## City Hears Both Sides Of "Trucker" Issue

After hearing statements from residents (and at least one non-
resident), the Friona City Council resident), the Friona City Council city's trucking ordinance in effect but agreed to ask the State Highway Department to do a study on the highways through the city and see what the possibilities are for trucks
to park along the highways for business purposes.
The council met in a special called meeting at the Friona American Legion Hall which drew a packed house" estimated at 100 people.
Several truckers, as well as
business owners and residents spoke out on the issue.
"It's obvious by the turnout tonight that we need to work together to solve this problem,

The ordinance, which was passed
by the city council in 1983, by the city council in 1983 , prohibits trucks with gross vehicle
weight of 10,000 pounds from city weight of 10,000 pounds from city U.S. Highway 60, Texas Highway 214 and on Main Street from U.S. 60 to Fifth Street. It also prohibits trucks from parking on any city
street. street.
Those
Those who spoke out in
opposition to the ordinance criticized it as being anti-trucking or anti-business.
Reyes Estrada,
Reyes Estrada, owner of Maria's
Restauman Restaurant, said "We have had some problems due to the ordinance. We
need to work together on this. We need to get the truckers to spend money with us. I also work at Excel and I've met a lot of truckers
ordinance." Gladys Day commented "Several years ago the Chamber of
Commerce raised the money to give the land where Excel is now located. Several people gave money to get the packing plant, because they felt it would help Friona. We have grown, but we have a problem
that needs to be solved. How did we that needs to be solved. How did we
think the cattle would get in and out of Excel, if they didn't use trucks? Clyde Field said that prior to the enactment of the truck ordinance, it was not uncommon for three or neighborhood. "One of them would aways be cranked up at about 4 sit and idle. We'd also have cattle trucks within 50 or 75 feet of our house, and they don't smell like a
bed of roses." bed of roses."

highways. Roger Field, city employee, held up a section of asphalt taken from a state highway
cutting that was seven or eight cutting that was seven or eight
inches thick inches thick. By contrast, a section
from a city street was shown that from a city street was shown that
was only three inches or less thick. was only three inches or less thick.
"We spend at least $\$ 30,000$ per
ear repairing torn up streets. It comes to $\$ 55-\$ 60,000$ every two years," Mayor Clarence Monroe stated, pointing out that the city's
streets just aren't constructed to streets just aren't constructed to accommodate the heavier truck
traffic. traffic.

Bifocals were dened to offer two different vision corrections in one frame Occasionally, though, vanity gets in the way: the wearer objects to glasses with a tell-tale line that tells the world these are bifocals and he or she is getting older.
Two kinds of non-line glasses are available to provide both near and far vision. A "progressive" lens is made to offer continuous for distance and the bottom for reading. It is the in between channel
fore that offers the additional option, middle-distance correction. Also available is a "blended" bifocal with near and far correction but no middistance area. It's like regular bifocal, but without the line. With any kind of bifocal or trifocal lens, expect a period o adjustment, learning how to move the eyes to see out of each section.
