These days he'd probably have to give his zip code, driver's license, car tag, phone number, social security number, ATM number, checking account number, and frequent flier ID.

City Hears Both Sides Of "Trucker" Issue

After hearing statements from residents (and at least one non-resident), the Friona City Council voted Monday night to keep the city's trucking ordinance in effect, but agreed to ask the State Highway Department to do a study on the highways through the city and see what the possibilities are for trucks to park along the highways for business purposes.

The council met in a special called meeting at the Friona American Legion Hall which drew a "packed house" estimated at 100 people.

Several truckers, as well as business owners and residents spoke out on the issue.

"It's obvious by the turnout tonight that we need to work together to solve this problem," stated councilman Tom Randolph.

The ordinance, which was passed by the city council in 1983, prohibits trucks with gross vehicle weight of 10,000 pounds from city streets. They are required to stay on U.S. Highway 60, Texas Highway 214 and on Main Street from U.S. 60 to Fifth Street. It also prohibits trucks from parking on any city street.

Those who spoke out in opposition to the ordinance criticized it as being anti-trucking or anti-business.

Reyes Estrada, owner of Maria's Restaurant, said "We have had some problems due to the ordinance. We need to work together on this. We need to get the truckers to spend money with us. I also work at Excel and I've met a lot of truckers who say they'd rather go to Clovis or Hereford to eat, due to the ordinance."

Gladys Day commented "Several years ago the Chamber of Commerce raised the money to give the land where Excel is now located. Several people gave money to get the packing plant, because they felt it would help Friona. We have grown, but we have a problem that needs to be solved. How did we think the cattle would get in and out of Excel, if they didn't use trucks?"

Clyde Field said that prior to the enactment of the truck ordinance, it was not uncommon for three or four trucks to be parked in his neighborhood. "One of them would always be cranked up at about 4 o'clock in the morning and would sit and idle. We'd also have cattle trucks within 50 or 75 feet of our house, and they don't smell like a bed of roses."

"There are several businesses I can't go to because of the ordinance," said trucker Mark Anthony.

Joe Bermea said he had two trailers that had been parking behind Kendrick Oil at night. "The drivers were told that they'd have to go in through Main Street, without going onto Kendrick's property," indicating that was an impossibility, without getting on a city street.

Dee King agreed with this point, saying "We ought to give these guys a block, or a little leeway. We need to try to work with them."

Robert Saiz said "Maybe we ought to change the sign that says 'Welcome to Friona,' and add 'But if you're a trucker, don't come here--you're not welcome.'"

Mayor Clarence Monroe defended the need for the anti-parking ordinance by pointing out the difference in construction of the city streets, compared to the state highways. Roger Field, city employee, held up a section of asphalt taken from a state highway cutting that was seven or eight inches thick. By contrast, a section from a city street was shown that was only three inches or less thick.

"We spend at least \$30,000 per year repairing torn up streets. It comes to \$55-\$60,000 every two years," Mayor Clarence Monroe stated, pointing out that the city's streets just aren't constructed to accommodate the heavier truck traffic.

A discussion was held as to who erected the "no parking" signs--the city or the state.

"We put them up, and the state thanked us," said City Manager Paula Wilson.

Asked why the city couldn't take the signs down, Mrs. Wilson replied "If we hadn't put the signs up, the state would have."

Members of the Friona Police Department defended the allegation of harassment of the truckers.

"If we stop someone (a trucker) for the first time, we simply ask them not to drive on a city street," said Patrolman Steve Jones.

Friona Woman Appointed Regional Office Director

U.S. Senator Kay Bailey Hutchison has appointed Shea Woodard to serve as director of her new West Texas regional office, which is scheduled to open in Abilene on February 1.

Senator Hutchison announced the appointment during a press conference at the Abilene Chamber of Commerce on January 16.

Ms. Woodard, a native of Friona, has worked for Senator Hutchison since 1992, when the senator was Texas State Treasurer. The new regional director attended Abilene Christian University and is a graduate of West Texas A&M in Canyon.

"I am pleased and excited to announce the opening of an Abilene office to serve our constituents. I know Shea will do a wonderful job representing me here," Senator Hutchison said. "We will now be better situated to provide assistance to the people of West Texas."

Tentative plans have been made to establish the senator's West

Texas Regional Office in the NationsBank Tower, 500 Chestnut, Suite 1570 in Abilene. Senator Hutchison has other regional offices in Dallas, Houston, Austin and San Antonio.

Ms. Woodard currently serves as the senator's state scheduler in her Austin office. A native of the Panhandle, Woodard said she was itching to return to West Texas.

"I'm around people I know I can work with and live with," she said. "You have a great life here in Abilene."

Woodard has ties to Abilene. She attended Abilene Christian University one semester and her aunt's college roommate at ACU was Mayor McCaleb's wife.

"She's bright, sharp and has great talent for working with people," McCaleb said. "From everything I know about Shea, I understand why the senator would have a lot of confidence in her."

Chamber Schedules Panhandle Day In Austin

The Panhandle's biennial trek to lobby the Texas Legislature has been set for Tuesday, March 28 and includes a full day of lunch, lobbying and laughter and concludes with a barbecue dinner on the Capitol lawn, according to Tom Randolph, president of the Friona Chamber of Commerce & Agriculture.

"Panhandle Day in Austin is one of the most effective ways our region has come up with to impact the legislative process," said Randolph.

Senator Teel Bivins said the biennial Panhandle Day celebration is an integral part of the region's legislative effort.

"Panhandle Day is a great opportunity for our people to meet the state's legislative leaders and let them know our concerns," said Bivins. While it's a lot of fun and the food is good, it's also an important part of the Panhandle's overall legislative effort.

A charter plane departs Amarillo at 10:30 a.m. and arrives Austin before noon on March 28. Buses will provide transportation to a lunch with Governor George W.

Bush or Lieutenant Governor Bob Bullock.

After lunch, participants will then divide into legislative teams and visit the legislature and many state agencies to educate legislators about issues of concern to the Panhandle region.

"We are particularly interested in streamlining the permitting processes for businesses and protecting private property rights," said Randolph. "Also, we need to continue to promote the education facilities within our region and improve our transportation infrastructure."

One regional commodity sure to receive attention is beef as 11 cooking teams from throughout the Panhandle will prepare a barbecue dinner for the entire Legislature to be served on the grounds of the Capitol.

Buses will return participants to the airport for an 8:30 departure from Austin arriving back in Amarillo at 9:40 p.m.

Cost for the trip, including both dinners, will be under \$290 and interested parties should contact the Friona Chamber of Commerce at 247-3491. More than 250 volunteers from 23 Panhandle communities participated in the 1993 Panhandle Day in Austin.

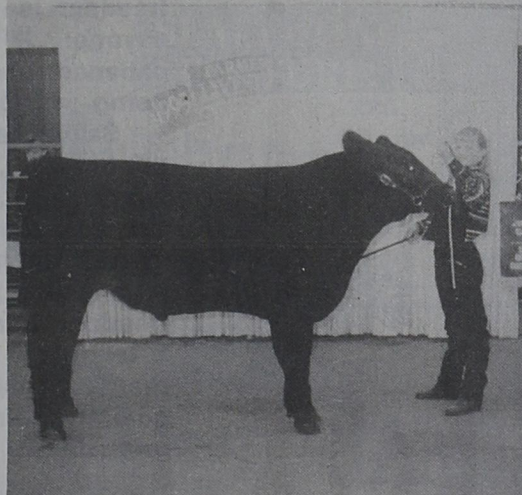
The menu will include fried chicken and all the trimmings, dessert and drink.

operation in Friona and took delivery on its first load of beef liver this week. Among the company's first business will be filling a large order to be shipped to France.

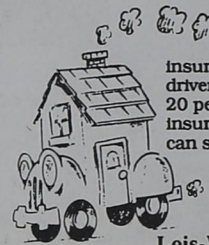

Friona State Bank has announced that Ab Hendley and Marca Lynn Herring have joined the staff at the Bank beginning in January.

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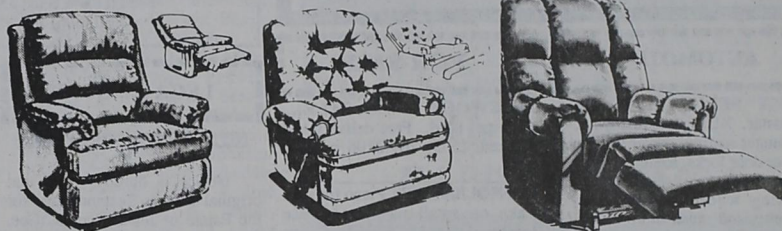

Council Studies Truck Problems

 Superintendent, commented that the Friona Junior High was in a "bad location," in reference to the highway. "Since I have a captive audience tonight, I'd like to say that we'd like to ask the truckers, as well as other drivers, to be careful going through the school zone."
 Speaking to a problem that truckers have in using Friona State Bank, Ratcliff was asked if the school minded truckers parking along the junior high practice field to do their banking. He replied "The school has no ordinance objecting to this."
 Also discussed by those in attendance was the speed limit through town, and the possible need for a speed limit of 30 miles per hour to be enacted from one city limit sign to the other.
 "When they rebuilt the highway, they came and checked out the traffic and made two different surveys. We were trying to get the speed limit lowered, but they actually raised it in one area," said Police Chief John Taylor.
 Patsy Zachary, owner of the Sonic Drive-In, said that due to the business' proximity to the high school, and the fact that the campus isn't closed at noon, the speed limit in that location was much too dangerous for the youngsters.
 "One youngster was hit in front of our place a number of years ago--Greg O'Brian, and it was a miracle that he wasn't badly hurt or killed. The impact was so great that he was flipped up and over the vehicle," she said.
 Mayor Monroe, while indicating that the city would look into the speed limit situation, re-iterated that for the purposes of Monday's meeting the council could not take action on the speed limit one way or the other, since the truck ordinance was the only item that had been advertised for the hearing.
 At least one trucker, Leroy Berend, expressed satisfaction with the outcome of the meeting. "They're going to do something. They're going to look into some solutions," he said.

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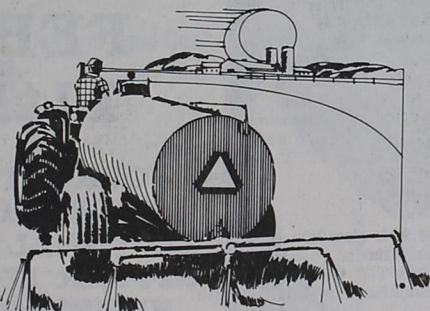

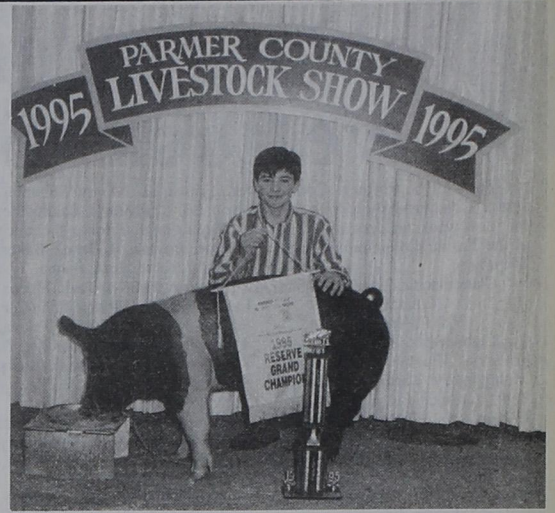

Senator Teel Bivins Reports



AUSTIN - It was a cold day, but then it's supposed to be cold in January. An estimated 25,000 people gathered on the grounds of the Capitol to witness the peaceful and organized transfer of

power. The inauguration of my friend George W. Bush as governor of Texas was a very special event for me.

The next day, Cameron County Judge Tony Garza sat before my Committee on Nominations as the first appointee to undergo the confirmation process in this legislative session. Judge Garza spoke eloquently about the inauguration. He cautioned each of us not to take for granted the significance of this inauguration or any inauguration for that matter. The inauguration is the culmination of our system of representative self-government. Mankind has struggled with power and governance throughout its history. There is no question in my mind that our system of transferring that power, resting with the consent of those governed, is the greatest idea mankind has ever conceived.

This particular inauguration was special for me and my family. George and Laura Bush have become close friends over the years, and we, of course, shared in their joy on the event of his inauguration. The ceremony became even more special for us because of the participation of our son, Will.

Will's godfather is James B. Francis -- my close friend and college roommate, and a top advisor to the new governor. On election night, he announced to us that his godson would sit on his lap on the dais during the inauguration of George W. Bush.

Lt. Gov. Bullock already has demonstrated that his priorities are to solve problems and leave partisanship at the door. I know for a fact personally, and the people of Texas will soon come to know, that George Bush shares that philosophy. This is good news for Will Bivins and all the people of the state of Texas.

Tears came to my eyes when Will walked on the dais with his "Aunt Debbie and Uncle Jim." Because it is Will and the millions of other Texas children that motivate George Bush and everyone else who serves in public office to work for a better future.

Will was probably much more impressed with the 19-cannon salute and the fly-over of four fighter jets than George Bush's inaugural speech. But while he may not have understood the words, I think he sensed that he was the clear beneficiary of the efforts of all those public officials present that day.

There is always a sense of excitement and optimism at the beginning of any legislative session, especially one when a governor is inaugurated. This time around, however, I believe the excitement is higher than normal. 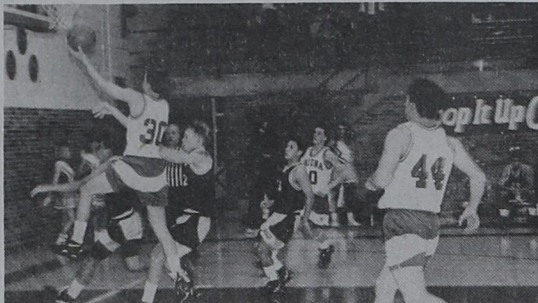

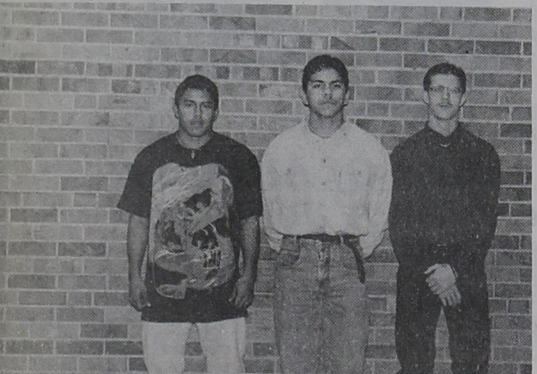

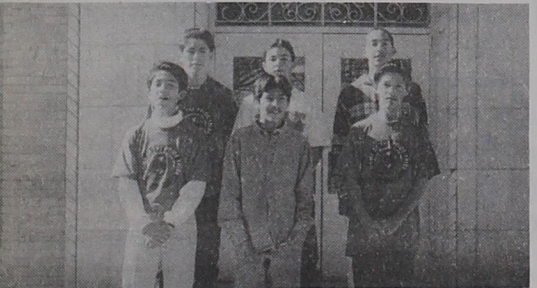

There is no time to stand around between sets or to wait for someone else to finish at a station. The athletes have committed themselves to work the entire fifty minutes of each athletic period.

Each year the Chieftains are tested periodically to measure each young man's progress. The tests that are used to measure physical strength include the bench press, the incline press and the parallel squat.

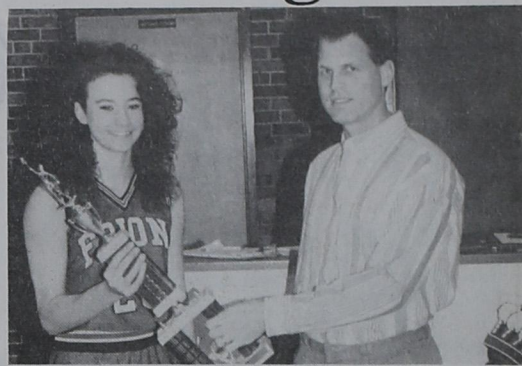

Slow But Steady Wins The Race

Aesop, whose stories are still handed down from generation to generation, used fables to teach children and adults lessons in morals and values. Perhaps none of this beloved storyteller's fables is more appropriate for investors than the story of the tortoise and the hare.

"The Hare one day mocked the short feet and slow pace of the Tortoise. The Tortoise replied: 'Though you be swift as the wind, I will beat you in a race.' The Hare, believing this to be impossible, assented to the proposal. On the day appointed for the race, the two started together. The Tortoise never for a moment stopped but went on

with a slow but steady pace straight to the end of the course. The Hare, lying down by the wayside, fell fast asleep. At last, waking up and moving as fast as he could, he saw the Tortoise had reached the goal and was comfortably dozing after his fatigue."

Wise investors prudently follow the common-sense lesson of "slow but steady wins the race." Those who try to get rich quickly usually just lose their money quickly. You stand a much better chance of achieving your investment goals if you choose investments that strive to provide rates of return that are attractive and attainable, and that offer a level of risk with which you are comfortable.

Once you've chosen a plan of action, put that action to work for you immediately. Time is one of the most powerful allies in winning the race for financial independence.

Let's look at an example. Consider two investors, both age 22. The first opens an IRA yielding 8 per cent and invests \$2,000 each year. After nine years, he stops making his regular investment, but he doesn't take the income earned from the IRA. Instead, he reinvests it and allows it to earn interest. At age 65, his \$18,000 investment has grown to \$446,238.

The second investor doesn't start investing in an IRA yielding 8 per cent until he's 31, the same age the first investor stops making his regular investment. This investor, however, continues to invest \$2,000 annually for the next 34 years. Like the first investor, he does not take the income from his IRA. Instead, he allows it to compound. At age 65, he has invested a total of \$68,000 that has grown to \$396,916, nearly \$50,000 less than the first investor!

TEAMS/TAAS Tests Are Set For March

Individuals who have met all requirements for high school graduation but have not passed one or both sections of the Texas Educational Assessment of Minimum Skills (TEAMS) or the Texas assessment of Academic Skills (TAAS) may take the test in March.

During the March 1995 TEAMS administration, the mathematics test will be administered on Wednesday, March 8; the English language arts test will be administered on Thursday, March 9.

During the March 1995 TAAS administration, the writing test will be administered on Tuesday, March 7; the mathematics test will be administered on Wednesday, March 8; and the reading test will be administered on Thursday, March 9.

All individuals who wish to take the TEAMS test(s) have to register in advance. This includes students currently enrolled in Texas public high schools as well as individuals who have completed all other high

school graduation requirements. The only individuals who must register for the TAAS test(s) are those who are no longer enrolled in school and who have not met minimum expectations on all sections of the TAAS test.

Registration forms must be completed and returned in the pre-addressed envelope and must be received in Iowa City, Iowa, no later than 5 p.m. Feb. 14. The Texas Education Agency and National Computer Systems will not be responsible for registration forms that are delayed or lost in the mail. It is suggested that individuals registering for the test make arrangements with the appropriate postal agent for a proof-of-delivery notice.

Questions concerning out-of-school examinee testing should be directed to the Texas Education Agency, Division of Student Assessment, (512) 463-9536.
