



Johnson grass completely without swinging a hoe. and son have moved to Abilene.

Spot application of diesel and naphtha-type oil sprays is proving a practical answer to row crop control of Johnson grass. At College Station four treatments of such oils killed 99 percent of all Johnson grass in cotton stands in one season. Four trips over a similar field with hand hoes eliminated only 44 percent of the grass.

Farmers can now get rid of

Homer E. Rea, agronomist for the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station who has been working with various Johnson grass killers, believes that successful spot oiling of Johnson grass is highly significant.

"It does away with intensive hand labor methods which few farmers can afford these days," Rea said.

Varsol 1, Lightfoot 23, No-weed Oil Lion 1 and Flit 38 are among commercial preparations to use. An ordinary knapsack sprayer applying a half and half mixture of one of these oils and diesel fuel will do the job, Rea explained. About one-third of a teaspoon of oil mixture on the stem near the base of each plant is sufficient for results. Best kills are obtained on young grass.

Within hours after the initial treatment Johnson grass usually is shriveled and killed to ground level. To completely eradicate the roots and prevent later resprouting repeated oilings at intervals of seven to 10 days may be necessix treatments.





STOP AND THINK!

Every once in a while you run across an item that makes you stop and think. Some time ago, the Cleveland Plain Dealer, Cleveland, Ohio, carried an editorial which did an excellent job of presenting the local angle of a farremoved problem.

There's been a lot written about the power project at Hell's Canyon on the Snake River between Idaho and Oregon, but to most of us that's a problem for somebody else to worry about. However, after reading the Plain Dealer's editorial, we were immediately interested to know how much this project in Idaho is going to cost Texas taxpayers. The answer - \$15,174,322. This is based on the fact that Texans pay 3.26% of taxes collected by the Federal Government.

Since we Texans will pay more than 15 million dollars of that proposed government high power dam at Hell's Canyon, this project in Idaho does have an important local angle.

Cleveland Plain Dealer, May 31, 1955

'The public power brigade in Congress is trying to get a bill passed that would commit the federal government to build a high power dam at Hell's Canyon on the Snake River between Idaho and Oregon. Led by Senator Wayne Morse, they have raised the old familiar cry that it would be a 'steal' if the government were to permit the Idaho Power Company, an investor-owned public utility, to build three small dams on the Snake River that would generate about the same amount of power.

'Well, let's see who would be stealing from whom . .

"The estimated cost of the government dam, including transmission facilities and interest during construction, is \$465,470,000.

"How much of this would be collected from Ohio taxpayers? The Council of State Chambers of Commerce has provided the answer - \$29,743,533. This is based on the fact that Ohioans pay 6.35 percent of the taxes collected by the federal government.

"Does it make sense that Ohioans should be compelled to contribute nearly \$30,000,000 to generate cheap electricity for the Northwest? We think not. On the contrary, taxpayers of Ohio and the rest of the states would benefit if the private company were permitted to build the facilities and help ease the tax burden on everyone."

Highway Patrol Needs More Men

Capt. G. L. Morahan, who commands the Abilene District of the Texas Highway Patrol said that he is interested in contacting young men in this area who desire a career in traffic law enforcement.

According to Capt. G. L. Morahan, the Patrol Division of the Texas Department of Public Safety plans to train 100 men in the year beginning Sept. 1, 1955. The examination, which will be statewide, is tentatively set for early in August with the training school to begin in Oct. In the meantime, applicants have until midnight of July 25 to file for the positions.

Capt, Morahan said that you are eligible for one of the positions if you can meet the following conditions: You must be a male, between the age of 21 and 35 years, inclusive; not less than 5 feet 8 inches in height; and weighing not less than 2 pounds or more than 31/2 pounds per inch of height. You must have a high school education, and must be a citizen of the United States and a resident of Texas for at least a year immediately prior to application. Finally, you must satisfactorily pass an exhaustive character and mental examination. Salary of Patrolmen is \$315 per month with \$10 per month extra for each five years of service up to 15 years. An annual two-weeks paid vacation is afforded and uniforms and equipment are provided to all members of the Patrol. Capt. Morahan says that you can secure an application blank by calling in person at 2064 Butternut Street in Abilene, or you may write directly to W. J. Elliott, Chief, Texas Highway Patrol, Austin, and request one.
