## Lazbuddie Showmen Win Lion's Share

HAVE YOU SENT IN your entry to Ed McMahon's "Am-UHRR-ican" Family Publishers Sweepstakes yet? Each year in January, our mailboxes are inundated with these unsolicited sweepstakes offers and get-rich-quick schemes. How many people do you know who have ever won anything from one of those scams?

At least three-fourths of the mail that comes to our house on Maple Street goes immediately into the trash without being opened. The average American household receives between 40 to 60 pounds of junk mail each year.

That thick envelope with good old Ed McMahon's face on it goes through the mails at a cost of less than half of what you are now paying to mail a letter and on Sunday the cost of our first class postage stamp will be increased again.

Frankly, I think Ed McMahon is rich enough to mail all those things out at the same rate of postage as the rest of us. If bulk-mail rates had been increased proportionally to first and second class rates since 1974, then we would still be able to mail a letter for ten cents. As it is, the general public is subsidizing all those companies which send out junk mail.

The current method of charging for postal delivery by ounces was begun July 1, 1885 with the two-cent stamp. Thirty-two years later, in 1917, the one-ounce stamp was raised to three cents, where it remained for forty-one years until 1958. Since 1981 we have faced a postal increase on an average of every 2.8 years, the last one occurring in April 1988, and the next one scheduled for next week.

Remember, magazines and newspapers which you subscribe to, are usually mailed second class, which is somewhat cheaper than the first class rate by which you mail letters. By being a subscriber to said publication, you have indicated that you wish to receive it. When the first-class postage rate goes up, second-class postage rate is always raised accordingly.

But the items which are mailed at the lower cost bulk-rate are things which you have NOT subscribed to and usually don't want. Postal costs for this sector have not kept pace. Why, I don't know.

Added to the bulk-rate junk mail fiasco, is the good old franking privilege which is overused and abused by our politicians. Members of Congress, acting on official business, are allowed to use the postal system free of charge. This amounts to a lot of free advertising during each election year.

Every elected official, no matter how insignificant his or her office, now mails out a monthly newsletter. Again, the affect is to keep their names before the public for purpose of getting re-elected next time around. Of course, Mr. and Mrs. Average American are the ones who are getting stuck with the bill for these abuses, in the form of continuing higher postal rates.

Please don't gripe at the folks down at the local post office. It's not their fault. We are fortunate to have an amiable, efficient crew of nice folks at the post office here, who bend over backward to help out in any way they can.

Write to your congressmen and the Postmaster General about the continued postage hikes (or clip out this column and mail it to them), but don't expect a lot of action right at first. Remember, they've got a good thing going in their own behalf and won't give up their free postal service without a lot of angry insistence from the general public.

If the current rate of postal increases is allowed to continue unchecked, there will come a day when fax copies and phone calls will cost less than mailing a first class letter.

Lazbuddie's Shana Foster entered the Grand Champion Lamb, a Suffolk, and schoolmate Cody Clark had the reserve champion.

Clay Hurst of Friona entered the Grand Champion Steer, an exotic breed. It likewise was the 26th steer title for a showman from Friona, and their 11th consecutive win.

Amy Hartzog of Farwell exhibited the Grand Champion Heifer for the fourth top prize in the show, and likewise entered the reserve champion in that division.

Clint Hurst of Friona was the owner of the reserve champion barrow, a Duroc. Jason Jesko of Lazbuddie entered the reserve champion steer, a Limousin.

Showmanship winners were Cody Simmons and Jessica Smith in the lamb division; Shana Seaton and Brett Thomas in the barrow show; and Watson Langford and Casey Bradshaw for the beef show.

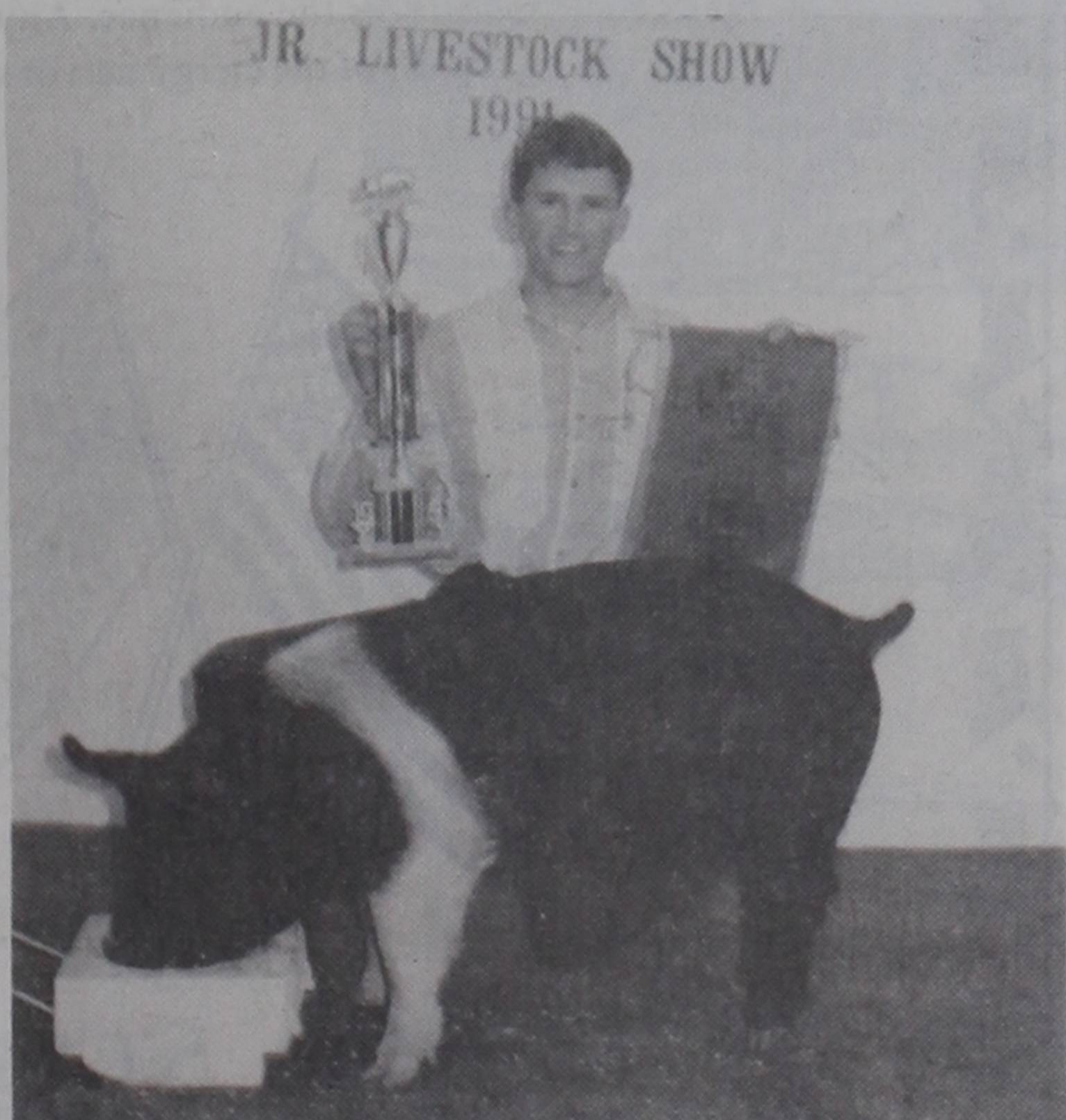

Nominations are needed by the Friona Chamber of Commerce for the Chamber's awards at its 1991 banquet. Deadline for making a nomination is March 18.

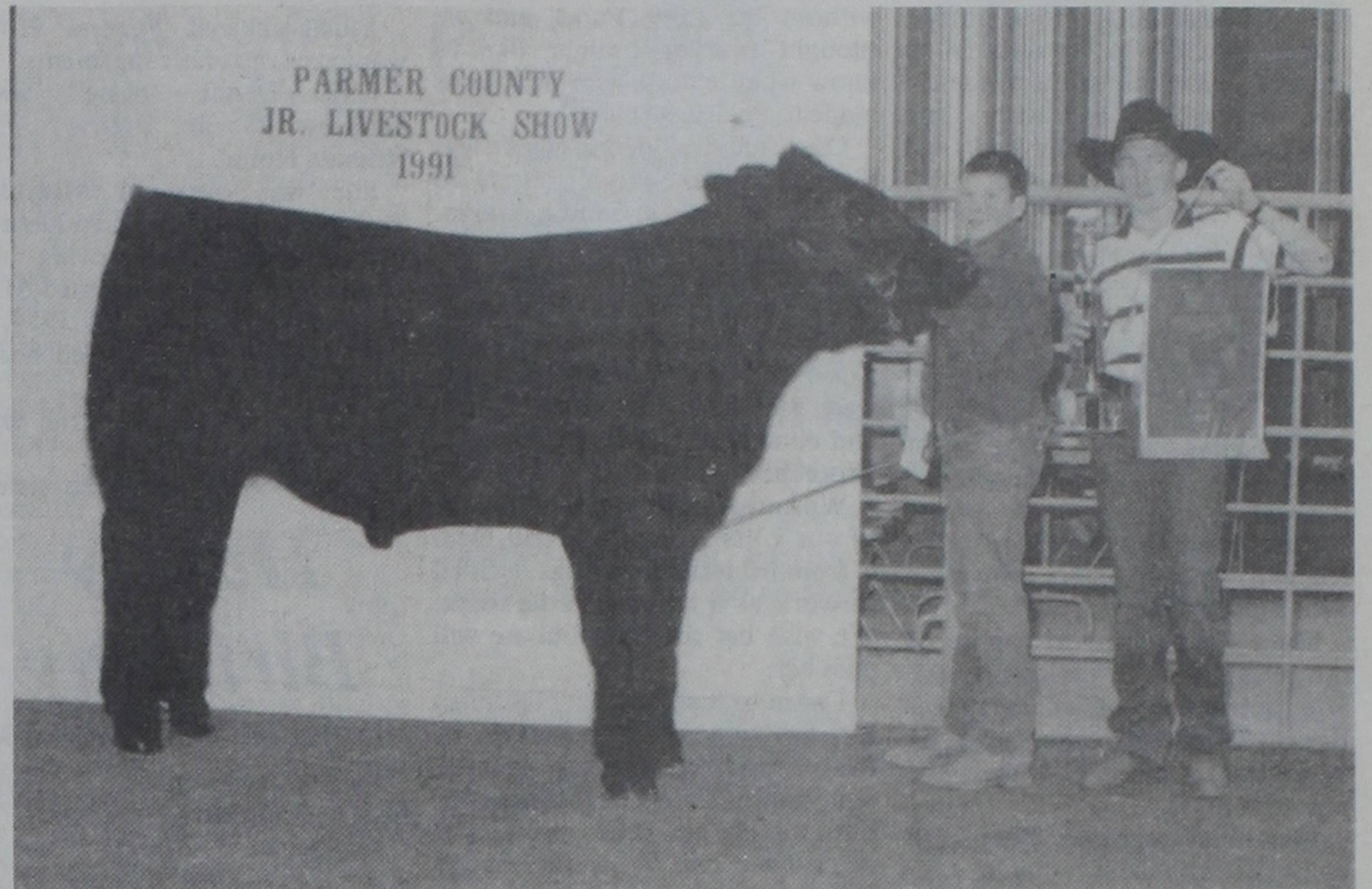

## Friona Athlete To Receive Honors

Rhonda Field is a typical mother who has typical feelings when she watches her only son compete in athletics.

"I want him to play, but then I don't," she said. "What if he got his left leg hurt? He'd be pretty much crippled. But it makes me mad too when he doesn't get to play."

Blue Field is not a typical 16-year-old son. Physically, he's not normal. His right leg from the knee down is not much bigger than a broom handle. His right foot is four sizes smaller than his left. His right ankle has no movement and is virtually useless.

Emotionally, he's not typical either. An inner desire burns bright. There's an intensity, a determination, a motivation that's greater than most, if not all, of his contemporaries in the sports arena.

"Some people think because I don't have two full-sized legs, that I can't compete," said Field, "but I like to get out there and prove them wrong. It proves to me that I can still do what anybody else can."

It's that drive that has not only allowed Field to play at Friona High School despite a serious birth defect, but to excel for the Chieftains as well. And because of that, Field will receive the Dee Henry Memorial Award during the Panhandle Sports Hall of Fame ceremonies at 2 p.m. February 3 at Amarillo College's Ordway Auditorium.

Since 1962, the Dee Henry Award has gone to an area athlete who's overcome a physical hardship and continues to excel in athletics.

"I don't think Blue ever realized he was somebody special," said Friona football coach Steve Williams, "until he won this award. I don't know if he's ever realized how much he's accomplished."

James Artis Field, though known to everyone as "Blue," had the odds against him at birth--actually before birth. While he was in the womb, his umbilical cord became wrapped around his right leg, restricting the circulation and causing serious damage to his lower leg and foot.

At birth, his right leg was substantially smaller than his left. When he was a month old, Blue was fitted with his first cast, and he stayed in some type of cast, either from the knee or hip down, until he was three years old.

At six months, he had the first of several corrective surgeries. But there was only so much orthopedic surgeons could do. His deformed foot never really developed any toes, which are a key element for balance. His ankle had no movement, thus his right calf

would likely never develop.

"The doctors told me at the beginning that his calf would not develop," Mrs. Field said, "and they were right. It has not. It looks like polio from the knee down."

There was natural concern how well Blue would overcome his handicap, how well he would fit into the mainstream.

"When he was smaller," Mrs. Field said, "I was more ashamed than he was, mainly because I didn't want other kids to hurt him. But I don't think it every really bothered him. He has said at times that he wished he was normal, but I remember telling him that God made him that way, that he was special, and do the best he could. And Blue's accepted it."

That much was obvious when he began to walk--at 10½ months, cast and all. Perhaps it was the refusal of the Field family to pamper him or lower their expectations of him that created a productive environment.

"I got a lot of flack when he was a baby," said Mrs. Field, "because when he fell down, people expected me to rush and pick him up. But if he fell down, he got back up on his own. He became very well adjusted."

That includes the playing field and the classroom. Blue is now 5-10 and 165 pounds. He somehow runs a very respectable 5.0 in the 40, and as a junior this year, he looked upon 1990 as an opportunity to earn a berth on the Chieftain varsity football team.

"That gave me more of an inspiration to try even harder," said Blue. "It was my chance to show them what I could do."

Williams, in his first year as head coach at Friona, had some reservations about using Field, but realized the risk of his getting hurt was no more than anyone else's.

"I've been asked about that quite a bit, but after a while, it never entered my mind," Williams said. "And I don't think it enters his parents' or his grandparents' minds. And I know it doesn't enter into Blue's."

With that established, Williams and his staff then had to decide how much Field could help Friona. Would his leg hamper his mobility? Would he have the necessary strength?

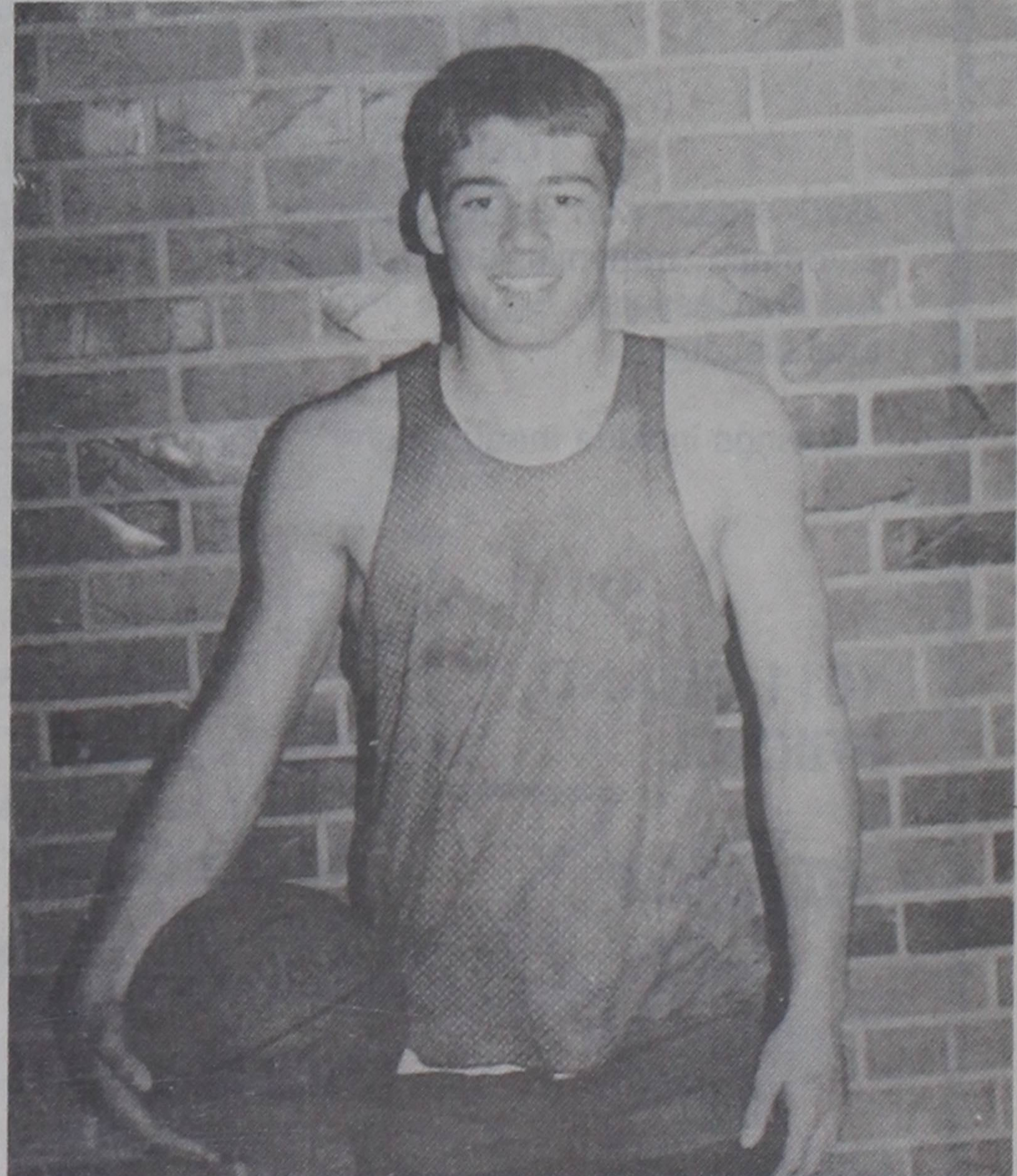
"We thought at the first of the year he would be a good backup linebacker, somebody that if the first-team middle linebacker got hurt, we could bring him in and finish the game," Williams said.

"But then our middle linebacker (Steven Dickson) broke his hand the first day of pads, and Blue went in the first two scrimmages at middle linebacker. He was all over the field, I mean absolutely all over the field. And he was the only one we had doing that."

Field was doubling as a starter at offensive guard. When Dickson returned, Field became his backup again. Then with two games remaining, Dickson moved to end, Field took over at linebacker, and both earned some type of all-district recognition.

"He made a lot of big plays, plays he shouldn't have," said Williams. "He shouldn't have played as well as he did--he's something else."

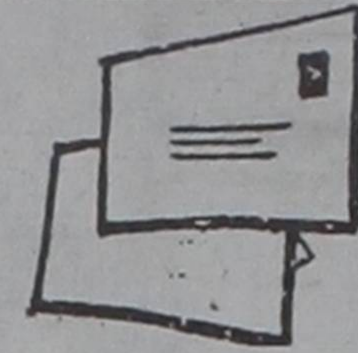

Hello from the Pacific Ocean/Indian Ocean/Southwest Asia:

I just wanted to drop a few lines to tell you thank you for the nice Christmas card. It sure picked up my spirits, and brought back some precious memories of my time in Friona. As you know, I've been in the Marine Corps for almost ten years. This is the first real opportunity for us to go and do what we've been training for these ten years. I hope everyone back there realizes why we are out here and that this is not going to be another Vietnam.

I would like to thank you for keeping me in your thoughts and prayers. I am sure we will all need that. And God willing, we will all return home safe to our loved ones. I'm sure you probably get more news back there as to what is going on than we do out here. We left from California on December 1, and have been on the water ever

since, except for brief stops in Hawaii and the Philippines. It sure can be boring on the ship, but we keep ourselves going with as much training and preparations as possible.

In case you didn't know, I am the Supply Officer for Battalion Landing Team 3/1. We are an infantry battalion, and I am responsible for getting them the gear they need to fight with, keeping up with our assets and getting repair parts to keep our vehicles going, just to name a few things that I do. It is a big responsibility, but one I am proud of doing. I have the confidence, that with the good Lord's help, we can go in and do what it takes to get Saddam Hussein out of Kuwait. I know we have a big mission in front of us, but someone has to do it. It is not right for anyone to take over another country.

Well, I guess I'll close for now. Again, thank you for your card. This letter will not reach you until probably late January, because we will not be in port until mid-January when we reach the Persian Gulf area. Please keep all of us in your thoughts and prayers. May the Lord be with you and protect you and your family until we meet again.

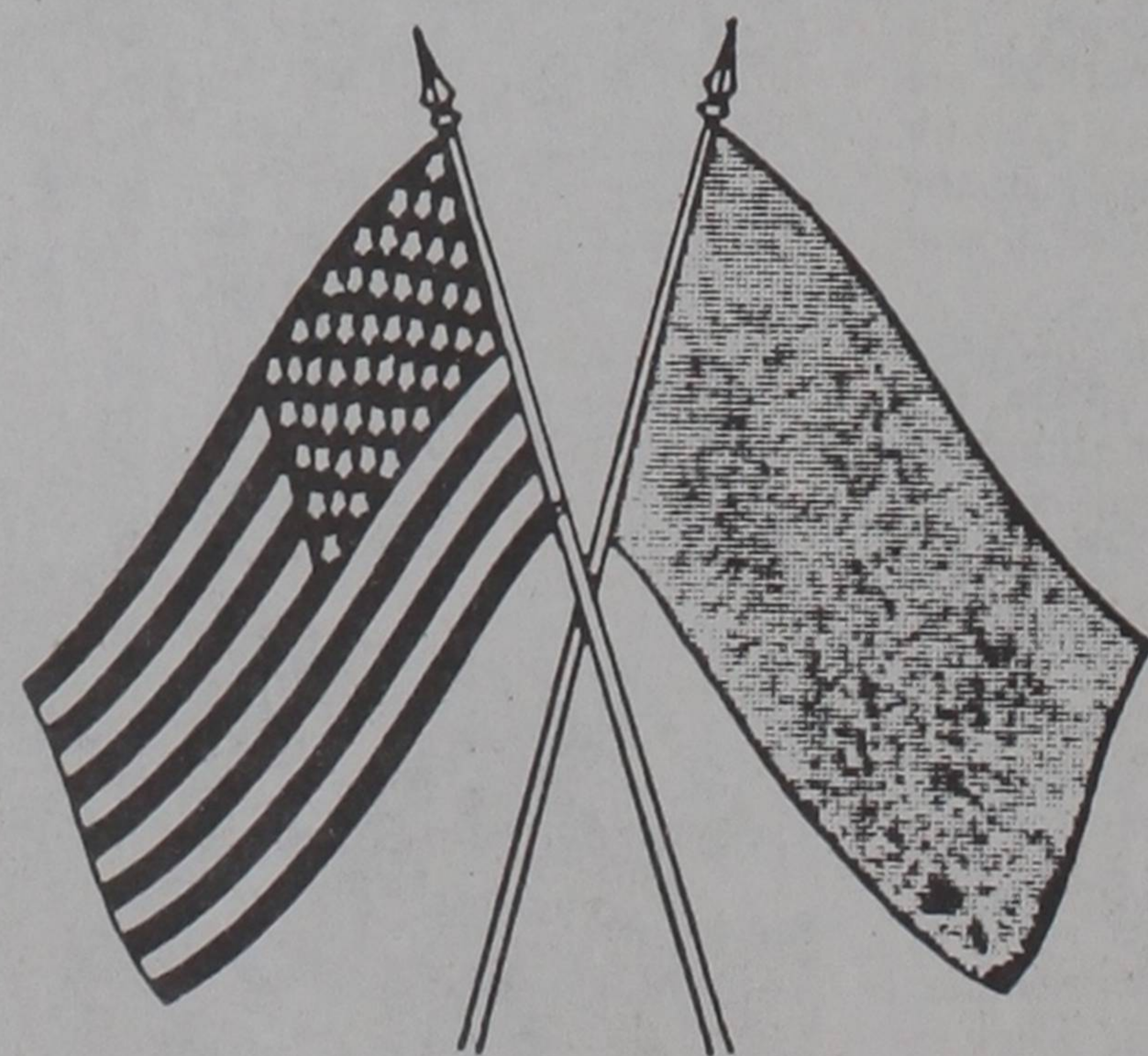
## PRESENTING : FLAG ETTIQUETTE

§ 171. Conduct during playing

During rendition of the national anthem when the flag is displayed, all present except those in uniform should stand at attention facing the flag with the right hand over the heart. Men not in uniform should remove their headdress with their right hand and hold it at the left shoulder, the hand being over the heart. Persons in uniform should render the military salute at the first note of the anthem and retain this position until the last note. When the flag is not displayed, those present should face toward the music and act in the same manner they would if the flag were displayed there.

When displayed

from a staff in a church or public auditorium, the flag of the United States of America should hold the position of superior prominence, in advance of the audience, and in the position of honor at the clergyman's or speaker's right as he faces the audience. Any other flag so displayed should be placed on the left of the clergyman or speaker or to the right of the audience.

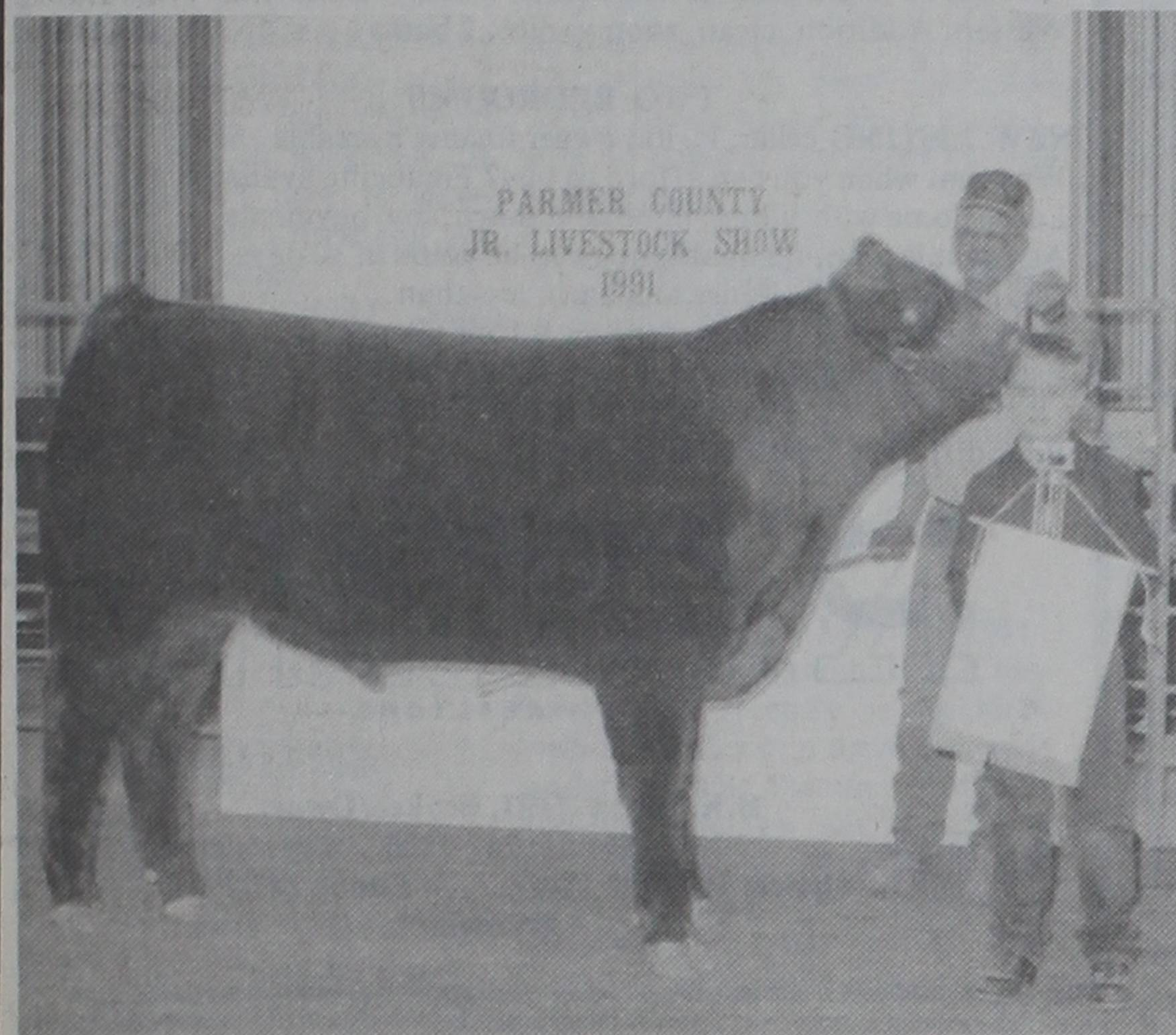

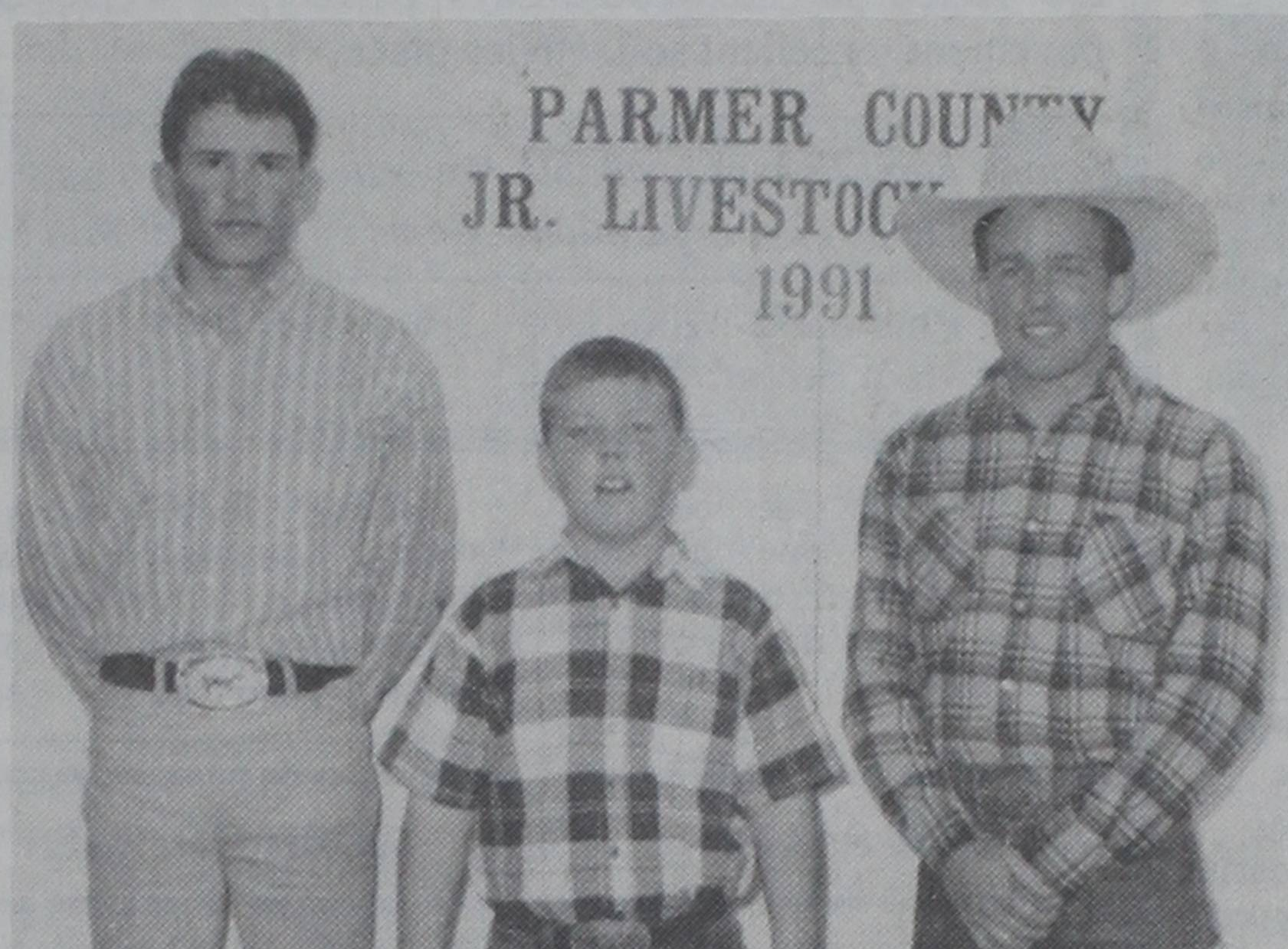

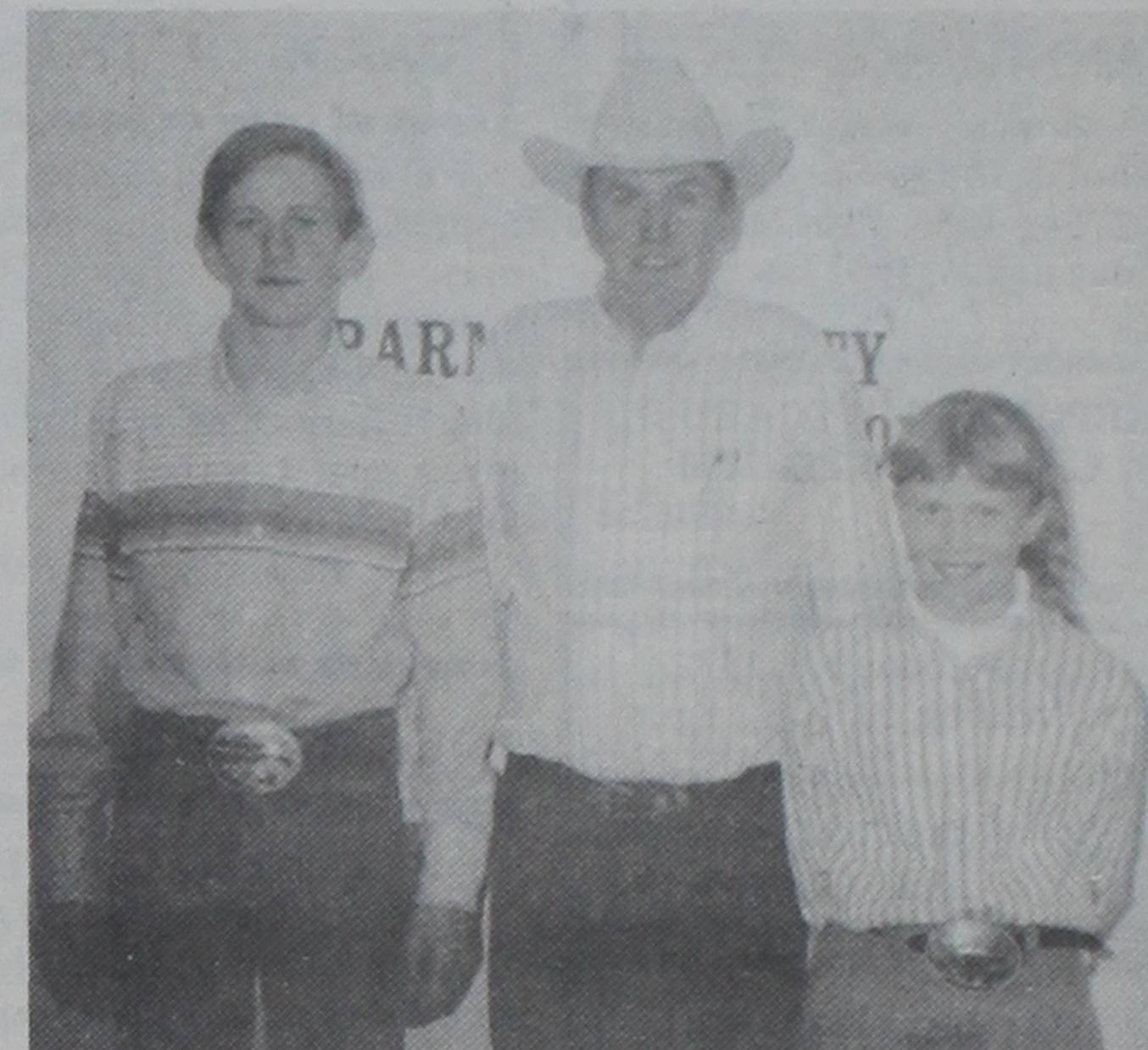

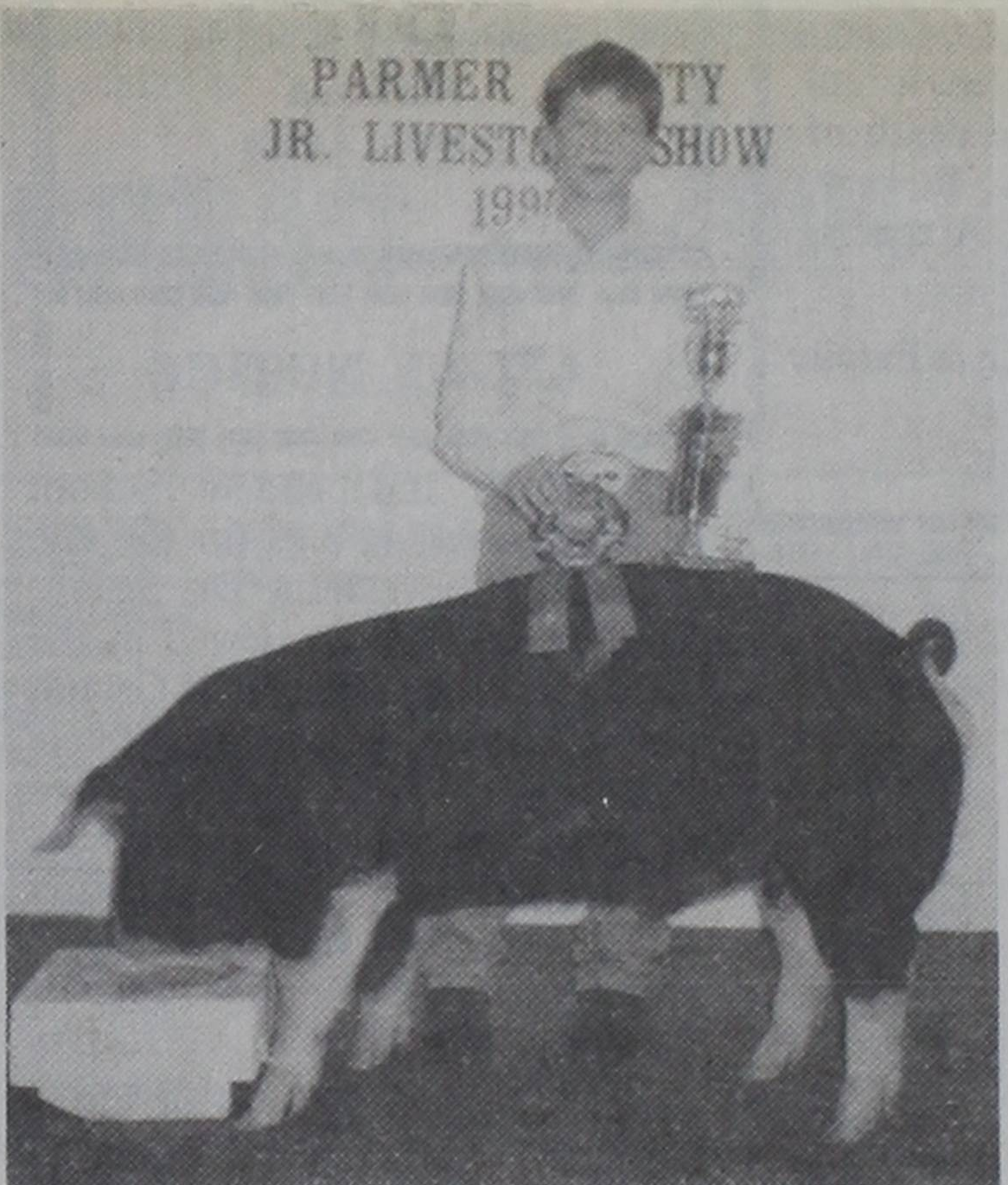

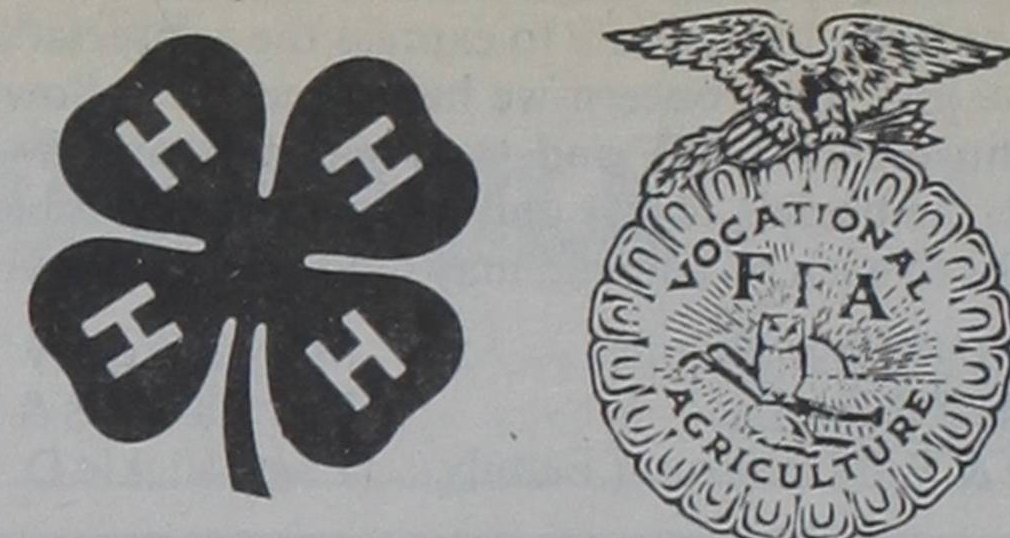

Pet Corner

It's a mistake to think your dog's fur coat will protect him from harsh winter weather.

When the mercury hits freezing, indoor dogs should be taken out for five or ten minutes only, says Dr. Richard Thoma, a veterinarian in Cheektowaga, N.Y. Don't force your pet to stay out longer than he wants to.

"If your dog whimpers or heads toward the house, you know it's time to go back in," he advises in the current issue of American Health.

On warmer days, in the upper 30s, healthy adult dogs can be walked for 20 minutes, or so. But puppies and older dogs can't stay out as long, says Thoma, because their internal thermal regulators don't work as well.

Doggie sweaters help small dogs and indoor pets retain body heat, allowing them to brave the cold longer.

Paw protectors can also help keep your dog warm, according to Thoma. They prevent snow from freezing in clumps between the animal's toes (particularly a problem among long-haired dogs), which can cause frost-bite. What's more, paw protectors guard against irritation from chemical ice melters such as rock salt. If your dog doesn't take to paw-wear, just be sure to rinse and dry his feet after an outing.

Here are some other cold-weather tips for dog owners: \*Don't let your dog walk through puddles.

\*After a bath, be sure your dog is thoroughly dried before you take him outdoors.

\*A doghouse is a must for outdoor canines and dry warm bedding.

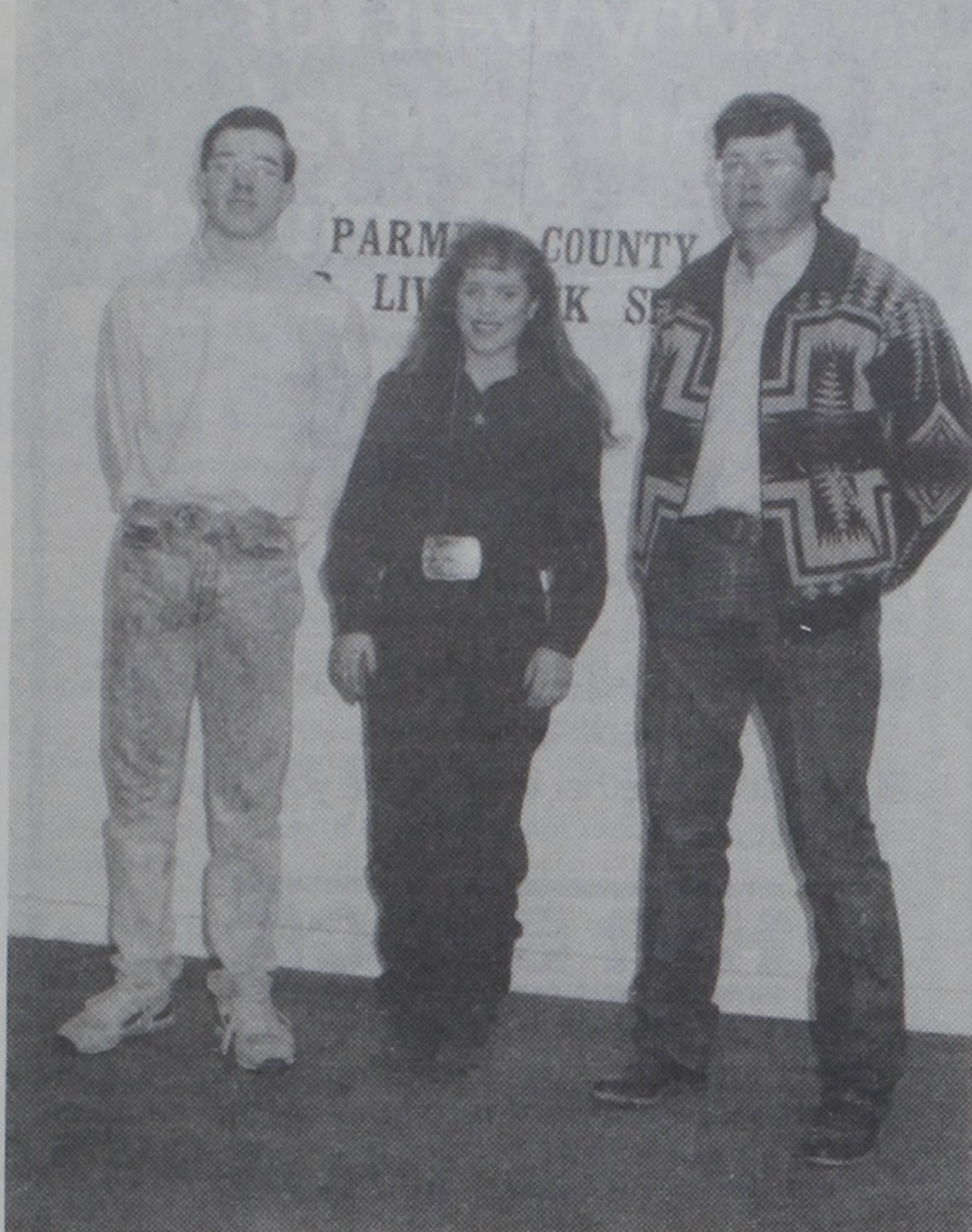

The Chieftains turned in a good game against the Hornets, but came up short for the second time against Tulia, 75-67.

The Squaws had a cold start, with only four field goals in the first half, as the visiting Lady Hornets held a 34-20 halftime lead.

But Friona came back with a good third quarter. Renee' Downey hit a pair of three-pointers; Kendra Gordon scored nine points, including five of five free throws, and Alicia Widner was six of six at the line.

"I thought we played them about as well as we could have," said Chieftain coach Ted Thomas. "They just have 'way too much height for us," he lamented, pointing out that the Chiefs managed only seven offensive rebounds all night.

Duke came up with his best scoring game with 22 points; Rogers added 17 and Snead settled for 11.

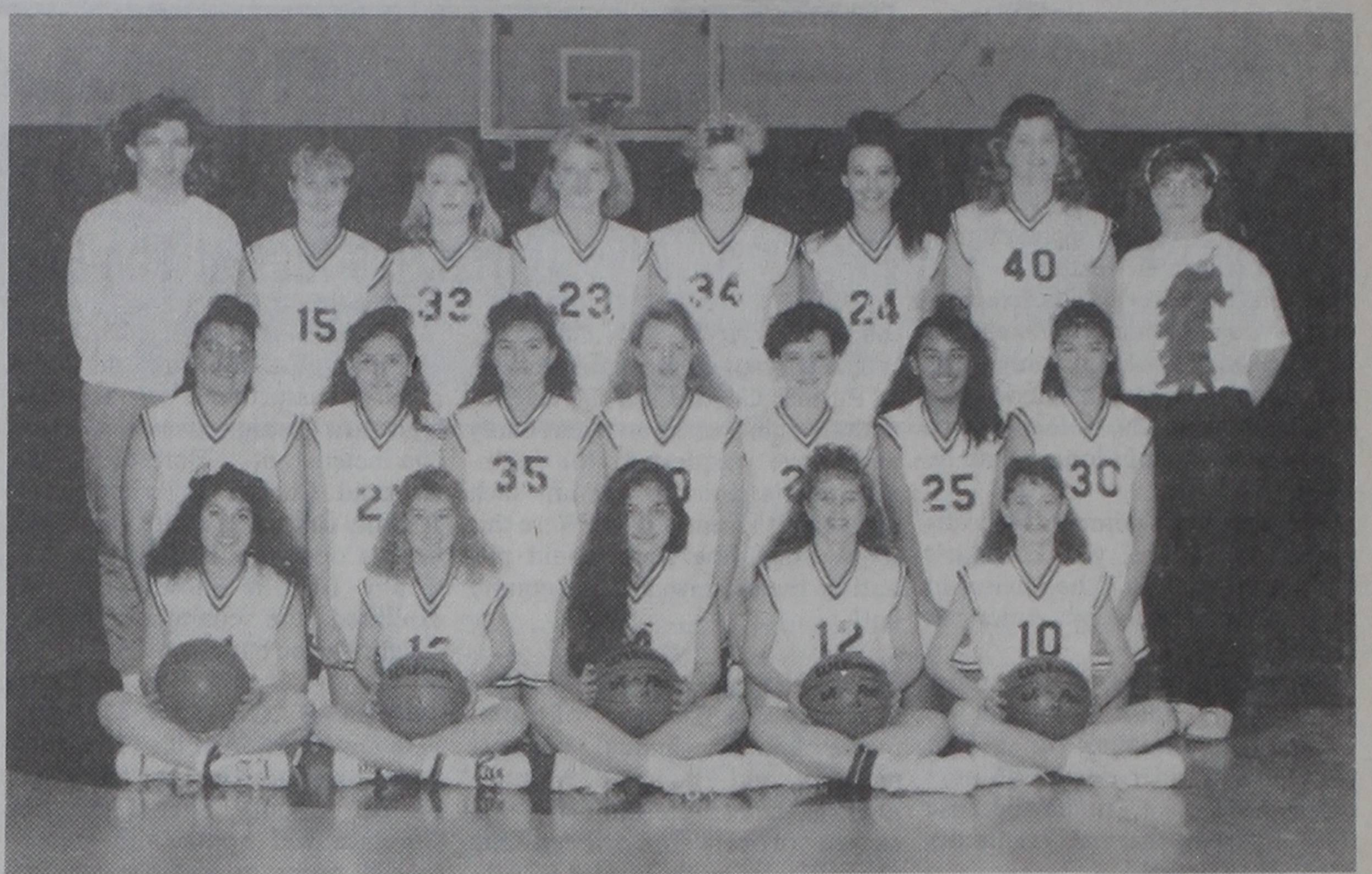

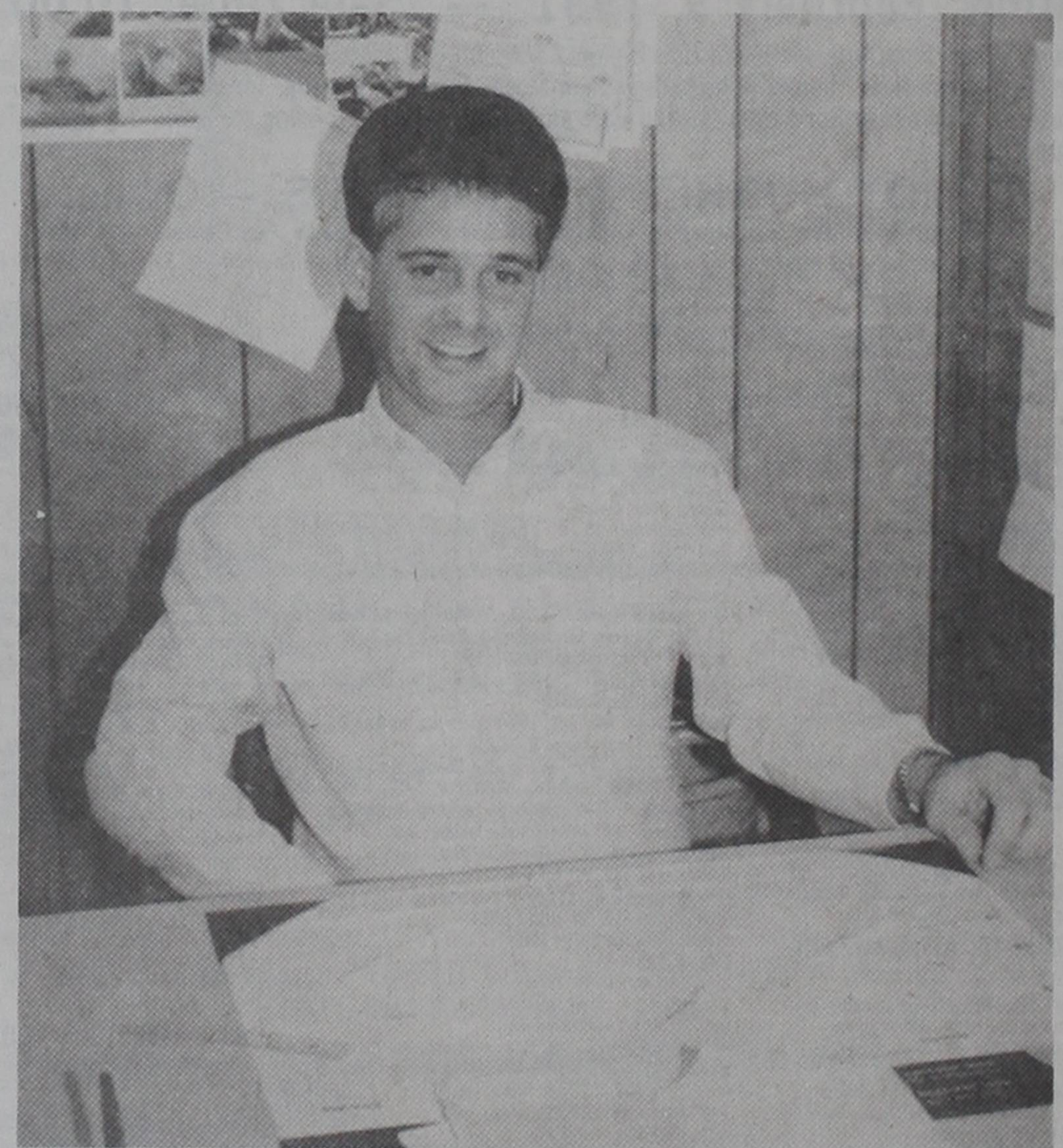

The twins are firsts for Jimmy and Andre, but Mike and Regina have a daughter, Lauren, who is two.

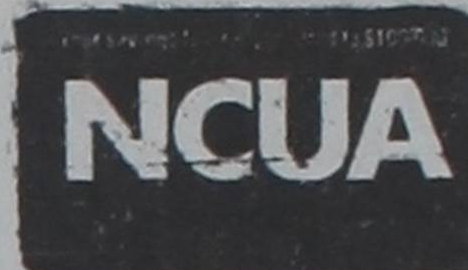

"It was a little one-sided. We played our man-to-man defense, and every time we got within a foot of their players, we were whistled," Coach Ted Thomas said.

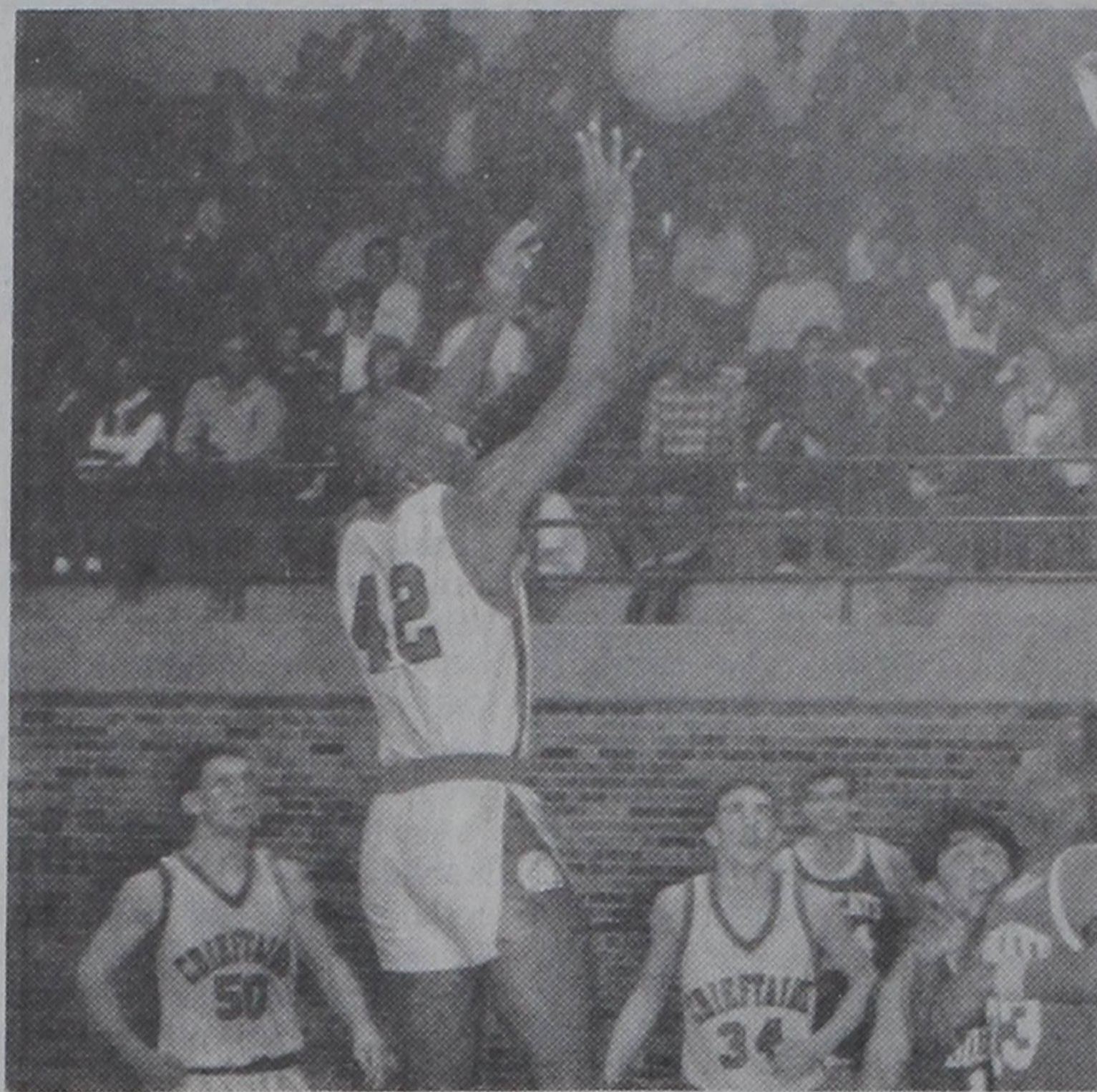
