"SNAP, CRACKLE, POP!" Walk down the grocery store aisle today, and the cereal boxes seem to be saying "This is a hold up! Give me all your money."

This week two congressmen called for an antitrust investigation of the high price of breakfast cereals which are produced by the four major cereal companies; Kellogg's, General Mills, Post and Quaker.

Consumers can pay over five dollars a pound for some of the breakfast cereals which are most popular with the moppet set (under age 10). I checked out some of the prices and found that Froot Loops is the most expensive cereal on the grocery shelves.

It's not that Froot Loops is the absolute best cereal for your children to eat. You're paying for a lot of cutesy gimmicks and gotcha's. Froot Loops has a plastic toy submarine inside the box.

Cereal companies try to outdo each other in their efforts to grab the eye of that little tyke riding in the front of mommy's grocery cart. Tyke whines and points to the one he wants. If mommy ignores tyke, he sets up a louder noise until she puts that cereal box into the cart.

Notice that the major companies place their cereal products on the middle shelf, right at eye level for the little guy in the cart. Cheaper in-house brands and adult cereals (lots of fiber) have to use the top or bottom shelves.

Every cereal has some sort of gimmick, an identifying cartoon character, a game on the back, a toy inside the box, or a chance to win prizes of some sort.

Cocoa Krispies has 30 free Nintendo Game Boy stickers inside the box. Raisin Bran has certificates inside which entitle you to play video games at specified participating arcade locations. Golden Crisp (formerly known as Super Sugar Crisp) has a glow-in-the-dark poster inside the box, plus a game piece giving you a chance on a lottery-type game with up to \$5,000 in prizes. Apple Jacks and Frosted Flakes are currently running a \$600,000 sweepstakes deal with Nintendo Donkey Kong games as prizes.

Is there any doubt why cereal prices have doubled in the past 10 years? Cost of the actual grain product which goes into that box of cereal makes up only 6.5 per cent of what you are paying for it. The promotional gimmicks and advertising cost 43 per cent, while packaging and shipping make up 36 per cent.

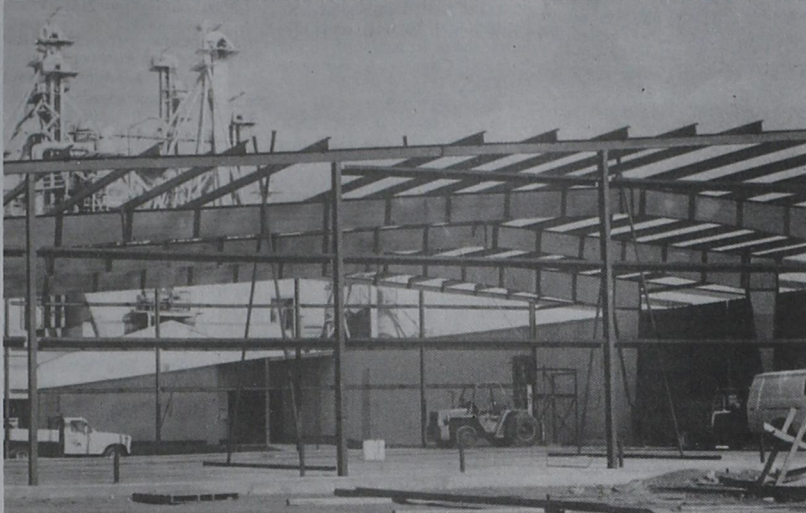
This isn't anything new, though. My good old boy says he remembers when he was a little kid, there were always three cereal boxes with no tops on them in his Granny's pantry, because he was always sending off the box tops for stuff like a "Superman secret decoder ring" which you could get for three box tops and a dime. Now you can buy a box of Cap'n Crunch cereal for over \$4.00 and send three proofs of purchase plus \$8.75 for a Mighty Morphin Power Ranger Watch.

Wouldn't it be nice if we could buy only the cereal?

While on the subject of breakfast cereals, *Consumer Reports* has just issued the results of some combined 12-year studies which prove that, after all the silly jokes about oat bran, fiber is getting the last laugh: It does help fight deadly diseases like coronary, cancer, etc.

Soluble fiber which is plentiful in beans, oat bran, most fruits and some vegetables, assists the liver in drawing cholesterol from the blood and also helps fight some intestinal disorders.

An increase of five grams of soluble fiber intake per day would cut cholesterol levels by five to 10 percent, which amounts to a 10 to 20 percent reduction in coronary risk. People with above-average cholesterol levels could expect even larger reductions in both cholesterol and risk.

Hi-Pro Feeds Expanding Here

Hi-Pro Feeds has begun an expansion of the company's storage facilities in Friona, which will add 10,000 square feet of storage space, according to company chief Jack Hamil.

"We have more bagged products being shipped out than in previous years. The new warehouse will enable us to be more efficient. We will be able to consolidate several products that we purchase from other sources and store locally," Hamil said.

The longtime Friona industrialist pointed out that in recent years it had become economically advantageous for Hi-Pro to purchase specialty items that it had at one time produced themselves.

65 Yrs. Ago--Mar. 14, 1930

Postmaster J. A. Guyer received word this week from the post office department in Washington, D. C. that the application for a new rural route out of Friona to the northwest had been granted by the department, and that the service will begin on July 1 this year. The route will be a little less than 62 miles, and will be carried just three times a week, on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

55 Yrs. Ago--Mar. 15, 1940

Dr. Mann will be here during the Easter holidays, and will repeat the tonsil clinic such as he conducted in December. The work done here during the Christmas holidays resulted in 16 tonsilectomies and four or five circumcisions. Fees are \$15 for a tonsilectomy and \$5 for a circumcison.

50 Yrs. Ago--Mar. 16, 1945

The Friona Squaws, district basketball champions for the past two years, won third place in the girls' state tournament at Hillsboro last week, chalking up three victories to one defeat.

G. B. (Pete) Buske lost some fingers on his right hand last Friday while grinding feed for his stock. He was taken to the hospital in Clovis for surgical treatment and is reported as getting along all right.

45 Yrs. Ago--Mar. 10, 1950

Friona State Bank was open for business Monday in its new \$50,000 quarters for the first time, after celebrating a most successful open house last Saturday. Frank A. Spring, cashier and director, said that more than one thousand visitors treked through the new building on Saturday. The moving of the bank from the old two-story building on Fifth Street marks the passing of another era of Friona history.

40 Yrs. Ago--Mar. 11, 1955

Development of the Whiteway Addition in northwest Friona as an immediate housing project was assured this week by an Amarillo developing group and W. H. Flippin, Jr., who is selling the

property to them. To operate here as Friona Building Company, the concern is headed by K. S. Reynolds, Roy Hunnicutt and E. E. Warnick. The property to be developed is north of Highway 60, between the highway and 15th Street, and to the north and west of Parmer County Community Hospital.

35 Yrs. Ago--Mar. 10, 1960

Unleashing a torrid attack that could not be repelled, the Friona Squaws defeated both opponents in the regional tournament held in Chapman Field House in Lubbock Saturday to win a berth in the Class AA state championship playoffs beginning Friday night in Gregory Gymnasium in Austin. The Squaws will meet the Bowie High School girls Friday at 7:30 p.m.

30 Yrs. Ago--Mar. 11, 1965

This weekend the Friona High School Squaws are competing in the state basketball tournament for the fourth time in six years, and tenth in all. However, this trip will be a new experience for the Squaws, who are for the first time making the tournament appearance as defending champions. Friona downed Spearman, 54-33, and Granbury, 49-45, to gain the state meet.

20 Yrs. Ago--Mar. 9, 1975

Landowners who will be involved in needed right-of-way for the widening of the middle portion of State Highway 214 between Hub and Clay's Corner will meet with District Engineer Rhea Bradley of

the Texas Highway Department and the Parmer County Commissioners Monday. Construction continued full pace on the overpass which is spanning Santa Fe Railway south of Friona on Highway 214.

Dedication ceremonies for Friona's second historical marker will be held at 2 p.m. Sunday, March 9, commemorating the site of Friona's first church building, the old Union Congregational Church.

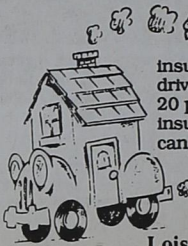

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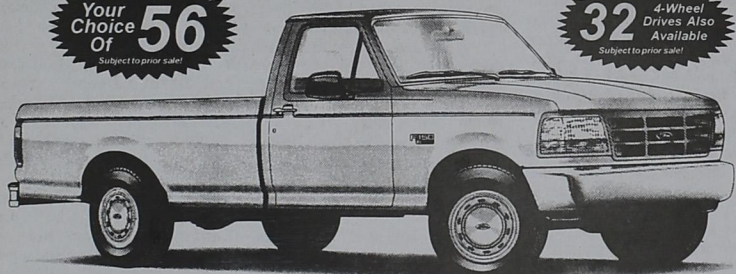

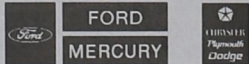

On Saturday, the Fritch Eagles scored 14-5 and 18-9 losses in their wind-blown doubleheader.

The Chieftains took advantage of the wind, socking six home runs in the two games, but couldn't sustain a long rally like the visitors, who had two big innings in the first game and scored nine runs in the last two innings of the second game.

Juan Gamboa had a homer in each game; Lance Looper had a pair in the nightcap, and knocked in five runs. Charlie Pope and Davy Hamilton also had homers in the first game.

The Chiefs had a four-run third inning at Dalhart Tuesday, batting around and getting five hits. But the Wolf pitcher bore down to end the inning with a strikeout, leaving the bases loaded.

Six Girls Win Meet For Squaws' Track

For a handful of girls who were given the option of running or not running, four freshmen, a junior and a senior did right well for themselves on the track last Saturday at Whiteface.

Their coach, Dennis Field, had gone with a group of girls to watch the state basketball tournament, and the girls were given the choice of running—or not.

Given the fact that the day was marred by winds that gusted up past 40 mph, the girls might have questioned their decision.

But at the end of the windy day, the Super Six had pulled off quite an accomplishment for themselves and FHS.

It was called the Morton "Last Frontier" meet, but held in Whiteface. This was subbed after the teams' meet at Amarillo had been cancelled due to a muddy track.

The small track squad entered 11

events, and here was the result: they won six events; placed second in five, and were third in two, winning 16 medals in all.

The Squaws scored 130 points, to win the first-place meet trophy, to 111 points for runnerup Bovina and 99.5 points for Denver City.

With such a small group, coaches hadn't intended to enter the relay races, since they didn't have an "intact" group that had practiced the same relay. But with the meet title in sight, last-minute plans were made, and a "volunteer" mile relay foursome placed second, to add frosting to the cake for Friona's meet win.

Amanda Pope and Vanette White were double winners for the Squaws. Miss Pope won the triple jump at 32-6-1/2, and the 100-meter dash in 13.0. She also placed second in the 200-meter dash in 28.68.

Miss White won the 100-meter hurdles in 16.5 and the 300-meter hurdles in 52.5.

Courtney Carthel won the discus event with a throw of 102-10---1/2, and took the second place medal in the shot put with a 28-7-1/2 effort.

Teresa Juarez won the 800-meter run with a time of 2:43.58, and placed third in the 1600-meter run with a 6:30.7 time.

Ruby Aronce placed second in the high jump, clearing 4-8. She also was second to teammate Vanette White in the 300-meter hurdles, in 56.55.

Chris Rodriguez placed second in the triple jump with a 30-0 mark.

Friona's "put together" mile relay foursome of Misses Carthel, Pope, White and Aronce logged a 4:44.6 time for second place.

Bolstered by the return of other "regular" team members, the Squaws will go to Tulia this week.

County Meeting To Discuss Boll Weevil Referendum

Information on the High Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Referendum will be provided on Friday, March 17 at the Farwell Community Center.

"We're conducting this educational meeting along with 29 other High Plains and adjacent Rolling Plains counties in the proposed eradication zone," said Gary Patterson, County Extension Agent. "This two-hour boll weevil meeting will be conducted by the Texas Agricultural Extension Service and will begin at 10 a.m.," he said.

It has been accredited by the Texas Department of Agriculture for two continuing education units (CEUs) toward re-certification requirements for private pesticide applicators.

Brant Baugh, EA-ENTO (PM), will present information on the present boll weevil situation and the proposed referendum so that cotton producers can make an informed decision when they have the opportunity to vote in April. A representative from Plains Cotton Growers (PCG) will follow with a presentation which will further emphasize the critical nature of the present boll weevil situation and provide details about the proposed referendum and program operation.

The Plains Cotton Growers Boll Weevil Suppressions Program has operated for 31 years and has successfully kept the boll weevil from becoming an established economic pest in the High Plains area, the biggest cotton patch in the world.

"Area producers have enjoyed a competitive edge compared to other regions of the cotton belt where insect control often means spraying up to 15 times a season," said Dr. James Leser, Extension entomologist at Lubbock. "Many of these pesticide applications can be directly attributed to the presence of boll weevils."

The PCG program uses a fall diapause control program, applying malathion within its operational boundaries that, with the help of cold winter weather, reduce the number of boll weevils able to successfully survive as over-

wintering adults until a new cotton crop is up and squaring in the early summer.

Malathion is a proven and safe insecticide which has been used by the diapause program for 31 years. It was also used for the California Medfly program and is widely used for mosquito control in towns across this area. The program control zone, roughly along the edge of the Caprock Escarpments, creates a buffer to the east and south of the High Plains acreage, separating weevil infested areas of the Rolling Plains and the uninfested areas of the High Plains.

Leser explains that the boll weevil has recently out-flanked the PCG control program and has moved into previously uninfested areas at an alarming pace the last two years.

Infestations are widespread as far north as Lubbock, Lynn, Dawson, Terry, Gaines and Yoakum counties. He noted that scattered infestations have been detected in Hale, Crosby, Floyd, Briscoe, Hockley and Lamb counties.

Leser warns that if left unchecked, the boll weevil could easily cost area producers over \$160 million in yield losses, fiber quality reductions and increase insecticide costs. "The worst case scenario is that the weevil could put us out of the cotton business."

The boll weevil has taken advantage of four consecutive mild winters, resulting in unprecedented number of weevils surviving to infest cotton in the early summer, Leser explains. The 1994-95 winter appears to be the mildest one of them all. Cotton producers in the southern High Plains area can expect an expensive battle with this pest this year, says Leser.

Mild winters, coupled with greatly expanded overwintering sites in the form of grasses in the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), have significantly altered the boll weevil's chances of overwintering on the High Plains.

In the past, CRP grasses were not considered as very good insulators from cold temperatures

associated with "normal" winters. However, recent mild temperatures are proving that CRP grasses can provide excellent overwintering habitat during mild winters.

Producers are encouraged to attend this or other boll weevil eradication referendum meetings scheduled during the month of March. For further information, contact the County Extension Office or a representative from Plains Cotton Growers.

The family suggests memorials be made to the Farwell Volunteer Fire Department.





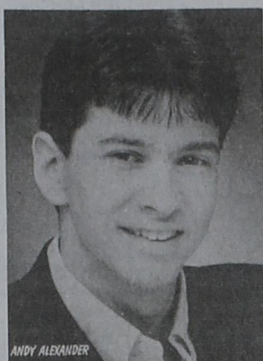
The World Showcase players are a group of professional actors from all over the U.S. who provide live interactive entertainment for the guests.

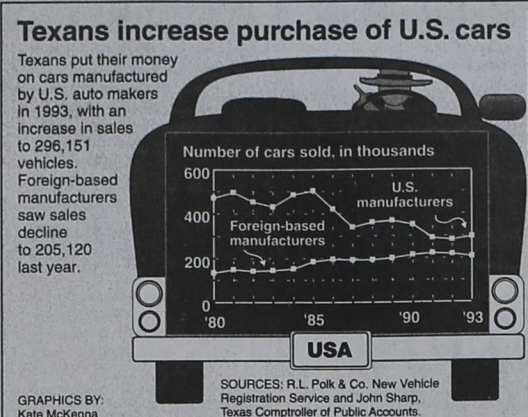

Sammy Perez was the other first-place medal winner, taking the 400-meter race in 55.36.

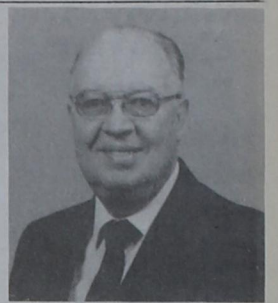

Telephone Co-op Sets Annual Meeting Date

Election of directors for the Tharp, Milo Center and Westway exchanges and voting on a major revision of the bylaws will highlight the forty-first annual meeting of the membership of West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative, March 21, at the Hereford Bull Barn.

Registration and serving of a barbecued beef and sausage dinner, catered by K-Bob's Steak House of Hereford, will begin promptly at 6 p.m. The business session is set to start at 7 p.m.

All cooperative members who register at the annual meeting are eligible to vote on directors and bylaws during the business session. Members will also hear a financial report.

Other activities will include a catered dinner, entertainment by local musicians, The Texas Country, and drawings for door prizes valued at over \$1,000.

Amending the cooperative's bylaws would update and clarify them, simplify accounting, eliminate membership fees and retain unclaimed patronage capital credit funds for local benefit.

In the past, when the cooperative has been unable to forward capital credit checks to their rightful owners within three years due to lack of a current address, those funds reverted to the State of Texas.

If amending the bylaws is approved by the membership, those unclaimed capital credit funds would be considered a gift to the cooperative and channeled into a scholarship fund that would assist students in the WTRT service area.

Another important proposed bylaws change would eliminate the required \$10 membership fee and the issuing of membership certificates. All membership fees currently being held by the cooperative would be refunded. WTRT's financial position is sufficiently strong to eliminate the need for the membership fees and the change would substantially reduce paperwork.

The requirement that two candidates be named by the nominating committee for board positions coming open at the end of a term would be eliminated under a proposed amendment.

The terms of office of incumbent WTRT director Jimmie Cockerham of the Tharp exchange in Parmer County, Ernest Flood, Jr. of the Westway exchange and Carl Straffuss of the Milo Center exchange in Deaf Smith County are expiring.

In accordance with cooperative bylaws, a nominating committee representing all the WTRT exchanges met in January and submitted two nominees for each of the board positions.

Incumbent directors are eligible for re-election and nominees included all three incumbents in addition to Richard Carson of the Tharp exchange, Tommy Wells of the Milo Center exchange, and Dwight Jesko of the Westway exchange.

Cockerham, 65, is a farmer near Bovina, in Parmer County, and has served as the Tharp exchange representative on the board of directors since 1967. He has served as president, vice-president and secretary of the WTRT board during that tenure. He and his wife, Barbara, are the parents of four children and they have eight grandchildren.

Carson, 47, farms and ranches north of Bovina in the Tharp exchange. He is a 1966 graduate of Bovina High School and holds a bachelor of arts degree in economics from Texas Tech University. He served two years in the Peace Corps in Cameroon, Africa and was employed two years with the Parmer County ASCS office. He is a volunteer with the Bovina Ambulance Service and is a deacon and member of the board of the First Baptist Church of Bovina.

YOUR EYES

Crossed Eyes



A very young infant's eyes may "wander" independently, but by about a year, binocular vision should be well established; both eyes should work together. In some children, however, the eyes do not point in the same direction. This condition--strabismus, or "crossed eyes," will not be outgrown and must be corrected as early as possible.

The problem is not how the child looks, but how he or she sees. If the strabismus is not corrected, the child's brain--in order to avoid seeing a double vision--will suppress vision in the weaker eye which will, in time, become unused.

Early corrective treatment, started well before the child is six years old, can be permanent. Conservative yet effective methods include vision training, teaching the youngster to coordinate eye muscles. Glasses may be utilized, too, to improve the chance of success. In most cases, every conservative treatment will be attempted before surgery is suggested.
