or any other expansion of civic activities and progress requiring contracts in excess of \$500 be accomplished during the absence of the water

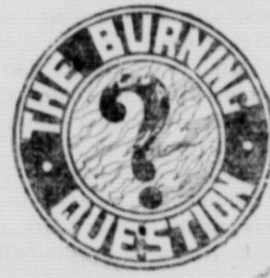

Rates and Capital

All this has to be paid out of the rates it receives for its services. Rates provide the money for running expenses, while capital provides the means for extension and growth.

It is this fresh capital that builds the extensions and improvements. Every thrifty man or woman who succeeds in saving something from his or her earnings, wants to invest this money to the best possible advantage. They want to invest it safely and where they may expect a good rate of interest in exchange for the use of it. If they don't get it they won't invest. That is common sense, for no one should be expected to lend his savings for nothing. It is the rates that pay the interest on capital invested for public utilities.

The West Texas Electric Company has to pay as much as any other for the materials it needs to carry on its business—oil, steel, iron, copper, wood, and the many other products needed in the production and distribution of electricity. Its employees must be efficient and satisfied, and it must pay them the "market" price in wages; otherwise they will go into other industries. Unlike other businesses, however, the utility company cannot fix its own selling prices. It has to pay the "market" price for what it gets, but its own selling prices, or rates, are fixed by some outside authority.

It is from these two sources, Capital and Rates, that the West Texas Electric Company gets the money to carry on its business.

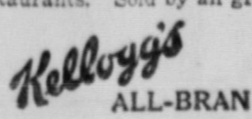

# Chiropractor Is Convicted

JURY FINDS THAT SPINAL ADJUSTMENTS ARE REALLY TREATMENTS. CHIROPRACTOR MUST COMPLY WITH LAW

PARIS, Texas, Oct. 7.—Dr. J. F. Pruett, chiropractor, charged with practicing medicine in Lamar county without a license from the composite, impartial examining board of Texas, was found guilty by a jury in County Court today.

Judge Dewey Lawrence, in his charge to the jury, tracked the law which has been sustained by the higher courts of Texas and by the Supreme Court of the United States.  
Court's Charge to Jury  
Gentlemen of the Jury—It is unlawful for anyone to practice medicine in any of its branches upon human beings within the limits of this State who has not registered in the District Clerk's office of the county in which he resides his authority for so practicing, which authority shall be a license or a verification license issued by the board of medical examiners for the State of Texas.....  
"Any person shall be regarded as practicing medicine within the meaning of the law:  
"1. Who shall publicly profess to be a physician or surgeon and shall treat, or offer to treat, any disease or disorder, mental or physical, or any physical deformity or injury by any system or method, or to affect cures thereof;  
"2. Who shall treat, or offer to treat, any disease or disorder, mental or physical, or any physical deformity or injury, by any system or method or to effect cures thereof, and to charge therefor DIRECTLY OR INDIRECTLY, money or other compensation.  
"The practice of medicine as defined by the statutes of the State of Texas includes every method or system used in treating any disease or disorder, injury or deformity, whether said treatment consists in the use of mechanical means or in the administration of drugs.  
Not Necessary Give Drugs  
"And you are instructed that in order for the defendant in this case to be guilty it was NOT necessary that he should have prescribed or administered any medicines or drugs, but that if he did on the said date treat or offer to treat any disease, disorder, deformity or injury by the APPLICATION OF HIS HANDS to the person of any human being and charge therefor he would within the meaning of the statutes of this State have been a practitioner of medicine.....  
Evidence from the witness stand showed that Dr. Pruett had no license from this State; that he had adjusted the spine of Miss Grace Ryburn; that he had charged her for his treatments which he claimed were "adjustments."  
Theory Explained  
Dr. Pruett took a human spine on the stand and swore that various bones of Miss Ryburn's spine were out of line. The specimen he showed to the jury had the cartilages and ligaments removed and the ribs and breast plate taken off hence it was possible to move the vertebrae of his specimen. In life, however, the cartilages and ligaments bind the bones together so firmly that more than 1000 pounds of force is required to move the vertebra out of line. Then a fracture results which may be remedied by a plaster cast, certainly not simply by the mere hands. Furthermore, the ribs and breast plate so rigidly hold the vertebrae in place that one of them can not be moved without breaking a rib or tearing it loose from the back bone or the breast plate.  
The State was assisted by the Hon. Leo P. Pierson of the firm of Pierson and Pierson, Dallas, special counsel of the State Medical Association.  
Other chiropractors have been found guilty at Boham, McKinney, Ballinger, Mineral Wells, Plano and Brownwood.
