SANTA FE GRANTS CROSSING REQUEST

C. of C. Over Crossing and Sanitation

At a special called meeting of the chamber of commerce Monday morning this body met with Mr. Briscoe, superintendent of the Santa Fe railroad, to discuss the feasibility of an additional crossing in Friona.

Mr. Briscoe informed the gathering that he would furnish plenty of cars to move the wheat crop and that an engine would be here to switch cars when necessary.

Together with the city council and the street and road committee of the chamber of commerce, Mr. Briscoe visited the site of the proposed crossing and agreed to start work on it at once.

The Friona chamber of commerce held a called meeting last Thursday, with luncheon in the basement of the Congregational church and enjoyed a most appetizing repast prepared by ladies of the Aid society.

County Sanitary Engineer Curdin, state department of health, was present and talked on City sanitation, stating that Friona is fortunate in having as much sanitary equipment as it has, and recommended that all join hands with the mayor and city commission in enforcing sanitation ordinances and keeping equipment in condition.

Dr. R. R. Willis talked on health and sanitation, inferring that unless sanitary equipment is properly used the city may awaken some morning to find itself with an epidemic of typhoid.

"The silver problem is one which requires governmental action. It cannot be solved or settled by resolutions or through the action of the citizens. Governments must deal with it. And it is somewhat difficult to understand the delay."

"Forces are gathering for the next period of prosperity," says the Insurance Field, editorially. "When a firm takes inventory it generally slows down on everything else until the process of itemization is finished. For 18 months the whole world has been taking inventory of itself, and all industry has slowed down while undergoing the most searching of scrutiny from all directions."

"In this microscopic analysis of costs and expenses, the influence of taxation should not escape expert attention. Why not debate taxation along with other outgo? Why not seize the psychological moment to show how much business expense is due to excessive cost of government, and the extent to which excessive cost of government grows out of government interference and competition with private business?"

Col. C. N. Ousley Of Dallas Speaks On Agriculture

Col. Clarence N. Ousley, of Dallas, one of the best informed men in Texas, spoke to the Texas Press Association in San Angelo last week on "Texas Agriculture: Its Problems and Possibilities."

He says that what is the matter with the American farmer today is that he is too busy trying to get rich to make a living. He told of all the modern equipment and the large acreages possessed by our farmers and said that most of them only attempted to raise "money crops", almost completely ignoring the need of producing their own food stuffs.

Our forefathers came to this country with all their possessions in one wagon. Their tools were few and simple. They worked hard. But they produced first their necessities of life, and second something to trade or sell.

He said that when the drought hit East Texas that it was necessary for the Red Cross to feed the farmers. Many of them had nothing to eat. Today, although crop conditions are little improved, this is not necessary.

In speaking of the wheat conditions, he said that in spite of the condemnation of Russian wheat in the world market, that Russia today was producing little more wheat than she produced before the war, although during the war and for the past 15 years she has produced none at all.

Col. Ousley believes that the machine age on the farm is here to stay, but predicts great improvements leading to more economical operation.

The economic condition and consequent low prices is brought on by the large acreage now in cultivation. He says one of two things must happen—we must either reduce our acreage or find a use for the excess products. We are still producing at the same rate we used to when we fed the world during the war.

These speakers referred to the fact that business men must take a hand in enforcing sanitation ordinances. An additional railroad crossing was discussed, and it was decided to send a committee to Amarillo to discuss the matter with railroad officials.

Short talks were made by members on the subjects under discussion, after which the meeting adjourned. SECRETARY.

Oklahoma Lane child health conference, adult health club, all day July 8.

Bovina child health club, and adult health club all day July 14. Farwell child health conference and adult health club, all day July 21.

Child Lost All Night In Wheat Field at Black

The 18-months-old infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Calvin Russ, of Black, spent last Sunday night lost in a wheat field with apparently no serious results or discomfort.

Mr. and Mrs. Russ went out to look at a field of grain and leaving the baby in the car walked some little distance away examining the grain. Upon their return to the car the baby had disappeared. Search was immediately instituted by the parents without result.

Becoming greatly alarmed upon being unable to find their baby they called for the assistance of neighbors and within a comparatively short time nearly every inhabitant of the Black community was on the spot searching for the child. Lines were formed, each searcher holding the hand of the man next to him and this line swept in continually widening circles through the field, but without results.

The parents were distracted and as the night slowly passed with the searchers making still greater and more frantic efforts to find the lost child, their alarm increased accordingly. Fear was held for the safety of the infant.

Then came the morning. Tired friends continued their efforts and the child was found within about 100 yards of where the car was parked. Evidently lost in the wheat and tired, it had laid down and gone to sleep. The night was warm and the youngster had apparently spent as comfortable a night as it would have spent at home.

CAR CRASHES INTO TRUCK; C. B. JORDAN BADLY HURT

The highway about a mile west of Friona was the scene of a serious auto accident Tuesday night about 12 o'clock. The car, a Ford coupe, property of Clyde Seamon, crashed into the side of a truck driven by J. R. Marcus of the Marcus Truck Line running from Clovis to Amarillo.

Mr. Seamon had loaned the car to one of the three men who occupied it at the time of the wreck. Mr. Marcus says that he noticed the car coming down the road in an erratic fashion and that he pulled his truck, which contained a load of about 6000 pounds, to the very edge of the bar pit in an effort to miss the coupe. The coupe struck the truck's left front wheel, taking off the hub cap then the overhang of the truck body and on into the rear wheels knocking them badly out of line and throwing the truck completely across the road.

The coupe was completely wrecked. The radiator and left front fender were crumpled beyond repair, the front axle was driven

under the car, the body was ruined. The coupe must have overturned several times before coming to a stop, we judge after viewing the condition of the road where the wreck happened.

In the truck were Mr. Marcus and his wife, who was slightly injured and is suffering with shock. Mr. Marcus was unhurt.

C. B. Jordan, one of the occupants of the wrecked car, suffered severe fracture of one arm. The arm was broken in several places and was badly crushed and lacerated. He was brought to the office of Dr. R. R. Willis, local physician and surgeon, who administered first aid and sent him on to the hospital in Clovis for attention. Because of the serious condition of Mr. Jordan's arm, it was necessary that it be set under an X-ray and have surgical attention such as only a hospital is equipped to give.

Eggs Will Get Scarce Unless Price Improves

(From the Hereford Brand)
No farming enterprise has been harder hit by price slumps than the poultry industry, reports received by W. H. Darrow of the A. & M. College extension service show. To make egg receipts cover feed costs is something of an achievement these days.

Culling and selling off is now a regular order of business on the

farm. Thousands of producers have quit feeding altogether. Two rays of hope shine through the gloom—prices must improve if Americans want eggs with their ham and bacon, and a few demonstrators are showing how to make a little money in spite of the price.

Every county farm and home demonstration agent whose poultry reports have been examined show at least one poultry flock demonstrator making a small profit above feed costs.

It is an art as well as a science to cut production to the quick without ruining production. In the records examined there is not an exception to the rule that the poultrymen who are breaking even or better had their hens laying 15 eggs or more each during a month.

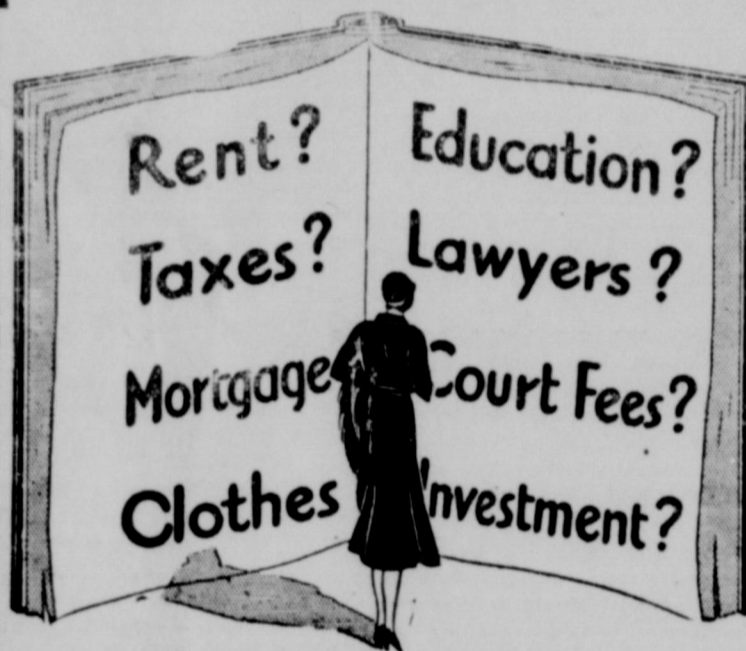

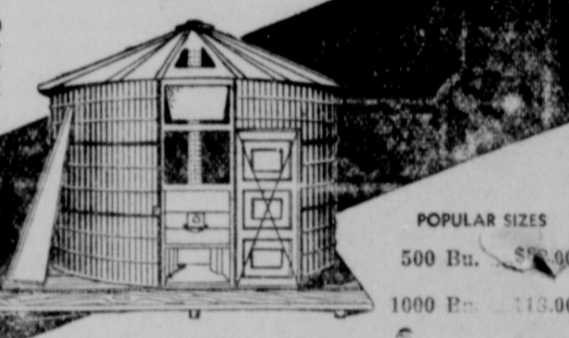

**Bippus Youth
Killed While
Hauling Water**

(From the Hereford Brand)

The Bippus community was visited by tragedy last Thursday morning when E. R. Reese, jr., age 9, met instant death after falling from a trailer on which four barrels of water were being hauled. He was crushed by one of the barrels and the tractor used in pulling the load, passed over his body when put into reverse by Ashburn Reese, age 14, the driver, who became excited at what was happening.

Ashburn had driven the tractor, pulling a trailer, to a neighbor's house for water. E. R. wanted to go but his mother told him to remain at home. The little fellow, however, slipped away and met his brother returning. He was riding on the trailer with the front barrel when it became unbalanced, both falling to the ground with the boy underneath. It is thought his head was crushed and that death was instantaneous.

When the brother saw the water barrels tipping, he brought the tractor to a sudden stop and the tragedy followed. In his excitement the vehicle was thrown into reverse and the heavy tractor ploughed backward, passing over the victim and crushing the barrel. The body of E. R. was penetrated by the wheel tings.

Deceased was the son of Mr. and Mrs. E. R. Reese, who live 43 miles northwest of Hereford. Surviving are the parents, two brothers, Ashburn and James; three sisters, Mary, Dorothy and Billy Ann.

Funeral services were held at the Z. J. Steen home and interment was made in the Bippus cemetery. Rev. Pryor of Adrian and Rev. J. M. Fuller of Hereford conducted the rites.

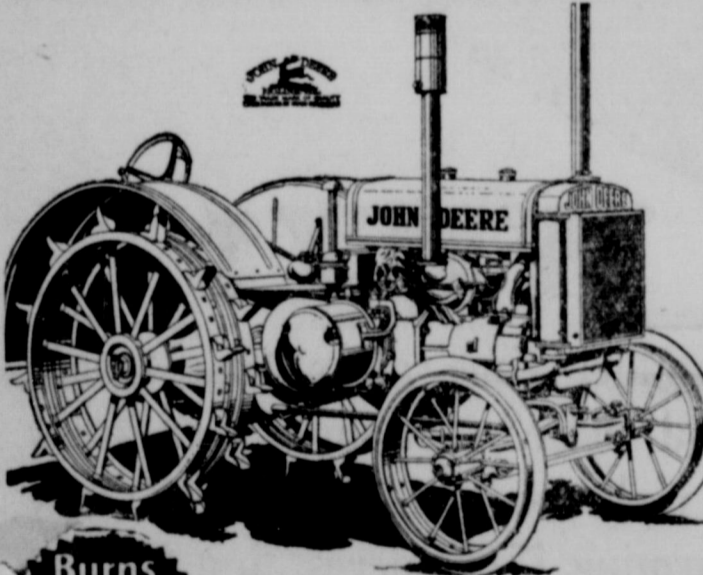
It has been called to my attention that some people are lax in their observance of the stock law. Those who have come to my office are reluctant to make complaints.

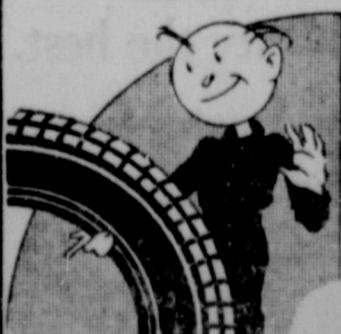

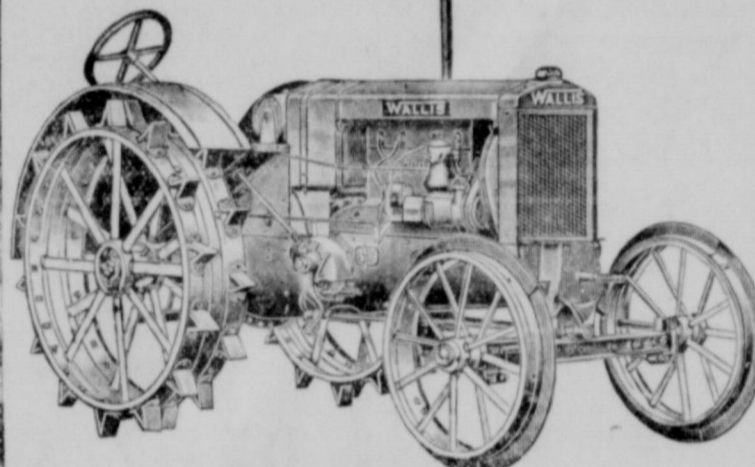

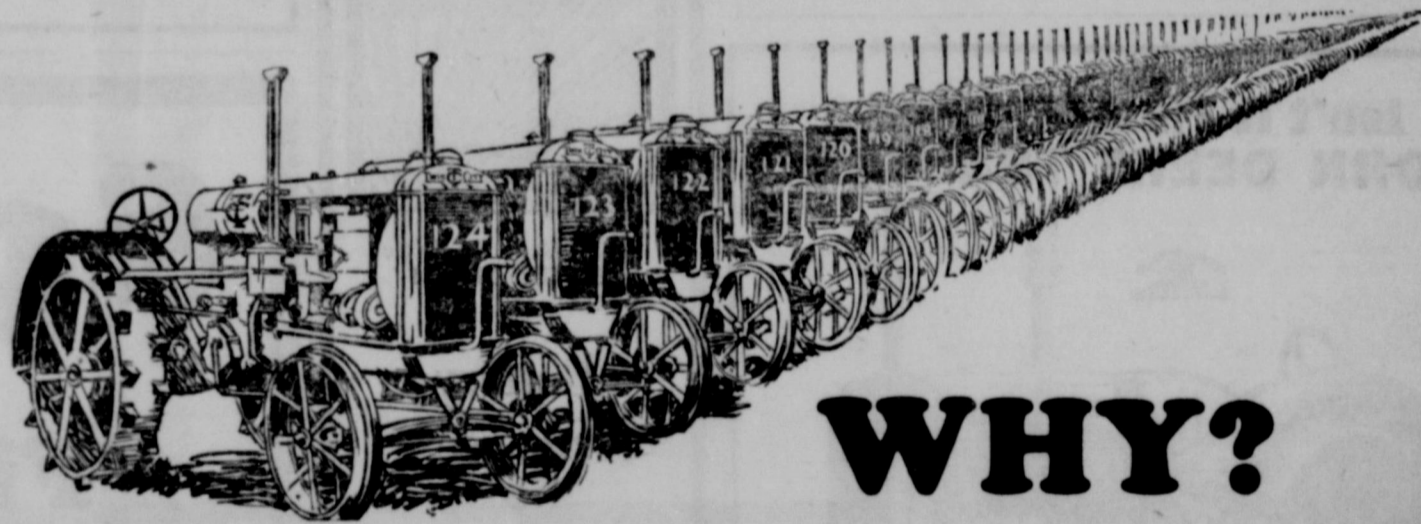
