## Tyson Neill Nails First Prize In Week 9 Contest

Except for the Hereford-Canyon tie, the high school and college games were pretty easy in Week 9 of the Friona Star Football Contest.

Then came Sunday and the pro games. Indianapolis was a popular pick, but didn't beat Buffalo.

Green Bay, Chicago, and the New York Giants were other losers as picking winners in the pros became just another guessing game.

The week's winner of the \$10 top prize was youngster Tyson Neill, one of three contestants to pick only 12 out of 16 games.

He missed the tie-game of Hereford-Canyon, Lockney's loss to Hale Center, plus the Chicago loss to Pittsburgh and the Giants loss to Seattle.

The tie-breaker score of Dallas over Philadelphia by 34-12 determined the top three prize winners.

Neill's guess was 35-10, only three points off.

Second place winner, Heath Patterson, who gets \$7.50, also had 12 correct picks and was five points

off the tie-breaker with his guess of Dallas by 31-10.

Third was John Seright of Lubbock. He pockets the \$5 for his 12 correct picks and third-place tie-breaker of Dallas 28, Eagles 14, which was eight points off.

Only nine other contestants managed eleven correct picks, with everyone else at ten or less.

The third place win and 12 correct picks vaulted Seright into first place in the overall standings with a total of 108 points, replacing perennial leader Ron Smiley, who now has only 107 points.

Bobby Wied is alone in third place with 104 points, followed by Tim Elmore, this week's winner Tyson Neill, Thomas Reed, and Mark Walker, all with 103 points.

Eleven other players have 100 or more points, with four contests left to play.

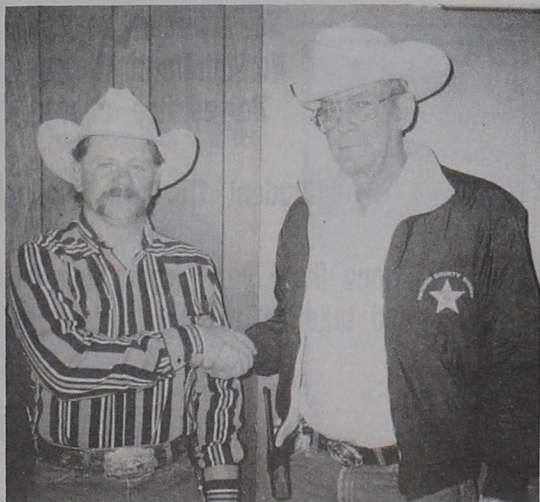
## Stew Supper Scheduled

THANKS TO Winifred and Andy Hurst for suggesting our recent trip to Branson, MO. They were especially enthusiastic about it, so we decided to give it a try.

Nashville, Tennessee, has always been the mecca for Country Music. As the birthplace of the Grand Ole Opry, and Opryland, Nashville has for generations been the home of country music stars.

But Branson, Missouri, an unlikely location--not even on an interstate highway--has slowly but surely become the place folks visit when they want to see their favorite star in person.

When Carol and I took the Trailways bus tour recently to Branson, we liked the fact that the shows are all "family oriented." None of the shows ever came close to having an off-color story. As a matter of fact, most of the shows' main stars have incorporated their children, or other members of their families in their show.

For instance, The Lennon Sisters are the headliners for the Lawrence Welk show, and they are just as good today as they were back in the 1950s when they first joined Welk's television show, being just out of their teens.

The Lennons are augmented by their daughters, called the Lennon Daughters. The Lennon Sisters have managed to age gracefully. When they did a number with their girls (four Lennon sisters plus four daughters), it was hard to tell the moms from the daughters.

Mel Tillis put on an outstanding show. The youngest performer we saw in Branson was Tillis' three-year-old grandson, who stole the show from grandpa. He nonchalantly strolled onto the stage with his own microphone, and sang harmony with Grandpa Mel to the 1950s favorite "This Old House."

Bobby Vinton's "80-ish" mother not only came onstage to join her son in a couple of musical numbers, but was out front during intermission selling her "jams and jellies." As you might suspect, Carol hardly ever passed a souvenir booth or gift shop without giving it some support.

Japanese export Shoji Tabuchi is a top draw in Branson, and he definitely puts on an outstanding show. Tabuchi's wife Dorothy has been a part of the stage presentation but now is strictly his business manager. Her 15 year old daughter Christina performs as often as possible, but never on a school night. Luckily for our group, we saw the Friday night performance, and were able to enjoy Christina's numbers. It was pointed out that she is also a straight-A student.

Jim Stafford has a show with lots of variety, including laser lights, remote controlled hot-air balloons, and snow falling on the audience. He made us all weak from laughter and thoroughly entertained the crowd with his wit and expertise on the guitar.

Andy Williams still belts out love songs that steal the hearts of the ladies in the crowd. The closing number of Anita Bryant's show dealt with scores of American servicemen who had given her their medals to pin on her special flak-jacket which she had acquired during her days with the Bob Hope Air Base Tours.

There wasn't a dry eye in the crowd as Anita told about the donors of these medals. She also came onto our tour bus, and Ye Editor had his picture made hugging a star. Anita's husband Bill met our bus when it arrived, and cracked jokes for several minutes.

All of the shows have representatives come out to greet you before you get off the bus, and then someone to come out and thank you for coming.

Some of the other headliners at Branson include Kenny Rogers, Wayne Newton, The Osmond Brothers, Tony Orlando, and more.

We thoroughly enjoyed Branson, and Carol is already figuring out when we can go back.

A move is now on foot to secure an early date, several more miles of paved highways for Parmer County. The other highway, which the new move proposes to pave, is the new State Highway, which connects Muleshoe, in Bailey County, with Friona, traversing the county from south to north.

## 40 YRS AGO-NOV. 4, 1960

The newly-built Sixth Street Church of Christ structure is one of the latest contributions to the Friona building scene, providing another modern church in a town of outstanding churches. Completed this month, the building is beautifully designed and constructed, inside and out.

Next election, in 1956, will find Parmer County residents voting for a new county elective office, that of County Tax Assessor and Collector. In a special election this Tuesday, the new office was authorized by one of the narrowest margins in local voting records, 97 affirmative and 81 against. Friona sanctioned the division by a slim 21-19 vote, with Farwell polling the heaviest ballot 54 for, 23 against the measure. The new office calls for a four year term, same as that of the sheriff. Mr. Lovelace will hold both positions until the 1957 term begins.

## 35 YRS AGO-NOV. 3, 1960

Two men were injured Monday afternoon in an explosion and fire at the Plains Farmers Gin on the Bovina Highway. Jack Dickerson was treated at Parmer County Community Hospital for burns and lacerations. His father Allan Dickerson was treated and released from the hospital. The younger man required hospitalization for his injuries, which included second and third degree burns on the arm and lacerations on the face and ear.

Firemen were called to the gin following the blast, which apparently started from a butane leak in a pilot of one of the gin's cotton dryers. Damage to the gin was not believed extensive.

Friona High School's Band will take part in Homecoming activities Saturday at Eastern New Mexico University in Portales. ENMU will take on Southwestern Oklahoma in the football contest that will highlight activities of the day. Friona's band will take part in the downtown parade at 11 a.m. and then perform at halftime.

## 30 YRS AGO-NOV. 4, 1965

Friona's District alignment for 1966 and 1967 has been announced. Hale Center and Memphis, both of which are moving up to class AA from A, will be in Friona's district, competing with the six teams which were already in the district. Bovina and Morton, neither met during the last two seasons, will be played as non-conference games. Muleshoe, Dalhart, and Plains, played this year, will not appear on the 1966 slate.

## 25 YRS AGO-NOV. 5, 1970

Friona voters gave a wide margin to Governor Preston Smith in his re-election bid, gave Lloyd Bentsen an eye-lash margin, and went overwhelmingly against liquor-by-the-drink in Tuesdays election. Smith had the majority in Friona, with 523 votes to 314 for Republican Paul Eggers. Bentsen edged out Bush in the Friona box, 421-415.

## 20 YRS AGO-NOV. 2, 1975

Ernest Osborn delivered the first bale of cotton in Friona for 1975. He brought the bale to Friona Farmers Co-op Gin on Thursday, October 30.

An official ground-breaking ceremony was held at the Friona Nursing Home site Tuesday morning. Lewellen Construction has estimated the job to take nine months to complete, and says he might beat that estimate if the weather is favorable.

## 15 YRS AGO-NOV 23, 1980

A record November snowstorm surprised the area Saturday and Sunday, with from six to eight

inches of snow falling in the local area.

An open house is set Sunday, November 23 at Parmer County Tax Appraisal Office in Bovina. The new office is located at 305 Third Street in Bovina. The new facility was completed November 1.

## 10 YRS AGO-NOV 17, 1985

The Friona area had a taste of winter weather on Thursday of last week, when the temperatures were in the 30's and 40's. Friday morning's low temperature was 20 degrees, which was the lowest reading of the season.

Funeral services were pending at the Star's press time for Ellis (Knotty) Tatum, 70, who died Friday morning November 15.

Funeral services for Aubrey Rhodes, who died at his home early Wednesday morning, were conducted Thursday.

## 5 YRS AGO-NOV 17, 1990

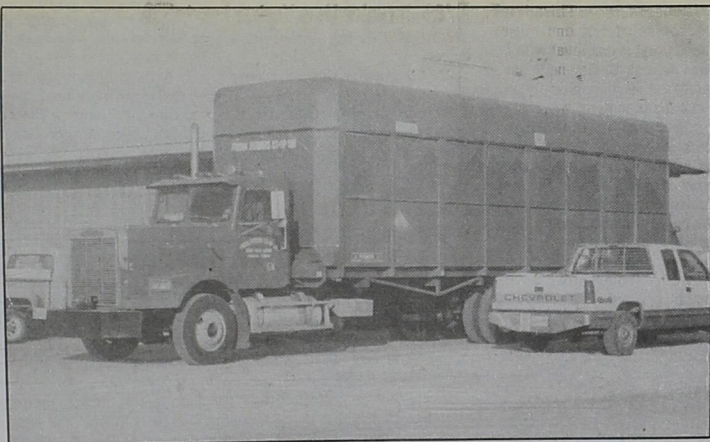

# Cotton Harvest Gets Underway

Harvest operations on the area's cotton crop has gotten underway, as farmers hope to have a positive conclusion on one of the strangest growing seasons ever experienced locally.

Although most of the leaves on the cotton plants have been killed by the freeze on November 2, the cotton stalks have not been killed, and there are still green bolls on the plants.

"We need a good, hard freeze, which will open those green bolls," said Jerry Butman, manager of the Friona Farmers Co-op Gin. "We need for the temperature to get down to about the mid-20s, and stay for several hours," Butman said.

The local ginner said that the yields on the cotton which has been stripped so far are not turning out as well as expected. "The crop could average a bale per acre, straight across. Earlier in the season we were hoping for a much better yield, he said.

Kenny Fangman of Hereford brought the first bale of cotton to Friona Farmers Co-op Gin on October 24.

The 1995 cotton crop was dealt a blow with late freezes in May, and hail-outs which included the June 2 tornado date. As a result thousands of acres were replanted, past the date when a cotton crop can mature under normal conditions.

These farmers with late cotton were needing a late freeze so their cotton could mature. They got the late freeze, but the crop also had to endure some late-season cold weather, which hampered the maturing process.

Then, needing a hard freeze to finish the process, the area hasn't had this type of freeze as of Wednesday of this week.

Grade reports on the '95 crop have been good so far, but the "micronaire" reading may drop when ginning begins on the irrigated cotton, it was suggested.

Butman said that the price of cotton is holding good, from 75 to 81 cents per pound. "The cotton farmers need the price to stay good, as they will need it to come out ahead on this crop," he commented.

A survey of the county's eight cotton gins on Tuesday of this week showed that 2,372 bales had been received at that point.

Curt Miller, director of the Parmer County CFSA office, said that 69,800 acres of cotton were originally certified by the county's

growers, probably an all-time record planting for the county.

Miller estimated, however, that around 9,000 acres were destroyed and not planted back to cotton. That still leaves possibly over 60,000 acres of cotton to be harvested in Parmer County.

Iona Cook reminded members of the Christmas Bazaar. The club is selling tickets on a queen-sized quilt and will also have crafts for sale.

Hal Ratcliff, superintendent of FSD, brought an interesting report on some of the special programs in the district. These included the reading recovery program in the first grade, the alternative classroom for junior and senior high, and the advanced placement program for juniors and seniors.

He also paid special tribute to past and present school board members and to teachers in the Friona Schools.

Music for the evening was furnished by Charles Allen and Geary Brogden, accompanied by Eva Miller. Their selections included "He Touched Me", "In Times Like These", "Just When I Need Him Most", "Whispering Hope", and "Amazing Grace."

Carmaleet Truitt brought an interesting review of the book, "None of These Diseases", by S.L. McMillen, M.D. This book, which has sold over one million copies, stresses the relevance of the Bible to today's mental and physical well-being.

The club collect was led by Elizabeth Gore. Refreshments were served by Lois Miller and Allo Reeve, hostesses.

He was a farmer.

# Out Here

Life is not always at its best here in Parmer County, but it beats being homeless in New York City. Ask Chris and Harold Richardson.

They have survived perils and ordeals that most Parmer County residents could only imagine.

One day in Fast Stop, I heard a New York accent. Because I have spent a lot of time in New York City, and have many friends in New York and New England, a New York accent in Parmer County caught my attention like snow in the weather forecast.

I struck up a conversation and learned that her name was Chris Richardson and she was indeed from New York City, but lived in Friona now with husband, Harold, and daughter Hope.

When she found out I wrote for the paper, she said she was writing a book about her life too, and invited me to come by sometime and listen to their story.

When I drove up the hard dirt road to their modest trailer home just off Highway 214 North, there were two or three old cars, two or three old dogs, and not a hint of those homeless days in New York City.

The sun lit the place as I sat in the warm and comfortable atmosphere of the living room with a cup of black coffee.

How many times during their almost nine years of being homeless in New York City had they longed for just such a shelter. It was quiet here. It is never quiet in New York City.

Robbin Christina "Chris" Richardson was born to a good

family in the Bronx, and grew up in Queens and Long Island. She graduated from prestigious Hofstra University in 1974 with a Bachelor of Science Degree in Hematology.

Harold Richardson was born in Brooklyn by accident, when his mother was on a visit from Wake Forest, North Carolina.

Harold's mother is Mexican-Indian. His father was a mixture of Mexican, Indian, and Black. Chris is German-Polish.

In plain language, they are an interracial couple, viewed with disdain by some, overlooked by others.

Harold bounced around between Arizona and New York during his childhood. In 1957, he enlisted in the Air Force and spent "3 years, 9 months, and 18 days" as he tells it.

Then he went back to New York. It was 1960 and he was 21 years old. The next twenty years he bounced around, drinking, partying, fighting, and sometimes working. He fixed cars, sang in bars, worked in a sock factory, and did some trucking.

One time he was stabbed in the heart by a "friend" high on drugs, and spent two weeks in a New York hospital.

Elsewhere in New York, Chris got into a couple of bad marriages, got pregnant, lost a child, got pregnant again and gave birth to a daughter, Faith.

She had consistent health problems, depression, and some bad luck.

All of which brings us to 1981. Chris and Harold met in a New York hospital. He had broken both ankles jumping out his second floor apartment window. The apartment was on fire at the time.

It was an alcohol and drug rehab hospital. Harold says it was the kind of place you could go to escape the street. "Two beers and you are in" at least for a night or two.

They liked each other. In fact, at the time, they needed each other, and so they clung together. For the next seven years, things didn't get much better.

They lived and slept on the

street, in parks, under bushes. One was always awake, on guard against the dangers of New York City.

Now and then, when they did some work and got a little money, they would get a motel room for a night or so, to clean up and rest without fear.

There was a big warehouse that sold bent or dented cans of food at cheap prices. A nickel or a dime would get you several cans of corn or sardines or pork and beans.

To this day, if you invite Chris over to lunch, "don't even think of offering me sardines or pork and beans", she says.

Harold managed to land a truck driving job and ran between New York City and Buffalo. Chris rode along. Later on, when their daughter Hope was born, they all rode and lived in that truck.

When he got paid, they would visit a laundromat, get another cheap motel for a night, and try to shake the fear of the future.

All along, Harold worried about them. He often told God, "Look, I could die by myself. Why did you send her here too?"

Somehow they managed just to keep alive. They said they never panhandled people for money when they lived in the street. "We weren't that kind of street people," Harold insisted, with a hint of pride in his voice now.

Still they clung together, hoping for a better tomorrow, which never seemed to come. Then they decided, to escape the pain and fear, "It was Friona, or nowhere."

Harold's brother came to get them in New Jersey, and they moved in with Harold's mother up on Main Street. That was seven years ago.

Since then, their deep religious faith has sustained them, along with some help from a lot of people here in Friona.

They attend First Baptist Church, sing in the choir, and thank God for the help that some of the choir members gave to help get where they are today.

They have lived comfortably now for over two years in this trailer home off 214.

## County Voters Mirror State Trend

Parmer County voters matched fairly well their neighbors across the state on Tuesday in the way they voted on the proposed constitutional amendments.

County voters gave their largest approval margin, 442-120, to proposition 6, the exemption from ad valorem taxation for residence homesteads of surviving spouse.

Next highest approval was prop. 7, reducing the bonds for the Super Collider project, which was abandoned on the national level.

Parmer voters agreed with State Treasurer Martha Whitehead that her office should be consolidated with other state offices, by 377-165. Statewide, the issue was approved by about the same margin.

Other propositions approved locally included proposition 3, to assist the development and processing of agricultural exports, 304-256. The issue also passed statewide.

Also, proposal #1, providing bonds to finance educational loans, passed 336-226. Amendment #5, increasing the amount of general obligation bonds for veterans, passed, 298-263.

Proposition #8, to abolish the constable office in three counties, passed, 377-137.

County voters also joined those statewide in soundly defeating proposition 13, property tax exemption for shrimp fishermen, 431-120, as well as proposition 9, allowing investment in a business with ties to South Africa, which was nixed here, 353-195.

A total of county 572 voters took part in Parmer County, an estimated 13.52 per cent of the 4230 registered voters. This was still higher than the regional and statewide figures, where only about ten per cent of the voters took part.

# Wildcats Burst FHS Playoff Bubble 26-12

It was a heart-breaking loss. Littlefield 26, Friona 15.

The Wildcats had possession of the ball for over eight minutes of the first quarter. (High school quarters are 12 minutes long). The 'Cats worked their way to the Chieftain goal with four first downs on a sustained drive.

The Chiefs thought they might have stalled the drive when Littlefield was penalized 10 yards for holding. But Jermaine Davis caught a pass from Danny Vargas that set the Wildcats up at the Friona six.

All Vargas had to do was hand the ball to Michael Benton and let him go. Benton, the area's leading rusher and scorer, got the TD and the extra point made it 7-0. Benton has more than twice as many touchdowns and points as the second-ranked player in class 3A.

The Chieftains started their first offensive series on their own 15-yard-line, but lost possession by a fumble just a couple of plays into the second quarter.

Vargas took the ball on a run to the Friona 48. The 'Cats weren't able to do much more with this drive, and the Chiefs got the ball back on their own 19.

Andy Kendrick and Shane Blackburn each had 12-yard runs, as the Chieftains moved upfield. However, a penalty slowed the team's progress, and they had to punt.

Wildcat tailback Benton sprinted 20 yards from his 17 to the 37. But Kendrick and Lance Loooper tackled quarterback Vargas on the next play to set the 'Cats back to their own 25.

Kendrick intercepted a Vargas pass a few minutes later, and Friona had yet another chance to score before the half. However, the Wildcat defense rose up to stop them, and they went to intermission trailing, 7-0.

The Chieftain fans were not worried, and Coach James Morton

still seemed confident. The Chiefs came out determined to make things happen...and happen they did.

The Wildcats scored twice in the third quarter. Again, Benton took Littlefield to the lip of the goal, and Vargas scored from 12 yards out. The PAT failed when the 'Cats were penalized, but Littlefield had hiked its lead to 13-0.

The Chieftain defense deflected a couple of Vargas passes, and Rusty Simmons sacked the Littlefield QB. But the Wildcats scored again just before the end of the quarter when Benton had two nice runs for first downs, and capped it off with a TD. The kick was good.

On Friona's next series, Simmons rambled 65 yards with the ball, from the Friona 20 to the Littlefield 15. Renner caught a nine-yard pass that moved the ball to the Littlefield six.

Kendrick ran it in for the TD, and Angel Vega, who had a flawless kicking game, booted the PAT for a 20-7 score.

The Wildcats drove back down to Friona's 13-yard line, but the Chieftain defense held on fourth and one, and Friona took over.

Lance Loooper caught a pass from Kyle Grimsley, good for 11 yards.

Then David Shelby sprinted for 18 yards. Grimsley tried for a TD pass, but Wildcat Ruben Martinez intercepted, and ran it back to the 37-yard line.

The 'Cats were cursed on their next offensive series when Cecil Cooper sacked quarterback Vargas, and Simmons covered a Wildcat fumble on the next.

Chieftain momentum was back, and the fans were on their feet.

Loooper took the Chiefs to the 24-yard line, and Simmons caught a pass that took Friona eight more yards. Renner scored the touchdown with a little over three minutes remaining in the game.

The P.A.T. snap went over the head of 5-6 Vega, but he picked up

the bobbled ball and ran it 20 yards for two extra points instead of one.

That brought about a score of Littlefield 20, Friona 15.

If the Chiefs could have caused a turnover just one more time, a TD would have won the game, and an almost certain playoff berth.

Renner sacked Vargas on the Friona 49, and brought up a third and 13. But Wildcat Ruben Martinez found the hole that netted him a 40-yard run to the Chieftain 11, to maintain possession for the 'Cats as the clock entered the final minute.

The Vargas to Benton combo that had hurt the Chiefs all night scored another TD for Littlefield and

Sunday was her 89th birthday. On Saturday she was honored with a family plus one friend dinner in Lubbock.

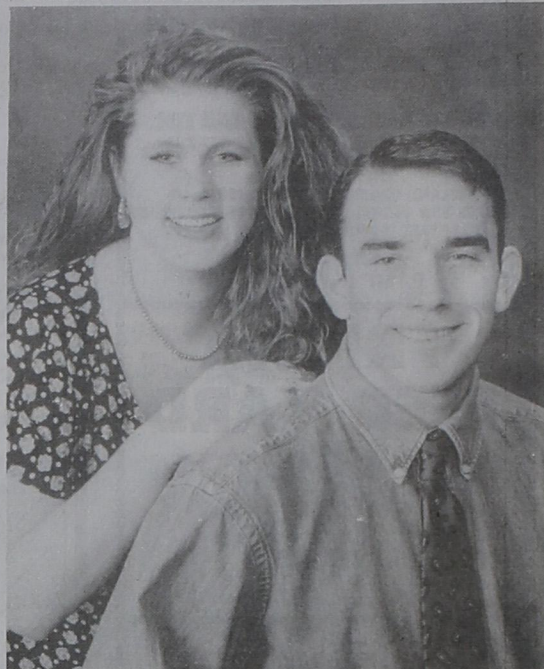

The bridegroom is the son of Tommy Brockman of Friona and Pat and Ralph Waller of Grand Prairie, Texas.

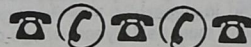

## Why Investors Choose One Mutual Fund Over Another

Put four people together at a table in a restaurant, and most likely, they will order four different entrees. Who's to say why they choose differently; perhaps it's just a whim.

Give four people a choice of funds, and they, too, will probably each pick a different fund. But hopefully, they don't base their decisions on whims.

As more individual investors buy mutual funds, fund managers

try harder to understand why investors choose one fund over another. The need to diversify causes many investors to look to a variety of funds, and three out of every four mutual fund shareholders today own three or more funds. The reason they select any particular fund, though seems to be performance.

In a random sample of more than 200 mutual fund investors, more than half said their choice of funds was influenced by the fund's latest one- to five-year performance records. This is unfortunate. Investments bought to meet long-term financial needs should not be chosen based on short-term performance records. The guiding factors in choosing a mutual fund should be your investment objectives and risk tolerance.

In addition to short-term performance, the survey also showed investors' other primary considerations in choosing mutual funds. Management was the next most important factor, listed by 18.8 per cent of the survey respondents. Potential investors look for longevity and evaluate the track record of the individual who manages the fund.

Perhaps investors are placing more emphasis on management as a result of the fact that mutual fund rating systems developed by various financial publications are beginning to evaluate management. However, only about eight per cent of the survey respondents considered magazine ratings important. More people (8.9 per cent) said they look to their brokers for recommendations.

Most of the respondents agreed that mutual funds are not short-term investments. In fact, only about 14 per cent followed daily price changes. About half checked prices monthly, and 20 per cent admitted to weekly reviews. Less than 30 per cent of those surveyed said they try to "time" the market—that is, guess the proper time to buy and sell.

The survey also showed that investors who do not use brokers or advisers tend to sell their funds more quickly and return to them much more slowly. Nine per cent of those surveyed said any price drop would trigger them to sell, and another six per cent would sell during a general market decline. The majority of fund owners, however, said they would stay the course until their objectives were met.

The reason you buy a fund often governs the success of your investment. Funds bought with little understanding and unreasonable expectations are often abandoned quickly.

Know your financial objectives when choosing mutual funds. As long as those objectives are being met, stay the course.

### "Exercise" For Your Eyes

A test of visual acuity—with an eye chart, perhaps—can indicate only whether each eye can see what it should at a certain distance. But good vision requires, also, that both eyes

focus on a page, that they can work as a team, seeing the same thing at the same time, and that they can "track" a line of type or the path of a moving object.

School and reading make real visual demands. Some problems are noticeable in the early years. In other cases, a youngster may develop adaptive behaviors to compensate—squinting, perhaps, or sitting up front in class. By high school or college, though, the demands may be more than inefficient eyes can handle.

Your optometrist can help with corrective lenses and vision training. Carefully prescribed "exercises" for the eyes, taught in the eye doctor's office and practiced at home, are designed to improve eye movements, focusing and coordination.
