## TURKEY MARKET MAY BE BETTER

Opening Price of Around 20c Expect ed as Compared With 15c Opening Last Year

CROP SHORTER THIS YEAR

Only 60 Per Cent of Last Year's Total 23 Cars Expected-Good Price on Cream

A better market for turkeys and a much shorter crop are the two outstanding factors that face poultrymen of this section according to advance information.

It is estimated that the turkey crop in this section will hardly average better than sixty per cent of last year's erop, owing to various and sundry misfortunes to the young stock during the growing season.

Turkeys begin to move to market around November 1 and it is thought likely that around 20 cents per pound will be offered at the beginning of the season with possibility of the price going still higher later in the year.

The season opened at 15c last year, and advanced to as high as 22c later. The bulk of the local crop moved out on the low market, as most local grow ers sold early. It so happened that the Christmas market was much ahead of the Thanksgiving market last year. A threatened embargo last year, owing to the hoof and mouth disease scare, caused much "dumping" and consequent low prices. Many turkeys were not yet matured or ready for market.

A total of 23 carloads of turkeys were shipped out of Sweetwater last year, according to G. J. Diehlman of the Western Produce Co. So far this year 28 carloads of live chickens and 10 carloads of eggs have moved from Sweetwater. Prices for both have been unusually good this year, as high as 20c a pound being paid for poultry and as high as \$11 a case or around 35c a dozen being paid for eggs. Eggs are of course not moving now nor are poultry. The latter will begin to move again after the first of the year.

An exceptionally strong market for cream has been in existence all the year with but few farmers taking advantage of it. At this time cream will bring 42c a pound which is con sidered a very good price.





#### Three Pints Water Daily Essential to Body's Well Being

BY DR. HUGH S. CUMMING, geon General, United States Publie Health Service.

Good water is essential to life, Water comprises about 70 per cent of the body weight and is necessary to provide elasticity and suppleness to muscles, bones, cartilage and tendons, to moisten various parts of the body so that they may perform their functions, and to act as a solvent for fcod so that it may be absorbed

Water also provides a fluid me-dium for the blood and lymph by which nutritive substances are taken to all parts of the body and waste

Products are removed.

Rain water that has not run down roof is pure water, but it is insipid and distasteful because it doe not contain certain mineral salts and other properties that makes for good drinking water. On the other hand water that contains too much mineral salts may be otherwise pure and still be quite unfit for drinking.

Water dissolves substances, both gases and solids, and absorbs odors. Because of these properties and because water is usually taken into the body raw, it is one of the most potent carriers of harmful bacteria.
