

Kuralt, who has always been my favorite TV reporter, was only 62. Although he had officially "retired" from television, he actually was struck down in his prime by lupus.
Tike his former associate Walter Cronkite, Kuralt learned the news business in journalism school, and did his appren-ticeship on a large daily newspaper, prior to joining the CBS news department.
He had a way with words at an early age, winning a "Voice of Democracy" essay contest sponsored by the American Legion. This won the young Kuralt a trip to Washington to meet President Truman. His essay was read by noted radio newsman Edward R. Murrow.
After admiring Kuralt throughout his career, Ye Editor learned in recent years that this "laureate of the common man" came from a similar background as we did. He was raised in rural North Carolina, and had a yearning to see the world as a news correspondent.
Don't take me wrong. Ye Editor has no illusions that he could ever be 1/10th the newsman that Kuralt was. It was just the similar backgrounds and early goals we shared. I enjoyed watching "Sir Charles" as he lived out the fantasies we might have had.
Kuralt started his CBS career by covering the 1960 presidential campaign. He later made four trips to Vietnam, as well as other world trouble-spots. By 1967, he decided he didn't have the temperament or physical makeup for a "daily deadline," and asked to be able to try something different.
That's when Kuralt began to criss-cross the country, making his famous "On the Road" feature-ettes for CBS. Having Walte Cronkite as the anchorman and Kuralt with his program-ending punch-lines, we sort of felt sorry for NBC and ABC.
For 13 years, Kuralt delivered his "catch of the day" in his familiar conversational baritone. He reported on everything

Rural Accident Sends Eight To Hospitals

A two-vehicle accident which sent several area residents to Lubbock and Amarillo hospitals, was one of several emergencies that kept area volunteers busy last Sunday, July 6. Friona EMS and firemen responded to the accident about 1 p.m. one-mile east

intersection. Miss Ray's car collided with the right front passenger side of the Ramos pickup, sending it across a ditch and up a brief incline. It was reported that the Ramos family were all inside the extended cab truck.

extended cab truck. All sustained injuries of some degree. Four members of the Ramos family were flown to Methodist hospital in Lubbock on two helicopters. Mrs. Ramos suffered broken ribs and collarbone, the 5-year-old son had a compound leg fracture, and Mr. Ramos had internal injuries.

heg fracture, and univer. Items had internal injuries. Another of the Ramos children was transported to Amarillo by ambulance for treatment of cuts and abrasions. Altogether, seven of the eight family members were hospitalized. Miss Ray suffered a severe gash to the left side of her face in the temple area, plus bruises and abrasions. She was wearing her seat-belt. EMS officials said the seat-belt severe hospitalized. Stotaled, as was the pickup. Mabulance to Northwest Texas Hospital in Amarillo where a plastic surgeon repaired the facial cut. At press time, all victims had been released from

hospitals and were recovering. In other Sunday calls, an 11 a.m. 911 call from a frantic lady was interpreted as a vehicle on fire. However, when volunteers arrived it turned out to be a family fight which was handled by Friona Police.

Later in the afternoon, another emergency developed when EMS volunteers were called to a residence on 5th Street. A one-year-old child was choking on a piece of Jolly Rancher hard candy.

According to Friona paramedic Dana Hendrix, the candy was dislodged from the child's air passage and he was not transported to the hospital.

Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams, who was on the scene of the car-pickup accident, advises residents to be especially careful of rural intersections right now.





Betty Sweatt Tells Us Her Life Story

Every month a resident of Prairie Acres Nursing Home submits a story about his/her life's history to be submitted in the home's newsletter, "The Prairie Times," and for printing in the Friona Star. This month we feature Betty Sweatt. Sweatt.

By BETTY SWEATT By BETTY SWEATT I was born in Long Beach, California on June 1, 1927 to Charlie and Margaret Stevenson. Several years later mother and daddy separated. Daddy took me with him to Wellington, Texas. Three years later daddy remarried to Pearl Warren. They gave me two brothers and a sister. I was pretty close to my brothers and sister.

close to my brothers and siter. We then moved to Dozier, Texas and daddy farmed. I helped him out in the field. I plowed with a team of horses and liked it a lot better than tractors. The land we rented was so rich that it made such good crops. There was one problem with this land, it had "jyp sinks." These were large holes that occasionally fell in the ground that measured about six to eight feet wide and about twelve to fourteen feet deep. They were very frightening. People who experienced

People who experienced these said that you could hear a loud roaring sound in the ground and then the jyp sinks would take everything on top of it into the ground.

sinks would take everything on top of it into the ground. There were occasions where people spoke of a team of horses sinking in. Seismographers followed up with some studies. But the cause was never known. We were very fortunate not to actually experience this, but it still gave me a weird feeling. I went through high school at a small country school called Sam Norwood and went through 1-1/2 years of business college. At 18 years of age, on July of 1947, I married my school sweetheart, Howard Francis. We moved to Kress. Shortly after our marriage, Howard was killed in a butane truck accident. We had two sons together. Robert was 2-1/2 years old at that time and Jim was one year old. On May 16, 1949, I remarried to R.B. Sweatt. His wife had also passed away. R.B. had two children, Gary, who was eight years old, and Connie, who was 2-1/2 years old. On July 17, 1954, R.B. and I had our son, "Roger." R.B. farmed and I was a

172 years out. On outy 17, 1954, R.B. and I had our son, "Roger." R.B. farmed and I was a housewife. We had five wonderful children, who also helped with the farming and the housework. Connie was the one to go to the grocery store and did most of the cooking when I was out in the field helping the boys. We were, and I still am, very proud of all of my children. In the year 1957 we suffered a tragedy. We lost our home in a fire. We bought a redibuilt home and moved it to the farm. Later, we rented a farm with a bigger home. In 1958 we bought a ski

In 1958 we bought a ski boat. The whole family really enjoyed going to the lake and we all learned to ski and also learned the ski

We would go to Lake Altus in Oklahoma, every chance we had. It was lots of

chance we had. It was lots or fun. Well wouldn't you know-everything in life does not run smoothly. The year of 1963, we were at Lake McAllen in McAllen, Texas and R.B. went over the ski jump and broke his hip. R.B. was unable to walk for a year. My children and I took over the farming on a

thousand acres of land until R.B. recovered from his injury. This was very hard for R.B. He was a hard worker and enjoyed farming. He was glad when he was able to go back to managing the field. Gary joined the Navy when he turned 17 years of age. He was in the service for 1-1/2 years when he married his first wife, Patsy Jarmagan, from Plainview. He was stationed in Japan and she asked permission to go with him. Our first grandchild, Brenda, was born in Japan. They came back 3-1/2 years later. They also had Gary Wayne. Gary also has three more daughters, Keisha, Stacy and Shelly. Several years later, Gary married Debbie Pierce of Friona and she also has two children, Glen and Shay Shirley. Gary and Debbie live in Tishamingo, Okla-homa.Connie married Deb

Shirley. Gary and Debbie live in Tishamingo, Okla-homa. Connie married Dee Willard on July 17, 1965. A later later, Dee went to the U.S. Army and served several years. Then he returned to Kress and continued farming. Dee and Connie are now living in Friona and have three daughters, Deena, Tena and Gena. Robert joined the Navy and was stationed on the U.S.S. Hornet in San Diego, California. He is married to Linda Dickey and lives in Plainview. They have two sons, Greg and Brandon. My son, Jim, died in 1989, in Little Rock, Arkansas. My youngest son, Roger, married Jamois Christisan in July of 1997. They have one daughter, Stephanie. They live in Clinton, Arkansas. Roger is a commercial tomato grower. In 1985, R.B. bought us a


Roger is a commercial tomato grower. In 1985, R.B. bought us a mobile home and remodeled and added three more rooms to it. We also added a log deck up in the front of the house. It was a nice and confortable home. R.B. passed away on December 23, 1987. I continued to live in Arkansas until 1994 when my health failed and I stayed in the hospital at Little Rock for a year. In May of 1995 I came to live at Prairie Acres. I have been very blessed with all my children, grandchildren and great-grandchildren.





Low Vision Aids

Serious visual impairment, often beyond the help of ordinary glasses or contact lenses, is referred to as low vision.

contact lenses, is reterred to as low vision. More than 11 million Americans have some form of it, often as a result of age or illness. Most common causes are macular degeneration, a deterioration of the retina that destroys central vision; cataracts, clouding of the lens of the eye; glaucoma, a condition of high pressure in the eye; or diabetic retinopathy. It's important to remember that people with low vision are not blind. As long as there is some residual vision, they can be helped to blind.
