A RECENT column by Paul Harvey had a headline that should be a bumper sticker on every vehicle in Parmer County, if not the state and nation:

The headline read: "HAVE YOU HUGGED A FARMER LATELY?"

Those of us who have been born and raised in farm families are acutely aware of how hard a farmer works to not only put meat and potatoes on his own family's plate, but also the plates of the other 98 per cent of the nation's population.

Not only does farming require hard, dedicated work, but the farmer's yearly income is at risk to the fickle hand of Mother Nature, in regard to rain (or lack of it), wind, hail, or other storms, which can wipe out a year's work at any time, even up to and including the time that he might be just pulling into his field to harvest his crop.

Those engaged in farming are the only business people aside from those running the State Lottery who actively participate in legalized gambling for a living.

That last statement is probably the main reason that Ye Editor decided early-on that he'd probably not follow five or six previous generations of his immediate family in the farming business. (That, along with the fact that he also reasoned that there was bound to be a way of making a living that didn't require you to work your fingers to the bone.)

The Ellises were "middle class" farmers (and perhaps lower than that during the Depression and the Dirty 30s), and had to accomplish whatever got done on the farm themselves, with the exception of a few extra "hoe hands" in the summer and cotton harvesters in the fall (prior to the coming of mechanized harvest).

Our country used to be a nation of farmers. Even the father of our country, George Washington, was a farmer, I'd wager that our current president, coming from a farming state, can't even pronounce 'cultivate,' let alone define it.

The percentage of people who are actively engaged in farming has dropped and dropped, until the latest estimate is that only about two per cent of all Americans are engaged in farming for their livelihood.

Like we said earlier, this two per cent has to feed all Americans--in the big cities and rural areas alike. We realize that there is an ever-growing segment of our population who believes (sometimes I think they really do) that it doesn't matter whether the farmer prospers or not, because they can get all the groceries they need down at their neighborhood Safeway, or whatever.

In a nation whose balance of trade is tipped toward imports by a whopping \$165 billion a year, our country's farmers are among the minority of businessmen who have continued to export their commodities, helping to feed millions of folks in other lands.

In fact, if it weren't for the export of their grain, oils, and such things as corn syrups, dextrose, fructose, beverage alcohol and vehicle fuel ethanol, our nation's trade balance would be down another \$50 billion per year.

Besides the traditional crops, farmers are furnishing such items as lecithin, palm oil, vitamin E, monoglycerides, malt and pastas. Over 30 different varieties of pasta are produced from hard durum wheat, we understand.

Besides keeping us fed, today's farmers produce such things as bio products such as penicillin, vitamin C, xanthan gum for baby food, citric and lactic acids and their salts.

So--don't cuss a farmer with your mouth full, and maybe you ought to hug a farmer occasionally (oh, all right, just a handshake would suffice). If we keep losing members of this profession, can the human race continue?

Parmer Co. SWCD Director Elected

Kevin Welch of Friona was re-elected to the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District board of directors on October 3. Welch represents Zone 3 of the district.

The purpose of the Parmer County Soil and Water Conservation District, with headquarters in Friona, is to promote sound soil and water conservation programs on agricultural lands within the district. In addition, the district serves as a voice for farmers, ranchers and local community entities on conservation matters.

The board of directors coordinates the conservation efforts of various local, state and federal agencies and other organizations and has authority to enter into working agreements with these governmental agencies and private concerns to carry out its purposes.

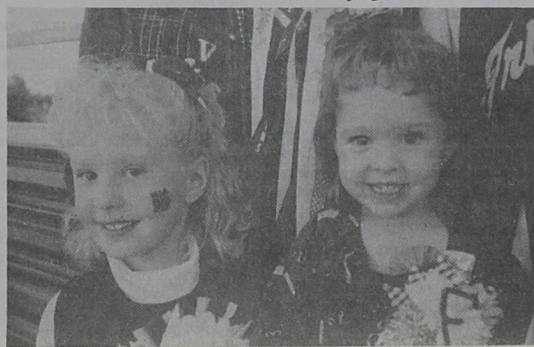
The five members serving on the district board of directors are

responsible for district policies and procedures for carrying out the district program within the framework of the Texas Soil Conservation District law.

Welch is active in the Farm Bureau where he serves as the secretary of the board. He is also a member on both the Plains Gas Co-op board and the Parmer County community committee.

In Texas, there are 214 Soil and Water Conservation Districts. Each is a legal subdivision of the state government organized by local agricultural landowners with the assistance of the Texas State Soil and Water Conservation Board.

Unlike most other legal subdivisions of state government, SWCD's do not have the powers of taxation or eminent domain. All conservation programs managed by the district are of a voluntary nature to the landowner or operator or other potential users of the SWCD's programs.

Current contest standings after week five, and this week's entry blank, are elsewhere in this issue of the Star.

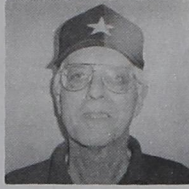

me and the kids out of the way. The only pig these city kids had ever seen was in the Charlotte's Web video. Plus they jump up and down to ride in Uncle Rick's truck. The Parmer County 4-H sponsored a pig auction at the Friona Community Center. Since Rick took a turn at raising pigs a few years ago, he thought Zach and Megan should see some of the "cute little pigs" for sale.

As we left the house, Cindy warned me that no matter how much the kids begged, "DON'T BUY A PIG, RON."
 When I was a kid in Hillsboro, Texas, I was a city kid too. I do remember there was FHA, FFA, and 4-H.

The FFA boys wore blue jackets with a gold emblem on the back. They got to leave school early some days to go to the barn and look after the animals.

There was a separate page in the annual for FHA, FFA, and 4-H club members. My picture was never on one of those pages.

Every year, one or two FFA or 4-H members would put on their jackets and hats and go to a state convention in Austin or Houston, or some other exotic Texas locale. Out at the Community Center, the Lazbuddie 4-H'ers operated the concession stand, the only part of the proceedings that I really understood. They had burgers and fries and cokes, but nothing with bacon was on the menu. Probably out of respect for the little honored guests.

In one area was an arena with some grandstands. A pig-run led from the arena to the other section where the pig contestants were housed in their own little individual pens.

The grown men hustled them along from their pens, out to the arena so other grown men and some boys could look them over. Since each little pig had a number on its back, the men and boys could make notes about which ones to bid on later.

Out at the pen area, it was apparent that all the pigs wanted to do was lay down and sleep. In one pen with five pigs in it, they all lay in a pile on top of each other.

But their naps were short-lived. The owners and shoppers had long buggy-whips that they used to whap the pigs to make them stand up and run around. If you didn't have your own stick, one of the pig raisers would gladly loan you one.

After all, you can't tell much about a future pig-pet when it is laying down. They've got to walk around and grunt so you can gauge their show-quality.

All I was able to gauge was their color. The experts called them names like Hamps, Durocs, or Polands. Me and the kids called them brown, black & white spotted, or, my favorite, pink and gray.

Prospective bidders roamed the aisles, spanking the pigs and interviewing the owners. The youngsters of 4-H followed their dads around and listened and learned.

It must be hard for a young boy or girl to decide which pig they want. Then when dad buys them, the kids raise them, get attached to them, then sell them. There are many of life's lessons in the whole process.

My kids? As soon as one of the pigs squealed real loud, Megan never let go of Uncle Rick's neck again.

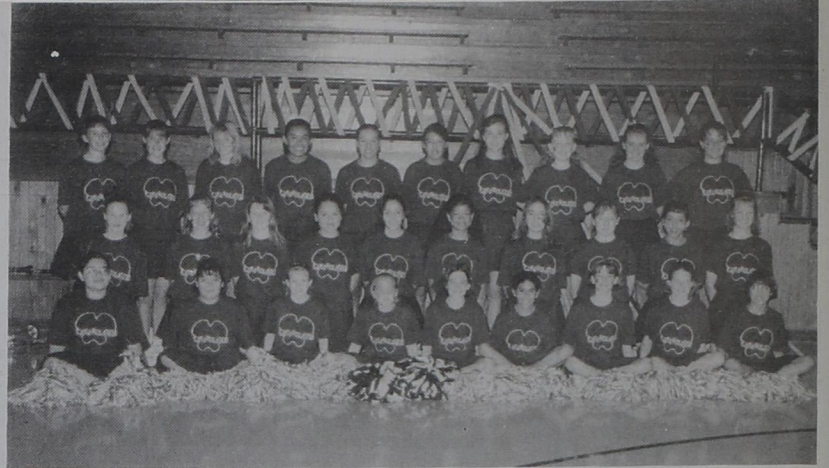
Zachary climbed over into the pens, petted the pigs, then like the grown-ups, he leaned back in the corner with his elbows on the rail and stood there surveying the action.

I figure he learned his first country lesson: how to effectively lean on a fence and talk. Now his Uncle Rick needs to show him how to chew on a piece of straw at the same time.

We left before the auction. The pigs were all sold and went home with new owners and new friends, and bright futures. For a while.

Thanks to my brother Rick, Terry Copley, and the other pig raisers for their technical assistance with this article and for letting us city slickers wander around the arena.

It was an educational afternoon and the good news is that during the entire time me and the kids didn't step in anything.

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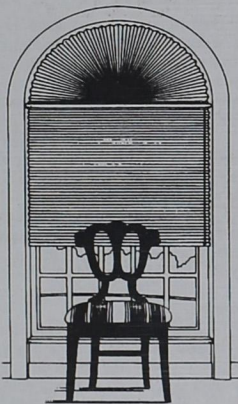
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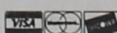

The Sixth Amendment to the Constitution provides that: In all criminal prosecutions, the accused shall enjoy the right to a speedy and public trial, by an impartial jury of the state and district wherein the crime shall have been committed; which district wherein the crime shall have been previously ascertained by law, and to be informed of the nature and cause of the accusation; to be confronted with the witnesses against him; to have compulsory process for obtaining witnesses in his favor, and to have the assistance of counsel for his defense.

Well the trial was public enough but I'm not sure it could be classified as "speedy."

I am reminded of the description of the end of the age described in the Book of Revelation. Revelation 20:11,12, "And I saw a great white throne and Him who sat upon it, from whose presence earth and heaven fled away, and no place was found for them. And I saw the great and the small, standing before the throne, and books were opened; and another book was opened, which is the book of life; and the dead were judged from the things which were written in the books, according to their deeds".

That sounds like it might be a public trial and probably pretty

speedy too.

In the case of those who come to God through Christ though, we do not come with lawyers or our witnesses. We come to the throne and plead guilty to every imaginable crime committed against God. We don't argue our case, for we don't have one, there are no closing arguments.

We stand only in the fact that Christ died for our sins. He took the punishment for my crimes against God. Was Christ's death on the cross adequate to pay the full penalty for my crimes? God, the one who sits on the throne says "Yes". An eternal and forever "Yes".

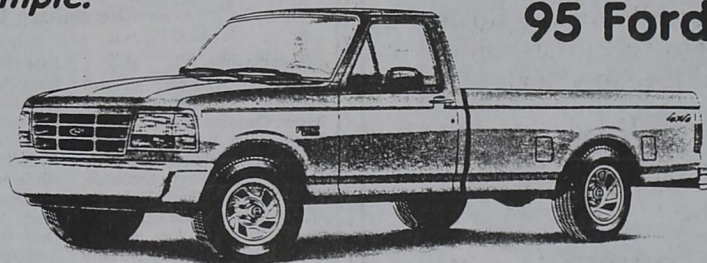
Huckabee is also involved in the Homecoming and Student Grievance Committees.

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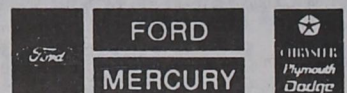

Chiefs' Defense Stars In Win Over Tulia

Things looked bleak for the Chieftains when Tulia scored on their first offensive series last Friday at Chieftain Field.

Less than three minutes into the game, Hornet Lane Russell connected with Jeremy Patton for a 15-yard touchdown pass. Teammate Jimmy Don Bullock added the PAT for a 7-0 Tulia lead.

But it was Homecoming, and there was no way the Chiefs were going to let the Hornets off that easy. So, on Friona's first series, the team came back for a scoring drive of their own.

Quarterback Tony Mejia, on the keeper, ran the ball in for a 1-yard touchdown, and Angel Vega kicked the point-after, to tie the score at 7-7, with 4:26 left in the opening quarter.

Then, on the first play of the second quarter, Andy Kendrick took a pitch from Mejia and quickly was in the secondary. Forty yards later, Kendrick crossed the goal-line, and it was 13-7, eight seconds into the quarter. A two-point attempt failed.

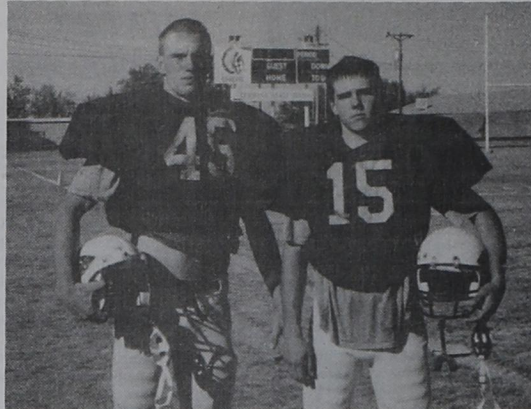
Kendrick carried the ball 15 times for 133 yards and was named as the Amarillo Globe News' "Player of the Week" for conference 3A. Kendrick also was on the South Plains "Area Honor Roll" for his performance.

Friona took the kickoff to start the second half, and put together a perfect 12-play scoring drive. Lance Looper sparked the drive, carrying three times for 33 yards, all three carries being "tough" runs. On his last run Looper was stopped at the Tulia five where Friona had first and goal.

Looper gained 85 yards in the game, and was on the Globe-News "honor roll."

A big play in the drive was an 18-yard pass play from Mejia to receiver Quint Ellis. Mejia threw the ball high, and the 6-4 Ellis went up to easily beat his defender for a first down.

Kendrick got the touchdown with a nifty five-yard run. Showing great balance after being hit, he righted himself at about the one, plunging into the end zone for his second touchdown. Once again the

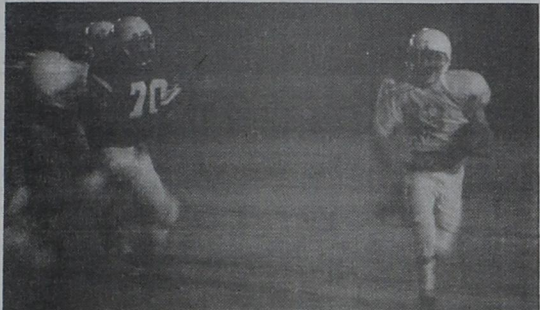

Tulia's Landis Barrow broke through the Chieftain charge, and raced 70 yards for a touchdown. The kick cut Friona's lead to 19-14.

All Tulia had to do was to score to take the lead, and possibly the win. The rest of the game was a tense defensive struggle. Tulia was able to keep the ball on Friona's end of the field for most of the last quarter, but the Chieftain defense was equal to the challenge.

Friona forced the Hornets to punt on all of their last four possessions. Aided by a penalty, Tulia drove to the Friona 19. But Quint Ellis sacked the quarterback for a seven-yard loss and Shane Blackburn knocked down a critical

third-down pass, and Tulia elected to punt.

Mejia connected with Raymon Flores on a big third-down play as Friona worked to run out the clock. Friona had fourth and one from their own 36 with 1:14 left, and Kendrick got the needed yard to seal the win.

Friona's defense held Tulia to just 72 yards overall.

"They told Hugo (Santiago) he was the quickest defensive tackle they'd ever seen," Morton said. Several times he was able to sack the QB or cause a fumble, then get back up and help with the recovery.

In the Globe-News, Friona is rated first in both offense and defense, and their awesome "D" is also top-rated in the South Plains, which includes such football powers as Slaton and Denver City.

Kendrick is the second leading rusher in Amarillo's list, and fourth in Lubbock's, with his 475 yards. Although missing the game, Kyle Grimsley still ranks fifth in passing, 19 completions for 360 yards.

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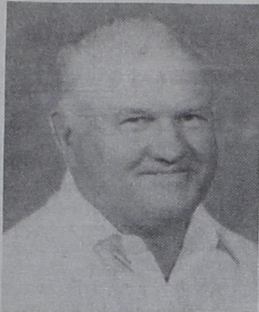
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PETE JESKO Rites Held Friday For 'Pete' Jesko

I was born December 14, 1911 in Tennyson, Coke County, Texas to Doc and Liza Larkin. I was one of ten children. I had five sisters and four brothers. Sometimes all those brothers and sisters were aggravating.

We were busy helping our folks from the time school was out until bedtime. All of us kids had to hoe the cotton and corn. We cooked on an iron wood stove.

I attended school at Tennyson and Joy, Texas. I played volleyball at school and we had to wear bloomers for our uniforms. I married Weldon Fulgham on September 9, 1929 in Waurika, Oklahoma. I met him at school and he was the only man I ever dated. We lived at Joy, Texas and farmed.

I have always enjoyed cooking and having my family around me. I lost Weldon in 1988 and life was very lonely. I came to Prairie Acres to live on November 1, 1993.

To sum up my life, I would say it has been very interesting. I wouldn't take for some of the experiences I have been through.

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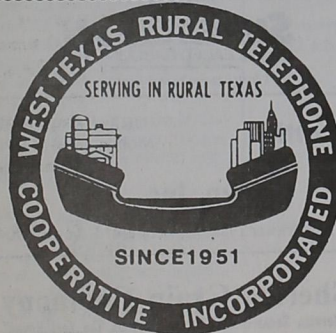

Is Your Credit Report Accurate?

In today's world, your credit history is sacred. You can't rent an apartment, apply for insurance or obtain a credit card, car loan or mortgage without a check of your credit history.

But you may not be aware of all the other companies and individuals who can gain access to your credit records. To join a university, try to apply to a club—even if you're a candidate for a new job—these organizations and companies also may be checking out your credit report.

What they will find in your report is the history of your payments on loans, mortgages, credit cards and other debt. They will learn not only whether you made all your regular payments, but also how prompt you were. Judgments, bankruptcies, liens and other unfavorable events are all there.

No problem, you say. You've always paid your bills on time, you never carry balances on your credit cards, and you've never been sued. So what if people are checking your records?

According to a recent report in *Personal Finance* magazine, up to 33 per cent of all credit reports contain serious errors. These include incorrect tax identification numbers, limited data or worse mistakes that can be damaging. These very mistakes can result in your being denied a car loan, mortgage or even a new job.

Obviously, it's to your benefit to make sure your credit records are correct, and it's pretty simple to do so. There are three major credit reporting bureaus--TRW, Equifax and Trans Union--and all will provide you with a copy of your credit report. The report is free if you've been denied credit within the past 60 days; otherwise, there is generally a small charge. However, TRW provides one complimentary report each year.

To obtain a report, you must submit a written request, and each credit bureau has specific requirements about what information to include in your request. All three bureaus provide recorded phone messages that spell out all the details of obtaining a credit report. Here are the phone numbers:

How do third parties get copies of your report? They must submit requests with your signature approving release of information. However, you may sometimes give this approval unknowingly--for example, when you apply for credit. Offers of "pre-approved" credit, according to a TRW representative, can be misleading. Signing an application for a "pre-approved" loan or credit card simply means you agree to a credit check. If your credit report is negative, you'll probably still be denied.

These national credit bureaus store credit information as reported by your creditors. Each bureau's report may contain different information. If you find any errors, correct them immediately. To do so, you typically must file a dispute with the credit bureau and prove the error. Even if there are no apparent mistakes now, it's a good practice to recheck your credit reports during your annual financial check-up.

Credit is a way of life for most Americans. It's not only your responsibility to use it properly, but also to make sure it's recorded properly.

YOUR EYES

The Eyes Of The Hunter



Most hunters are careful to check their weapons before setting out and to wear high-visibility garments--but too many forget to check their vision, too. Yet what the hunter sees--or thinks he sees--is the key signal to squeeze the trigger. Defective vision can be a serious problem in the field.

In Minnesota, a hunter casualty study showed that 77 per cent of those who wounded fellow hunters had defective vision, and that half of them were not even aware of it. In addition, some 15 per cent of males are either color-blind or color-deficient--unable to distinguish colors properly--another threat to other hunters.

Hunting makes certain visual demands: the hunter needs to be able to distinguish detail at distance and against various backgrounds and to focus clearly on near and distant objects, switching focus quickly. Most visual defects can be corrected easily to enable hunters to continue their sport safely and successfully.

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
