The United States government has appointed a public health nurse to work for a period of eight months in four West Texas counties...

Grade teachers who have been receiving \$100 a month will hereafter receive only \$90, and high school teachers who have been receiving \$125 will receive \$112.50. The salary of the superintendent has been reduced \$900 per year.

This reduction is in line with the promises of the new members of the board who were recently elected to office.

The Friona Woman's club is sponsoring a movement to make Friona a cleaner and better place in which to live. They are sponsoring a cleanup and paintup campaign in Friona, especially in the downtown district and urge that everyone cooperate with them so as to make Friona not only a cleaner and better place in which to live, but also to make it more attractive to the eye of the visitor who comes to our door.

After interviewing the chairman of their cleanup committee we believe that wonderful results will be obtained by this movement. The ladies ask that everyone, especially the downtown business men, inspect their premises and then put them in a clean and orderly condition, that they clean up the front, inside, and especially the alleys where litter has been allowed to accumulate all winter. With hot weather coming on, this rubbish furnishes ideal breeding places for flies. Haul this trash to the dump ground so as to get it out of the city. Merely to gather it up in a pile will not do any good, for it will soon become scattered again and be as bad as ever.

After it is cleaned up they ask that we do not allow it to gather again.

The campaign will run from May 1 to May 15, at which date judging will be made. There will be three prizes to be awarded to business houses only, and scoring will be 75 points for all outside appearances, including curbs and alleys, and 25 points for inside appearance. There will be three judges appointed to judge the premises, and the standing of all business premises will be published in the Star. Arrangements will be made to have trash hauled away by May 12 if it is gathered in piles so as to be easily loaded on the trucks.

Thieves Take Money, Checks and Fine Watch

F. L. Spring's store was entered some time Friday night by thieves who knocked the knob off his safe and helped themselves to the contents. The robbers entered through the rear door, prying the screen open with a wrecking bar and evidently opening the back door to the store with a skeleton key. The safe had been left with the combination only partially locked and the robbers either knew safes mighty well or knew Mr. Spring's habit of only partially turning the combination, for they succeeded in opening the same without ruining the combination. If they had turned the combination too far in either direction the safe would have automatically been locked.

After opening the outside door of the safe they knocked the lock off the inner door with a pinch bar and scattered the contents all over the floor. Only valuables were taken away. Cash to the amount of about \$20 and checks valued at over \$100, also a wrist watch worth \$15 and some valuable papers were in the loot. The papers were found scattered on the ground near Mr. Wentworth's residence, but at this time the checks and watch have not been located.

Mr. Spring asks that all who gave him checks on Friday, April 24, stop payment on them and come in and give him a new check if the one given him has not shown up at the bank. If your check does appear in your statement be sure that you show him the endorsement so he may be able to trace the thieves if they have cashed any of the stolen checks.

This is the second robbery of this character in Parmer county in two weeks. Last week robbers entered the safe of a lumber company in Farwell, securing much loot.

## International Sunday School

### Lesson

May 3, 1931.

#### JESUS IN THE HOME OF ZACCHAEUS

Luke 19:1-10

1. And he entered and was passing through Jericho.  
2. And behold, a man called by name of Zacchaeus; and he was a chief publican and he was rich.  
3. And he sought to see Jesus who he was; and could not for the crowd, because he was little of stature.  
4. And he ran on before, and climbed up into a sycamore tree to see him: for he was to pass that way.  
5. And when Jesus came to the place, he looked up, and said unto him, Zacchaeus, make haste, and come down; for today I must abide at thy house.  
6. And he made haste, and came down, and received him joyfully.  
7. And when they saw it, they

all murmured, saying, He has gone in to lodge with a man that is a sinner.

8. And Zacchaeus stood, and said unto the Lord, Behold, Lord, the half of my goods I give to the poor; and if I have wrongfully exacted aught of any man, I restore fourfold.

9. And Jesus said unto him, Today is salvation come to this house, forasmuch as he also is a son of Abraham.

10. For the Son of man came to seek and to save that which was lost.

Golden Text: The Son of man came to seek and to save that which was lost.—Luke 19:10.

Time: March, A. D. 30, about ten days before the crucifixion.  
Place: Jericho. The house of Zacchaeus was probably outside the walls, where the wealthier people lived.

#### Introduction.

The incident of this lesson occurred within a week of the Crucifixion. Christ's face was "set steadfastly to go to Jerusalem," and the disciples noticed an eagerness and almost haste which filled them with awe and fear. But, nevertheless, he paused to impart his grace to a despised publican. In the study of the story let us keep our eyes upon Jesus, for his every movement and word will throw light upon the spirit and mission of the gospel; and upon Zacchaeus, for his experience is a classic disclosure of the transforming power of Jesus Christ and the fruits of his grace.

#### The Two Miracles at Jericho.

"At both ends of Christ's walk through Jericho on his last journey to Jerusalem was a miracle, one as he entered the city and the other as he was leaving it. Both were worked for despised men, the first for two blind beggars, the second for a hated tax collector. "We are prone sometimes to thing of the lot of Jesus as a very limited and circumscribed one. As a matter of fact, I question if there ever was a life so rich in its variety as was Christ's. It is amazing how swiftly the scenes change. This rapid transition from the roadside paupers to the home of one of the richest men in Jericho is

typical of the experience of Jesus."—Rev. George H. Morrison, D. D. Jesus "Passing Through Jericho." "And he entered and was passing through Jericho." "The whole place was stirred with excitement. The company of those who were going up to the passover was in itself enough to make much ado, but the excitement was greatly increased by the presence of Jesus Christ, the prophet of Nazareth, whose fame had gone through all the land, and of whose miracles everybody was talking. We read in the eleventh verse of the universal expectation that the kingdom of God should immediately appear. The popular belief was that this son of David would presently sit on David's throne, and restore the kingdom of Israel—that indeed Jesus was now on his way to claim the kingdom for his own. It is said that when Napoleon the Great was on his way to Russia, men, women and children stood contentedly for days and nights waiting to see him pass along his way. We can understand then the eager excitement that filled Jericho at this time."

#### Zacchaeus' Quick Response.

"And he made haste, and came down." The little man fairly tumbled out of the tree in his eagerness. "And received him joyfully." What a rush of orders sent about his house! How he sent the servants hustling here and there to get out the couches and tables and the best dishes, and to bring together a rare feast! Yes, and doubtless invitations were sent to all his assistants and to

#### He Sought to See Jesus.

"And he sought to see Jesus who he was." "One thing about this man Zacchaeus is not mentioned in the story but is implied in it; he was possessed of a great unrest and remorse. He had been a bad man and he knew it. He kept up his evil practices, but his conscience lashed him night and day."—Rev. Frederick Lynch, D. D. It was more than idle curiosity that led him toward Jesus; he felt that Jesus might help him where he most needed help. "And could not for the crowd." Crowds often get between the seeking soul and Jesus—crowds of men, skeptical, mocking, hindering; crowds of secular duties, clamorous for our time; crowds of worldly pleasures, alluring and urgent; crowds of doubts, born of Satan himself. Our souls need all their strength to get by these things and reach our Saviour.

#### Jesus Calls Zacchaeus.

One of the greatest surprises in the Bible took place under that sycamore tree, a disagreeable surprise to the throng, a blessed surprise to Zacchaeus; and yet it was precisely what might have been expected.

"And when Jesus came to the

place." Doubtless he had been looking ahead to it, eager to meet one who was so eager to meet him. "He looked up, and said unto him, Zacchaeus, make haste and come down; for today I must abide at thy house." The Lord knew Zacchaeus in the fig-tree, doubtless through his supernatural knowledge even as three years before he had known Nathaniel under the fig-tree (John 1:48). Very likely Christ's greeting was the first touch of friendliness the publican had received for many years, and it was water to his thirsty soul.

#### Fault Finding Pharisees.

"And when they saw it, they all murmured." "The plaudits of the crowd for Jesus changed at once to murmurs. In this loss of favor with the people observe an-

other instance of that constant sacrifice of himself which Jesus made in behalf of the castaway." "Saying, He is gone in to lodge with a man that is a sinner." "The Master heard their murmuring but was undisturbed. He was always ready to pay the full price of doing good in his own way. There never was an hour from the time when he faced the devil in the wilderness until he hung upon the cross when he was not willing to

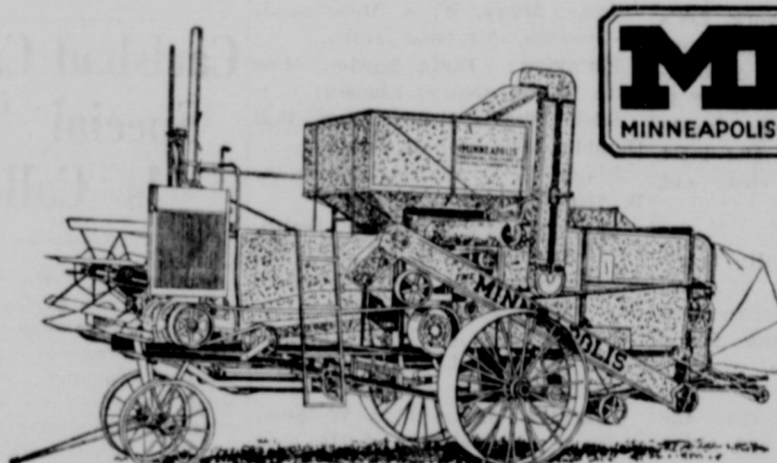

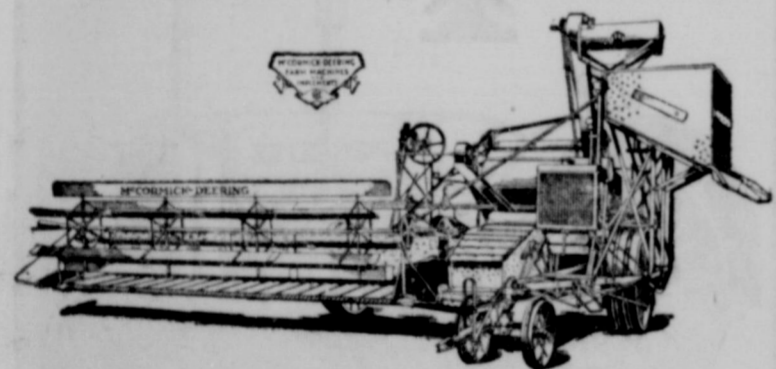

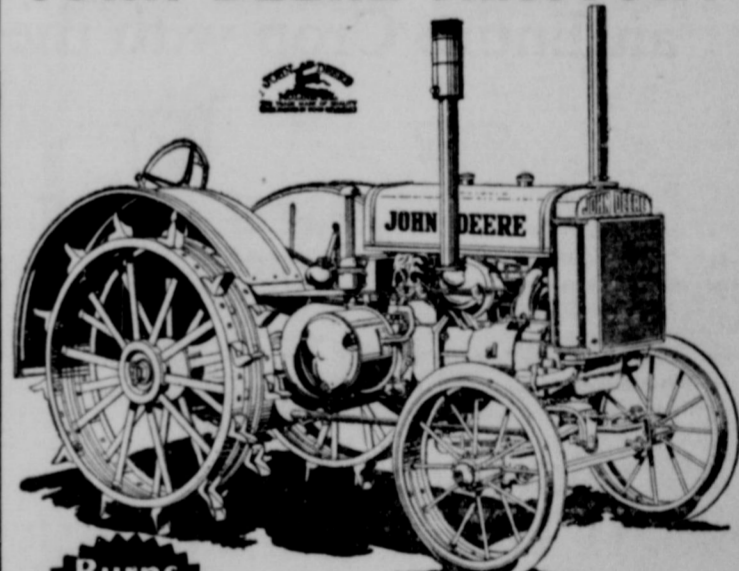
