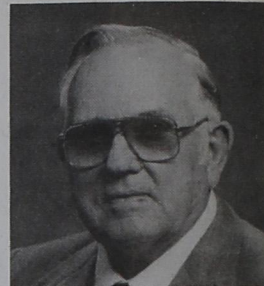
Ed Clark's Services Held Here Tuesday

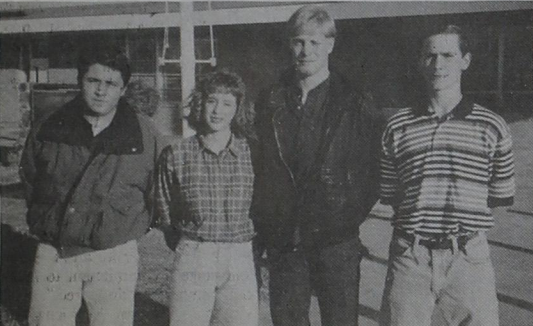

Everyone knows oil and water don't mix! Recycle your waste oil. Remember, "You dump it, you drink it".

The City of Friona has two new oil recycle locations. They accept Only used motor oil from the crankcase of your personal vehicle...and...only used oil filters from your personal vehicle.

Center locations are at: 623 Main (8 a.m.-5p.m.Mon-Fri) behind city hall, and 710 Jackson, (8 a.m.-5 p.m. Mon-Fri and 2 p.m.- 4 p.m. Sat)

NOTE: No more than five (5) gallons of used oil can be recycled during any one center visit.

There are posted instructions at each center. No smoking is allowed there. No materials other than motor oil or oil filters are accepted.

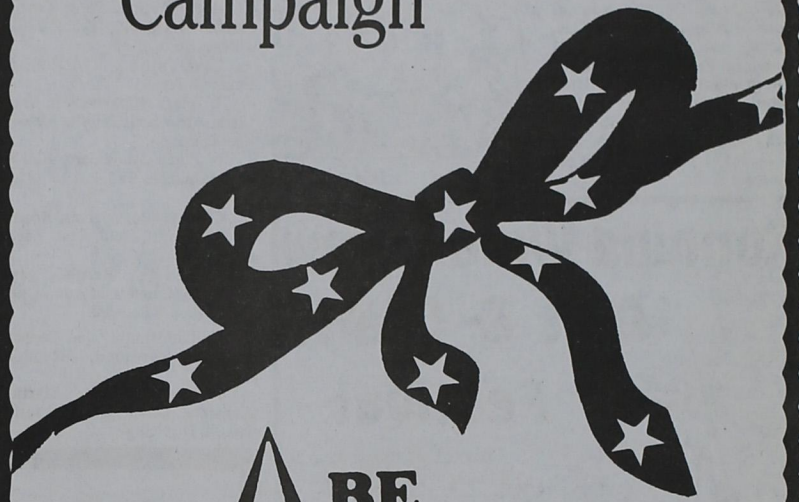
When you leave, close all the lids and leave the area clean.

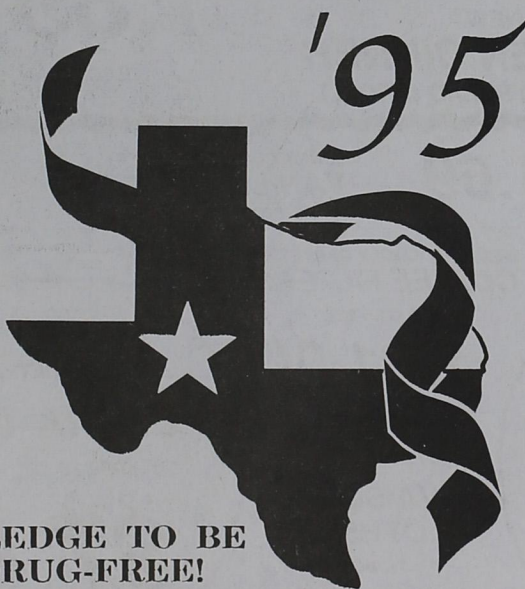

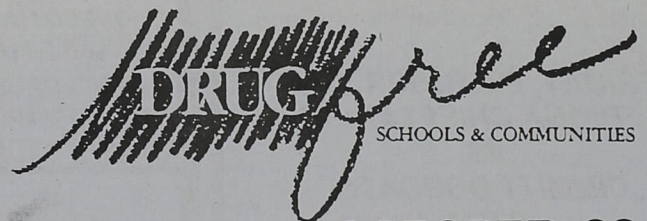

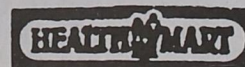

Macular Degeneration

Age-related macular degeneration is the cause of more cases of legal blindness in the U.S. than any other reason. Today, some 20 per cent of people over 75 are affected. And the numbers are expected to rise, from 1.7 million now to 6.3 million by 2030.

The macula is the most sensitive part of the retina, where the lens focuses light. It is the macula that is responsible for providing the fine detail that enables us to read and do other close work. When the macula is damaged, objects may become indistinct or distorted; there may be an actual blind spot in the center of the visual field. Color perception may be affected, too.

Early detection is important. One type of degeneration--the "wet" kind, in which blood vessels begin to grow indiscriminately--needs to be treated quickly to save the patient's vision. The more common "dry" type moves more slowly. Your optometrist can help you make the most of the vision remaining.
