High School Football Players Sus - pended From Team Following Alleged Intoxication

COLORADO FRIDAY PLAY

Machine Weakened by Less of Stars-Many Substitutes Will Play in Hard Contest

The Sweetwater Salty Pups, fac ing one of their hardest battles of the season with the heavy Colorado eleven, will go into the game here Friday weakened by the loss of seven first string players, suspended by Coach Andersen and school officials following alleged intoxication of some of them.

The seven stars of the Salty Pup squad have been dropped for an in definite period, and it was not state Thursday when the seven, or any one of them, would be reinstated. The team members were suspended from the team, and not from the high

A rigid investigation by school officials, under the direction of B. H. Mc Lain, superintendent of schools, has been carried on this week following rumors of "drinking" by the football players. The acts brought to light resulted in the suspension of the play ers from the team. Reports that one of the lady high school teachers was also intoxicated have been proven ab solutely false, McLain said.

The grand jury, which has been in session here, was investigating the affair Wednesday when a group of high school boys, the majority of them members of the football eleven, appear ed before the jury. It was reported. however, that the grand jury was investigating to learn where the alleged intoxicating liquor was obtained. No indictments have been returned in connection with the affair.

MR. BOK AND THE POTATO

Mr. Edward Bok, writing in a cur ent weekly, gilds his boyhood with remembered foresight and heroism. He tells how a petato fell out of a procer's basket and a boy picked it vo. The boy was Bok. Years after wards, as he tells the story, he received a lotter from an old gentleman who wrote:

"You, of course have forgotten it, but I saw you pick up a potato in front of Ritterbusch's grocery. I asket whose bey you were, and decided you would go fur." Then Mr. Bok goes on to describe a friend now old and penniless who all his life has thrown away the string coming around parcels. "When I open a bundle of books today," says Mr. Bok, "I save the string. If I told my friend it was the potato and the string that have kept him where he is today he would laugh in derision. Yet that is exactly what has happened. He has spent and wasted. I have spent and saved."




