

## MY TURN

**LIFE IS LIKE** painting a picture. You have a general idea how you'd like for it to turn out, but sometimes it sort of goes in a different direction from what you had planned. Eventually the dark parts all go toward the background and the highlights become the most important focal points. When your painting is completed, you always hope someone will look at it and say "Pretty good, really."

A friend called me last week and said Arnie Vail had died. Folks in the Panhandle area might remember Arnie. He came up here from Irving Texas several years ago and gave painting demonstrations and workshops around these parts.

He had quite an interesting and varied career as an artist. He studied at Louisiana State U. until World War II when he began painting sets and backdrops for touring USO troops. He also studied at the Chicago Art Institute and was cartoonist on the staff of the *Chicago Tribune*, *The Dallas Times Herald*, *The Chicago Sun-Times* and *The Chicago Daily News*. He worked as a graphic artist for ABC and CBS television networks and was resident artist for Six Flags Over Texas.

Arnie had been cited twice by "Ripley's Believe It or Not" for his speed and dexterity as a caricaturist. His paintings hang in many corporate and private collections, including that of the Vatican in Rome. Plus, a few of his works are on permanent display at Friona State Bank. Several local people have his paintings in their homes.

In his later years, Arnie and his wife, Doris, enjoyed traveling around Texas and New Mexico where he would give workshops for all the little housewife "artist wannabees."

He was a rebel, of sorts, and would throw out all the rules that artists have been taught for years, saying "There are no absolute rules for painting." He thought a creative person should be free to work with housepaint or crayon or whatever they felt comfortable with at the time. If you needed a ruler to help you draw a straight line, so be it. If you needed to cut a pattern out of paper and draw around it, that was fine too.

As one of his "artist wannabees," I admired his "anything goes" attitude about painting and I still use some of the tricks of the trade that he taught us in his workshops at the bank.

When Arnie was doing a demo or a workshop he would spice up the atmosphere by making up little funny stories about something in the picture. For instance, if he was doing a farm scene with an old fallen-down wagon in the foreground, he would make up a story about the farmer hitching up his old plow horse to the wagon; getting the family all dressed up for church and piling them into the wagon. Then since it was Sunday, the farmer would send them all back into the house again to put on their shoes.

Arnie was age 73 when he died last Thursday, February 2, 1995. He'd had a stroke. He and Doris had no children. He is survived by over 20,000 beautiful paintings and a lot of nice memories for the people whom he touched along the way. A reception was held in his memory at the Irving Art Center following his funeral last Saturday.

Oh, by the way, he is survived by something else, too. Most people think I drew the caricatures of Bill and myself which grace the headings of these columns in *The Friona Star* and *The Bovina Blade* every week. I didn't. Arnie Vail did. We've thought about updating those column-head pictures several times. But since Arnie did those drawings back when we were quite a bit younger and cuter than we are now, why mess up a good thing!

Thanks, Arnie, for allowing us to stay young at the top of our columns for the past 15 years. "Pretty good, really."

## Local Credit Union Holds 41st Annual Meeting

The Friona Texas Federal Credit Union had their 41st annual meeting on Tuesday, February 7 with 149 people present, the exact same number as were present at last year's meeting.

This is the 40th anniversary of the Friona Texas Federal Credit Union, which was established the latter part of 1954.

In the chairman's report, Jameson said, "We have held our own and look to be a very secure institution to carry out your financial needs. Your Credit Union is still one of the strongest financial institutions in this area. This has been hard for the board to maintain, with the lower interest rates and rising cost of doing business."

Fred Florez, chairman of the credit committee stated that the credit committee met each Tuesday evening during 1994 to review all loans made by the loan officers

"The credit committee approved a total of 257 loans during 1994 and the loan officers approved 825, for a total of 1,082 loans approved. The loans amounted to a total of \$2,359,293.27 loaned," Florez said.

"We have one of the strongest credit unions in the nation!" stated John Baxter, chairman of the supervisory committee. "We have had a very prosperous year and our

financial soundness continues to get better," he continued.

Baxter also reported that the remodeling is completed and has added some attractiveness to our community and for the membership and that the drive-up window has been most beneficial to members and staff.

Christeene Mann, chairman of the membership committee reported that 1994 was a "bumper" year in the new accounts department. "389 memberships were approved, an all-time high!" she said.

Barbara Maynard gave the financial report and the president's report. She stated that "The total 1994 net income, after expenses, was \$239,981.84 with 22,749.66 to regular reserve, 174,863.90 to dividends, and 42,368.28 to undivided earnings."

Mrs. Maynard also reported that the new drive-up window is very popular and used by 50 per cent of the people and that they have thoroughly enjoyed the remodeling of the Credit Union.

As part of the remodeling project, additional office space was acquired. "The Parmer County Tax Collector has an office in the Credit Union which is open on Thursday from 11 a.m. to 12 noon and 1-3:30 p.m." Mrs. Maynard reported.

Plaques were presented to: Sam Mears, credit committee, 1988-95; Gerall Wyly, credit committee, 1989-95; Karen Baker, board of directors, 1992-95; James Gee, supervisory committee, 1990-95.

A plaque for the late C. H. Veazey who served on the board of directors from 1983 to 1994, was presented to Mrs. Veazey by Coy Jameson.

Two new members were elected to the board of directors. They were Sam Mears and Monty Allen. Director C.H. Veazey passed away recently, and Karen Baker retired from the board. Holdover directors are Coy Jameson, Curt Miller, Ralph Shirley, Troy Sharrock and John Baxter.

John Clark and Henry Gauna were elected to the credit committee.

Gerall Wyly's and Sam Mears's terms expired. Holdover members are Fred Florez, Matt Osborn and David Smith.

James Gee retired as chairman of the "closed accounts" department for the supervisory committee. Opal Baxter will take over that position.

A surprise award was presented by Karen Baker to Barbara Maynard, president of the Credit Union. Barbara was presented with a plaque for her 25 years of service to the Friona Texas Federal Credit Union. She was also presented with a beautiful gold watch and a dozen red roses! Barbara said, "Thank you so very much and I do enjoy being your president."

## Deadline Nears For Brick Sales

The dream of a City Park is fast becoming a reality. With over \$9,000 already raised, the Women's Division hopes to raise the balance of its \$20,000 goal by selling personalized bricks.

The following students not only placed, but will be

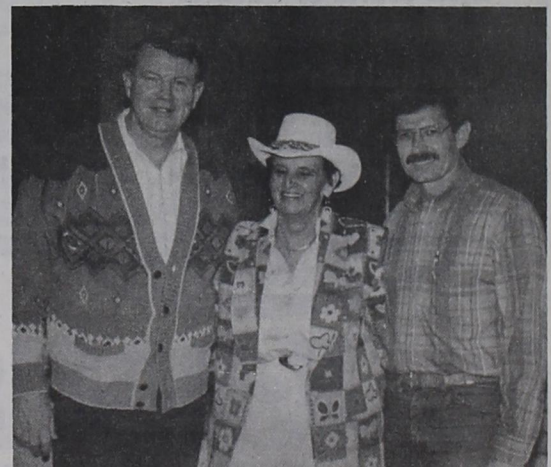
representing their chapter at the conference in Corpus Christi, March 8-11.

## Letter To The Editor



Dear Editor,

The Texas Legislators plan to spend \$187,000,000.00 to refurbish the State Capitol. They have announced terminating about two-hundred employees, cutting back on programs such as Human-Resources, Re-habilitation, Education and others, can't find money for school teachers pay raises.

Now look back at the following item from 1992, ashtrays at \$400.00 each because they matched the stairway railings and no doubt the capitol has by now been declared a smoke-free building.

"In state government, ability to pay is not a consideration. That became obvious last week when the Austin American-Statesman reported the state is purchasing 90 trash cans, at \$901.46 each, and 74 "sand urn" ashtrays, at \$400.56 apiece.

Meanwhile, state budget officials say the state will have to cut vital services or raise taxes \$4 billion to \$6 billion during the next two-year budget cycle.

These trash cans and ashtrays represent about \$110,000 of the \$1 million of the taxpayers' money that is being spent on furnishings

for the new underground annex to the State Capitol.

Thus far, state officials make no apology for their extravagance.

The Capitol curator and Preservation Board purchase supervisor concede the new trash cans and ashtrays cost several times what the state paid for the ones currently used in the Capitol. But these furnishings, they say, are bound to be more durable than less-expensive alternatives -- and they match the pattern on the stairways railings.

Texas Rep. John Smithee, R-Amarillo, is among those who are upset. "In tough economic times," Smithee said, "I think this is sending the wrong message." True. But it wouldn't send such a good message even in good times.

If this is the way the state spends money when it's facing a \$4 billion-to-\$6 billion shortfall, one can only guess what happens when there is a surplus.

If all state officials are this insensitive to the taxpayers, it's easy to understand why Texas has been subjected to five major tax increases -- two by record amounts -- in the past eight years."

**55 Yrs. Ago--Feb. 16, 1940**

# Chiefs Top Winds; Fall To Dimmitt

The FHS Chieftains scored a 72-62 win over Floydada last Friday at Floydada, but the team came up short Tuesday night against rival Dimmitt in an 81-63 loss. The games left the Chiefs at 3-6 in district play with one game remaining at Muleshoe Friday.

Kit Preston gave the team leads of 2-0 and 3-2 in the first two minutes of play Dimmitt's Derrick Thomas' three-point basket gave the Bobcats a 9-5 lead before Wade Hinkle's basket and Cory Hamilton's layup after stealing the in-bounds pass tied it at 9-all.

Preston again broke a tie with a layup on an assist by Roy Hendley at the 2:00 mark for a 13-11 Friona lead. Hamilton's layup made it a 15-16 deficit at the end of the opening period.

Preston's follow shot got the team back within one at 18-17, and Jason Rector's 15-foot jump shot gave the Chiefs a 19-18 lead at the 6:35 mark. That was to be Friona's last lead in the ball game.

Two baskets by Preston made it a 23-21 game, and Rector's long jumper tied the score at 25-25 with 5:00 left in the half.

Quint Ellis came in to make a shot from the side and a layup for a 30-29 Friona deficit with 2:53 to play, but Dimmitt outscored Friona 5-2 in the final 1:42 to take a 35-31 halftime lead.

Chieftain fans were hoping for a second-half comeback, but the

Bobcats held a 12-3 edge in the first 3:20 of the third quarter to stretch their lead to 47-34.

Preston's jump shot and Rector's trey made it a 47-39 game, but Dimmitt held a 55-45 lead after three quarters.

The 'Cats scored the first five points of the final quarter to take a 60-45 lead, and the Chiefs could never recover.

Hamilton's 16 and Preston's 15 paced Friona.

At Floydada, the Chiefs recovered from a 21-14 first quarter deficit to take a 35-32 halftime lead and held on in the second half.

Hamilton had a hot hand, scoring 26 points; Preston scored 19 and Ellis 11.

Helping the Chieftains to pull away from their tight 50-48 lead after three quarters was Cory Hamilton, who scored five baskets and three free throws to account for 13 of his 26 points.

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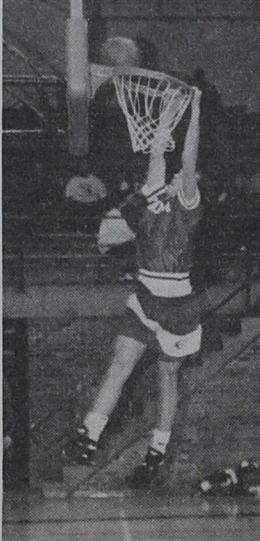

# Squaws Topple Bobbies, 49-44

Friona High School's Squaws may not be headed to the playoffs in 1995, but they gave a message to playoff-bound Dimmitt on Tuesday.

The Squaws, in spite of watching an unbelievable 18-point lead evaporate in the second half, came back to post a 49-45 win over the Bobbies. Dimmitt will finish as either number one or two in district. Friona's best hope is to tie for third place.

But Tuesday's game was a good old-fashioned Friona-Dimmitt basketball rematch, with mostly pride on the line.

The Squaws played near-flawless basketball in the first half, to build an eye-popping 26-14 lead that quickly became 32-14 early in the third quarter. But few fans of the Squaws doubted that Dimmitt could turn the tables in fairly short order. The only thing that may have surprised them was the "shortness" of the Dimmitt rally.

Good defense early-on, and a three-point basket by Keri Reeb helped stake Friona to a 9-4 first-quarter lead.

When Britny White sank a jump shot shortly after a second Reeb "trey," the Squaws had built a ten-point advantage at 16-6.

Amy Ethridge's shooting helped the Bobbies pull back within seven, but Kristi Meyer sank a pair of jump shots in the last 1:40 of the first half to give the team its 26-14 halftime lead.

Miss Reeb and Julie Goddard turned steals into layup baskets around a 12-foot jump shot by Courtney Carthel to open the third period. Things looked a bit unreal as Friona upped its lead to 32-14 less than three minutes into the second half.

Suddenly the Bobbies awakened. Baskets by Dimmitt's Thomas, Ethridge and Bradley made it a 32-21 game. Miss Thomas added three more baskets as the Bobbies caused Friona turnovers, and Dimmitt had pulled to within three at 32-29 as the quarter ended.

Dimmitt scored to open the final quarter for a 32-31 game and the Bobbies had run off a 17-0 unanswered scoring binge. Miss White finally cracked the ice for the Squaws with a layup off a steal for a 34-31 Friona lead, breaking a nerve-wracking 5:52 scoreless streak for the Squaws—almost an entire period.

Miss Ethridge tied the game at 34, and things looked a little bleak as ball-handler Julie Goddard went to the bench with an injured ankle as the third quarter was ending.

However, Miss Goddard came back into the game, pain and all, to spark Friona's winning rally.

Her two-handed three-point shot set the tone for the rally with 5:51 to play, for a 37-34 score. Ethridge made a layup for a 37-36 score, but Miss Goddard sank a pair of jump shots on successive trips downcourt and Friona had a 41-36 lead at the 4:08 mark.

A minute later, Miss Reeb's long three-pointer hit nothing but net, and the Squaws had a 44-36 lead with 3:48 to play. Friona broke the Dimmitt press for a layup by Miss White and it was 46-38 with 2:06 remaining.

## Last-Second Shot Sinks Dimmitt JV

Eric McInroe only scored one fourth-quarter basket for the Friona JV Chieftains Tuesday against Dimmitt's JV Bobcats—but it was the winning shot, beating the buzzer in a 57-56 victory.

But Dimmitt gradually wrested the lead away from the Chiefs, and seemed about to get out of Chieftain Fieldhouse with the victory, until McInroe's timely basket. He ended up with 11 points for the night and Reyes Valdez took scoring honors with 17.

It was the team's first win over Dimmitt after two losses to the 'Cats earlier this season.

"They beat us by four points at Dimmitt, and then again in the Muleshoe tournament. It was a big win for our program," said JV Coach Mike Herbert.

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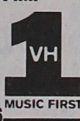

Burial was in Friona Cemetery under the direction of Ellis-Blackwell Funeral Home.

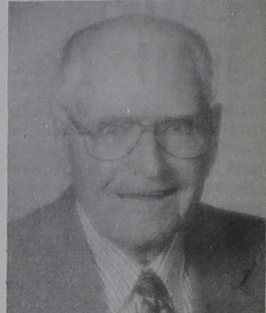

### Big Change For Farm Programs


Farm programs have a new requirement this year. Farmers may not earn crop program benefits without crop insurance. One feature of the new law is The Federal Crop Insurance Reform and Department of Agriculture Reorganization Act of 1994.

Beginning with this year's crops, farmers must purchase at least the minimal, or lowest, level of crop insurance to be eligible for benefits from programs run by the former ASCS, or Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service. Among other modifications, the law changed the name ASCS to CFSA, which stands for Consolidated Farm Service Agency.

The law also merged ASCS with the Federal Crop Insurance Corporation. This means that you can buy minimum coverage insurance, or catastrophic crop insurance (CAT), from the new CFSA or from a private insurance agent, who can also provide additional coverage that is higher than the minimum.

In order to meet program requirements, the insurance MUST be purchased on all insurable crops in Parmer County by March 15, 1995. Additional information on the crop insurance program will be published in newsletters as it becomes available.

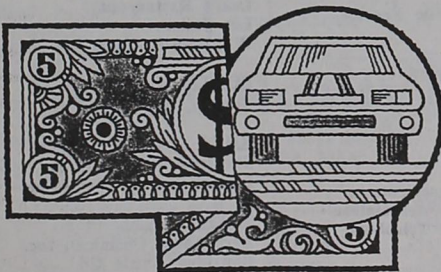

# Moisture Needed To Bring Parmer County Soils To Field Capacity

Parmer County producers within the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1 service area need two to ten inches of water from precipitation and/or irrigation to bring the five foot root zone soil profile to field capacity before the 1995 spring planting, according to pre-plant soil moisture survey data released by the Water District and the USDA-Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS).

"We found that six per cent of the Water District service area will need from 0 to 4 inches of moisture to bring the soils to field capacity. About 45 per cent of the area will need 4 to 6 inches of moisture, and 48 per cent will need 6 to 8 inches of moisture. One per cent of the area needs 8 to 10 inches of moisture to refill the soil profile," says Gerald Crenwelge, USDA-NRCS soil scientist.

Soil moisture readings are taken by lowering a neutron probe into a permanently-installed aluminum access tube at each of the 301 monitoring sites within the 15-county Water District service area. Each site is chosen based upon the soil type, the variations in the saturated thickness of the Ogallala Aquifer which indicates potential well yields, and typical farming operations in the area.

Plant available soil moisture varies according to the previous crop produced at the site. For example, soil moisture at cotton sites averaged about 0.4 inches at the one foot soil level, 0.3 inches at the two foot level, 0.3 inches at the three foot level, 0.4 inches at the four foot level, and 0.5 inches at the five foot level.

Sites in corn producing areas has about 0.6 inches at the one foot level, 0.6 at the two foot level, 0.6 inches at the three foot level, one inch at the four foot level, and one inch at the five foot level.

Available soil moisture for grain sorghum and wheat sites was found to be between that of corn and cotton. Grain sorghum sites averaged 0.5 inches at the one foot level, 0.3 inches at the two foot

level, 0.2 inches at the three foot level, 0.3 inches at the four foot level, and 0.4 inches at the five foot level.

Wheat producing sites averaged about 0.7 inches at the one foot level, 0.5 inches at the two foot level, 0.4 inches at the three foot level, 0.6 inches at the four foot level, and 0.7 inches at the five foot level.

Generally, each foot of soil has a capacity to hold about two inches of soil moisture, or a total of about 10 inches in the five foot root zone soil profile.

Historical data shows that above-average crop yields are more likely when the five foot root zone soil profile is at or near field capacity at planting.

"We hope the area will receive significant precipitation that will help reduce these soil moisture deficits prior to planting," says Crenwelge. Rain gauge readings taken by Water District staff at the soil moisture sites in Parmer County show 12.91 inches of precipitation during 1994.

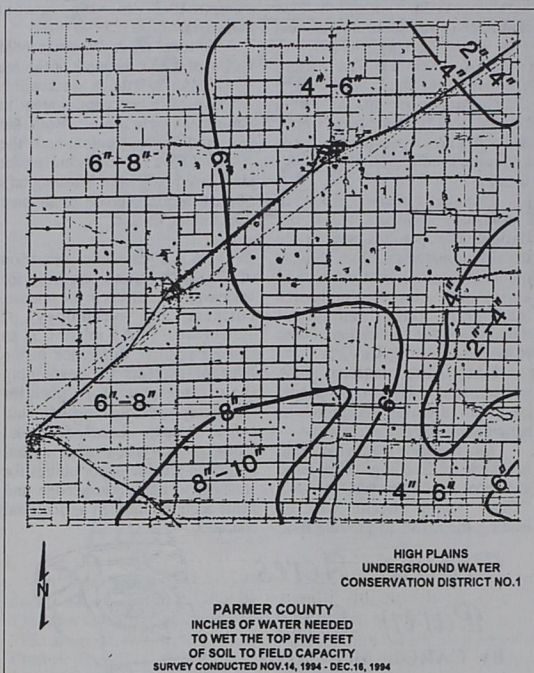
Use of furrow dikes will help keep any moisture that falls between now and spring planting on the field so that it can soak into the soil.

The annual pre-plant soil moisture survey data informs producers about general plant available soil moisture conditions across the Water District.

## Wildlife Habitat Is Important Here

If you like to improve wildlife habitat, some of the best improvements that could benefit the play lake areas, would be to plant food plots around the outer areas. This could include milo, millet, corn or native grasses.

From a wildlife standpoint, the greatest benefits would be in the development of nesting and brood-rearing habitat for pheasants, quail, rabbits and a wide variety of non-game wildlife species.

The nesting period for most wildlife in the area is the period from April through August. These are the critical times and spraying,

mowing or other disturbances should be kept to an absolute minimum. At this time, the Parmer County S.W.C.D. has available wildlife packets from the Texas Forest Service. These are for quail and pheasants, deer, turkey or squirrel.

The deadline to order trees or wildlife packets is March 1, 1995. All services are available regardless of race, color, national origin, age, sex, religion, marital status, or handicap.

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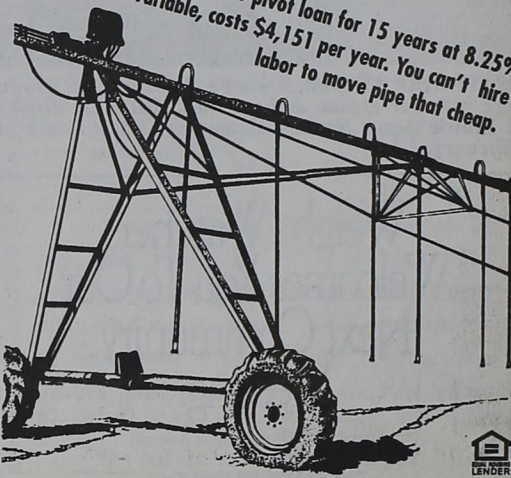

## Did You Know?

Dietrich Bonhoeffer was born in 1906 in Germany. At the age of 14 he declared to his family that he wanted nothing more than to be minister-theologian in the church. In 1931 he was ordained as a minister.

During these years church seminaries were complaining that over half of the candidates were followers of Hitler. This was not true of Dietrich. He opposed Hitler and spoke out against the policies of the State and helped smuggle Jews into Switzerland.

In 1944 Bonhoeffer was arrested for his involvement in a plot against Hitler. On April 9, 1945 he was hanged at the extermination camp of Flossenburg by order of Hitler. The camp doctor who had to witness the execution, remarked that he watched Bonhoeffer kneel and pray before being led to the gallows.

"I was most deeply moved by the way this lovable man prayed, so devout and so certain that God heard his prayer," he wrote. "In the

almost 50 years that I worked as a doctor, I have hardly ever seen a man die so entirely submissive to the will of God."

I have just returned from spending 24 days in Moscow, Russia. I had the opportunity to go and spend time with a Christian outreach group there and decided to take it. Leslie asked me if I were going to write an article for the paper. I wasn't sure? How easy it is to get out of the habit of doing something that requires some effort. I am good at that.

I would have written something about Russia, but after getting home I started reading books on the history of Russia and decided to wait for another day.

From my perspective I would rather have been with Bonhoeffer in Germany and be defeated than to be in Russia and have won the war.

In fact, it was during World War I that the revolution in Russia was taking place, and Germany was their enemy. I think they would have been better off had they lost World War I.

But then I think we would have been better off if Dallas had won the last 20 Super Bowls. That's just to remind us that it's good that we are not in control. Jesus reminded Pilate in John 19:11, "Thou couldst have no power at all against me, except it were given thee from above."

Payne Best, a British officer was with Bonhoeffer during the last days of his life. He made this statement, "He was one of the very few men I have ever met to whom his God was real and ever close to him...."

"And this is life eternal, that they might know thee the only true God, and Jesus Christ, whom thou hast sent." John 17:3

## Rising Income Is The Best Answer To Rising Prices

We're all familiar with the effects of inflation. Your morning cup of coffee that cost a quarter 20 years ago now costs 85 cents, more than three times as much. The dream house you bought for \$36,000 in 1974 would cost \$126,000 today.

According to the Consumer Price Index, the purchasing power of the dollar has declined 68 per cent over the past 20 years; the dollar of 1974 is worth only 32 cents today.

Most people consider inflation as it relates to their salaries, and they expect employers to increase their pay to keep up with inflation. However, very few people consider inflation when choosing investments. Investors who "safely" put all their money into guaranteed investments that offer regular income and no growth potential may see their income and principal deteriorate as inflation erodes buying power.

To illustrate the importance of rising income in staying ahead of inflation, let's look at two hypothetical couples. Both couples retired at the end of 1973 with \$200,000 to invest. The Smiths found an excellent investment that promised to return their \$200,000 in 20 years. Better yet, it guaranteed to pay them a fixed rate of 7 per cent—that's \$14,000 every

year until maturity. In 1974, that was a generous offer that the Smiths decided to accept.

As the years passed, however, inflation (rising prices) eroded the value of their annual income. By the time their investment matured in 1994, it took \$44,100 to purchase what their \$14,000 bought in 1974. Even worse, the Smiths' \$200,000 nest egg bought less than half of what it did when they invested it 20 years earlier.

The Joneses, on the other hand, understood the importance of staying ahead of rising prices. They invested their \$200,000 in a portfolio of professionally managed stocks that have a history of keeping up with inflation. Because they needed income, they decided to withdraw 6 per cent each year, based on the value of their account at the end of the previous year. In 1974, they withdrew 6 per cent of their original \$200,000 investment, or \$12,000. In 1975, they took 6 per cent of their account balance as of the end of 1974, and so on each year. The Joneses' investment is not guaranteed, so they understand that the value of their original principal, as well as their income, fluctuates.

Here's the actual amount of income the Joneses would have received in various years, based on their investment's value at the end of each previous year: 1974, \$12,000; 1978, \$12,767; 1983, \$21,837; 1988, \$36,647; 1993, \$55,592. The Joneses' total income over the 20-year period was \$545,050, and their original investment grew to \$977,704.

This is a history lesson that may or may not repeat itself, but it is a valuable financial planning tool. No one can predict the future, but we can probably assume that prices will continue to rise. Like the Smiths and the Joneses, you might find that the only way to meet rising prices is with rising income.

## YOUR EYES

### Questions And Answers

A lot of questions about eye health and vision come our way. Here are the answers:

**\*If eyes don't hurt, why have them examined?** Because most eye diseases start slowly, and your optometrist can spot trouble before you feel pain or notice symptoms. Vision changes may be subtle, too.

**\*Will wearing glasses weaken your eyes?** No, but vision may deteriorate anyway. What will happen is that your eyes, more comfortable with glasses, will become accustomed to them. They won't work as hard to focus without glasses as they used to.

**\*If I need glasses now, will I need them forever?** Maybe not, especially if lenses were prescribed to correct an astigmatism. The cornea matures by about age 25, and the condition may correct itself.

**\*Why does it hurt to read in dim light?** It's not your eyes that hurt, but stiff muscles in your head, neck and face that tense when your eyes have to work extra-hard to focus.
